

# Growth Stressed At Idaho Power Annual Meeting

Idaho Power company is entering one of the greatest growth periods in its 47-year history in order to serve every future electric need of its customers, "from the smallest home and farm to the biggest industry," the utility's president said here Wednesday. President T. E. Roach, Boise, addressing Idaho Power shareholders at the first annual meeting to be held in this area, described the company as "a forward-looking and expanding energy supplier ready, willing and able to pace the development of its economically sound area by supplying electricity at the lowest possible cost."

The shareholders, meeting at American Legion hall, reflected the 14 counties of the company, all of whom are residents of the Idaho-Power area. At noon Wednesday, Idaho Power hosted some 80 business and professional men and women at a luncheon at the American Legion hall. President Roach outlined substantially the same material to be covered in the annual meeting later.

He did make a passing reference to Idaho Power plans to build a new district headquarters office in Twin Falls some time in the next two or three years. It was the first public reference to the firm's plans for new quarters.

In his talk to businessmen, President Roach also noted that Idaho Power's rates for operation of irrigation pumps are low elsewhere in the West. He also pointed out Idaho Power's rates are some 25 percent under similar rates in the West. He said the nearest cooperative purchasing tax-free power produced by government agency, the Bureau of Reclamation.

# Race Case Extension Okayed by Gem Court

BOISE, May 2 (UPI)—Idaho's supreme court today granted Gov. Robert E. Smylie an extension until Monday in the time allocated for him to give legal reasons for not appointing a state racing commission. All five justices concurred in the extension, sought this morning by Atty. Allan C. Sheppard, who argued that the governor was unable to sign a brief supporting his reasons for not complying with Idaho's new horse racing law which sets up a commission to govern part-mutual betting in Idaho.

In granting the extension, the court noted, however, that it is leaving Boise on Sunday for a trip to north Idaho. The high court will hear appeals in Lewis and Clark and Co. v. Idaho next week. The court said it will not be able to consider the horse racing case until at least May 15.

"The Onida, Oaxaca and Jerome county fair boards and Wendell rancher Joe Hangerman are in a hurry to get the law passed last month to force him to name the three-member commission, authorized by the 1963 legislature to govern part-mutual betting in Idaho."

The legislature passed the bill over Smylie's veto. The governor, however, refused to sign it because of the extension because the mutual feature of the act violated Idaho's constitutional ban on lotteries.

The supreme court action was subsequently instituted and the court ordered Smylie to appoint a commission to the governor by May 15, or show cause why it is not.

Sheppard, who is representing Smylie in the action, filed a stipulation signed by him and by attorneys for the plaintiffs in the action, agreeing to an extension of time. Sheppard requested the extension because the governor is "absent from the capital city."

Smylie left Tuesday afternoon for a trip up north Idaho and visits to other points in north Idaho. He is not expected to return until Monday.

At the time the court issued the writ called Justice E. T. Knudsen told UPI it was not necessary to appoint a commission in the case. Justice Knudsen said that would be decided after the show cause hearing.

He said if the matter involved a question of constitutionality or law the court probably would have granted the extension because the governor is "absent from the capital city."

There are several actions in the court right now following hearings on the writ. It could grant additional time for attorneys to present evidence, but the court is not yet ready to make the writ permanent.

# Smith Lauds Lottery Hits At Smylie

BOISE, May 2 (UPI)—Gov. Robert E. Smylie has been panned by "the galleries of the moralists' forces" in Idaho, his November opponent declared.

Cambling advocate Vernon C. Smith, who took a \$2,000 vote drubbing from the Republican primary in November, yesterday criticized Smylie's stand on the Idaho horse racing act and praised the New Hampshire lottery plan.

Smith said this New Hampshire lottery, signed this week by Gov. John King, shows a contrast between King and Smylie. That is "sharp and clear in his concern for the taxpayer and his concern for education," he charged.

Smith blasted Smylie's stand on the horse racing act. The governor has refused to appoint a commission to implement the act, arguing the law violated anti-lottery provisions of the state constitution.

"It seems that Governor Smylie is concerned, anything which would help stimulate the state to give tax relief to our over-laden citizens is illegal," Smith said.

# Haiti Crisis Takes New, Serious Turn

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti, May 2 (UPI)—The United States and Brazil sharply protested to Haiti today against abuses of diplomatic immunity as the internal crisis here took a new and serious turn. The U.S. also expressed official concern for the Haitian foreign office over violations of traditional diplomatic rights by Haitian troops and militia patrolling Port au Prince streets and manning road blocks. Both the American and Brazilian complaints involved the halting and searching of diplomatic vehicles by heavily-armed Haitian troops.

U.S. Ambassador Raymond Thurston protested the halting of an embassy car by troops in Port-au-Prince at dawn yesterday, and the forcible search of Embassy First Secretary Robert Hill.

Thurston protested that Hill and the driver of the embassy car were made to step out of the car and search the car. A shot was fired while Hill was being searched, the ambassador said.

The Brazilian protest, through Charge d'Affaires Milton Ribeiro, charged that an embassy car carrying a Brazilian diplomat was stopped by Haitian troops at the gate of the embassy residence.

The protests were the latest in a growing number of incidents between the Haitian government and the diplomatic community over the violation of traditional diplomatic rights by Haitian troops and militia patrolling capital streets and manning checkpoints.

# Missing Girl Case Puzzles Law Officers

## Quadruple Death Date Is Planned

**SAN QUENTIN PRISON.** Call for the execution since the quadruple was installed in the chamber 25 years ago San Quentin will be carried out tomorrow on schedule.

Gov. Edmund G. Brown, a staunch opponent of capital punishment, announced yesterday he would not intervene in the case of three convicted murderers scheduled to die.

The fourth was refused a stay of execution by both the Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas and the California supreme court.

The governor's action concerned Joseph Roseto, 39, John P. Vlahovich, 31, and Donald G. Franklin, 34, all sentenced to death for the shotgun slaying of Anaheim tavern operator Leslie J. Sluggen in 1959.

The full court appeals were on behalf of Charles J. Golsen, 71, convicted of raping and slaying a 70-year-old woman in Los Angeles.

Because San Quentin's gas chamber contains only two cells, quadruple execution would have to be carried out in two phases. Vlahovich and Franklin are scheduled to die at 10 a.m. Friday, while the executions of Roseto and Golsen are scheduled for 2 p.m.

The unprecedented quadruple execution was scheduled by chance. A Los Angeles superior court judge ordered Golsen to die, and a judge in Orange county picked the same date for the other three, by coincidence.

## National C. of C. Convention Ends In Washington

**WASHINGTON, May 2.** The National Chamber of Commerce wound up its 51st annual meeting yesterday with adoption of policy declarations suggesting that education, mass transit and economically depressed areas are local problems that can be solved without federal aid.

The Kennedy administration currently is pushing legislation to provide federal assistance in all three areas. Other declarations adopted by about 3,000 chamber delegates urged "rigorous economy" in government, and continued support of the United Nations.

## Coloradan Says Lottery May Cut Tax

**DENVER, May 2.** The highest-ranking Democrat in the Colorado senate has asked for a state study on the possibilities of adopting a lottery law to cut down on property taxes and sales taxes.

Sen. Sam T. Taylor, Walsenburg, said yesterday he would submit a copy of a lottery law passed Tuesday by New Hampshire and other sweepstakes information to a special legislative committee studying revision of the Colorado tax structure.

Taylor, the senate minority leader, said he asked the state's legislative council, research arm of the legislature, to acquire the needed documents and information. He said his action should not be construed as his support of such a law, but "we ought to start kicking something like this around to take the load off the property tax," he said.

"I prefer this to an increase of the sales tax, too," New Hampshire, the first state in this century to pass a law allowing sweepstakes, expects to take in about 4 million dollars a year by running two horse races with a lottery.

Taylor said if New Hampshire's precedent works, "you're going to find a lot of states going into it. We might be driven to something like this in the future."

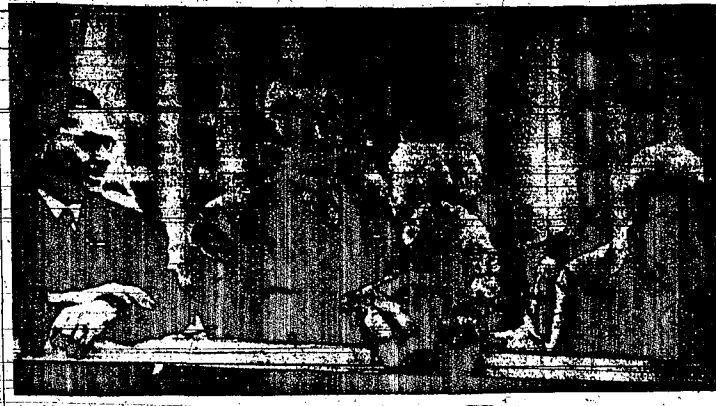

The dogs are never sold and are seldom seen in Tibet. The breed is considered a symbol of the Tibetan religion and while he is not worshipped, he is identified with the lion which saved Buddha's life when he was persecuted by enemies.

All purebred Lhasas in existence outside the city of Lhasa stem from pairs given as gifts to high officials or people of importance.

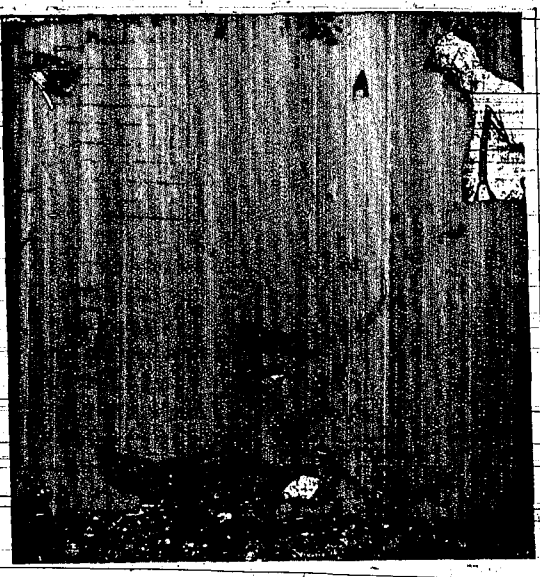

## Alaska Town Records High Radiation

WASHINGTON, May 2 (AP)—Fallout radiation from Russian supplies tests appears to be declining throughout the country, but Palmer, Alaska, is still recording a warning-level dose of radioactive iodine, the government reported Wednesday.

For the seventh consecutive month, the public health service (PHS) reported that Palmer was the only U.S. city receiving a 12-month accumulation of iodine-131 that was above the "acceptable health risk" level.

None of the 62 radiation monitoring stations across the nation recorded accumulations of strontium 90 or the more dangerous strontium 90, that approached the warning range.

Palmer is closest of the 62 test cities to the Soviet Union's Siberian nuclear test site. It built up a heavy dose of iodine 131 in late 1963, which is keeping its yearly average high. But it was exposed to less than 10 microcuries of iodine 131 on a daily basis during March, well below the warning level of 100 microcuries per day.

The only test point that registered more than 10 microcuries per day during March was Denver, with a reading of 20.

Earlier heavy exposure also was responsible for relatively high annual levels at Salt Lake City, and Kansas City, Mo., which recorded 31,920 and 30,070 respectively.

The warning level, which merely means that a detailed evaluation of the cause of radiation should be undertaken, is 30,000 microcuries per year, a 12-month period.

Highest-year-long readings for strontium 90 during March were at Little Rock, New Orleans, and Jackson, Miss. Little Rock recorded 11,242 microcuries, and Kansas City, Mo., recorded 11,186 and Jackson, Miss., 9,156. The warning level for strontium 90 is 73,000.

## Soldiers May Be Congo's Big Problem

ELIZABETHTOWN, May 2 (AP)—What has happened to President Moise Tshombe's 20,000-man army?

The Katanga army was officially disbanded after U. N. troops crushed Katanga secession and a campaign was launched to enlist Tshombe's troops in Congolese central government armed forces.

But so far, only 2,644 ex-Katanga troops have applied for service in the national army of the Congo.

United Nations sources said some of the men are known to have returned to their villages in the bush and thrown away their arms. But there are believed to be at least 15,000 former Katanga soldiers in hiding throughout the province. Reports indicate most of them are still around Elizabethville.

When Tshombe disbanded his army—under U. N. orders—he gave each soldier three months pay instead of notice.

Now, the three months are up. The United Nations fears the men may organize themselves into small well-armed groups, and start a campaign of terror and death throughout Katanga.

There is little fear they will be used in another Katanga war of secession. A U. N. military source said, "Without the mercenaries, the Katanga troops are useless. They didn't give us any trouble before, why should they now?"

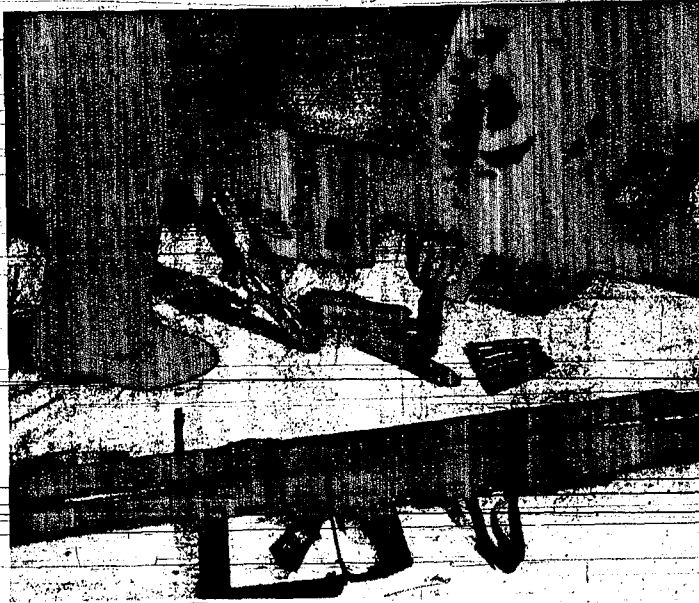
Former Katanga soldiers already have been blamed for one death near Elizabethville.

A Belgian, Emile Therer, was shot in the neck while driving from Elizabethville to Northern Rhodesia. No one saw who fired the shot, but ex-soldiers are suspected.

In another incident, a Portuguese was shot at and robbed by two ex-soldiers while driving on the same road.

A U. N. spokesman said, "once they run short of food, they could become very dangerous. Fifteen thousand terrorists in the bush around Elizabethville would be quite a problem."

## Tug-of-War Over Laos Might Have Once Seemed Unlikely

By ROY ESSOYAN

VIENTIANE, Laos, May 2 (AP)—Laos is one of those improbable never-never lands. Only a few years ago, it might have been voted the country least likely to be caught in an East-West tug-of-war.

The 2½ million people of Laos, mixture of tribes and minorities, would never have cast such a vote themselves mainly because 55 per cent are illiterate. Most have never heard of democracy or communism, many don't know the name of their prime minister and some have never heard of the name Laos.

Laos is the size of Great Britain but two-thirds of its tangled jungle and rugged mountains are inaccessible except to tribesmen. There are no railroads, no highways in the modern sense, and few roads suitable for trucks or cars.

You travel by jungle path or plane. Laosians have been frequently described as peace-loving. This applies to the ordinary Lao who is gentle, easygoing and fun-loving. It has not always applied to royal families that have ruled him for centuries.

King Savang Vatthana, the meditative 55-year-old figure-

head-ruler of Laos, once told a Western ambassador "Laos is not really a national community."

According to Lao legend, all Laosians came out of a pumpkin (thousands of years ago). They are all related, and like some relatives they, or their princely leaders, have been squabbling for centuries.

The rest of the world paid little attention to them until about 10 years ago. In the old colonial days around the turn of the century, the French used Laos as a hunting preserve.

The French threat of the sport and under pressure from nationalist and pro-communist forces they pulled out.

The Geneva agreement of 1954 gave Laos its independence. At the United States moved in with advice and assistance to fill the political vacuum and Laos became a pawn between the East and West.

The United States has put 400

million dollars into Laos since 1955, first in an effort to create a pro-Western bastion in the heart of Southeast Asia, and then in an attempt to create a neutral buffer between East and West.

It has been a losing game. Three years ago the communists held the two neighboring provinces. Today they control two-thirds of the country.

The United States appears to be following a policy of "time, mainly because the alternatives are even less palatable. They are: Cut your losses and pull-out entirely, handing Laos over to the communists, or pour in more and possibly American troops and risk a major Southeast Asian war.

The importance of land-locked Laos is due purely to its geographic position in the heart of Southeast Asia. It is a buffer state between Red China and North Viet Nam in the north and anti-communist Thailand and South Viet Nam in the south.

If Laos falls to the communists, Thailand and South Viet Nam will be immediately threatened.

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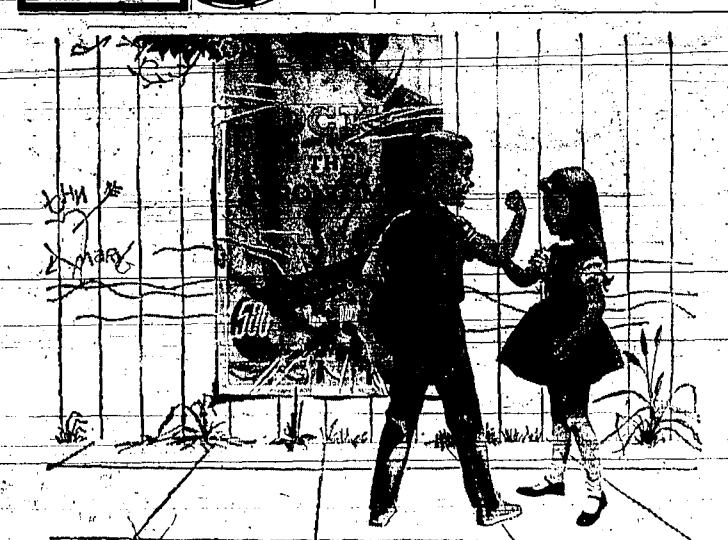

# Hoffa Eyes European Union Pact

WASHINGTON, May 2 (AP) — Union Pres. James R. Hoffa said Wednesday he hopes to work out agreements with European unions that would make transportation strikes more effective.

Called to testify on a bill that would ban strikes in the maritime industry, Hoffa made a hard-hitting defense of collective bargaining procedure, including strikes and lockouts.

Compulsory arbitration, as proposed in the bill, he said, would destroy the free labor movement and lead inevitably to government control of prices and wages.

Hoffa assured the house committee that he is aiming at nationwide agreements with European unions he would never call a national transportation strike.

The Teamsters could not win such a strike, he said, because the existence of bargaining with employers is to keep at least half of them operating as competition.

"I'll keep doing this business," he said. "That's why we have been able to make our strikes work."

Hoffa opposed nationalization.

"Working people won't accept a decision if it is imposed on them," he said.

"If a man wants 20 cents an hour more than that is going to happen to that employer is going to get 10 cents worth of work," he said.

"All the guy has to do is put his truck in second or third gear and make two pickups a day. Instead of three and the employer will be glad to pay 10 cents to get it back in high."

Hoffa said cooling-off periods in labor laws don't solve anything.

Hoffa said President Kennedy by imposing guidelines on wages and price increases, was seeking to limit collective bargaining and thus, he said, repudiating 1958 campaign statements opposing such regulations.

# Indonesia Takes West New Guinea

KOTABARU, West Irian, May 2 (AP)—Indonesia took over West New Guinea, the last remnant of Holland's 1962 Indian empire, Wednesday and renamed it West Irian.

The United Nations transferred control of the western half of the world's second largest island to Indonesia in Holland's 1962 agreement.

## Report on Refugees in U.S. Given

NEW YORK, May 2 (AP)—Rep. Francis E. Walter, D.-Pa., said last night about one million refugees have entered the United States since World War II aided by direct federal contributions amounting to \$1,444,600,151.

"Never in history has a nation done more than the United States for victims of war and oppression," the chairman of the house committee on immigration and naturalization said.

Walter presented what he called the "most complete audit of America's refugee aid" since the war in a speech prepared for the opening of the 20th anniversary conference of the American Council for Judaism which continues through Saturday.

The congressman has been hospitalized in Washington recently and was unable to attend. His speech was read by Judge J. Cullen Gandy of the U.S. circuit court of appeals, a longtime friend.

Walter said that "critics of America's immigration policy have stressed the inadequacy of our effort rather than our unprecendented achievements."

Americans may be proud of this country's actions in the refugee field.

William J. Vanden Heuvel, president of the International Rescue committee—the case work agency overseas for the council's humanitarian fund—expressed a critical view.

"While the parole and visa provisions of public basic law have been adequate in emergency, they are inadequate in terms of permanent solutions in that they do not confer on the newcomers definite status," he said.

"They invariably require follow-up legislation. Actually for the Cuban as well as the Chinese refugees who have been admitted as parolees or on visa waivers, such legislation is now overdue."

Henry B. Moyer, Scarsdale, N.Y., president of the council's philanthropic fund, said the Walter report was of particular significance for Jews.

"Of the thousands of displaced persons who were welcomed here after the Nazi holocaust, many were Jewish refugees since the United States makes no religious discrimination," he said.

"This fact would put to flight the old repeated Zionist myth that 'Israel is the only haven for oppressed Jews,'" he added.

Walter said the largest expenditure was 200 million dollars

## Distinguished Son of Idaho Will Be Honored at Special Boise Program

**NEW YORK, May 2** (Special) — Distinguished son of Idaho, Dr. Lawrence H. Chamberlain, will be honored at a special program at the University of Idaho today. The program, which will be held at 8 p.m. Friday, will be held at the Owyhee hotel following a 6 p.m. reception. Among those expected to attend are Judges Henry McQuade and Joseph McFadden of the Idaho supreme court; Judge Fred Taylor of the U.S. district court, and numerous prominent citizens from the Boise area.

Co-chairmen of the dinner, sponsored jointly by Columbia University and the University of Idaho, are Odeon H. Oppenheimer, Boise attorney and an alumnus of Columbia college, and the Columbia school of law, and the University of Idaho.

On Saturday morning Dr. Chamberlain will attend a breakfast with several Boise high school teachers and guidance officers and with those high school seniors from the Boise area who have been admitted to next year's freshman class at Columbia college, the newly undergraduate school of Columbia University.

He was born in Challis on March 15, 1908. He received his B.S. and M.A. degrees from the University of Idaho in 1930 and 1932, respectively. He held the posts of instructor and assistant professor of political science at Idaho, before joining the Columbia faculty in 1941.

Dr. Chamberlain's academic career at the University of Idaho was marked by an unusual occurrence. Confronted by financial hardship, lacking enough to pay

look a job at Challis, teaching fifth and sixth grades at the local school. From his small salary, Young Chamberlain repaid Professor Crawford and, with summer earnings, had funds enough to complete his undergraduate education. He received his degree and was subsequently admitted to Phi Beta Kappa.

After a year as principal of the Bonanza high school, Dr. Chamberlain returned to the University of Idaho on a teaching fellowship. In the meantime, he had married Mildred Eleanor Perry, with whom he had attended high school and college.

In 1932 he joined the Idaho faculty as instructor of political science, and soon thereafter was promoted to assistant professor. While teaching at Idaho, he decided to seek his doctorate degree at Columbia, and in 1941 joined the Columbia faculty as instructor in government. The next year the undergraduate student body in Columbia college voted the Columbia political science "the instructor most likely to succeed." Their forecast was spectacularly borne out—within 10 years Lawrence Chamberlain had risen to the post of dean of Columbia college.

President Dwight D. Eisenhower—president emeritus of Columbia—commented that in his work, Dean Chamberlain had earned "the devotion of thousands of students."

In 1947, after four years of full-time teaching in Columbia's graduate faculties, Dr. Chamberlain was appointed vice president of the university. President Kirk voiced his appreciation "that Dr. Chamberlain has consented to answer once more the call to administrative duties." Reluctant to give up teaching altogether, Dr. Chamberlain has continued, as Joseph I. Buttenwieser, professor of human relations, to conduct a

**BOISE, May 2** (UP)—Appraisers counted up fire damage today in a fire Tuesday night that charred through the roof and damaged most of the equipment in a machine shop at the Idaho state penitentiary.

Warden L. E. Clapp said the spectacular blaze may have started in a barrel of oil. Pump-trucks battled it for an hour before bringing it under control, and firemen remained another two hours.

"All the machines in the machine shop were damaged to some extent," Clapp said, adding, "I don't have any idea of the extent of the damage money wise."

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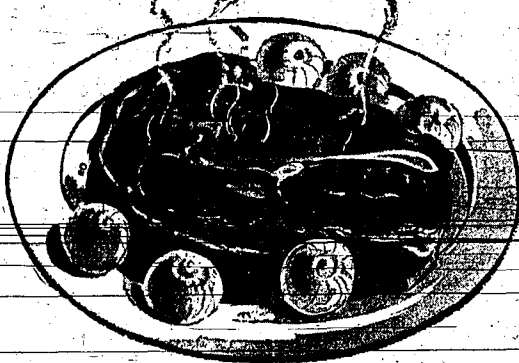
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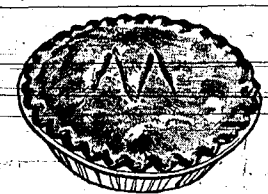


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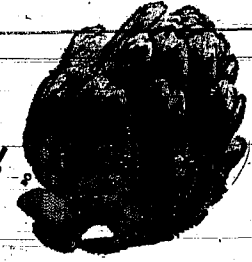
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
