

Legislators Talk Finances Before Race Bet Action

BOISE, Feb. 25 (AP)—Idaho's legislature talked finances behind the scenes and headed toward a final decision today on a bill which would legalize parimutuel betting on horse racing. The betting bill, already approved by the senate, was at the top of the third reading calendar in the house. Legislative leaders agreed to hold up final action on appropriation bills in the senate until after a decision is reached on financing. Sen. Sidney Hansen, R. Minidoka, chairman of the joint finance-appropriations committee, obtained unanimous consent to delay until Saturday consideration of a long list of bills, already approved by the house, appropriating money to agencies which operate on dedicated funds.

He said he felt it would be unfair to approve full-scale spending by those agencies if, because of lack of revenue, it is determined that departments financed with general fund mon-

The key to the situation, Hansen made clear, is the disposition of the sales tax bill, which comes up for final action Friday in the house. If that bill is passed he said the plan is to consider it immediately in the senate under

If the senate approves, then financing is assured for a general fund budget totaling the approximately 102 million dollars reported to be favored by the joint committee. That would include a 10 percent increase in the state's general fund.

More Bills Under Study By Utahns

SALT LAKE CITY, Feb. 28 (AP) — The Utah house of representatives debated a proposed freepoint legislation today, and sponsors predicted the proposal would obtain the two-thirds vote necessary to send the measure to Gov. George D. Clyde.

Meanwhile, legislative halls buzzed with comments on school finance plans—particularly the direction the Republican majority will take in connection with Governor Clyde's school program.

Republicans met twice with Governor Clyde Wednesday on school finances. Some senators indicated after the meetings the governor wants to hold firm on his proposal to increase state support to \$4.75 per distribution unit, plus a supplemental program of \$75 for a total of \$9.50 with a 10-mill levy.

That would cost 8.75 million dollars more per year than the current program.

Rep. Robert Sonntag, R. Salt Lake, started the freepoint debate Wednesday saying it would permit shippers to use the state as a distribution point for sending goods to the West coast.

There was little open opposition on the house floor. However, Rep. Franklin Quantell, R. Logan, the minority leader, were reported opposed to the bill.

Representative Allen said the tax would lose one million dollars in tax revenue, but 600 jobs would make up the loss. He said Hercules Powder company had already indicated it would employ additional 600 men if the freepoint passed.

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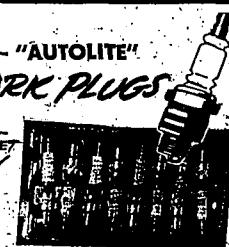

Protein is offered in a host of attractive forms—both meat and non-meat—at the nation's supermarkets this week-end. Beef and pork prices continue low or lower, with heavy late winter livestock marketing. There also are several poultry attractions.

Eggs look a drop in most markets, fresh and canned seafood items are plentiful and cottage cheese, other cheeses and dairy products in general are economy priced.

Among best offerings, roasts are strongly featured. A sampling of some price tags at a national chain includes roasts at 50 cents a pound, round roasts \$5 and rump roasts \$5.

Both cured and fresh pork items are economically priced. Poultry features include turkey in the Midwest especially chicken fryers, particularly in the Southeast, and roasting chickens.

Fresh vegetable offerings include cabbage, radishes, tomatoes, celery, onions and potatoes. Iceberg lettuce has come down in price at the same time quality has risen.

Fruit buys continue to be bananas, apples, pears and canned cherries. Also, citrus prices are slipping downward, with oranges, lemons and grapefruit becoming more attractive.

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Harvard Law Dean Slams High Court Prayer Ruling

SALT LAKE CITY, Feb. 28 (AP)—The dean of the Harvard law school argued Wednesday night that the Supreme court was wrong in ruling the "New York recent school prayer" practice as unconstitutional.

Dean Erwin N. Griswold, in a lecture on "absolutism" in the courts, said the prayer directive did not conflict with the first amendment prohibition, that "congress shall make no law respecting the establishment of religion."

"Those who wrote this 'establishment of religion' clause might be perplexed by the use which is made of it in 1962," he said.

"I venture the thought that it was unfortunate the question was ever thought of as matter for judicial decision, that it was unfortunate the court decided the case, on which the court has taken and intimated in such matters, thus inviting such litigation in its extreme form."

The supreme court ruled last year that public school recitation of the prayer, formulated by the New York state board of regents, violated the first amendment.

Griswold, delivering the annual "William H. Leary lecture" at the University of Utah law school, said the prayer was not compulsory and that no student was compelled to participate.

"Must all refrain because one does not wish to join? This would suggest that no school can have a policy of allegiance to the flag if any student does not wish to join," he said.

Griswold said courts have found Sunday closing laws difficult because of the absolutist approach and contended there is nothing literal about legislation for sabbath day observance.

"If a majority of the people want to observe Sunday as a day on which ordinary work is not performed, even though there may be some religious motivation in picking that day, I find it hard to see that there is anything wrong or oppressive in making that law applicable to all members of the community," he said.

"As long as the persons who do not care to observe Sunday themselves are not compelled to do anything."

The bill provides that hearings will be closed, except as permitted by the judge. The present law says that records will be open but the judge may restrict the access to them.

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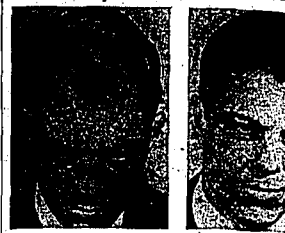
