

U.S. Firm Castro Pot Bubbles

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27 (AP)—Secretary of State Dean Rusk has pledged that Fidel Castro will be blocked from trying to export armed attack. His assurances are unlikely to quiet the crackling debate over the administration's handling of the Cuban problem. Rusk said in House Tuesday night that if Cuba tries to use its territory it "will be met with the full force of the hemisphere."

Khrushchev Says He'll Defend Cuba

MOSCOW, Feb. 27 (AP)—Premier Khrushchev warned today that the Soviet Union "would come to the aid of its friends" should the West launch any attack on Cuba or Red China. "The imperialists must know," he told an election rally in the Kremlin, "that if they unleash a new atomic war they will themselves be burned in the fires of that war."

Living Cost Jumps up in January

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27 (AP)—The cost of living in January rose 1.2 percent, as measured by the government, rose by two tenths of one percent in December. The 1959 average last month compared with the record high of 1.5 percent in January 1958.

TOKYO, Feb. 27 (AP)—Communist China said today it is ready to hold private talks with the Soviet Union on the ideological issues splitting the communist bloc. But it coupled this offer with a slashing attack on Premier Khrushchev for "double dealing" and demanded apologies. The Chinese communist party made this conclusion of the peace talks proposed by Moscow in a 70,000-word editorial in the Peking People's Daily.

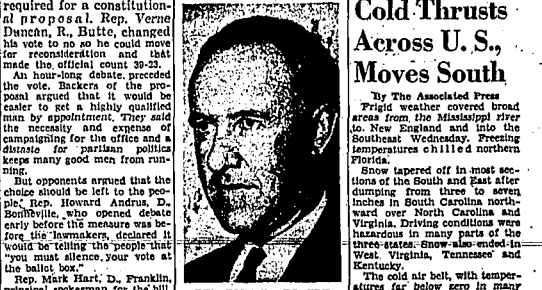

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Short Week Symbol of Lack of Jobs

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Feb. 27.—The shorter work week is now a symbol of organized labor's genuine concern over continuing high unemployment than an immediate goal.

The steady clamor for a 35-hour week is a sign of drawing attention to the fact that the rate has been stuck at over 10 percent for more than five years—keeping five out of every 10 workers can't find jobs.

What AFL-CIO leaders actually want, they made clear at a today session concluded here Tuesday, is a full-employment, anti-production economy. They feel it will take drastic government action to get it.

They propose a deep tax cut along with more public work and other forms of deficit spending to increase purchasing power and demand for goods and services.

The 35-hour work week is another available tool, but the labor leaders probably recognize the opposition expressed by President Kennedy and the seeming disinterest in congress make this a dim prospect now.

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Visitors Impressed With Many Russians in Cuba

HAVANA, Feb. 27.—Visitors from North America say they are impressed by the numbers of Russians seen in the Cuban capital and other places around this island.

"We read about them but did not quite seem to accept the report, we thought them perhaps a bit exaggerated," a Canadian caller said.

"With the exception of a very few Soviet officers attached to their embassy, who turn up at selected functions in uniform, Russians seen in Havana invariably wear civilian clothes."

Among the Russians seen here, two types are clearly defined: those working as advisers to ministers; here with their families, and those who are roughly in their middle 20s and are under flood to be billeted west of the city.

The advisers and their families have been lodged at various hotels and in certain subdivisions, such as the "Repatrio Kolybi," in the twin township of Marianh.

The others—far more numerous—come daily into Havana, riding on unmarked Soviet-made heavy duty trucks. They seem to come from an area south of Havana where, before the Cuban crisis erupted last fall, facilities for them were being built.

Convoy of tank trucks, driven by Russians, come in from the west and disappear in the direction of the oil refineries, across Havana bay. Other cars, with backs tightly shrouded in a vast, frequently 14 m.p.h. through the night, again headed westward, probably toward the port of Mariel, 34 miles distant.

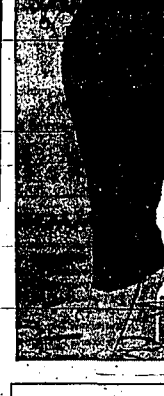

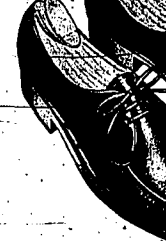
These reports concern only the rumors that have become more or less concrete. There are several more which indicate Magic Valley schools might be seeking as many as 12 new coaching faces before next football season.

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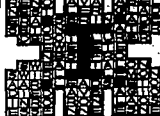

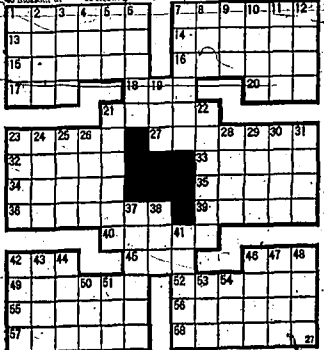

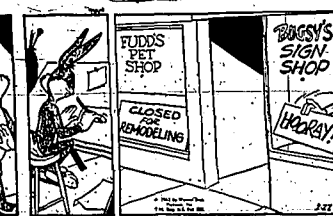

School Funds Discussed at Meet in T.F.

Ernest Ragland, superintendent of Twin Falls school district No. 411, explained the formula system for determining individual school district receipts from school appropriations during the legislative session meeting Tuesday afternoon at the American Legion hall.

Ragland said there are many factors considered in the formula, such as the daily attendance in schools, transportation costs and county assessments.

"But the heart of the formula is the teacher factor," Ragland said. "The teacher factor is a rating teachers receive for the number of years of experience and the education they have."

"The teacher factor ranges from 75 to 100 years of teaching and one year of teaching experience, to 150. Five years of training and 10 years of experience," Ragland added. Twin Falls school district has an average rating of 130.

Ragland also explained what the school district spends each year for each child. He said Twin Falls is well below the national average, which is a little more than \$400 per child. Idaho's average is a little more than \$200 per child, while Twin Falls school district spends \$225 per child a year. These figures were from a report made last July.

The schools need more money for more teachers as well as for supplies and equipment, which would raise the average cost of each student, Ragland said. He noted that school enrollment is rising. "Next year about 60 per cent of the children in Twin Falls county will be enrolled in the Twin Falls school district," he said.
