## Buhl Reports Teacher Pay Raise Is Out

Buhl, March 27—With the increase in costs of supplies, maintenance and other operating expenses, Buhl school trustees found it impossible to grant general salary increases for teachers and other school personnel. It was decided during a special session of the board Monday evening. Board members pointed out that because the revised school fund distribution formula adopted by the legislature fails to give the Buhl school district any additional funds for operation, the local school district finds itself in the position of having to decrease its expenditures for the 1963-64 biennium. Trustees, however, granted teachers who are the "head of a family" a stipend of \$200 per year to be added to their present salary schedule. Also all teachers in the district who have an income less than \$2,000 per year will receive a special salary schedule will receive this. They also extended the professional leave policy for all teachers to three to five days per year. Sup't. Rex Engelting pointed out it will possibly be necessary for the local school district in 1964-65 to hold a maintenance and operation levy election, unless provisions enacted by the 27th legislature, beyond the present 30-mill levy, in order to continue and maintain the established quality of the local educational program. (Local revenue will be far less than expected for all teachers.) The trustees also voted to place the names of persons owing fines in a conspicuous place in the library.

PRIVATE MUSIC INSTRUCTION of at least one hour per week will be a feature of the Sun Valley Music Camp July through Aug. 24 at Sun Valley. It is the first full-season music camp to be conducted in Idaho and the program is endorsed by the Idaho Federation of Music Clubs. Many of the finest musicians from throughout the United States have been selected as faculty members for the music camp.

### Summer Music Camp Scheduled to Start July 8, Available to Students

A unique summer music camp, the first full-season music camp chosen for public performance. Membership in the orchestra will be determined through audition. Students and some faculty members will comprise the musicians in the orchestra. All students, except those in the music classes, will participate in the chorus. The group will perform on several occasions—and will combine with the orchestra to perform an oratorio the final week of camp.

All instrumentalists may participate in the chamber music groups. The ensembles will be given two hours each week of coaching by the faculty members and will be expected to rehearse by themselves in addition to the coaching periods.

Beginning and advanced music history classes will be offered. Placement will be determined by interviews during registration.

The "master classes" will include weekly lectures and demonstrations by the faculty.

A limited number of students will be accepted for private instruction in orchestral and chamber conducting. Separate courses will be offered for ballet masters and others, consisting of ballet technique, pantomime and character.

Members of the voice department, physical education and other departments will have an opportunity to learn various techniques of opera, stage movement and acting in the opera house.

The "arts and crafts" course is specifically designed for junior high school students to acquaint them with painting, drawing, sculpture, weaving and other crafts.

Executive director of the music camp will be Jacques Brouman, Boise, who is conductor of the Boise Philharmonic orchestra, and activities director will be Donald S. Parmelee, member of the faculty at the college level, currently 12 private lessons, chamber music, music history, ear training and harmony, master classes, conducting, ballet, opera, workshop, four-hand piano and arts and crafts.

Concerts and recitals will be given frequently by the faculty, students, orchestra and chorus.

Mrs. Fernie Honderich, in-charge coordinator at the hospital, was chairman of the course planning committee, assisted by Mrs. Alleen Atwood, director of nursing service, and Mrs. Nell Wheeler, supervisor.

### Pilot Tells Of Wait in Frigid North

By RALPH FLORES  
As told to United Press International

WHITEHORSE, Yukon, March 27 (U.P.)—This was my first accident and I've flown about 450 hours in about 12 years. It must have been meant to happen, but I'm glad it's all over, and some day I hope to write a book about it all.

I kept a diary for some of the time, but then stopped. I'm going back to my plane to look at before going home to California, and I will write a book about my experiences.

How did it happen? It was bad weather and heavy fog. We were following a course which was to take us to Fort St. John, B. C.

Suddenly we ran into the bad weather and fog. I lost contact with my radio beam and I didn't know our direction. Everything was happening at once.

I dropped from 7,000 feet to 3,000 feet to try and get below the fog to get my bearings. One of my gasoline tanks was just about empty and I wanted to use every drop before switching to another one.

When I was about to change tanks, the one I was flying on became exhausted. We began to drift in other than the direction we had set.

I could see the forest coming at me. One wing caught in a tree. Then we crashed. I must have been unconscious for about half an hour.

We kept track of the days with a calendar, and for the next month and three days we camped at the camp.

We had sardines and some canned fruit and a few crackers. With my radio beam and I didn't know our direction. Everything was happening at once.

I carried a Bible and this gave us inspiration. We both read from the Bible every day. There were no special verses or chapters that gave us courage.

It all died. I left Helen alone for a week when I went down the mountain to get an S.O.S. in the snow, and she came through fine.

I picked up wood for her when I had to make a walk and for three days she was without water. She's a brave girl. A good girl.

### Miss Klaben to Lose Toes, But Will Be Home in 8 Days

WHITEHORSE, Yukon Territory, March 27 (U.P.)—Helen Klaben, 21-year-old Brooklyn, N. Y., girl, who spent seven weeks in the frozen wilderness of the Yukon-British Columbia border following a plane crash, reads in her hospital bed in Whitehorse, Yukon territory. Her doctor informed her she will lose her five right legs because of frostbite. (AP wirephoto)

Dr. Neta James said the Yukon's 21-year-old heroine will be able to leave the Whitehorse hospital next Wednesday.

Dr. James is treating Miss Klaben and Ralph Flores, the pilot of the plane that crashed Feb. 4 on a mountain in the frozen wilderness 75 miles south of the Yukon-British Columbia border.

The doctor gave this report: Miss Klaben suffered a broken left arm which apparently has healed in good position. She also suffered frostbite on the toes of her right foot and on both heels. The toes will have to be removed but the heels seem to be improving nicely.

Flores suffered a broken nose, broken jaw and frostbite on two toes. He appears to be recovering from all his injuries.

Miss Klaben was full of laughter Tuesday as she chatted by telephone with her family and close friends from a wheelchair at the nurses' station in the hospital.

"I'm a celebrity," she told her mother. "You'd never believe the attention I'm getting."

Flores also was considerably livelier than he has been since Indian trappers found him Sunday night near his distress signal that a passing bush pilot spotted.

"I feel like a million dollars," said the 42-year-old electrician and pilot after a good night's sleep.

"I talked with my wife and she might be able to come visit me," Flores' wife and six children live in San Bruno, Calif. Flores was on his way home from a job in Canada, taking Miss Klaben as a passenger, when their plane crashed.

Bush pilot Jack McCallum said he had been reprimanded for making the risky landing which resulted in Miss Klaben's rescue.

McCallum said he landed his plane in a narrow, tree-lined clearing about three miles from Mrs. Klaben's camp.

The pilot who had spotted the pair, Chuck Hamilton, had been cautioned earlier by Indians not to try to land in the hazardous flue.

After McCallum landed safely, Hamilton followed in his plane.

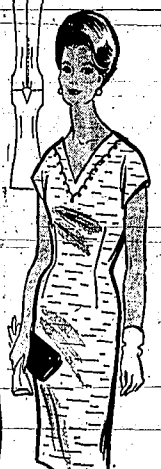

### Food for Americans

By GAYNOR MADDOX

Because turkey is good to eat and economical, it has become a popular choice for Easter dinner. The modern Belleville-type turkeys, specially developed for use in small families, need to roast about 30 minutes per pound ready-to-serve. This is in a 350 oven (325 degrees) when stuffed. Unstuffed turkeys take slightly less time.  
Turkeys should be roasted at a constant low temperature of 325 degrees. This insures juicy, evenly cooked meat and prevents drippings for gravy. Roast uncovered on a rack in a shallow baking pan. Turkey is done when the leg joint moves freely in a firm grasp. The wings of turkeys should be skewered into place, with the tip slipped in the end of the bird. The legs should be skewered, or trussed, so that they will remain in the same position throughout the cooking process. The vent openings of stuffed turkey should be closed by sewing up, or by lacing string around poultry pins or cootzsticks which have been inserted from one side of the opening to the other.

¾ cup chopped celery  
1 cup butter  
3 cup plumped raisins  
1 envelope onion salt dressing  
¼ cup water  
12 cups bread cubes  
Cook turkey in boiler until tender. Moisten blend onion salad dressing mix and water. Add salad dressing mixture, chopped apple and plumped raisins to butter and celery then combine with bread cubes. Toss together with a fork until thor-

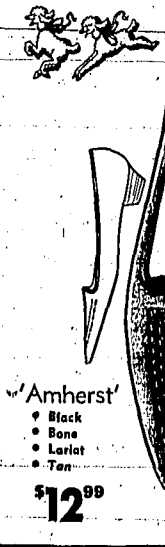

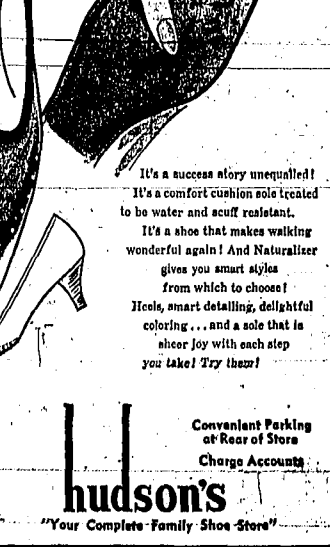
