Enemies of Humanity

There's little argument with LDS leaders who have pinpointed moral decay and communism as the nation's greatest enemies. Many thinking people have agreed generally for years that these two developments pose the greatest threat to the nation, and also humanity generally. Opposition to communism and efforts to combat moral decay in the U. S. cross party, religious and economic lines.

Communism and means to combat it have become a drain on U. S. strength and resources something of which every citizen is aware. But equally as important—or perhaps more important—is the necessity of strengthening the moral fiber of Americans—individually and collectively. The cost of moral decay is counted in juvenile delinquency, parental delinquency, skyrocketing crime rates, and perhaps most in part, a paralyzing apathy that continues to grip the nation.

These are not matters of primary concern only to governmental leaders or churches or civic organizations. Moral decay and communism should concern each and every individual. The mere fact that too many people just can't be bothered or don't have time is the big reason communism and moral decay are such major problems today. If more Americans had heeded all the warnings and signs in the past two decades, perhaps there wouldn't be today's need to try awakening the public to the dangers.

Now it's not a fight for a particular church or segment of the population, it's everyone's fight.

COY POLITICIANS

Sometimes the public must wonder what politicians accomplish by unseemly coyness. Although the 1964 presidential election is 18 months in the future, some of the politicians are already being coy, and still insisting they aren't candidates for the presidential nomination or merely saying "no comment" when asked. It's a lot of nonsense that certainly doesn't fool the voting public.

Perhaps the pretense is continued because the public doesn't come into the picture until after the parties select their candidates. Yet it's difficult to see what purpose is served by the various candidates continuing to be coy when it's patently obvious they are candidates.

Take, just for instance, the case of Nelson A. Rockefeller. For someone who insists he isn't a candidate, Governor Rockefeller is covering lots of territory and mending lots of political fences.

Of course, Governor Rockefeller is the leading Republican candidate at the moment, regardless of what he continues to say. What's the reason for running as hard as a man can run more than a year ahead of the party's convention.

Undoubtedly the strategy is to keep insisting the presidency is the farthest thing from mind while zipping around trying to gain commitments from party wheels. Again, no one is fooled by that sort of procedure.

Many voters probably would favor a process wherein candidates would declare their intentions well in advance of the party nominating conventions. It would make it easier to tell the horses from the jockeys without a program, but it would take a lot more to hold politicians to their word, regardless of declarations of candidacy.

Promising is the easiest thing a politician ever does, whether he seeks the presidency or some local office.

CITIZEN CHURCHILL

Sir Winston Churchill, the first foreigner ever bestowed an honorary citizenship of the U. S. by congress, came close to being an American by birth. Churchill said when he spoke to congress in December of 1941, "I cannot help reflecting that if my father had been an American and my mother British, instead of the other way around, I might have got here on my own."

Those who are preoccupied in firm beliefs in fate and destiny will insist Winston Churchill was English by birth because that nation was going to have the greatest need for him. By serving his country in time of war, and helping to give the English the will to resist, he also served the cause of freedom everywhere.

If any foreigner ever earned an honorary U. S. citizenship, it was Winston Churchill. Few, if any, voices will be raised to protest the honor.

The honor is doubly significant because, after being in congress, he moved to live in an honorary citizenship to anyone, not even to Marquis de Lafayette, who was identified so closely with the nation's initial battle for freedom. Congress should continue to hold honor. Nothing would have a greater honor faster than to have it handed out like keys to the city.

NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON, April 8.—All eyes will be turned this week to a battle in getting the railroads out of lock. Administration spokesmen say that there's a good chance congress will pass the President's proposal to let the railroads set lower certain freight rates now held at a regulated minimum by the interstate commerce commission.

The supreme court's ruling which in effect outlawed freight-brokers was the first step in the treatment of the railroads. Now if the railroads can get a legal way to compete on equal terms with the truckers in carrying agricultural and bulk commodity shipments, the patent may begin his recuperation.

1963 DISCIPLINE—What President Kennedy is trying to cure is an illness whose cause goes back to 1945, when the ICG was created to prevent them from abusing their unique position. That year, congress established the ICG and later gave the agency authority to regulate maximum transportation charges.

In 1950, the ICG was granted the additional power to fix minimum rail freight rates to protect the smaller railroads from the richer ones. Meanwhile, congress gave only a casual glance to the truckers and barge lines, which at that time, hauled about 90 percent of truck traffic and about 80 percent of barge tonnage is unregulated.

On other words, the truckers and barge lines could, and did, reduce their freight rates whenever they pleased, thereby taking business away from the railroads, which were tied to government-regulated minimum rates.

RAILS LOSE OUT—The inevitable happened, of course. In 1950, the railroads carried more than four-fifths of all freight tonnage, passengers, and more than 75 percent of intercity freight traffic. Today they carry only 28 percent of freight tonnage, passengers, and less than 45 percent of the freight. Since World War II, the truckers' share of freight has increased from 10 percent to 40 percent, and barge tonnage has increased from 10 percent to 40 percent.

Minimum freight rates for the railroads originally were set as a bar against monopoly. But the law's minimum no longer exists, and the highway and waterway carriers firmly established and the airlines and pipelines cutting in for their share of freight. Still, the railroads must not lower their rates to meet this competition.

"EQUALITY OF OPPORTUNITY"—Kennedy is not asking that congress lift all regulations governing the railroads, but only to let them lower their rates for agricultural and bulk commodity shipments. The ICG would raise all its other powers over the railroads, including control over freight rate increases. In its transportation measure, the president put it in simple terms: "The law should provide... equality of opportunity for all modes and for all passengers and shippers without any special preferences."

Some of the opposition to the President's plan is predictably selfish and unreasonable. But the main point in warning that the railroads might be tempted to misuse their new freedom. They raise the possibility that the railroads, free of minimum rate regulation, might use their wealth to cut rates to the point where smaller competitors would be driven into bankruptcy.

TOUGH PROBLEM UNSOLVED—Kennedy has met this objection by suggesting that these competitors could defend themselves by seeking "injunctions" under the Sherman act. But it doesn't seem to have thought this one out. For the only avenue thus provided is in the Sherman act, which is a criminal law. News Around Idaho

BLACKFOOT, April 8—A request for dismissal of a voluntary manslaughter charge against Sterling Jones, 45, was filed Monday at his district court arraignment. Judge E. R. Benson set May 13 for a hearing on the motion by Jones' attorney, J. L. Anderson. Blackfoot, Jones did not enter a plea. Jones, Aberdeen, is charged in the fatal shooting last March 4 of his wife, Dorothy, at the couple's home. Investigative officers said it followed a quarrel.

BOISE, April 8—The area redevelopment administration has been asked to provide funds for development of a \$200,000 fertilizer mixing plant at Post Falls. The Idaho department of commerce and development forwarded the request to the federal agency. Louise Shaduck, executive secretary, said 35 per cent of the financing will be provided by the organization backing the plant. Charles A. Pitt, Lewiston, is president and J. Lamar Chapman, Lewiston, secretary-treasurer. Miss Shaduck said it is one of a number of ARA requests that have been processed through the state agency.

BOISE, April 8—Five Oregon and Nevada men face federal charges of fraud and conspiracy to use the mails to defraud in the sale of building lots near Lake Coeur d'Alene to 38 Spokane, Wash. residents. They were named in a secret indictment returned by a federal grand jury here last month. All five have been arrested and posted bonds of \$1,000 each. They are Raymond Eugene Robertson, 33, formerly Beaverton, Ore.; F. David Windsor, 35, and Carl Allen King, 44, and Bertie Olson, 45, all of Boise; and John S. Grisham, 42, Sparks, Nev. U. S. Atty. Sylvan Jepsen said dates have not been set for arraignments. The indictment charges that paying, water systems, sewers and other promised improvements were never provided for what were promoted as "lakefront estates."

POCATELLO, April 8—Dr. Robert M. Bates, Cour d'Alene, is new president of the Idaho Society of Sons of the American Revolution. He was elected to the position at the annual state meeting in Pocatello. Other officers are Carlton E. Tappan, Boise, vice president; Z. C. Phenix, Pocatello, secretary-treasurer; and the Rev. David A. Choate, Boise, chaplain.

BOISE, April 8—The Idaho Grassman of the Year committee will carry on the contest this year. The contest was organized last year. Chairman Robert P. Ball announced today. He was re-elected, along with Hugh L. Hough, assistant chairman, and Paul V. Nash, secretary. All are from Boise. Ball said the program for encouragement of grassland agriculture will be promoted in every county and the contest will result in the selection of four district winners. One of the four will be chosen as the 1963 Idaho Grassman of the Year.

BOISE, April 8—Idaho liquor prices have gone up but the superintendent of the state dispensary says they are not as high as Washington and Oregon. He said the state is in a bind. Fred M. Charlton said prices were boosted five cents a bottle more than was required by a tax increase voted by the 1963 legislature. The reason, he said, is to make up for revenue lost by elimination of the liquor permit fee that yielded about the \$125,000 a year. The legislature eliminated the permit, with arguments that they intended to discourage Idaho purchases by tourists and residents and that the cost of testing them eliminated any profit.

POCATELLO, April 8—The J. R. Slinn plant company announced Monday that two important phases of their recently announced 10 million dollar expansion are under way at the Pocatello plant. W. Grant Kilbourne, vice president and general manager, said a contract for a five-story addition has been awarded to the H. H. Oliver company, Stanford, Conn. This large facility will be located in the raw materials section of the plant and will be completed by late fall. It will have a productive capacity of 1,500 tons per day, and the installed cost is estimated in excess of \$500,000.

BOISE, April 8—Highway department officials of 13 western states were advised Monday to avoid high speeds on the new Interstate 5, chief of the internal audit section of the California division of highways, advised today. He said the states were at a public roads financial management conference. He said right of way appraisers using a "give a little bit here and a little bit there" approach invite land speculation at the expense of highway development.

BONNERS FERRY, April 8—Boundary county received a certificate Monday night as the first county in the Pacific Northwest to be certified for a state fair. The certificate was presented by the county commission, received the certificate from Stanley Trentham, Boise, Idaho commissioner of agriculture. No brucellosis infection has been found in the county during the last four years, said Dr. K. H. Hoyt, Boise, assistant director of the federal-state livestock regulatory programs. He said a nationwide state-federal eradication program had reduced losses to the disease from 18 million dollars to 15 million dollars in 10 years and greatly reduced incidence of human brucellosis—undulant fever.

BOISE, April 8—Cases of influenza-like illness showed a decline of more than 200 in Idaho during the past week with 600 reported by the state health department.

SUN VALLEY, April 8—Mrs. C. Wayland Brooks is resigning her position as national committee-woman from Illinois. Mrs. Brooks is the widow of the late U. S. Sen. C. Wayne Brooks of Illinois and the daughter of the late U. S. Sen. John Thomas, Gooding.

She wrote William E. Miller, chairman, Republican national committee, "I have found it is too difficult both physically and financially to carry on my duties in Idaho and my political duties in Illinois."

Mrs. Brooks inherited the 150-acre sheep outfit and ranch from her father when he died in office in 1945. She has recently added considerably to these holdings and with her son, John Peavey, now operates a sheep and cattle outfit that grazes over 100,000 acres near Sun Valley. Although she feels that this operation under her son and her foreman, Dennis Burke, is in most respects a family business, she has decided to leave the ranch to her son and to devote her time to her political duties in Illinois.

Mrs. Brooks, who had her initiation to politics when she served as her father's hostess in Washington until the time of her marriage to Illinois' popular Senator Brooks, has been a resident of Chicago since 1940.

She became Illinois Republican committeewoman at the resignation of Mrs. Wesley M. Dixon in March, 1957. She served as hostess of the 1960 National Republican convention and was responsible for the "Great Ladies Luncheon" an outstanding entertainment success at which prominent Republican women modeled the inaugural gowns of past presidents' wives.

Smyle Tips Hat to Army Engineers

WALLA WALLA, Wash., April 9 (AP)—Gov. Robert E. Smylie today paid tribute to the army corps of engineers as little-known creators of vast projects in the growing economy of the inland empire.

The governor addressed an "appreciation day" audience at a luncheon honoring the Walla Walla district engineers sponsored by the chamber of commerce and the Eastgate Businessmen's Club.

Smylie described the engineers as the "regally-defined" they "stand to when people say they 'don't' should control floods, irrigate desert valleys and harness the Snake river for slackwater navigation."

"All of us here today know that the 'they people' are the members of the U. S. army corps of engineers," Smylie said, "representing a great amount of work always in motion, usually working the surface like an ice-berg."

Smylie said completion by the engineers of the Lower Monumental dam in the next decade will bring slackwater navigation to Lewiston and open up "possibilities for an expected four million shipping tons and more annually on the lower Snake valley."

"The work of the corps will be the largest more significant from the Pacific to Lewiston," he said, "as the hydroelectric plants light the land and drive the wheels of the river, on what was once just a stretch of sand and wind and sun and solitude that the Snake Walla district engineers have completed, including the Lower Monumental dam, which will ultimately provide irrigation for 250,000 acres in Oregon; John Day dam and the Ice Harbor dam, which described Ice Harbor as the first link in the last 140 mile push up the lower Snake to point above Lewiston."

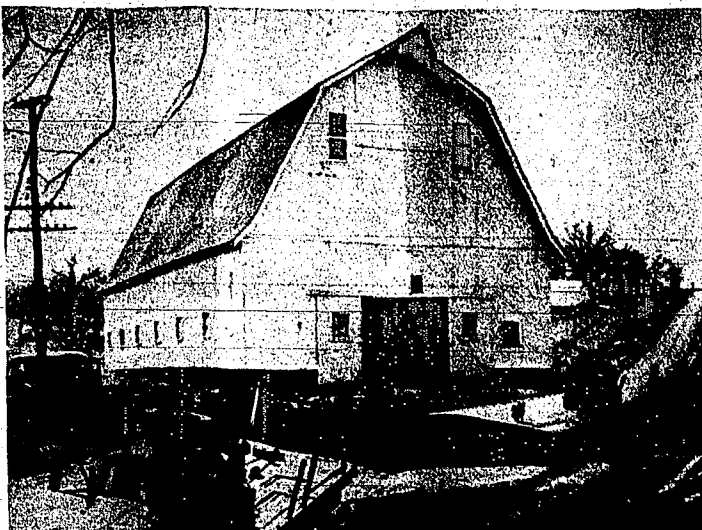

Pope Signs Encyclical For Peace

VATICAN CITY, April 9 (AP)—Pope John XXIII signed a new encyclical on peace today in an unusual ceremony emphasizing the importance of the pontiff's attached to his pronouncement.

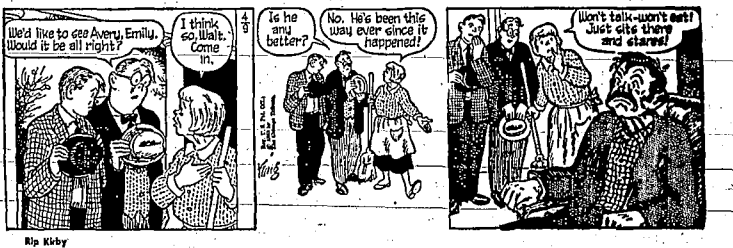
