Rebellion Hits Chinese Reds; Casualties High

CALCUTTA, 476—The predominantly Muslim population of red China's Szechwan province rebelled against the Chinese communists in mid-November, according to reports reaching the Indian state of Sikkim on the Tibetan border.

The Calcutta Daily Hindu's correspondent in Gangtok, the capital of Sikkim, reported the revolt today, quoting travelers from the area. Both sides used Russian-made weapons in the conflict, according to the reports.

Outcome of the revolt and details are not available, the newspaper said, because there are no foreign diplomatic representatives in Tibet or any place close to Sikkim who could report on the reports.

Disarmament Talks Have 'No Progress'

GENEVA, April 3 (AP)—The United States and Russia were resigned today to reporting "no progress" in disarmament talks to the United Nations.

The proceedings during the past two months have been mainly a restatement of the Western and communist position on disarmament measures and a nuclear test ban, and procedural wrangling.

The Western and eight nuclear delegations have attached paramount importance to the nuclear issue, but the Russians have refused to negotiate the question unless the United States accepts their quota of three annual on-site inspections to police a ban. The United States has insisted that seven inspections are necessary, creating a tight deadlock.

News Around Idaho

FOCATELLO, April 1 UP—The Focatello school board asked its teachers Monday night to decide the bare minimum they will accept in pay increases and to be as conservative as possible. Information on the minimum acceptable rate is about all that is known before the board can determine how much more will have to be raised. After July 1 when a new law goes into effect, school districts can raise taxes as high as they want, as long as it is approved by the taxable vote of the taxpayers. The Focatello school board is studying the possibility of raising the mill levy.

KELLOGG, April 3 UP—The 1964 Idaho State DeMolay convocation will be held at Moscow, some 250 delegates decided before their annual meeting here earlier this week. William Carpenter has officially taken office as Master counselor of the Idaho DeMolay, Charles Walton, III, Moscow, was chosen state senior counselor and John Kahley, Nampa, state junior counselor.

BOISE, April 3 UP—Kenneth Dale Watson, 23, Caldwell, pleaded guilty Tuesday in federal court here to a charge of wilfully and maliciously destroying a rural mail box near Caldwell. District Judge Charles A. Clark ordered the case continued pending a presentence investigation. Watson and another man, Cody Arthur Lyon, Jr., 23, Seattle, were charged in grand jury indictments with destroying a mail box belonging to Oscar Aldrich, Caldwell, last Feb. 25. Court records show Lyon is scheduled to appear in court for arraignment on April 4.

IDAHO FALLS, April 3 UP—The Idaho operations office of the atomic energy commission says it will award contracts for \$250,000 worth of miscellaneous construction work at the national reactor station west of here to business firms with average annual receipts not exceeding \$25 million dollars. Officials of the Idaho office said they will issue specifications for the work next week.

Ralph Harding, Idaho's second term Democratic congressman for the second district, says he will arrive here Friday to take part in Franklin County's annual Harding day planned in his honor. Representative Harding said he will attend final sessions of the 133rd annual general conference of the LDS church in Salt Lake City Sunday before returning to Washington.

BOISE, April 3 UP—The 1963 Idaho Easter seal fund-raising campaign will receive a helping hand this week-end from members of a University of Idaho fraternity who are sponsoring a bicycle ride from Moscow to Boise. Bill Blenap, Boise, contact man for the university's chapter of Delta Sigma Phi fraternity, said the riders will leave Boise at 8 a.m. April 5 and are scheduled to arrive in Boise at 3:30 p.m. April 6. The team will use a tandem bicycle, and expect to average about 10 miles an hour. Those not pedaling will ride in accompanying cars.

Rupert Plans Air Force Band May 7

RUPERT, April 3 UP—The United States Air Force band will appear in Rupert under the joint sponsorship of the Rupert, Idaho and Klamath Falls May 7, club officials announce. Col. George S. Howard is director of the band, and the famed "Singing Serenades" directed by Capt. Robert L. Ladders, will present special numbers. Afternoon and evening performances will be given. Ralph Swanson, Rupert club president, said the public is encouraged to attend and enjoy the performance. He explained proceeds will be used for youth committee activities in the three communities.

Special numbers from members of the three high school band departments will supplement the band performance.

Lowell L. Leek, editor and publisher, will remain as editor and advertising manager. Leek and his wife, with offices in McCammon, Whittenberger said.

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Report Says Life Abounds In Milky Way

NEW YORK (AP)—Scattered though the Milky Way is, there are millions of planets bearing life, an astronomer reported today.

The Milky Way is a galaxy of stars, of which there are about 100 to 200 billion stars, and it is a rather average star.

Dr. Fred Moles of Columbia University said he estimates the Milky Way contains 200 million stars similar to our sun, and if each star has planets like ours, each star would possess three "as abundant as our planet" planets.

Dr. Moles said in the realm of science, the existence of life on other planets "would support an intelligent form of life under slightly different conditions." Moles told a session of the Institute of Space Sciences, an American astronomical society, that life exists beyond the solar system is now taken for granted by most scientists, even though we have no direct evidence, he said.

"We know from astronomical observations that in our galaxy there are millions of stars similar to our sun. Recent developments in the theory of stellar evolution (now observationally confirmed) show that all stars with the same general characteristics originated in pretty much the same way from the same kind of cosmic dust and gas, and have evolved in the same time through the same series of stages."

"Moreover, we also know that when stars like the sun are born from a mass of gas and dust, a planetary system also arises."

"From this, it follows that there are in the galaxy millions of planetary systems like our solar system with similar physical and chemical properties."

It is far from being burning long enough, and if the temperature is agreeable on a planet, highly intelligent life is bound to evolve, Moles said.

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For Slight Fee You Can Hunt African Elephants

PORT PORTAL, Uganda (AP)—Take out a \$50 license, add a measure of effort and skill, and you too can be an elephant hunter—if you come to the middle of Africa.

This is the starting point for many hunters seeking some of the world's biggest elephants. In a familiar sight in the streets of Port Portal is a Jeep-like Land Rover back from the hunt and carrying huge ivory tusks as trophies.

To the north is Murchison falls Park where elephants, hippo and giraffes are seen. To the south is Queen Elizabeth park where more herds of elephants, leopards and the fearsome tree-climbing lions roam the great plains.

The road to the west, across the snow-capped Rwenzori mountains, are the Congo forests, teeming with big game of all sorts. Also nearby is Park Albert, the major wild life preserve of the Congo.

The animals are protected in the parks, but much of the forest and bush country outside of the parks is set aside as game preserves and controlled hunting areas that give the hunter a wide choice of game.

Bill Young of Chicago, an engineer who helps build schools and churches for Africans at the Holy Cross fathers mission in Port Portal, also is an avid hunter. He has shot water buffalo, Uganda kob and topi on various safaris. Recently he spent part of vacation on his first attempt at elephants.

Young took along a friend who is an experienced hunter, plus three Africans used as trackers. In a hunting area to the south of the Kazinga channel and in the general area of Lakes Edward and George, West, they went into a section that has shoulder high brush, a typical feeding ground for elephants.

The hunters had 375 Magnum rifles, the smallest, big game weapons that can be used in elephant hunting.

They spotted more than 50 elephants and several hippos by a pond.

But what we didn't know was that there was an elephant that was isolated from the herd, and near us, who apparently picked up our scent. He started running which warned the herd and they stampeded away from us," Young said.

Later Young and his friend came to a clearing and spotted their prize—a big bull elephant with big tusks at the other edge of the clearing.

When Young got the elephant broadside to him, he fired his first shot, hitting the beast just above a leg, near the heart.

The elephant ran off, snorting.

The hunters and trackers chased it about three-quarters of a mile before it collapsed. During this time Young fired another shot into the heart and one into the brain.

One tusk weighed 44 pounds, the other 42. This is average in East Africa. Some tusks go to 100 pounds each, but these elephants are now rare.

Young took the tusks to a district commissioner's office where they were registered and stamped with his license number.

The ordinary hunting license costs \$21. For elephant you need another costing \$42. Only male elephants may be shot.

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Contract Is Rejected by Spud Group

PAUL, April 2—Directors of the Magic Valley Potato Growing and Marketing association have agreed not to accept the contract offered by the J. R. Simplot company for 1963 potatoes, August 1, Bethke, executive secretary, announced Tuesday.

Negotiations have been in progress the past week, but the Simplot firm has failed to offer a contract which the board feels will be acceptable to growers, Bethke pointed out.

Simplot's offer remains at \$1.20 for No. 1's, 60 cents for the remaining tubers with all spuds under 1 7/8 inches considered as tares. The company also has offered a 10-ounce clause whereby there is a one cent increase over 25 per cent and a one cent decrease under 25 per cent.

The association feels the farmer cannot grow potatoes for less than the 1962 contract and the one offered is from five to 10 cents per hundredweight less, Bethke said. The 10-ounce clause as offered by the Simplot firm could be very damaging to farmers having small potatoes, he added.

Before any final decision is made, the board will refer to the membership of the association through a general meeting of all potato growers. The association wishes to continue with negotiations in an effort to agree on a suitable contract soon, Bethke said.

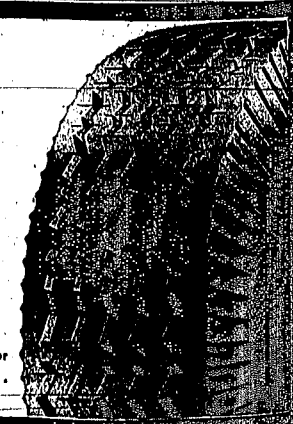

Ordinance Is Bounced by Californians

BERKELEY, Calif., April 3—A proposed city ordinance that would have made racial discrimination in housing a criminal offense was rejected Tuesday night by the voters in this university community.

The vote was 22,750 against and 20,324 for.

The total ballot cast represented 63 per cent of Berkeley's registered voters, according to Naomi E. Hess, Berkeley city clerk.

There are 111,343 residents in Berkeley, a community across the bay from San Francisco. Of these, an estimated 24,000 are Negroes.

Also defeated, and by nearly the same margin, was a candidate for mayor who supported the ordinance. Dr. Fred W. Stripp, a lecturer at Berkeley's University of California campus and a minister.

Stripp lost to Wallace J. S. Johnson, a scaffolding manufacturer, by 22,415 to 22,472.

The ordinance had been passed 5-2 by the city council Jan. 16. It prohibited discrimination in the sale, lease, or rental of almost all housing on the basis of race, color, or creed.

A petition circulated before the ordinance became law in February collected more than three times the necessary number of signatures and forced the issue on the ballot.

A few days ago I bought 100 shares of common stock through a big brokerage firm. The stock traded on the New York Stock Exchange. Newspaper tables of trading prices for that day showed it at 25 1/2. I can tell you for sure, because I don't know exactly at what price your brokerage firm's representative on the trading floor of the stock exchange (the broker) was able to buy the stock for you, assuming that your order was to buy "at market," the "floor-broker-bought-it-for-you" at the best available price. That's what he's there for.

But you should have all the cost information. By this time you should have received a "confirmation slip" from the brokerage firm listing, among other things, the cost per share, commission charges and the total cost to you.

Q. When I buy stock how do I know my broker doesn't jack up the price, say 50 cents or \$1 a share, over the price he bought it for me on the stock exchange and pocket the difference, as well as his commission?

A. Any such action by a broker would violate laws and other regulations all over the place. But because that evidently won't satisfy you, take comfort from the information that it's practically impossible.

The books of brokerage firms are checked by stock exchanges, the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission and/or the National Association of Securities Dealers. There's the idea that I'm sure that there is no way a broker can jack up the price of a stock over the price he bought it for me on the stock exchange and pocket the difference, as well as his commission.

Q. I bought 100 shares of a well-known stock. The most other people I know of who own it are down during the market. I sold it, but I lost 100 shares of the same stock. After waiting 31 days, I sold my original 100 shares at a price that was 1/2 share less than I paid for them. I expected that loss as a capital loss on my 1962 income tax return.

A. From some things I have read recently, I fear that what I had may be considered a "wash sale"—the internal revenue service rule that any capital loss may not be allowed. How about it?

Q. You have nothing to worry about. What you did is one method of "maintaining a position" (keeping ownership) in stock and still establishing a capital loss for tax purposes.

There are other methods. But the one you used is just about the easiest. Relax.

Q. My father recently signed over to me a \$2,000 debenture of a big company. It pays interest at the annual rate of six per cent—\$120 a year. Can you brief me on the difference between a bond and a debenture?

A. Briefly, a debenture is an unsecured bond. Both, of course, are "debt securities." The difference—in this case that the issuer—in this case that the company. The creditor is the owner of the bond or debenture—
you.

Q. A "right" bond—normally is secured by a lien on property—of a mortgage. A debenture secured only by the issuer's promise to pay—not of a promissory note.

Georgia Governor Report Says Butts and Bryant Are Guilty of Collusion

ATLANTA, April 3 (AP)—Atty. Gen. Eugene Cook reported undisputed evidence that Wallace Butts of Georgia piped advance information on his state's primary to Paul Bryant of Alabama last fall which might well have accounted for the final score in a 35-0 Alabama victory. In an official report to Gov. Carl Sanders which climaxed a two-week investigation, Cook said the information was "unethical and improper and unprofessional."

TAMPA, Fla., April 3 (AP)—Veteran right-hander Early Wynn was cut from the Chicago White Sox Tuesday there is no room for him on their roster. Wynn, 43, is seeking a chance for one more major league victory that will give him 300 triumphs.

"I personally regret the whole affair, all of the ramifications of the unfortunate affair," Wynn said on college football "regardless of the final outcome," Sanders said.

One of those questions was whether he would accept a recommendation that the attorney general be authorized to continue the probe in connection with a U.S. senate subcommittee investigating betting on state events.

Cook said he concluded after listening scores of witnesses and obtaining numerous exhibits and documents that George Wynn, an Atlanta salesman, did in fact accidentally get cut out of a long distance telephone conversation between Butts and Bryant. Butts sold his story to the Post for \$5,000.

Scopes Trial Ghost Dampens Evolution Talk in Tennessee

MEMPHIS, Tenn., April 3 — A 21-year-old student teacher said today she had been ordered to cancel a scheduled classroom debate on the theory of evolution.

Tennessee law forbids the teaching of any theory that man descended from lower animals. This was the law tested in the famed 1925 Scopes trial in Dayton, Tenn. Several attempts since to repeal it have failed.

Mrs. Martha Powell, a Memphis state university senior doing her student teaching at a Memphis high school, said the question came up in a biology class.

Principal Radford W. Rosebrough, Jr., said she had been ordered to cancel the debate.

"I was so happy to see that the subject provided the first real spark of interest the students had shown," said Miss Powell.

"I was not presenting the subject for them to learn, but just for them to think about."

"I don't think I would be willing to instigate a court case myself," Miss Powell said, "but if someone else did, I wouldn't have any choice but to stand up for my rights."

She said her 30 students, who are about 16 years old, want to

continue discussing the subject. Rosebrough said later no parents had complained, but that school policy is to avoid things of a controversial nature.

Some of these students teachers are a little freer in their thinking than are the older teachers," he said.

"I don't think it is our responsibility to do all we can to have the students think about controversial subjects," Miss Powell said.

ISC Economist Says Idaho Needs Revised Sales Tax

FOCATTELLO, April 3 (UP)—An economist at Idaho State College thinks Idaho needs a sales tax but nothing like the one offered in the 37th session of the legislature this year.

He said the bill defeated by the senate this year would have provided a net increase in the taxes of those in the \$4,000 a year income range and a net decrease in the taxes of those in the higher brackets.

Cornelius Hoffman, acting chairman of the department of economics at Idaho State College, thinks too much of the proposed sales tax would have been poured into tax relief and not enough would have gone to improving services.

Hoffman thinks the three-per-cent sales tax was unnecessarily high, and that a tax of one and a half to two per cent would have been adequate for now.

At the same time, however, Hoffman finds it hard to understand why farmers were opposed to the bill. He thinks it would have given them an advantage, and it was their last chance to get such a bill.

"I'm not opposed to the sales tax," Hoffman said. "I simply believe we can pass a better tax than the one before the legislature."

Hoffman appeared as an expert before the house revenue and taxation committee just before the vote on the sales tax, and expressed similar views.

Recapping his comments, he said the bill offered would have cost the man with a \$4,000 income and four dependents about \$100 a year.

"The same man would have received \$15 in property tax relief. If he owned a \$25,000 home and about \$15 in income tax relief. His net increase in taxes would have been \$75."

"Higher income groups would actually have a net decrease in taxes, via the return on the income and property tax, they would actually gain," he said.

Hoffman said there is no need for property tax relief.

"The property and income tax really aren't prohibitive in Idaho," he said. "We're below the national average in the amount of property tax paid in relation to the value of the home."

"The income tax really isn't too high, because of the double deductibility feature. Our 9.5 per cent rate is really lower than the effective tax rates of other states. We don't have a prohibitive effective tax rate."

"It looks high on the books, but in practice it is low. I would the books would indicate, I would

get the same \$40 credit. It makes the tax somewhat more progressive."

"This would eliminate part of the argument that people with many children are hit by the sales tax," he said.

Hoffman criticized the bill of this time, because it contained so much tax relief that the net revenue produced would have been scant.

"The sales tax offered would have raised about \$4 or \$5 million dollars and would have returned in tax relief to the taxpayer about 40 or 42 million dollars. The net revenue from the three per cent sales tax was only about 12 million dollars," Hoffman noted.

But he said Idaho farmers, most of whom opposed the bill, missed an opportunity.

"It was a very good bill for farmers—probably too good from the standpoint of the economy of the state of Idaho."

It gave exemptions on farm purchases and it gave property tax relief, and the farmers are usually large property holders. Many farmers would have had a net decrease in taxes under the bill.

"I would not expect the farmers to get a bill so favorable to them in the next session, especially after 'reapportionment,'" Hoffman said.
