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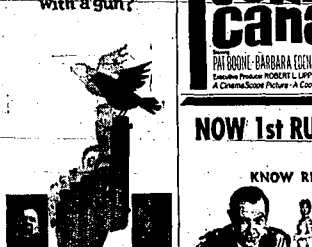

Red Demoted For Knowing Executed Spy

MOSCOW, May 30—Chief Marshal of Artillery Sergei S. Varentsov has been removed from his top post in the Soviet armed forces and reduced in rank for his association with executed spy Oleg Penkovsky. Informal sources disclosed Wednesday.

Penkovsky was condemned to death and executed and a British businessman, Greville Wynne, was given an eight-year prison sentence earlier this month for late activities in an Anglo-American spy ring said to have been operating here.

Varentsov was not directly involved in the alleged Anglo-American ring, but was a personal friend and protector of Penkovsky, who exploited the friendship to secure military data for espionage purposes, the sources said.

First Moon Craft Will Carry Crew

TOKYO, May 30—Marine Lt. Col. John H. Glenn, Jr. predicted today that the first U.S. spaceship to reach the moon will carry men rather than experimental animals or automatic machinery.

America's first man in orbit led the Foreign Correspondents' club that the flight made no far by U.S. spacemen proved that man can operate safely without automatic protection.

"The main thing we learned from project Mercury is that we don't need all those automatic systems," he said. "Man is capable of operating in space. He suffers no vertigo, no unconsciousness, no body deficiencies that we know of."

New Photograph Satellite Eyed

NEW YORK, May 30—A "Trex" weather satellite capable of photographing the Earth's entire surface at least daily will be put into orbit sometime next year, according to plans announced yesterday.

The hatbox-shaped satellite would roll on its side in a wheeling polar orbit and photograph 500,000 square miles of Earth and cloud cover every 30 seconds with two cameras.

Jordan Says New Wheat Plan Needed

WASHINGTON, May 30 (AP)—Sen. Len Jordan, R., Ind., said today he believes congress has a responsibility to American agriculture and should take appropriate steps to enact an acceptable wheat control program.

Noting that farmers voted against the program proposed by the Kennedy administration, Jordan said:

"I do not share the President's view that by the recent referendum vote the farmers have indicated themselves in favor of the program. It is my feeling it alone, so to speak, that was indicated by that the farmers want the program enacted, but that they do not want a responsible program imposed on the farmers and the nation's needs."

"Congress has a responsibility to American agriculture and should take appropriate steps to enact an acceptable wheat control program. For this reason, I joined in sponsoring one of the bills and I do not deem this measure to be the answer, but I, together with other senators, will continue to work for a responsible program for the wheat industry."
