

Tax Reform 'Nil' If No Budget Cut, Republicans Say

WASHINGTON, March 4 (UPI)—House Republicans said today that as much as 15 billion dollars could be saved from President Kennedy's record 98 billion dollar budget without harming either the economy or national security. If the economy is not made, the House GOP warned, administration hopes for a tax-cut "will be almost nil." The warning came from an appropriations committee task force, headed by Rep. Frank Bow, R-O. Speaker, John W. McCormack promptly challenged the Republicans to pinpoint their proposed economy-cutting program. "If nothing would come of the drive,"

The GOP group said a study of the budget showed cuts could be made in every item during the 12-month period starting July 1. They said this included defense and space.

They added that details of the economy blueprint would be made public as the appropriations subcommittee moves ahead with its work.

Generally, Bow said, the economy plans call for a downshift on the federal payroll, a moratorium on new government programs and a reappraisal of existing programs.

Other developments:

- Space—Space Agency Chief James E. Webb wanted Congress to be dangerous to cut the space program in an effort to pave the way for tax reduction. "It is a matter of this or that," he said, "but we must have some economy in letting the budget get ahead of us." He testified before the House space committee.

- Navy—The chief of naval operations said the navy made more progress in the fiscal year than the Cuban crisis. At least six were positively identified as Russian spies, Admiral George W. Anderson told the Senate naval services committee. The six Russian subs were forced to surface by navy units and photographed.

- Peru's Junta Chief Sees Little Change
- LIMA, Peru, March 4 (AP)—Nicolas Lindley Lopez, new chief of Peru's military junta, says the bloodless ouster of Gen. Ricardo Perez Godoy will not affect holding of democratic elections scheduled for June 9.

- The civilian minister elected today is to replace the military. Lindley, a one-time commander in chief of the U. S. army, joined two other members of the four-man junta to force Perez Godoy over the week-end.

- Lindley, a quiet, forceful man of 44 years, has not yet accepted a role to make himself a dictator.

Supreme Court Strikes Down Union Featherbedding Practice

WASHINGTON, March 4 (UPI)—The supreme court ruled today that the nation's railroads have the right to eliminate "featherbedding." The decision affects workers in five union brotherhoods who have threatened to strike if the changes are made. In a brief unsigned opinion, the high court upheld a ruling of last Nov. 28 by the seventh U. S. circuit court of appeals in Chicago. It maintains that after routine moves, the railroads legally can go ahead with operating rule changes designed to eliminate unnecessary work known as featherbedding.

The five railroad brotherhoods appealed the lower court decision, asking the supreme court to hold hearings on the case. But today's unsigned opinion said the only question to be decided was whether the lower courts were correct in deciding that the railroads had the right to eliminate featherbedding. The supreme court said the lower courts were right on this.

In other actions today, the supreme court:

- Refused to accept an appeal from Nicholas Barone, an Allegheny county, Pa., union leader convicted of violating the federal "no-strike" law.
- Refused to accept an appeal from the White Motor Company, Cleveland truck firm, that followed such a practice.

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- Viet Cong Executes 2 Missionaries
- SAIGON, South Viet. Nam, March 4 (AP)—An American missionary and one from the Philippines were executed today by the communist firing squad before the eyes of their wives and children after their cars were ambushed north of here.

- Injured by Viet Cong although not seriously—were two of the Philippine young women. Wives of the two men, an American child and two Philippine children, were not injured.
- The survivors have been brought to Saigon.

Labor Agency Celebrates Its 50th Anniversary

WASHINGTON, March 4 (UPI)—The American Labor Union looked back on a half century today to celebrate the astonishing change that has brought to the list of the American working man.

This is the department's 50th anniversary. President Kennedy will help mark the occasion, at a banquet tonight attended by some 3,000 department employees and representatives of labor and management.

The labor agency was founded on March 4, 1913, just before riding to the Capitol on his last day in office, that President William Howard Taft. It was then known as the Bureau of Labor, and was a law enforcement department. It is successor, Woodrow Wilson, a Democrat, immediately named the agency as the Bureau of Labor Statistics, and the first labor secretary.

House Asks Senate Appropriation Vote As Tax Bill Guide

BOISE, March 4 (AP)—Idaho's house of representatives called on the senate today to vote immediately on some major appropriations bills, such as public schools and institutions of higher education, to give a clear indication of how far the senators want to go in slashing budgets. The Republican majority in the house agreed in caucus to bring out no new tax measure until that is done, so there will be an indication of how much revenue will be required.

"We want to see what kind of economy they are talking about," said Rep. Arvil Miller, R. Bingham, chairman of the revenue and taxation committee.

Both Democrats and Republicans in the senate have been talking of trimming the budget to as low as \$2.5 billion dollars. Miller said the house Republicans have no such ambitions.

"They are in favor of meeting our needs, of meeting the 100 million dollar budget if that is what the appropriations committee recommends."

The joint finance-appropriations committee indicated that it has no intention of cutting the budgets it has recommended, which would total 102 million dollars. Budget for 1963 is 100 million dollars.

- House Republicans indicated in the caucus today a preference for an increase in income tax rates as the major new source of revenue, said Miller.
- He emphasized that any tax to finance a budget increase is going to hit the low income brackets. One of the major arguments against the sales tax was that it would hit those least able to pay.

- "Regardless of what route we take here, it's going to cost money," said Miller. "If it is the income tax route, it will be a substantial amount and is going to fall hard on the little man."

- ST. LOUIS, Mo., March 4 (AP)—A "freight-train" sounding earthquake shook the northwestern United States Sunday from southern Illinois to Memphis, Tenn. There was no serious damage.
