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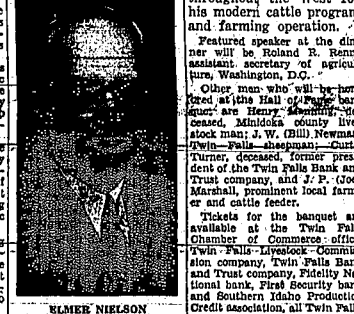

Secretaries' Association Studies Postal Procedures

Thirteen members and guests of the Twin Falls chapter of the National Secretaries' Association toured the Twin Falls post office Monday evening as part of a nationwide educational project conducted by 500 chapters in the United States.

The project originated as a result of a request by Postmaster General Edward Day to the secretarial association. Theme of the program was "know your postal service better so they can help you more."

Acting Postmaster Fred Sanger pointed out 85 per cent of all incoming mail is incorrectly addressed.

Lloyd Liberty, postoffice employe, discussed various mailing problems which were submitted to him in the form of actual packages prepared by chapter members. It was reported after understanding of postal services will save money. Knowledge of how to mail letters will be less costly and better service.

The secretaries received copies of a new postoffice folder of suggestions for addressing, preparation and mailing. It contains specific information, rate sheets, change of address forms, address labels available from the postoffice, and 15 other items.

Other topics discussed were demonstrated how to use postal endorsements such as fragile, rush, do not crush, personal delivery and others; how to pack and mail an heirloom china cup and saucer; how to mail a will; the difference between "special handling" and "special delivery"; and how to alter or eliminate the amount of COO charges after the article has been mailed.

Wife Reports Downed Flier Was Husband

FRESQUE ISLE, Me., March 14—A mother of three says her husband-flier was reported shot down 16 months ago while dropping anti-Castro leaflets over Cuba and she has lived since then on virtually no steady income.

"It's been like a nightmare," Mrs. Beatrice Thompson said yesterday. She is living with her father, Lawrence Paradis, here.

Mrs. Thompson said her husband, a native of Charlestown, W. Va., fitted the description of one of two men found in the wreckage of a small plane in a Cuban sugar cane field.

She said since receiving that information she has become resigned to the belief that her husband is dead.

The Pompano Beach Sun Sentinel in Florida has quoted a Cuban farmer as saying that Thompson and Robert Swanner of Innisville, Me., were shot down over Matanzas, Cuba, she said.

Mrs. Thompson said her husband, instructor and chief for Midbourne Airways in Florida, was not employed by the central intelligence agency.

She said he went to the airport Dec. 14, 1951, and picked up two men identified as Bill Johnson of Fort Lauderdale and Frank Fiorini, an adventurer. They flew to Andros island in the Bahamas where her husband reportedly picked up Robert Swanner.

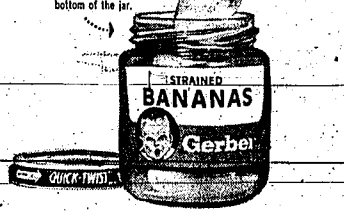

Another Spring Flood

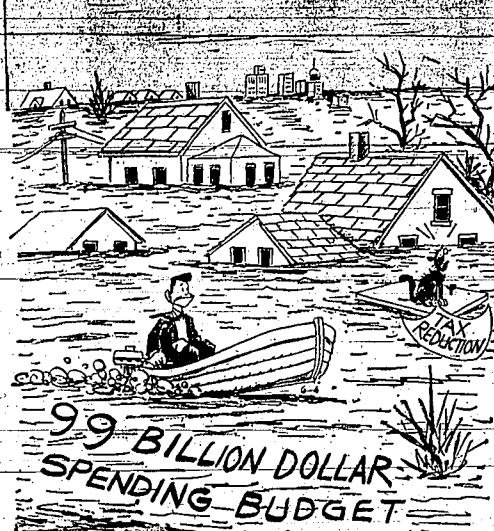

More Restrictions

As a nation develops and its population grows, a certain amount of regimentation can be expected. Basically, as density of population increases more regulation is necessary to protect the public.

It's obvious, for example, it's not in the public interest to permit a man to keep children and cats in the center of a city residential district or permit a coal dealer to block off the street for use as a place to pile coal.

There are thousands of examples not quite so clear-cut, down to the point where the individual may feel he is being deprived of his rights unjustly. And sometimes he is.

Generally, the crowded East is more accustomed to restrictions than residents of the traditionally wide-open spaces of the West. But there's a bill pending in congress, S.869, that most Westerners are likely to regard as another raid on rights.

The bill would raise funds for improvement of federal lands by charging fees of \$2 or \$3 from everyone entering on those lands. In hearings on the bill, Interior Secretary Stewart L. Udall and Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman favored the proposal. Some senators asked questions, including Idaho's Sen. Frank Church who pointed out Westerners are accustomed to free lands.

Without specific exemption, anyone and everyone visiting public lands for any purpose could be subject to payment of the fee. That might include rockhounds, hunters, prospectors, picnickers, fishermen and just plain sightseers.

Some 75 per cent of all land in Idaho is public land, so Idahoans should be a little more sensitive about any federal plans for its use. No one could possibly object to fees for use of such federal areas as Yellowstone National Park.

The federal bureaucrats will never be happy until there's a special sort of red tape to govern each and every activity and endeavor. The more red tape, the better.

Many Are Dry

Pocatello citizens will vote March 26 on three proposed bond issues in which there could be a marked difference of opinion between the wets and dries.

In hopes of getting at least part of the proposed funds, the March 23 will vote on three bond proposals, one of \$100,000 for flood control, \$170,250 to replace some bridges and \$310,250 for needed storm sewers.

As could be imagined, most of the Pocatello residents living along the Portneuf are solidly in favor of the proposals.

Yet the "wets" are vastly outnumbered by the "dries," those who are no longer being flooded out of their homes by the river. The selfish attitude responsible for defeating many bond issues, if too many voters say, "It's of no benefit to me," then the bond issue will be defeated.

When a bond issue needs a two-thirds majority for approval, it can be a ticklish business convincing the selfish majority of the voters—anyplace between 61 and 66 per cent—can favor a desperately needed bond issue and yet be stymied by one-third of the voters, plus one vote.

Pocatello residents, well aware of the possibilities, are leaving no phase untouched in their efforts to answer all questions pertaining to the bond issue. Complete information and education, plus intensive and extensive efforts to convince all possible eligible citizens to vote, are about the only means of keeping the minority group from controlling a bond election.

TWO YEARS OF DO-NOTHING—All would be quite a bit, and although it would not spare the Democrats, it would reduce many a Republican case. With such documents as a wily politician like Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey's Minnesota record on the Cuban situation, Kennedy employed with such vigor against Eisenhower in the 1960 campaign.

For Fidel Castro took over in Cuba on New Year's Day, 1959, and two years, until Jan. 20, 1961, the question of what to do about him was heavy in the lap of the Eisenhower administration. Nothing was done in that period, only reasonable to assume that the Eisenhower team committed a blunder or two and engaged in some of the "do-nothing" period.

COMMUNIST TAIN NOT HIDDEN—For instance, it was plain within a month after Castro took over that he was running a tight ship with the Argentine, Che Guevara, told me a week after the takeover that the communists were spending millions of dollars in the United States. He said, meanwhile, had recognized these United States as the legitimate Cuban government and was trying to lend Castro some money.

THEY FOLLOWED THE EXPROPRIATION OF American property, the arrest and harassment of American citizens, and the seizure of American assets. He said to show Castro how to run a communist country, Castro turned his sugar over to Khrushchev at a price well below the market.

TOO LITTLE TOO LATE—The point can be made that the time to jump on Castro was before he got into the United States. He consolidated his foothold and slammed the prison doors shut on the captive Cubans. Certainly, it was a naval blockade or quarantine, with other economic sanctions or by a military adventure—before the Russians moved in to install their missiles there.

CHICAGO, March 14 (AP) — A national railroad strike and quiet White House intervention appeared possible today after the unions and the carrier representatives on the featherbedding issue.

Just 30 minutes after Wednesday's bargaining session opened, a conference of labor unions and the railroad broke down.

H. E. Gilbert, president of the Brotherhood of Firemen and Enginemen, said the carrier representatives walked out of the meeting.

James E. Wolfe, chief management negotiator, said: "I don't think that anybody walked out. We told them we were disappointed and that we thought they were stalling."

Wolfe announced that the railroad will act as soon as possible to make sweeping changes in the work rules to eliminate what they call featherbedding. The carrier first notified the unions of the changes in 1959.

The unions, representing 200,000 members, fear that such action would trigger a strike. Wolfe said the breakoff in negotiations, the third, shows lack of a feeling of trust by President Kennedy, which would delay any strike for at least 90 days. The strike are 60,000 jobs and 600 million dollars a year.

The two sides appeared to be separated on ground rules. The railroad wanted to conduct the talks within the framework of the presidential railroad commission report of Feb. 28, 1962. This report accepted some of management's demands and management accepted the report. The unions wanted bargaining to include their proposals.

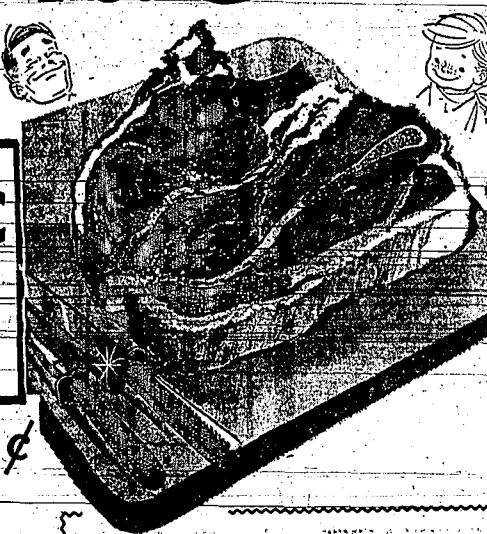

The entire ward has worked on many projects in their effort to realize their dream of a new church, Bishop Lancaster said.

One of the larger projects is cattle raising. A herd of 200 head of cattle is being cared for by the church members. Approximately 60-head of cattle are maintained at the church farm and the remainder of the herd is being cared for by church members. Interest-free loans for their time-all-funds are turned into the building fund.

The thanks of the LDS ward to the building committee has been expressed by Bishop Lancaster for their interest and cooperation.
