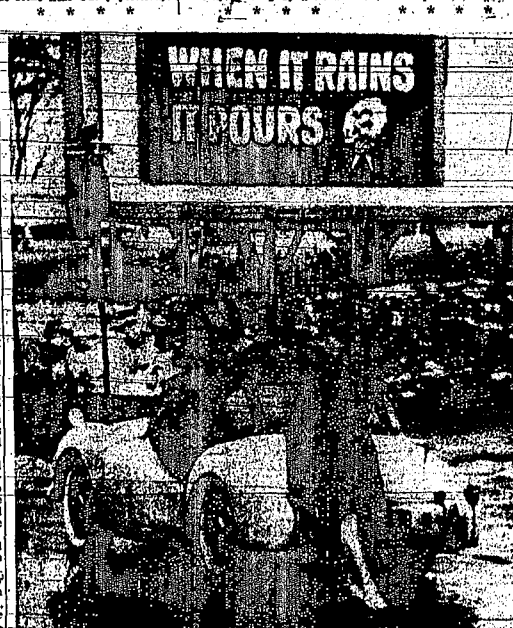

# Big Changes Have Occurred Since Old Dictator's Death

**By EDDY GILMORE**  
**MOSCOW, March 6 (AP)—**Joseph Stalin died here 10 years ago Tuesday—a trait that brought a revolution in the lives of 220 million people.  
 A decade after the demise of the old dictator, great changes have taken place in this vast land, covering one-sixth of the earth's surface.  
 First and foremost, the unspeakable sufferings of people in every section of Soviet life—all the hands of the divided secret police—have been relieved. Stalin's successors—more especially Premier Khrushchev, have choked off the near absolute power of the old cop.  
 There has been a remarkable opening in the standard of living. By Western standards, many cities are extremely costly, but that is not the point—there is no point in one to years ago they just couldn't be bought.  
 Housing still is desperately

short of the clamoring demand. The government a d m i t s i t . Housing is going forward at a great pace.  
 Ten years ago you'd seen toilet issue in the Kremlin—but now where they today? It's on sale from Leningrad to Rostov-on-Don at the equivalent of 22 cents a roll.  
 There are some current Moscow prices:  
 Man's shirt—\$8.75 to \$12.  
 Man's suit—\$77 to \$141.  
 Good grade overcoat—\$265.  
 Socks—\$2.75.  
 Toothpaste—33 cents for a small tube.  
 Men's shoes—from \$28 to \$46.  
 Food prices are high, too.  
 One lemon—best grade 35 cents, second grade 22 cents.  
 Butter—\$1.80 a pound.  
 Steak—with bone included—\$2.20 a pound.  
 Ham—\$1.87 a pound.  
 Eggs—not always easy to get—\$1.71 a dozen for the best quality.  
 Yet I saw long lines of buyers and I watched one man buy 50 lemons at the equivalent of 35 cents each.  
 Most of these items are high

by Western standards, but the point is that 10 years ago they were as much as 5 to 10 times as high—when they were available at all.  
 This does not mean that were Stalin alive today, these items at the current prices would not be available. They probably would be available. But millions of people now buying them wouldn't be consumers. They're inmates of prison camps.  
 In October, 1961, the 22nd congress of the Communist party banished Stalin's body from its resting place beside Lenin in the big red marble tomb in old red square.  
 Today, Stalin's body lies behind Lenin's tomb, near the Kremlin wall, beneath a plain stone slab that says "Stalin 1879-1953."

### Committeeman Says Powell Is High on Funds

WASHINGTON, March 6 (AP) — A high-ranking Democratic member of the house education and labor committee yesterday called Chairman Adam C. Powell's \$207,000 budget request "outrageously high." He said it should be cut just about in half.

Rep. Paul Landrum, D., Ga., ranked on the committee only by Powell and Rep. Carl D. Perkins, D. Ky., submitted a statement to the house administration committee calling the chairman's spending proposal for 1953-54 "an unconscionable affront to the members of the house . . . and the U.S. taxpayers."

Landrum recommended that the administration committee cut \$127,000 from Powell's request. He said unless it does so, respect for the committee will

cease to exist and embarrassment will be heaped upon the congress and upon each of its members."

Landrum, who has refused to claim his right to head one of Powell's subcommittees since 1951, said \$200,000 sought by the chairman for an "investigative task force" was "a shrewdly calculated 'piggy bank' and ought to be cut out entirely."

Landrum also proposed cutting each of the six subcommittees under Powell from \$60,000 to \$40,000 for the two-year period. "I do not believe that the ob-

jection of any one of these subcommittees requires such exorbitant sums of money," Landrum said.
