

## Legal Attempt to Unseat Governor On Shaky Ground

BOISE, March 28 (AP)—A former Idaho supreme court justice expressed belief today that any legal attempt to unseat Gov. Robert E. Smylie would run up against a provision of the state's constitution. At the same time, State Auditor Joe R. Williams said he has no intention of holding up the governor's next paycheck on the basis of suggestions that the chief executive might be holding office illegally. "I will pay the governor as usual and will continue to do so unless I am told otherwise by the courts," Williams said. The governor said Wednesday he would welcome court action to test the validity of a section of the Idaho law which is in apparent conflict with the constitution.

## Rebels Given Chance to Dump Hoffa

PHILADELPHIA, March 28 (AP)—The national labor relations board today ordered a new bargaining election in the continuing fight between James R. Hoffa and a rebel group for control of the huge Local 105 of the Teamsters union.

The law, enacted in 1944, specifies that a governor may not succeed himself in office. A similar provision in the constitution was removed by an amendment approved in 1950.

The former justice, William D. White, said he could not recall the exact election in the constitution. He said he was not sure of the exact circumstances, but that in his opinion the constitution would prevail.

The NLRB order, made in Washington but announced here, gives the Voice of the Teamsters, a rebel group, another chance to elect Hoffa and take the local into the AFL-CIO. The voice lost an NLRB election last November by 558 votes out of 7163 cast.

That election was considered the most serious challenge yet to the Hoffa leadership of the Teamsters. It was the first such challenge to Hoffa among over-the-road truck drivers regarded as his strongest supporters.

Smaller units of the Teamsters have broken away previously, but they involved candy, milk and soft drink drivers.

## Model, Brawl On Program In Madrid

MADRID, March 28 (AP)—A model airplane program and a brawl were the main events of the day in Madrid today for Paris.

There was no indication whether the model, Christine Kessler, who disappeared two weeks ago, had been seen in Paris or returned to London.

But her departure was marred when one of two men escorting her to the airport was shot.

John Corbett, Sole political reporter of the Idaho Statesman, says the conflict was uncovered by a reporter who was in the area in preparation of a suit to uphold the legality of the party.

## Estes Found Guilty of Mail Fraud

EL PASO, Tex., March 28 (AP)—A federal grand jury today convicted John Estes of mail fraud in the handling of a dozen major insurance companies in mortgage.

He was sentenced to four months in prison and a fine of \$5,000. The federal government indicted Estes for defrauding the insurance companies by selling them mortgages listing fertilizer tanks which never existed as security.

## Kansas Boy Dies After Sniffing Glue

FREEMONT, Kans., March 28 (AP)—Stanley Duncan's life ended while he was sniffing glue. He was 19.

"I can't happen to you, you'll always tell yourself," says his mother, "but it can and it does and I pray Stanley's death will help some youngsters and parents to realize that it can."

Stanley's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Duncan, had gone to Harper, 10 miles away, the day he died—March 15. When they returned, Howard Duncan found his brother's body.

A plastic freezer bag was over Stanley's head. Glue was found in the bag. Suicide has been ruled out.

Dr. A. R. Edmundson of Harper said Stanley apparently inhaled too much of the glue and suffocated. "He died a violent death," Dr. Edmundson said.

Thousands of youngsters have found they get kicks from breathing fumes from glue used for model airplanes. You can buy a tube for a dime.

The fumes damage the liver, lungs and frontal lobe of the brain and bone marrow where blood cells are formed.

## Saturn Logs Fourth Successful Flight

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla., March 28 (AP)—The Saturn super-boosted, forerunner of a manned moon rocket, registered its fourth straight test flight success today and demonstrated that it can operate if one of its eight engines fails.

With its mammoth power plant generating 1.3 million pounds of thrust, the world's largest known rocket broke away from its launching pad at 3:12 p.m. Performing with a foot projectile race across a clear sky, climbed to an altitude of about 77 miles before plunging back to break up and sink in the Atlantic ocean about 200 miles southeast of Cape Canaveral.

The national aeronautics and space administration announced that all phases of the flight took place normally.

The brief 7-minute test was the last test for Saturn's first stage only. Flight tests for the second stage will start in a few months, aiming at a time when the whole assembly will carry a manned capsule to the moon.

One of the Saturn's four in-board engines was shut off deliberately after 100 seconds of powered flight to simulate a failure. The fuel intended for the dead engine was routed automatically by a pressure system to fire other seven engines.

## Castro Warns Cuba May Get Bombers To Guard Shipping

HAVANA, Cuba, March 28 (UPI)—Premier Fidel Castro warned today that Cuba may have to acquire long range bombers and warships to protect its merchant shipping against American "aggressors." Castro made his threat in an official statement which accused the United States of responsibility for armed attacks on two Soviet freighters in Cuban ports and for the recent crash of a Bolivian airliner. He said the United States was behind yesterday's attack by Cuban exiles on the Soviet freighter Baku while it was loading sugar in the north coast port of Calabrien, leaving it heavily damaged.

Castro also blamed the United States for the March 18 stranding by another group of Cuban exiles of the Soviet freighter Legu in the adjoining port of Isabel de Segun.

In Washington, the state department confirmed that sea-borne raiders attacked and damaged a Soviet ship long ago and in a Cuban north coast port. It said it had no idea where the assault was made.

(Anti-Castro Cuban exiles have claimed credit for both attacks. Gen. Maxwell, the official Soviet news agency press carried a dispatch from Havana saying that the attackers of the Baku caused "serious damage" and "endangered the life of the crew."

"Castro said a 'pirate warship' attacked the Baku in Cuban territorial water and fired several salvos from 20-mm guns and machine guns.

"After this," Castro said, "the warship approached Baku and fired a torpedo which blew a hole four yards high and almost half a yard wide in the hold. This endangered the life of the crew. Serious damage was caused to the Soviet merchantman."

Castro criticized the United States for its alleged "criminal actions."

## British Firm On Pipe Sale To Russians

LONDON, March 28 (AP)—Diplomatic sources said today British stands firm by its refusal to ban sales of oil pipes to Russia.

The British stand emerged as U.S. Undersecretary of State George Ball met with Lord Privy Seal Harold Caccia for a round of the latest Anglo-American conflict.

The two leaders met over lunch as guests of U.S. Ambassador David Bruce.

The discussion ranged over a number of economic problems, including the forthcoming round of tariff negotiations in Geneva, according to the sources.

The problem of possible British sale of oil pipes to the Soviet Union is said to have been one of the major topics of the talks. Ball is en route to the Bilderberg conference at Cannes, France, for a discussion of international problems.

The Anglo-American dispute, which flared over reports of a British 28 million dollar deal for steel pipes to Russia, was set off by a series of consultations in Washington, London and Bonn.

## Galena Has Foot Of Snow In Storm

A spring storm dropped moisture throughout Magic Valley Wednesday night and Thursday morning, with rain reported at the lower elevations and snow in the mountains. One foot of new snow fell at Galena lodge, according to Mrs. Reuben Alfred. Eleven inches of new snow were reported on top of Bald mountains at Sun Valley, making 47 inches there. There are 31 inches at the Roundhouse and about four inches on the valley floor at Ketchum. Snow measurement at Hailey showed only .4 of an inch had fallen there Wednesday, the forest service reported. It was 29 of an inch of precipitation.

It was raining throughout Magic Valley Thursday morning and at Burley 33 of an inch of precipitation was recorded by the weather bureau. Rain fell at noon and the rain was mixed with wet snow, which was melting, as it fell.

But rain, snow, sleet and hail fell on Wednesday because of lack of snow and it was reported these rains will be cleared for the season. However, good skiing is reported on Bald mountain.

Old-timers in the Hailey area predicted a "real" storm for the near future because a huge flock of robins landing together like a flock of geese, was seen flying southward out of the Wood River valley Thursday morning.

It is claimed, when the robins leave in the early spring, bad weather will follow.

It rained hard throughout Wednesday night at Fairfield and a drift of light snow was reported there Thursday morning. Heavier snowfall in the mountains to the north was reported, but no measurements were available.

Stockmen in Gamas prairie and mountain areas were urged to watch their livestock for precautions with their livestock.

## Navy Captain Comments on TFX Choice

WASHINGTON, March 28 (AP)—The Pentagon made public today a navy captain's evaluation saying there was no clear-cut navy choice between competing designs for the TFX warplane but that it gives a slight edge to the General Dynamics corporation design finally selected.

At about the same time the senate investigations subcommittee released testimony by a representative of the defense contractor to General Dynamics would not produce the best plane.

The contradictory development was reported by a spokesman for the defense secretary Robert B. McNamara, publicly defended, before still an undecided choice of the Port of Worth, Tex., firm's proposal over a rival bid by the Boeing company, Seattle.

McNamara said, as he has before, that the General Dynamics design will have "at least a billion dollars in development, production and operating costs over the life cycle of the aircraft." He appeared before a defense procurement subcommittee of the senate-house economic committee.

The Pentagon memo on lack of a clear-cut choice, dated Nov. 2, 1962, was prepared by Capt. John T. Sheppard, navy air chiefman for the TFX evaluation group. It was one of a series of preliminary studies leading to the final selection of the General Dynamics design.

Sheppard listed 14 points of comparison in which he gave his qualifications, an edge to General Dynamics. The points and to Boeing on five. Others showed little or no difference.

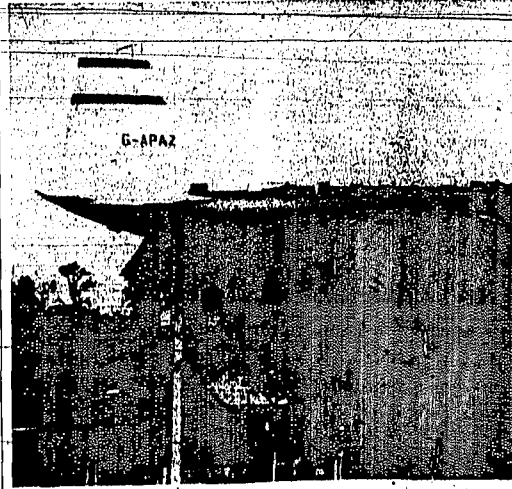

POCATELLO, March 28 (AP)—An investigation into the probable cause of two plane crashes Saturday night is completed but civil aeronautics board investigators are holding up disclosure of their findings.

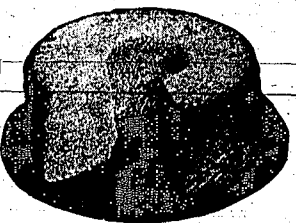

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# News Around Idaho

**DRIGBO, March 28**—Trustees of the Teton county school district Wednesday were considering a recommendation to boost allocations for teachers salaries to 200 cents of the state's present 85 per cent cost for teacher salaries. The recommendation is one of four presented by the Teton county teachers association in its one-week plan. Others include giving teachers who are heads of households additional pay, providing fringe benefits for insurance and making more liberal established policies on emergency leaves and professional fees.

**IDAHO FALLS, March 28**—Idaho's territorial centennial will be spotlighted here Saturday when 21 small stepping high school drill teams and 100 school bands will participate in a band twirling clinic. The teams, some accompanied by school bands, will come from throughout southern Idaho and northern Utah to show off their precision drills at the annual twirling and drumming clinic starting Monday. The clinic will start off at 9 a.m. It will be conducted by Lynda Crockett, head majorette of the University of Utah marching band. At 10 a.m. participating units will parade the grounds around Idaho Falls. Gov. Robert E. Smylie will serve as grand marshal.

**BOISE, March 28**—Four large watercolor paintings, on loan from Idaho State college, were put on display this week in the office of Gov. Robert E. Smylie. The governor said the paintings were loaned to him by John D. Brown, the state's first department and Raymond Obermyer and Don Brown, assistant art professors at the college. The paintings were done from sketches made of mountain ranges in the Idaho primitive area.

**BOISE, March 28**—Selection of Edgar B. Jensen, Boise architect, as a subcommittee chairman for the governor's committee on government of the state, was announced Wednesday by Gov. Robert E. Smylie. Smylie said the subcommittee will study barriers which prevent, or make it difficult for, people with physical disabilities to use the state's business and public buildings. Jensen said studies will be undertaken to determine how extensive the problem is in Idaho. "It has been learned," he said, "that barriers exist to a surprising extent in all sections of the country."

**BOISE, March 28**—Progress was reported Wednesday in the drive by the Idaho state auditor to raise 1963-64 to finance its operations this year. George T. Cunningham, Boise, chairman of the budget and finance committee, said early reports from local treasurers show about 90 per cent of the 1963-64 fiscal year corresponding period last year. Cunningham said three counties—Minidoka, Washington and Franklin—have surpassed their 1963 goals, and seven others have exceeded them. The counties are Clearwater, Canyon, Payette, Butte, Custer, Benewah and Ada.

**BOISE, March 28**—Potatoes used in processing during the first eight months of this marketing season totalled 10 per cent less than in the corresponding period a year earlier, the U.S. department of agriculture reports. The agency said potatoes processed in 1962 had this season amounted to 11,857,000 hundredweight compared with 13,187,000 a year earlier. But processing for starch, flour and alcohol used only 1,189,000 hundredweight, a 4 per cent increase over 1,139,000 a year earlier.

**POCAHONTO, March 28**—Fifty-two employees of the Clay company will immediately return to their jobs. The J. R. Simplot company said plans call for immediate opening of operations of the mine. The Simplot employees are members of the Operating Engineers Union. The mine closed after a breakdown in contract talks between the company and union.

**BLACKFOOT, March 28**—The man who claims that he is the 12-year-old murderer of an Idaho Falls plumber, District Judge Ezra F. Hansen, said today that he probably sometimes in May, 1948, an escapee from state hospital south, previously had waived a preliminary hearing on a charge of murdering Edward "Red" Wilson on the back of fingerprints in Blackfoot. He claims he is Roy Albert King.

**IDAHO FALLS, March 28**—Recreational and canal water have averted disaster for farmers in southeastern Idaho this year. Despite a relatively dry season across the state, there is plenty of water available for irrigation. The Snake river basin, near Eagle, watermaster of Snake river district No. 36, in fact, unless you're a farmer who lives where stored water is inaccessible, things ought to be pretty good. He predicted that the natural flow of the Snake river will be about the same this year as the dry years of 1960 and 1961.

## Inter-American Press Stings Government Press Policies

**MONTGOMERY, Ala., March 28**—The Inter-American Press association today said it has fought Latin American limitations on freedom of the press for 18 years, in the name of the official U. S. effort to "manage news."

Florida Publisher John H. Perry told the IAPPA freedom of the press committee yesterday that the U. S. press still is free, but that government has limited information through last fall's Cuba crisis "chilled a huge chip out of the foundation stone of American liberty."

"The committee will receive final reports today," Perry said.

Perry's report on the U. S. press said government news management is "the greatest single threat to the free flow of information to the American public."

Perry is president of the Perry Publications of Florida.

The "reference specifically to Assistant Defense Secretary Arthur Sylvester's statement that 'news is part of the arsenal of weapons'."

"Military secrecy remains our biggest government information problem," he said, "it is difficult to draw the line between information to be kept from a potential enemy which the American people must have."

"We are going to have a Democratic form of government, with power in the hands of the people, we must have a free flow of information from the government to the people."

Perry cited the following specific provisions of U. S. press freedom:

"The federal communication commission's decision to limit the broadcast programming, reflected by its withholding of 100 AM, FM and TV licenses in California, and the progress of the fight on ownership and competition in the newspaper business."

"The American flag association's decision to perpetuate a

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**Air Force Seeks 'Quick Draw' Missile**

CAPE CANAVERAL, March 28 (AP)—The air force is looking for ways to make its minimum "instant ICBM" quicker on the draw.

The 54-foot Minuteman is the bulwark of America's land-based striking force because it can launch a nuclear warhead to a target more than 6,300 miles away on just 22 seconds' notice. But in a space-age all-out war with computers doing the thinking and missiles in the fighting, even 22 seconds may not be fast enough. The air force would like to narrow that to 16 seconds.

The way for future tests toward this end was cleared last night when a Minuteman rocket blasted from an underground launching site on Cape Canaveral and streaked more than 4,000 miles to a target in the Atlantic ocean.

The success closed out a four-shot series bridging a gap between the earlier Minuteman Wing-1 missiles and the more advanced Wing-1 version. Missile experts now will work on the problems of increasing the Minuteman's range and payload and in bringing down that 22-second "reaction time."

The United States already has about five dozen nuclear-tipped Minuteman rockets on station in concrete-lined launching sites at Minuteman air force base near Great Falls, Mont. These are Wing-1 rockets.

The Wing-1 missiles will be tested in the near future from Cape Canaveral have improved upper stages as well as some computer improvements.

Experts indicated they believe it is only a matter of time before the 22-second reaction time will be cut in half. "We're working toward that end, and the progress so far is satisfactory," said one.

### Smylie Signs Bills to Hike Officials' Pay

### Death Toll of Bali Volcano About 1,600

JAKARTA, Indonesia, March 28 (AP)—Indonesian authorities today placed the death toll from the March 17 volcano eruption on Bali at 1,600 and said as many as 40,000 persons are missing.

Mrs. B. Abdul Rahman returned Tuesday on a three-day inspection of the island with the official death figure. She said another 200 persons were killed and 75,000 have been removed to safe areas.

Bill Gove, Sutedja said the fate of from 3,000 to 40,000 villagers who lived on the northern slope of the volcano, 10,500-foot Mt. Gunung Agung, still is not known. He said the area is cut off from the rest of the island by rivers of lava and is accessible only by sea or air.

"We do not know how many people were killed or died of starvation in the area," he said, adding that food supplies normally had to be brought in and may be exhausted by now.

Most of the dead, a total of 1,100, were killed in five villages on the southern slope of the volcano. One group of 200 who had sought refuge in a mosque was wiped out when lava swept away the building.

WASHINGTON, March 28 (AP)—A Beverly Hills, Calif., real estate broker was indicted Wednesday for mail fraud in connection with the sale of desert land covered with sagebrush and weeds near Elko, Nev.

The justice department said the indictment against E. H. Johnston, 38, was handed down by a grand jury in San Francisco.

The indictment charged that Johnston, operating as the Comstock Land company, represented the land as lush, green meadows with ready access to water and utilities.

# Stalin Era Still Grist For Writers

**PHOENIX, March 28 (AP)**—The Stalin era still is grist for the mill of Soviet writers, but there were indications that freedom of literary expression remains curtailed in other areas.

As if to illustrate both points, a new exposure of former President Stalin's labor camps was published yesterday. At the same time the 3,000-member writers union met to deal with rebellious members.

The new labor camp tale by the well-known author Boris Dnukov appeared in the Leningrad Life magazine Zvezda (Star).

It told about a student who was sent to Siberia for 10 years because he complained about flouting discipline in a loaf of bread and an old man imprisoned for taking down a Russian flag because it was tattered and worn.

At the second day of the third session of the Soviet writers Union, young poet Yevgeny Yevtushenko admitted he made a "major mistake" in letting the French magazine Express publish some of his autobiographical comments. But he charged the Express sensationalized and distorted the account, according to an account by the official Tass news agency.

Yevtushenko came under fire from Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev three weeks ago when the Soviet leader cracked down on artists and writers showing symptoms of dissenting from the communist party line.

According to Tass reports, Yuril Zhukov, commentator for the communist party newspaper Pravda, yesterday criticized Soviet writers for "improper behavior" abroad.

He attacked Yevtushenko for the "inaccurate, absurd and simply harmful interpretation of our life" reflected in the Express article, according to Tass.

Zhukov also warned that those among the western press who expected "oppositional" speeches from Soviet writers would be disappointed, Tass said.

## Loyalty Oath, Other Bills Authorized by Gov. Smylie

BOISE, March 28 (AP)—Gov. Robert E. Smylie on Tuesday signed a bill requiring all state employees, teachers and school employees and employees of counties and municipalities to sign a loyalty oath.

The bill requires signing of written declaration that the person has not belonged to an organization dedicated to overthrow of the U. S. or state government within the past five years.

It was one of 38 bills signed by the governor, the majority of them appropriations for various state agencies.

The loyalty oath bill was passed by the senate 22-0 but was almost killed on a motion to table before passing the house.

Opponents complained that the bill did not provide a specific list of organizations which are used by the federal government.

They also contended that it

delegated a particular group of citizens for suspicion, and that truly disloyal persons wouldn't hesitate to sign the oath.

But backers said that perjury charges against persons who falsely sign such oaths has been an effective weapon against communists.

They also contended that working for the state was a privilege, not a right, and that the state had a right to protect itself by requiring an oath.

The law is scheduled to become effective in 60 days.

Other bills signed are measures which will:

1. Require newspaper publication of a detailed financial statement by school boards within 60 days after the end of each fiscal year.
2. Authorize use of a special census by the U. S. census bureau in determining the population of a city or village for the purpose of levying liquor licenses.
3. Authorize school districts to provide instruction for trainable mentally handicapped persons from ages 6 to 21, as recommended by the children's commission.
4. Provide that the legislative council will assist the director of the budget in preparation of the biennial budget.
5. Require the state highway board to conduct a public hearing, if asked by petition, before it can order abandoned any highway leading to public lands or water.
6. Exempt from the property tax equipment used for air or water pollution control, if it can't also be used for production of a marketable by-product.
7. Authorize the state land board to accept land for an addition to Mary Mierva McCrocker state park in Latah county.
8. Permit two or more offenses to be charged in a single criminal indictment.

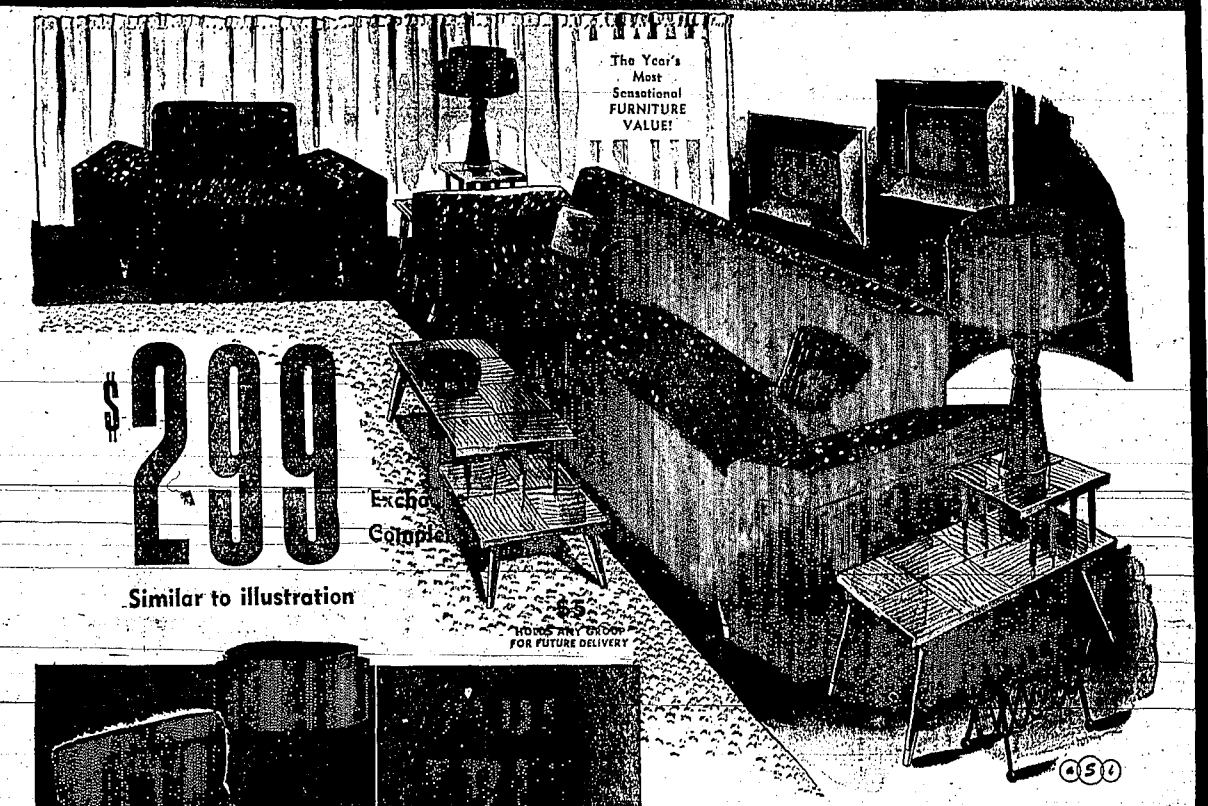

### Gem Students Face Change In Utah Law

SALT LAKE CITY, March 28 (AP)—The state tax commission has announced a new program on requiring out-of-state college students to buy Utah license plates and pay car property taxes.

Commission Chairman Orville O'Leary said Tuesday out-of-state students would not be required to buy the plates or pay the tax this year but would have to if they return next year.

O'Leary announced the program after conferring with schools which will be exempt from buy-

county assessors last week. He outlined the program this way: Students now attending Utah schools will be exempt from buying license plates and paying the tax on cars this year.

Next year, starting with Jan. 1, those students returning to Utah will be required to buy the tax and pay the plates.

Those students attending Utah schools for the first time next year, however, will be exempt of the requirements during 1964, but upon returning in 1965 would be required to have the plates and pay the property tax.

The issue of out-of-state students having to conform to the Utah requirements was brought up by Idaho legislators during last legislative session. The Idahoans appealed to Utah legislators to amend the Utah laws,

### Astronaut Cooper Assigned Many Photographic Duties

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., March 28 (AP)—During his forthcoming orbital flight, astronaut Gordon Cooper will switch off the lights in his space cabin and attempt to photograph a phenomena familiar to amateur and sunset fan-

"The mystery he will try to record is nocturnal light—fast-recognition glow visible in the east just before dawn and in the west after sunset."

The assignment was discussed by one of Cooper's fellow astronauts, M. Scott Carpenter, in a speech prepared for delivery at an Optical Society of America meeting in Jacksonville.

Cooper is scheduled to ride a modified Atlas rocket into space in about six weeks for a 22-day sweep of the Earth.

Carpenter, the third American to orbit the Earth, said on previous flights the requirements of operating his spacecraft did not permit turning out the internal lights in the cabin, so it was impossible to observe nocturnal light. But Carpenter said provisions have been made for Cooper to do so.
