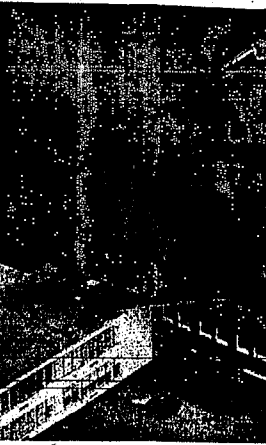


U.S. Use of Gas Is Charged

Grow Beard or Get Ducked; Jaycees Set Centennial Plan

All Twin Falls men have been warned by the Twin Falls Jaycees Vigilante committee to grow beards before noon March 23 for the Idaho centennial celebration.

Tom Moore, director of the vigilante committee and Jaycee president, issued the ultimatum Saturday. He said all men caught after that date without a beard or a shaving permit will be ducked in a horse trough full of water.

Jaycees will sell shaving permits. The permits will be placed in a blocked-off area between Shoshone street and the Reguson hotel.

Moore added that a barber will check beards to judge whether a man qualifies for the trough. Men must have an actual beard, not a waxed or dyed beard.

The Jaycees issued a challenge to all other service clubs and divisions in the beard growing contest. A mystery date has been set for the judging and several awards will be made during the spring and summer.

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Two Salary Bills for Gem Officials Reach Smylie

BOISE, March 9 (AP) — Two slightly different bills permitting increases or reductions in salaries of public utilities commissioners reached the governor's desk today.

Rep. Robert Green, R-Ada, told the house members that the senate approved a bill earlier approved in the house and the house passed a similar version.

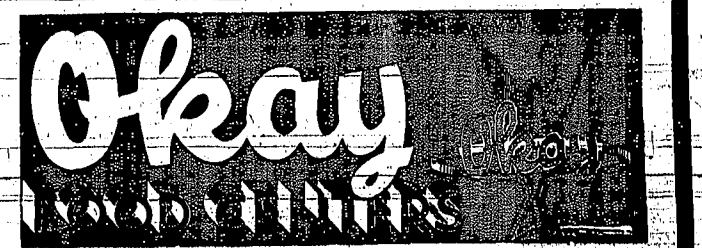

CHICAGO, March 9 (AP)—Sports of heavy selling depressed all grain prices, the board of trade. Compared with a week earlier, wheat closed off 1/4¢ to 1/2¢; corn 1/4¢ to 3/8¢; soybeans off 1/4¢ to 3/8¢ and drummed-off 1/4¢ to 3/8¢.

Delivery notices were light and easily absorbed, most buyers with the exception of rice. Hard wheat and corn enjoyed a brisk export demand, but dealers were disappointed by a sluggish interest in red wheat, soybeans and rice.

Active long liquidation weakened most wheat at the outset. The offerings were well taken by commercial houses, but ever and rarer at Kansas, Illinois and Minneapolis helped stem the decline and generate brisk upturns.

Deferred wheat was affected by moderate rainfall in the winter wheat belt. Although the market for soft wheats continued to come in, most dealers thought the possibility of extensive damage to wheat crops in heavy selling appeared in corn following news that the CCC had sold 100,000 bushels of corn. The weakness spread to oats and other grains. Processors bought actively, however, and the commodity credit corporation had the CCC offerings were expected to take some time in reaching Chicago.

Rumors of possible export business continued to trade. Prices rallied sharply on Friday, but no foreign commitments were confirmed.

Soybeans were less active than in recent weeks as demand softened for meal and oil and processors were less likely to speak a new rally in the market.

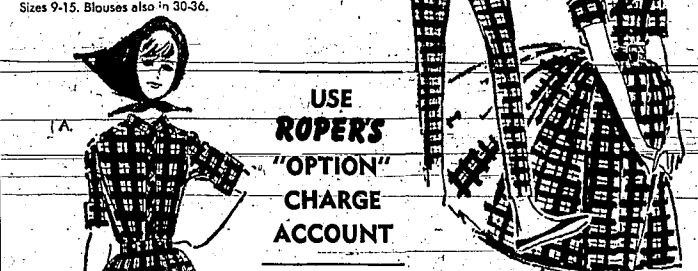

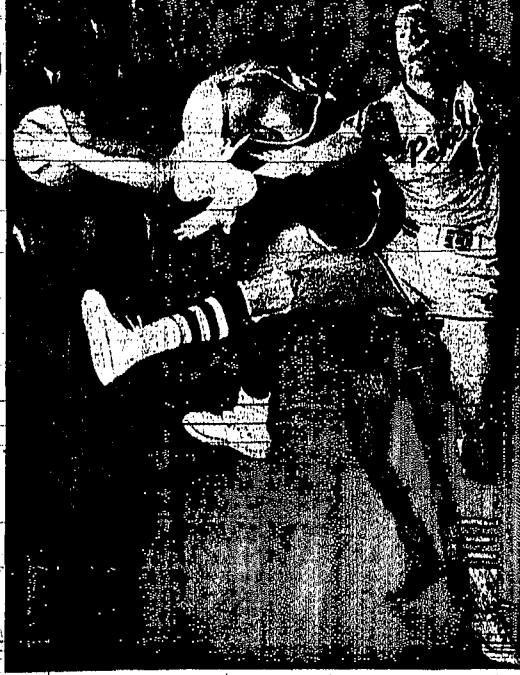

Solon Takes Issue Over Pay Report

BOISE, March 9 (U)—Rep. George Brocke, D., Idaho, today took issue with the assertion that average faculty salaries are higher at the University of Idaho than at Idaho State.

Brocke said he referred to a news story quoting the Stanford research institute report as saying that Idaho state salaries average \$40 under those for faculty members at the university.

"The budget—figures that are available to me don't bear this out," said Brocke.

He said he would present his figures to the Joint Finance Appropriations Committee in support of his contention that the budgets for the two schools should be brought into line on the basis of percentage increase over the current increase.

He said the university's budget shows an increase of 14.8 per cent and Idaho State's of 12.4 per cent.

He said for 1962-63, the average salary for an average Idaho State was \$7,979 compared to \$8,324 for the university.

Only full professors at the university had the highest salaries than at Idaho State, said Brocke. He listed figures showing that average for assistant professors and instructors at Idaho State are higher.

Brocke also said that the average per semester credit unit is higher at Idaho State than at the university. He said for 1961-62, the average credit unit was \$8.48 at the university and \$10 at Idaho State and for upper division courses \$11.80 at the university and \$2.98 at Idaho State.

House Okays New Libel Limit Bill

BOISE, March 9 (U)—The House of Representatives passed 83-1 a new libel law on Idaho that would limit liability of a defamatory statement is corrected, or if there is no demand for correction.

The measure would also alter the standard of care for a person not connected with the station, unless malicious intent is shown, unless malicious intent is shown.

The correction provision specifies that unless a person does not correct the statement within 10 days and it is not published, he can collect no more than actual damages in a libel suit.

The bill provides that a broadcast station may require copies of any speech or statement to be broadcast in advance of the broadcast.

Rep. Carl Hull, R., Canyon, said the bill originated with the radio and television industry.

He said it spells out what is privileged for the first time in Idaho law.

Matter that is privileged, or exempt from the provisions of the libel law, is defined to include legislative proceedings and "fair and true" reports of judicial, legislative or other official proceedings.

House Okays Poll Tax Measure Ratified by Gem State Senators

BOISE, March 9 (U)—The Idaho senate completed Friday ratification of a proposed amendment to the United States Constitution which would outlaw poll taxes.

The vote in the senate was 33-1 and the house previously approved the resolution.

Sen. Carl Moore, D., Nez Perce, was the only person to speak on the resolution in the senate.

He said the measure had bipartisan support nationally and he urged approval so that Idaho's name can be among the 40 states approving this amendment.

The only senator to vote against the proposal was Sen. Herbert K. Whitworth, R., Oxnobou.

The amendment would prohibit enactment of any law which would take the right to vote away from any individual because of a failure to pay any poll tax or other tax.

Senate Fight Sharp Over Anti-Pirating Measure

BOISE, March 9 (U)—Idaho senate fought a sharp night battle Friday over a more to amend the so-called "an electrical system anti-pirating bill." It amended 40-undamaged and in line for a vote early next week.

Supporters of the bill defeated 21-20 a move to send it into committee of the whole for amendment.

The bill is similar to one introduced in the 1961 session and is known as the "Burley" bill. It moves from moving its municipal power system into territory served by a rural electrification administration agency.

It had passed the house despite objections of opponents that it would prevent a city from serving people in an area it annexes, preventing orderly municipal growth.

Sen. Walter Prather, R., Boundary, said the amendments would provide that if the utility voluntarily agreed, the people in the area annexed would vote to decide who would serve them.

Increase in Fish, Hunt Fees Given Good Boost

BOISE, March 9 (U)—Backers of higher hunting and fishing and fishing fees received a good boost today when the Idaho senate approved Friday of a house-passed bill which would increase the Idaho game department revenue by an estimated \$750,000 per year.

The bill would raise 25-14 hunting and 25-14 fishing fees. Fifteen Republican and 10 Democratic voted for the bill.

Sen. Wayne Tibbitts, D., Jefferson, opposed the increased fees on grounds they would make it difficult for families who may go fishing only one week-end a year. He said he was not being fair to the sportsmen and that several senators objected to including all revision in a single package. Some said they were in favor of some changes but opposed to others.

Increases in Expense Bill Fails to Pass

BOISE, March 9 (U)—An attempt to increase expense allowances for Idaho legislators failed Friday when the senate killed a bill approved earlier by the house.

With the end of the 60th legislative day Thursday night, legislators no longer—because of a constitutional limitation—may collect their \$10 per day salaries. But their \$10 per day expense allowance for meals and lodging will be increased.

The house passed a bill which would have increased the expense allowance to \$25 per day after the 60th day. It was defeated 33-20 in the senate.

"We would be less than proper to pass this bill," Sen. Jack Moody, R., Lincoln, said. "It is my good conscience give my approval to this extra money for ourselves when we have so many other appropriations bills yet to consider."

Sen. Harry Nook, D., Valley, said principal spokesman for the measure which he said "is an important bill."

"I need to find out if I bring my lunch tomorrow," he said, "I believe in a full day's pay for a full day's work."

Sen. Hal Wallington, R., Blaine, said, "My heart bleeds for my good friend, the senator from Valley, and I hate to see him leaving his lunch. I will be honored to buy his lunch."

Sen. Jack Wood, Jr., D., Bonneville, said "I want to go home today."

Rep. Herman McDewitt, D., charged that there had been a "breach of faith" in passage of the bill by senate Republicans.

He said the bill would have made the director appointive, by the land board, appointed by the governor.

He said the house bill still in committee in the senate and that attempt to amend it in recent days have failed on party-line vote.

"It can be fairly stated if you cooperate in a bipartisan measure to force partisan legislation through the house we must accept the responsibility," McDewitt warned the Republicans.

Rep. Larry Mills, R., Ada, called a five-minute recess and then moved to indefinitely postpone a vote. It carried by voice.

Rep. William Lanting, R., Twin Falls, the majority leader, said after the recess had not decided what will be done with the bill.

Marriage Bill Voted Down, Then Passes

BOISE, March 9 (U)—The Idaho house of representatives first voted against and then for a bill permitting police judges to perform marriage ceremonies after a plea by a northern Idaho lawmaker who said it would help his cause.

The measure lost 29-20 on the first round but passed 44-8 on reconsideration.

Rep. Nathan Davidson, D., Boundary, said Idaho law now permits probate judges and justices of the peace to perform marriage ceremonies. But they work a 40-hour week in Boundary county and often aren't available when citizens want to be married.

Washington and Montana are seeking matrimony.

"The people of Boundary county would like to accommodate these folk," he said.

Rep. Charles McDewitt, R., Ada, said "I believe it is necessary to amend the penal code before giving a municipal judge the power to pass a life sentence."

Rep. W. Clay Sutton, D., Washington, asked Davidson if there were any people "up there who need to get married now who can't?"

"I haven't been up there for 40 days to research that," replied Davidson.

Sawtooth Area Hearing Set by Forest Service

WASHINGTON, March 9 (U)—Sen. Max Baucus, R., Idaho, said Friday he has been assured by the United States forest service that hearings on the creation of the proposed Sawtooth wilderness area will be held in Idaho.

Originally hearings had been planned in Ogdén, Utah, regional headquarters for the forest service, Jordan objected.

"This is a matter that vitally affects many Idahoans and the economy of our state," he said. "I am pleased to get the cooperation of forest service officials in getting this assurance that hearings will be held in Idaho."

Jordan said also that he has joined with a group of other western senators in an effort to provide more realistic appeals procedure from regulations affecting public land users.

Jordan said, "an applicant is permitted an appeal from the land office manager to the director of the bureau of land management. If his decision is adverse to the applicant, the applicant has the right to appeal to the secretary of the interior."

Many Appropriation Bills Flood Into Idaho Senate

BOISE, March 9 (U)—A dozen general fund appropriation bills are flooding into the Idaho senate. They follow closely the spending recommendations of Gov. Robert E. Smylie.

Only two call for expenditures of more than that recommended by the governor. One proposes expenditure of \$250,000 from the general fund for operations of the state land department compared with \$148,850 by the governor. The department had \$242,187 in the current biennium.

The other proposes an emergency fund of \$50,000 for the governor who had asked \$50,000.

State Land Commissioner O. J. Buxton had urged an increase in his department's appropriation, contending the money could be used to advantage in surveying tracts of state-owned land which then might be offered for sale or lease for summer home sites.

He said the demand for such property exceeds considerably the land which is available.

The appropriations of more than \$1 million dollars are for the state tuberculosis hospital in Gooding and for the operation of the state tax collector's office.

Gooding State Pre-School Class Teaches Children Communication

by G. H. CHAMBERS

GOODING, March 9—Communication, according to Washington, is the art of expressing and understanding through written, spoken or other graphic means. When the written word is eliminated, the spoken word is eliminated, graphic means then takes on more significance.

To a small group of pre-school children at the Idaho School for the Deaf and Blind the term "graphic means" may or may not play an important role in their future lives.

According to Edward W. Reay, school superintendent, one of the problems with deaf youngsters is that they receive little or no training until they are 18 months or in some cases 2 years. A center has been held out of school for several years.

The first year and possibly the second year is devoted to teaching the youngster how to communicate with others.

Often this results in a 9-year-old first grade student. However, change in the Idaho law makes it possible for the school to accept pre-school youngsters, ages 4 years old.

The totally deaf child is a pity, said Reay. Most of them are born hearing. The goal of the school is determining how each hearing the child has and help the child can be helped in a mechanical aid or some other device.

The world of silence is a huge world. When the child is able to hear sound more often it is not reproduced. It often is a sound the child hears a distorted noise depending on the loudness—this is what the child hears. This is what, it is reproduced.

According to Dr. D. Robert G. Galloway, of the Washington State College of Education, the world of sound is a hearing of noises, new sounds, a screeching sound and intermixed with the

sets such as coloring books, Watson, dolls and toys are provided for the children.

The pre-school teacher, Mrs. Walter Nelson, takes the children one or two at a time to another special classroom.

By doing this the teacher can give individual instruction. A set of earphones is placed on the youngster and Mrs. Nelson speaks to the child through a microphone. The teacher's voice is amplified and usually the child has some hearing, maybe only 10 per cent, but he can hear. By using the microphone the child can also hear his own voice. Once this contact is established the teaching can begin.

Both mechanical and visual aids are used. The child then begins to know a tree, a toy, a fish; he can point them out on charts. He can pronounce them; he can hear his own voice.

The best part of the entire program is that the child is ready to enter the first grade when he is 6 years old. At this point the child progresses at the same rate as other children. It is also possible that the child can be fitted with a hearing aid.

There is a side benefit from the pre-school program. The child learns how to get along with other children. You often the child is protected and has no idea how to participate in games. At first they become easily frustrated with other children, but this is overcome with the help of the teacher and the classroom supervisor.

The pre-school classroom at the Gooding school is quite different in that group of children are learning the simple things a child needs to know providing they keep their earphones on and the sound turned up.

Two District Court Rules Are Reversed

BOISE, March 9 (AP)—The Idaho supreme court reversed the decisions of two district courts in two opinions handed down Thursday. In the first, the high court reversed back to Judge Charles Roegstad of Lincoln county a fourth-district court decision denying costs of J. D. Nolan in a suit filed by Frank Page. In the second, the supreme court reversed a seventh-district court decision of Judge Robert H. Dunlap dismissing an action brought by a trucking firm as a result of a collision in Payette county between a truck and a farm tractor. Judge Roegstad sustained a motion by the attorneys for Page to strike the cost bill upon the ground it was not filed within time required by Idaho code which provides that a memorandum of costs must be filed and filed within five days after judgment or decree has been entered. The high court held that in this case, where findings of fact are waived, the five-day period does not commence to run until the party entitled to costs has received notification that the judgment or decree has been entered. The other case involved a collision by a truck operated by Raymond E. Sturge, a driver for P. H. McClure and R. V. Estell, operators of Empire Transport, in June of 1950. The high court said Sturge was attempting to pass a farm tractor when he collided with a truck which was driving on highway 50 in Payette county. Neither young Garrett nor Sturge was able to give an explanation of the cause of the accident and the trial court dismissed the action. In reversing the decision, the high court said there was sufficient evidence from photographs, testimony of the witnesses and other testimony to present a question of fact for jury determination.

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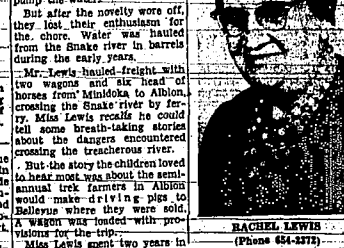

will leave the United States lagging behind the Soviet Union in a vitally needed type of aircraft. Because of this controversy there may be no public ceremony when the RB70 slicks its pointed nose out of its hangar at Palmdale, Calif.

For more than a year 1,000 engineers and technicians have been hand-crafting three RB70s in a huge hangar 70 miles north of here on the Mojave desert. Only one is close to completion. When it rolls out for pre-flight tests or its air 30,000-pound thrust engines, it will be visible from a major highway.

The first flight will be no secret, either. The RB70 will fly only 30 miles, from Palmdale to the air force research center at Edwards air force base, but its shape and its shape will alert thousands.

There will be a ground-shaking roar as the 303 engines, each the size of an automobile, rev up for take-off. As residents of this surreal-conscious area begin scanning the skies, there will occur a low-view-an-appearing-out-of-science-fiction; 240 tons of titanium and steel fabricated into a pencil-bodded vehicle 185 feet long with a triangular wing 100 feet across, where the tail normally is.

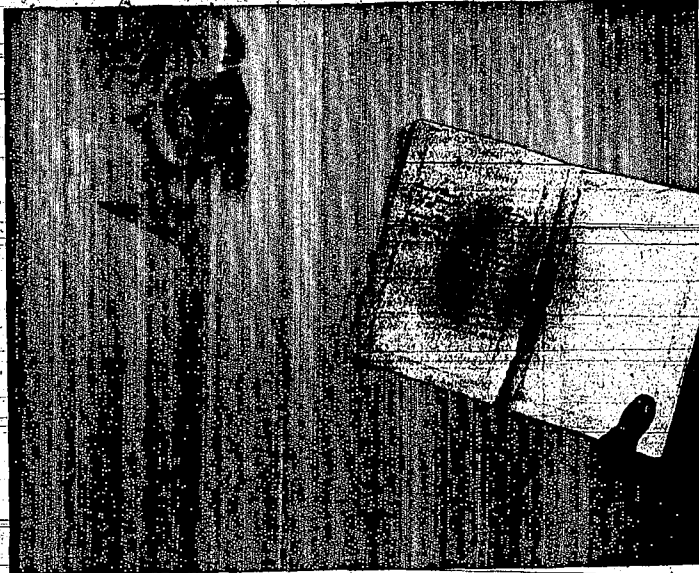

Amateur Historian Details Story of Twin Falls County From Beginning

Miller's note: Amateur historian Lee Williamson, former mayor of Twin Falls, has written a book, "The Clearwater: A History of the County," which details the history of the county from its beginning to the present. The book is available at the local bookstore.

Twin Falls County, once a part of Cassia county, was organized Feb. 10, 1907. It extends along the Snake river and covers about 3,000 square miles of territory.

It is bounded to the north by Snake river canyon and to the south by the Snake hills and Dryden. It is bounded to the east by Cedar draw and Salmon Falls creek canyons cut through it to Snake river canyon.

Robert Stuart, traveling east through the area in 1812, in his notes, commented on the deep canyon and the fact that he had found a small settlement known as Wilson-Fraser-Fraser's hole that was smashed on the rocks at Milner in 1811. He suggested that the trail which actually ran through southern Idaho.

Marcus Whitman followed the trail in the first wheeled vehicle to cross the region in 1818.

The first settlements in the Twin Falls area were the mining town of Spanglers, the town of Hansen, and Dryden.

Further west on Dry Creek in Snake river valley, there were two or three small settlements.

They were small mining towns. One was called Spanglers and was found in the sands of Snake river and was later abandoned when the gold ran out.

The first permanent homes in the area include the Herman Stricker ranch, a store and stage stop on Rock creek (now Snake hills), the John Bliss home in Snake river canyon near Craters springs, and on land now known as the Crystal Springs orchards and the Charlie Arthur home and hay ranch across the river from Craters springs.

Mr. Arthur sold half to the Shoshone ranch located near Stricker's store. The Shoshone ranch was owned by John Bliss when most of its cattle froze to death in the terrible winter of 1870-71.

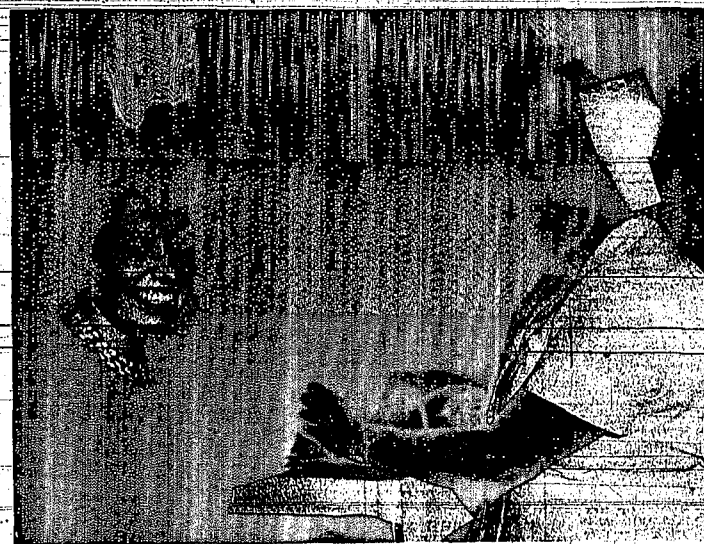

of a local Grange or 4-H club while I was seated there waiting a friend and fellow employee spotted me there and decided I was their decision, not mine. They supervised my donation from beginning to end — even arranging for a beautiful young nurse to take the painful bit of blood. (This dispelled the women's worst theory.)

I was ushered to a desk where a friendly typist took my name, address and other information. Then I moved over to a long row of chairs where a nurse stuck a thermometer in my mouth and took my temperature.

Next I sat down at a table with four nurses and three other prospective donors. The nurses keep busy performing three important jobs — checking post-puncture history, taking blood pressure and giving the "heroic" small (very small) drop of blood — taken from the tip of one finger. It was allowed to choose the finger.

The sample is dropped into a test tube of a special chemical solution. If there is a lack of iron in the blood — the drop will float. If it sinks — you're OK.

Purpose of the test is to show whether or not the donor is anemic. Each donor has his own medical history card, which is re-checked by a local physician. The visiting doctor does this time for serving at the drawings. The brief, routine medical check-up can result in a prospective donor being turned down.

Persons cannot donate for varying lengths of time after having the measles or scarlet fever — also after childbirth. Persons who have had undulant or prolonged fevers should wait two years before donating. After a rabies inoculation, wait one year. Persons having a smallpox vaccination, wait two years and for any other shot — one week.

After the doctor checked my medical history card I was handed an empty one-oz. bottle and taken to one of several tables where the blood is actually drawn. The donor's arm is wrapped in rubber tubing, lightly around one arm — above the elbow. This confines pressure to the arm while the blood is taken and also numbs feeling on the arm a great deal. There was pain, but the nurse ever had to tell me the needle was in place.

In a few short minutes the bottle had filled (till no pain) and the nurse pulled the needle out (painlessly) and untied the rubber tubing. After lying down on a nearby cot for a few minutes (you're supposed to do so to prevent any feeling of weakness) I walked, entirely unassisted, back to the table with my goodies tasted better the second time around — probably because I had earned them.

After it was all over I wondered why I hadn't donated before. It was easier to donate than it was to argue about why I didn't want to.
