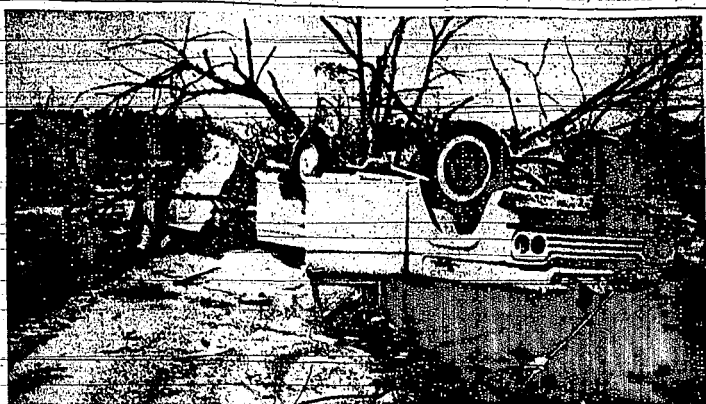

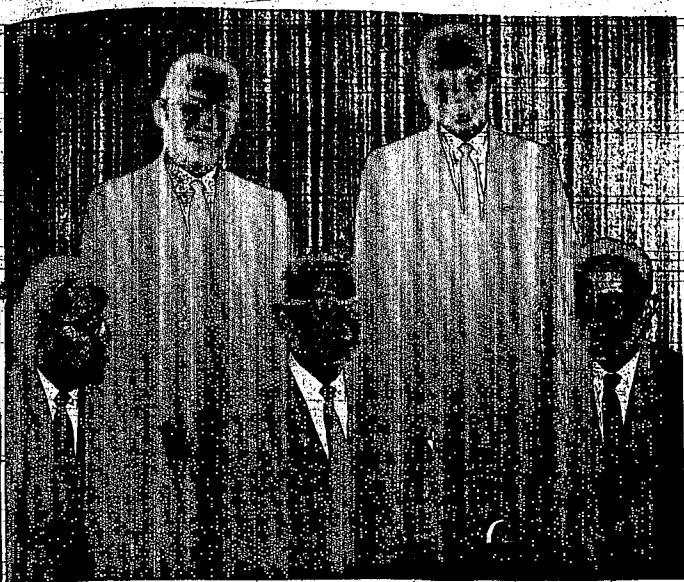

Everybody's Money

Management can make a contribution to industrial peace by maintaining a quiet life for workers in face of increasing automation.

Management can do more than hold the line for present employees by creative innovation through research and new product developmental efforts. This will help to meet the job requirements of young entrants to the labor force.

The emotional fears generated by technological unemployment are likely to increase fallacious thinking about retirement. The view that job opportunities for the young are helped by automatic retirement of older workers is based on what economists call the "lump of work" fallacy. There is not a limited amount of work, but under balanced conditions one man's production gives him the buying power with which to employ others.

With medical science advancing rapidly and the life expectancy being extended, there is ample justification for the assumption that all become senile and superannuated at precisely the same age.

Irrespective of age, youthfulness is a state of mind. Men stay young as long as they are participating in constructive growth. It is not until his last serious illness which occurred at the age of 84 continued to expand his home at San Simoun and to augment his business and publishing empire. Aging overtakes an individual when he thinks that the time has passed for growth and development. Irrespective of income requirements, it is therapeutic for older folks to continue to plan and to dream, and to produce.

Thus, many who are automatically retired by corporations at 65, seek second careers. Latin American enterprises and others have habitually stood in line to employ retired technicians of the American telephone industry.

There is a growing quiet war against the philosophy that at 65 vital personalities should be content to join the shuffleboard brigade.

Tough Sledding Ahead Is Seen for Outdoor Measures

WASHINGTON, March 12 (AP)—There's trouble ahead in Congress for two outdoor recreation bills backed by the Kennedy administration.

The senate may vote Tuesday on a measure which unexpectedly became the vehicle for spearheading a Republican fight against spending although the bill involves only recreation planning, and no money.

This measure would authorize the interior department's bureau of outdoor recreation to inventory the nation's recreation facilities and needs and then draft a comprehensive nationwide program.

The second and companion bill, calling for funds to finance a land acquisition program costing several billion dollars, appears likely to run into trouble before it gets to the senate floor.

Members of the senate interior committee in hearing last week took a dim view of several proposals in the money bill, including proposed user and entrance fees at recreation facilities in the parks and parks.

There are indications the measure may not reach the senate floor. But if it should, Minority Leader Everett M. Dirksen, R., Ill., has promised to oppose it on economy grounds.

The two bills are strongly recommended by the administration.

The money bill would reauthorize a program developed by the planning bill.

An estimated 5 billion dollars would be invested in recreation facilities under the program and appropriations of 60 million dollars annually for the first eight years would be authorized by the money bill.

To this 460 million dollars would be added half of the 100 million dollars estimated annual revenues from user and entrance fees, motorboat fuel taxes, and surplus federal land sales.

States would be asked to provide matching funds.

Berated Dictator Still "Lives" Among Georgians

 GORI, Georgia, USSR, March 12 (AP) — Denounced and denigrated all over the Soviet Union, Joseph Stalin lives on in the hearts of his fellow Georgians. "He may have been a rascal," said one dark-eyed, mustached native, "but he was our reason!"

Here, in his dusty, somewhat down-at-the-heel home town, the two-room cabin where Stalin was born is preserved as a shrine. Blk and shining, the Stalin museum attracts hundreds of visitors, mostly Georgians, every month.

The 65-mile road from Gori to Tbilisi, capital of the Georgian republic, once had many statues of Stalin. Today only one stands, a bronze statue of Stalin in an overcoat, 11 1/2 in the center of Gori's first capital, the ancient mountain town of Mtskheta. But all the bronze plaques carrying effusive praise of Stalin have been ripped off.

In these days of de-Stalinization, many Georgians feel they are paying for the fact that the man who ruled the Soviet Union for 25 years was a Georgian.

"This is a beautiful, ancient land, yet things look crummy. The old shabby town in which many funds the still stands one end of Tbilisi."

Georgians make no secret of their dislike for Russians, and the Russians you meet around Tbilisi are not enchanted by the music.

Georgians. The Russians are in a considerable minority. I suffered two minor insults in public places from Georgians who took me for a Russian. In poor Russian, one said: "Why don't you go back to Moscow? You're not welcome here."

Other Georgians treated me politely. When they learned I was an American, they treated me extra politely.

A fierce, loud and undisciplined people, Georgians are adept at profanity.

A few moments of sinister unpleasantness arose as my chauffeur-driven limousine cut west descending a high mountain.

Turning a sharp curve, we encountered a barricade of stones across the road highway.

Wisely refusing to stop, the driver ploughed through the barricade without damaging the car. As we hastily sped away from the spot, I noticed about a dozen swarthy faces staring from behind trees and bushes on the high banks beside the road.

Was this a planned holdup? The driver shrugged and pressed the accelerator.

Nobody ever offered an explanation of the incident.

WASHINGTON, March 12 (AP)—Applicants for licenses to build power dams on the Snake river between Idaho and Oregon opposed Monday an interior department recommendation for federal development.
