

Lancaster Will Succeed Stivers As County Clerk

Harold A. Lancaster, Filmer, who was defeated by a narrow margin in last November's general election when he ran as a Democrat against T. W. Stivers, Independent Republican, for the office of Twin Falls county clerk, was appointed Tuesday afternoon to replace Stivers, whose resignation becomes effective Saturday.

The appointment was made at a special meeting of the Twin Falls county commission. Lancaster was appointed county weed control chairman by the commission in January. His newly-appointed position as county clerk marks the first time in 20 years the county has had a Democrat in the office.

The county's last Democratic clerk was Frank Smith, who served from 1933 to 1938, when he was defeated by Walter Musgrave, a Republican. Musgrave and Charles A. Butts served as county clerks and Stivers took office in September, 1961, at an age of 61. Stivers had served as county clerk for 12 years and was assigned from the \$3,500 a year job to purchase the Boone Land Title company.

Stivers, if he had not resigned, would have served a full four-year term until 1965. However, the commission was notified Tuesday by James M. Cunningham, assistant prosecuting attorney, that Stivers, as newly-appointed county clerk, was resigning.

The traffic death rate for the four-month period was the same as a year ago—4.7 fatalities per 100 million vehicle miles traveled.

The 11,630 deaths was one per cent above the previous record of 11,516 for the first four months of 1962 and four per cent above the 11,160 deaths in January through April, 1962.

As motorists prepared to flock to the highways, law enforcement officials throughout the nation called out full forces and ordered a heavy crackdown on traffic violations.

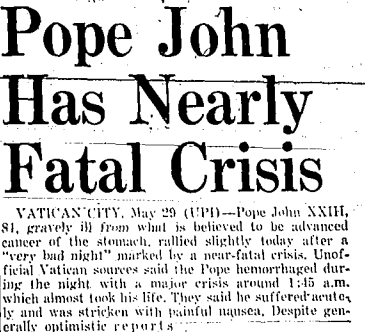
Between 4:00 and 5:00 p.m. persons could die in traffic accidents between 6 p.m. today and midnight Sunday.

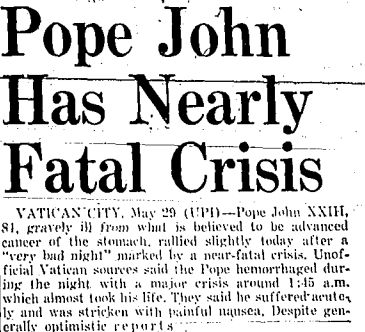

Continued fair skies and warm temperatures were promised by the weather bureau for Memorial day.

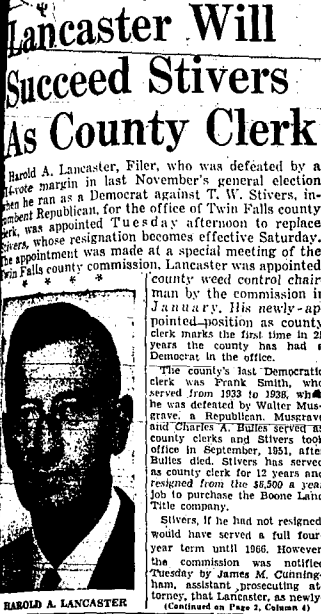
Forecasters said the weather would be sunny and pleasant, with temperatures in the 70s and 80s.

INDIANAPOLIS, May 29 (P)—The fastest drivers in 500-mile race history gunned their cars through a rain-delayed final tuneup Tuesday, and a blown engine almost put a twice-bumped pilot back in the Memorial race. Troops Evade Injury in Plane Crash

MANHATTAN, Kan., May 29 (AP) — "Don't panic," the first command given just before the four-engine transport plane crashed to the ground.

"Now, unfasten your safety belts, and get out."

The plane already was in flames as the 64 soldiers escaped safely from the wreckage of the Standard Airways Constellation that crashed while landing yesterday at municipal airport, according to some survivors.

Only five injuries, none critical, were suffered by the 69 passengers and crew members.

Capt. David Brown, the pilot, said the craft lost power while he approached for a routine landing. It crumbled to the ground short of the runway and burned for more than three hours.

The soldiers, returning from maneuvers in California, said the plane was burning when they jumped to the ground and fled to safety.

The 60 moved quickly to safety after the plane shattered to a halt in the mud.

Witnesses said the right wing tore off the craft, then the other. Flares started in the wings and spread to the fuselage.

"I looked out both sides of the plane and all I could see was real orange colored flames," Pfc. John L. Sturino, Kenosha, Wis., said. "When the plane came to a halt... we went out."

The soldiers all were members of troop C, first reconnaissance squadron, fourth cavalry of the first infantry division stationed at nearby Fort Riley, Kan. They were returning from maneuvers at Camp Irwin, Calif.
