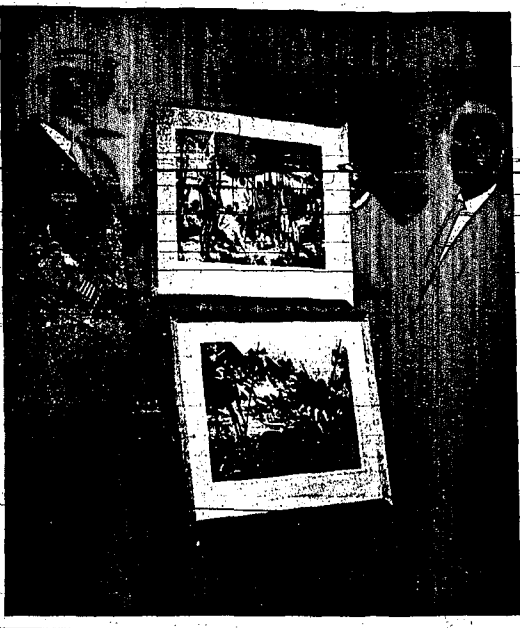

# Cooper Marvels at Growth of Space Travel

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla., May 15 (AP)—As a boy, Leroy Gordon Cooper, Jr. read Buck Rogers in the funny papers and wondered whether man would fly into space before the 25th century. Today he's amazed at the swiftness of events which have sent astronauts into space in his lifetime—and his participation as one of the pioneers of this great effort.

If anyone seemed destined for space flight, it was Cooper, 33, who has been flying as long as he can remember.

His father, an air force colonel, was a close friend of such aviation greats as Wiley Post and Anne-Mary Earhart, and Gordon was to listen intrigued to their flying conversations. The elder Cooper took his son aloft almost before he could walk.

"Gordo"—as his fellow astronauts call him—recalls first handling the controls of a plane when he was 6 and flying his first solo at 16.

Cooper's mother says her son always was interested in airplanes.

"Gordon made a lot of model planes," she reported recently at her Carbondale, Colo., home. "Later, when he was a senior in high school at Shawnee, Okla., he

had a good friend who ran an airport. Gordon worked there to pay for flying instruction. He soloed then, while his father was serving with the air force in the Pacific."

The senior Cooper died of cancer in 1960.

Cooper, a Methodist, was born March 6, 1927, in Shawnee, Ala. After graduation from high school in 1945, he entered the marine corps and spent some time at the naval academy preparatory school. After his discharge in 1946, he attended the University of Hawaii for three years.

At the university, he met and married the former Trudy Olson, Seattle, Wash. Under Cooper's instruction, Trudy soon had a pilot's license. The couple explored the Hawaiian islands in a Piper cub. They took their first baby for a plane ride soon after she was born.

The Coopers now have two daughters, Camala, 14, and Janita, 12. They live in Houston, Tex., site of the manned spacecraft center.

While at the University of Hawaii, Cooper received an army commission, which he transferred to the air force. In 1949, he was called by that service for extended flight duty. After training he was assigned to the 8th

fighter-bomber group in Munich, Germany, where he piloted F84s and F86s for four years. He later attended the air force Institute of Technology at Dayton, Ohio, and helped design and test experimental fighter aircraft.

More than 800 Negroes staged a "freedom march" through downtown Raleigh, N. C., last night to back up desegregation demands. Police arrested 34 demonstrators.

There were no incidents during the march but there were some tense moments when the demonstrators passed street corners crowded with white youths. Police charged 15 of the arrested group with assault against Leslie Ferguson, assistant manager of a cafeteria, who was "put in a state of fear" during a sit-in attempt.

A biracial committee held a two-hour meeting in Raleigh yesterday and bank official Victor Bell, Jr., said, "I think we made good progress in understanding each other and the problem." Earlier the Raleigh Ministerial association voted 42-1 in favor of desegregating business facilities.

## Wheat Vote Fight Plan Dismissed

WASHINGTON, May 15 (AP)—A federal district judge has dismissed a suit by a group of Midwest farmers seeking to block a national wheat control referendum May 21.

The group contended that the 1952 wheat law setting up the program as proposed in the referendum was unconstitutional.

They said it gave the secretary of agriculture too much leeway in setting wheat planting allotments and asserted the voting qualification rules for the referendum discriminated against small growers.

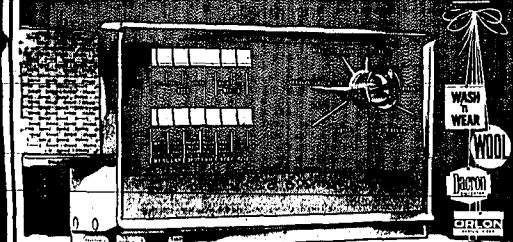

# Sabin Oral Polio Vaccine Clinics Set This Week-End

Magic Valley doctors urge everyone to take the Sabin oral polio vaccine Saturday and Sunday at Magic Valley clinic stations. The mass immunization is sponsored by the South Central Idaho Medical society.

The Sabin oral vaccine is a syrup type of vaccine and is taken by mouth. Dr. E. M. Wright, Twin Falls, member of the society's polio committee, said each person will drink the vaccine from a small paper cup as in the two clinics held last fall.

The Sabin oral vaccine provides a permanent type of immunity while the Salk vaccine requires booster shots for continued immunity. This is a reason for persons who have had the Salk vaccine to take the Sabin oral vaccine.

There are several advantages why a person should take the Sabin oral vaccine. One reason is the ease with which the vaccine is taken.

Another advantage is that the oral polio vaccine provides immunity against "intestinal immunity" against polio. Thus, unlike other polio vaccines, the individual is not only immunized against polio by being provided with antibodies in his blood, but he also is less likely to be a carrier of the disease, and therefore may not transmit it to other people via the digestive tract.

After a person swallows the vaccine, the vaccine particles multiply in the digestive tract to work in building up what doctors call "antibodies." These are what provide protection against

polio. It takes about two or three weeks after a person swallows the vaccine before it becomes effective in providing immunity.

Dr. Wright said type III vaccine will be given Saturday and Sunday at the clinic stations and is the final dose in a series of three. This vaccine is completely safe and everyone should take it, he said.

There will be 50,000 doses of the Sabin oral polio vaccine on hand to be administered Saturday and Sunday, Dr. Wright said.

The vaccine will be given between the hours of 1 to 4 p.m. Saturday and from 2 to 6 p.m. Sunday.

# Valley Board Okays Budget At Hearing

EDEN-HAZELTON, May 15.—A revised budget, based on the last month's action, was adopted by the board of trustees of school district 263 at the annual budget hearing Monday night.

The budget hearing was held at 8 p. m. last night, but action was deferred as information from the state department of education was not available at that time. Now how much state money was available under the new formula.

Figures released by the state department indicate that Valley will receive \$6,164 less this year than in 1961-62. Because of this deficit, funds now have to be made up out of the 1960-61 budget.

Discussion was held by the board concerning the extension of a portion of the district in the extreme east end of the county, adjoining Minidoka county. The portions of the area, which include sections 22, 23, 24, 25, 26, 27, south half of 28, sections 34, 35, 36, all in township 8 range 21 east, have petitioned the state board of education to include the area in district 231 and exclude it from district 263.

This action is legally possible under Idaho code which states that any area of less than 10 square miles, and in which no school is operating, may be excluded from the school district in which it lies, and annexed to a contiguous district, when the best interests of such area are shown to be served thereby.

Dr. L. T. O'Connell, superintendent of schools, told the board he opposes extension of this area. He said that while the area now involves only 36 children, the probability of future development of the adjoining undeveloped land should be considered.

He stated that taxes now available from this area, evaluated at \$19,000, amount to \$14,600. State aid from the 36 students would bring in \$6,840. The cost of transportation for 36 students is estimated at \$1,200. Trustees will invite the patrons of the area in question to the June board meeting to discuss this matter, to see whether an agreeable plan can be worked out to keep them in the district.

Resignations were submitted by Mrs. Eula Davidson and Mrs. Clara Whitesides. Mrs. Davidson has taught fifth grade at Hazelton the past year, and Mrs. Whitesides has been teaching in the science department at Valley for several years.

Four vacancies still exist in the Valley system. Vacancies in science at Valley school, second grade at Eden and fifth grade at Hazelton. Two prospective teachers were interviewed by the board, but no action taken. Discussion was held by board members on the construction of a hot lunch room at Eden school. The board decided to investigate possibilities of extending the present apartment buildings adjacent to the school for a lunch room. The present lunch room is located across the highway from the school and has no cooking facilities. Food is transported from Valley to Eden school.

Ralph McClain, clerk reports there have been no declarations of candidacy filed for districts two and four. These positions are held by Clyde Montgomery and Herman Huettig, whose terms expire.

An election is scheduled at Valley high school from 1 to 7 p. m. May 21. Trustees are elected for a three year term. Only residents of the district may have children under 21 years of age or residents who pay taxes in that district may vote.

## Food for Americans

It's a hearty open sandwich rich with meat, and seasonings, just right for pizza fans. The meat mixture takes only 10 minutes to cook. The tasty cheese sauce, made from a mix, takes half that time.

Serve the pizza loaf with a casserole of scalloped potatoes. Try using packaged scalloped potatoes. They are delicious and save cooking time.

LONG BOY PIZZA LOAF (8 to 10 servings)  
1 teaspoon salad oil  
1 1/2 pounds ground beef  
2 tablespoons instant minced onion  
1/2 cup chopped ripe olives  
1 1/2 teaspoons salt  
1/2 teaspoon oregano  
1 can (8 ounces) tomato paste  
3/4 cup water  
1 envelope cheese sauce mix  
1 cup milk  
1 Italian loaf bread (about 4 1/2 inches)  
4 tomatoes, thinly sliced  
Paprika

Spread oil over bottom of skillet. Add beef and onion. With a fork or spoon, break up meat. Cook over high heat 2 or 3 minutes, stirring constantly. Add olives, salt, oregano, tomato paste, and water. Bring to a boil; reduce heat; cook 5 minutes, stirring occasionally.

Meanwhile prepare sauce mix as envelope directs using 1 cup milk. Split loaf of bread in half lengthwise. Spoon meat over cut surfaces. Arrange tomato slices in a row over meat. Spoon cheese sauce over tomato slices. Tuck a piece of foil around bottom of each loaf half.

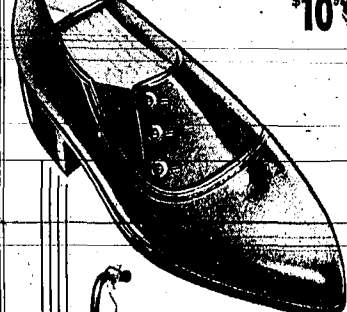

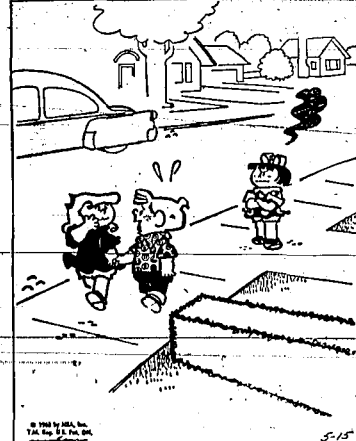

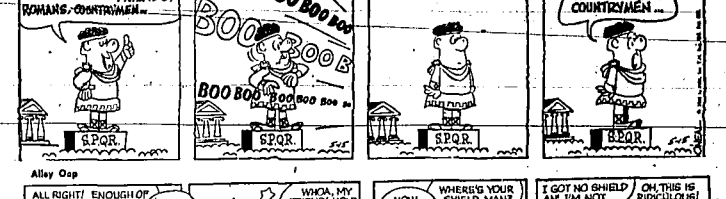

# Unitarian Minister Balks at War Tax Use

KENTFIELD, Calif., May 15 (AP)—A Unitarian minister who fought with the Dutch resistance during World War II now is refusing to pay part of his U.S. income taxes.

Karel Botermans, 40, says he is challenging the U.S. government for reasons basically similar to those which prompted him to fight the Nazis 20 years ago.

He wouldn't bow to some of the Nazi occupation's orders because, he said, an individual has no right to violate his conscience just because the government so

he said, would be to make a personal contribution to an arms race which will lead to world destruction.

(Actually, under the budget submitted by the administration for the coming fiscal year, only about 50 per cent would be spent on defense and related items, including space and foreign military aid.)

Botermans, who arrived in the United States in 1947, paid only 31 per cent of his tax bill this year, and sent the remainder to the United Nations for use in developing a world court.

This area who won't pay any taxes. The internal revenue service, however, gets its money by clamping liens on his bank accounts.

In the past, the service has employed the same method to get money from former U.S. Gov. J. Bracken Lee, who refused to pay taxes for the support of the U.N.

Botermans said his congregation is split over his conduct, but that nobody has questioned his right to follow his own belief. Respect for the other person's position is a keystone of Unitarianism, he said.

He said that although he is not more secure, "It is not time that we reversed the trend and sought another way of being secure."

The minister said he is sorry to break U.S. law, but that he must do so to obey "the law of my deepest religious conviction and the law of international justice."

At the Nuremberg trials, it was held that in genocide, every person in that society involved is responsible, and not just the actual perpetrators of the crime, he said.

"I got not as an American, but as a human being," he said.
