If the economy is not made, the House will warn, administration hopes for a tax-cut "will be almost nil." The warning came from an appropriations committee task force, headed by Rep. Frank Bow, R-O. Speaker, John W. McCormack promptly challenged the Republicans to pinpoint their proposed economy-cutting program. "Other than that, nothing would come of the drive."

Supreme Court Strikes Down Union Featherbedding Practice

WASHINGTON, March 4 (UPI)—The supreme court ruled today that the nation's railroads have the right to eliminate "featherbedding." The decision affects workers in five union brotherhoods who have threatened to strike if the changes are made. In a brief unsigned opinion, the high court upheld a ruling of last Nov. 28 by the seventh U. S. circuit court of appeals in Chicago. It maintains that after routine moves, the railroads legally can go ahead with operating rule changes designed to eliminate unnecessary work known as featherbedding.

Carbon Dioxide, H2O Vapor Found on Mars

PALESTINE, Tex., March 4 (AP)—The presence of water vapor and carbon dioxide on Mars was detected during the Stratosphere II balloon flight but life on the planet would be marginal at best, a preliminary report by scientists said today. The preliminary summary of the findings of the tandem balloon carrying a huge telescope and sensing equipment this past week-end was released just prior to a news conference by researchers here. "A very preliminary scientific analysis of the infrared tracings of Mars taken on the flight shows that the telescope did observe the infrared spectrum of the planet, that it recorded bands that can be attributed to water vapor and carbon dioxide, and that the amounts of these can be determined from the tracings," the report said.




