

Petitions Asking College District Of Whole County

Signatures are being asked in all sections of Twin Falls county petitioning the county commission to organize a junior college district, including the whole county, to be known as Southern Idaho Junior College district. Aim of the petitions is to create a junior college district in an election prior to July 1, says John A. Barker, Buhl. The swift action came following a meeting in Twin Falls Tuesday of Barker, representing trustees of Southern Idaho college at Buhl; Jerry Cover, Twin Falls, representing a liaison committee for a junior college committee, and William Dring, secretary-manager of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce.

It is the aim of the group to collect more than the required 300 signatures on the petitions prior to Thursday. The petitions would be presented to the county commission for approval and then forwarded to the state board of education by Saturday morning when the board opens a regular session in Moscow. If the state board approves the plan, Barker points out, it would be possible to call an election on formation of the district prior to July 1.

Barker notes a junior college district can be formed on a bare majority vote prior to July 1, but after that date a two-thirds majority would be required. The move comes after the state board of education refused twice to approve a junior college district covering all Buhl, Piler and Caldwell school districts. The board said the area did not provide a broad enough tax base to assure success.

Petitions are being circulated by all those attending the meeting Tuesday, plus a number of volunteers. Barker reports, they include Jack Ramsey, Piler; Heber Loughmiller and David C. McKelvey, Caldwell; McCall, Bill, William J. Lanting, Twin Falls; Carl Irwin, Twin Falls, and the Kimberly branch of the Twin Falls Bank and Trust company.

Barker says the tax base for a junior college district covering all of Twin Falls county would be about 40 million dollars.

Wallace declined comment but an aide said there would be "absolutely no change in the governor's stand despite the injunction."

There had been reports Barnett might fly to Oxford, Miss., to try and persuade McDowell not to enroll.

McDowell and Meredith both were registering for the summer term at "Ole Miss" where bloody rioting broke out last fall when federal marshals escorted Meredith into the campus.

Kennedy Says U.S. to Develop Supersonic Commercial Plane

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., June 5 (UPI) — President Kennedy, speaking at the Air Force academy commencement, today announced a government decision to go ahead with developments of a supersonic commercial transport plane capable of traveling at more than twice the speed of sound. Kennedy interpolated the supersonic plane decision in his prepared speech to the air force graduating class

announcements made on his arrival here from Washington.

—He will fly on Saturday to Hawaii for a Sunday speech on civil rights to the National Conference of Mayors meeting in Honolulu. This represents an extension of his current western tour which originally was scheduled to end in Los Angeles Saturday night.

—The President definitely will visit Italy this month to confer with President Antonio Segni and other Italian leaders. The death of Pope John XXIII had put the Italian portion of Kennedy's forthcoming European trip in some doubt until today's announcement.

—The decision to put the United States into competition with Great Britain and France in developing a high-speed transport plane was announced as the French aircraft were being flown to a Franco-British combine for their version of the plane.

—Pan-American World Airways yesterday ordered six Concorde aircraft to be built jointly by the British Aircraft Corporation and Sud Aviation, a French firm. The Concorde will be able to travel at about 1,450 miles per hour at an altitude of 60,000 feet. This is known as "mach 2.2" or slightly more than twice the speed of sound. The American plane, according to present hopes, will travel at about mach 2.0 or at something better than 1,200 mph and also at an altitude of about 60,000 feet.

—Kennedy acted on the recommendations of a high level inter-agency study committee headed by Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson. The committee delivered its report last Saturday. Congress has appropriated 30 million dollars to the federal aviation agency for early research and development in the supersonic transport field, but the President said today the new program undoubtedly would cost substantially more and that the country should be prepared to support this major investment in the future.

—In explaining his decision to the students, who filled the air force academy stadium, the President said intense international air competition would not permit the United States to lag behind.

Canada to Alter Border For Fishing

OTTAWA, June 5 (AP)—Canada is going to ban foreign fishermen within 12 miles of its coast; apparently to shut out the Russians and the Japanese. Another purpose may be to hamper spying by Soviet trawlers.

American fishermen likely will not be affected. Arrangements that special arrangements will be worked out with the United States accompanied Prime Minister Lester B. Pearson's announcement Tuesday that Canada will extend its exclusive fishing zone from three miles near the coast.

Pearson told the house of commons that foreign fishing pressure along the Atlantic coast has increased enormously over the past five years, not only depleting offshore fisheries resources but posing other problems.

Pearson did not elaborate. He may have had in mind fears in some quarters of spying by the huge Soviet fishing fleet that operates regularly in the region.

Canada also plans to revise the territorial limit, a line that now follows coastal contours.

The new limit will be drawn in a straight line from coastal points extending farthest into the sea. This will bring thousands of bays, inlets and channels completely within Canadian jurisdiction for the first time.

Fishing on the Great Lakes will not be affected by the changes.

1,000 Injured in Battles Between Moslems, Police

TEHRAN, Iran, June 5 (AP)—At least 1,000 persons were reported seriously injured and some killed today in a pitched battle in Tehran between armed Moslem demonstrators and police using machine guns and tear gas.

Large sections of the city's downtown bazaar were set on fire. Damage was estimated at several million dollars.

The battle began to die down around noon after huge numbers of troops poured into the city and took over the main thoroughfares.

All shops and office buildings were closed as precaution against looting. Several were still burning.

It was believed martial law would be imposed if the violence did not stop.

The fighting spread in all directions as troops poured into the city. Police fired into the air.

for an hour, then began shooting into the crowds trying to attack government buildings, smashing shop windows and hurling rocks at the police and passing cars.

It was the second day of anti-government demonstrations stemming from a three-day mourning period of the Shiite Moslems for the founder of the sect. When the religious observance turned into an anti-government rally Tuesday, the government arrested the leader of the sect, Ayatullah Khomeini, and banned all unauthorized demonstrations.

Some 700 demonstrators were arrested Tuesday. At least 200 more were picked up during the early stages of the rioting today.

The demonstrators shouted protests against the arrest of Ayatullah Khomeini and 17 other top religious leaders at Qum, south of Tehran. A government official said they had been inciting the public.

Their main grievance, the official said, was the enforcement of the shah's land reform program which deprives religious leaders of income from shrine lands.

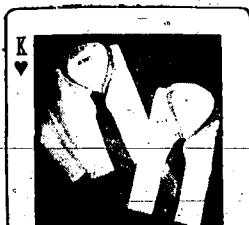

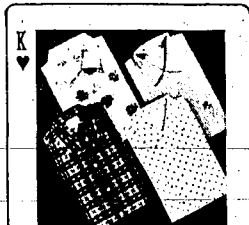

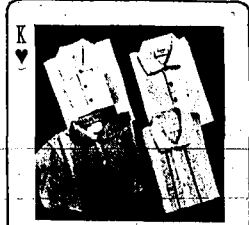

Atheistic Russ Mourn Pope's Death

MOSCOW, June 5 (AP)—Officially atheistic Russia Tuesday mourned the passing of Pope John. From Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev down, the people praised him as the pope of peace.

"Khrushchev said 'young atheist.' But Pope John was admired here as a good man. He wanted to stop nuclear war."

That was a typical reaction among Russians questioned.

The government newspaper yesterday tonight called the pontiff "one of the most remarkable personalities of the contemporary world."

Between the lines of praise, diplomatic observers here saw implied fears in the Kremlin that Pope John's successor might interrupt or completely break off the apparent growing easing of differences between the Soviet Union and the Catholic church.

A spokesman said Mrs. Kennedy will use her own obstetrician, Dr. John W. Walsh.

The first lady plans to enter the hospital during the last week in August. She will occupy the Presidential suite.

The birth will be by C-section.

The Kennedy family nurse, who has stood by for the birth of about 30 of the Joseph P. Kennedy grandchildren, will be on hand to nurse Mrs. Kennedy.

The first lady's 5-year-old daughter, Caroline, was born in a New York hospital. Her son, John F. Kennedy Jr., was born 3 years old Nov. 25, was born at Georgetown University hospital.

From the security standpoint, the White House prefers that Mrs. Kennedy go to Walter Reed, where she would have more privacy in the Presidential suite on the fourth floor.

Heavy Growth on Range Is Fire Hazard, BLM States

SHOHONE, June 5 (AP)—The Shoshone district of the bureau of land management is now preparing for the coming fire season, according to Dale H. Kinnaman, district range manager.

Kinnaman says this season may be one of the worst in years, because of the great amount of moisture received during May, as well as the large amount of fuel left over from last season.

"This will mean there will be a large volume of brush fires on the range. The grass (fuel) as the manager called the growth, is a liability to stockmen, yet at the same time or can be extremely hazardous if ignited by lightning. Kinnaman explained.

In past years, many of the fires in this district have been man-caused, through carelessness or by unauthorized burning of private lands or by campers or smokers. Many other fires are caused by lightning.

The manager calls for cooperation of the public in keeping down fires caused by carelessness.

He said any fires spotted in the Shoshone district should be immediately reported to the BLM by calling collect to Shoshone fire dispatcher, telephone 488-2373. Calls should be made there from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m., after which the calls should be made collect to 466-1664.

The governor of Idaho sets the fire season from May 10 through Oct. 20, during which time any one willing to burn on private lands must obtain a burning permit. Anyone wishing to secure the burning permit within the Shoshone district must contact the BLM in Shoshone, telephone 488-2373.

Experienced fire personnel will assist the holder of a permit to set up a burning plan and outline the necessary conditions that must be met before a burning permit can be issued. This precaution will reduce the chances of the fire escaping.

Anyone failing to obtain a burning permit may be found guilty of a misdemeanor under state law, which is punishable by a maximum of \$500 fine and six months in jail. Also, should an unauthorized fire spread to public lands, the person responsible may be required to reimburse the government for suppression costs.

Kinnaman points out it is against federal law to set fire to public lands. This crime is

considered arson and is punishable by a maximum fine of \$5,000 and five years in prison.

The Shoshone district extends from the Snake river on the south to the forest boundary on the north, and from King Hill creek on the west to American Falls on the east, and covers some two and one-half million acres of federal, state and reclamation land.

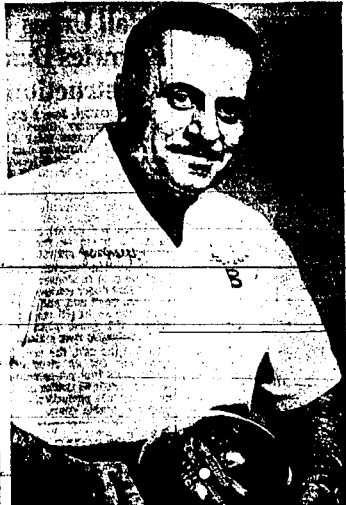

New Meetings May Point to Soviet Thaw

GENEVA, June 5 (U-P)—Intensified "hot-line" negotiations and agreement to bilateral disarmament talks between the United States and Russia have spurred western hopes for a Soviet thaw in the disarmament conference here.

The conference, resumed today following the pentecost recess, is the first since the 1958-59 talks. Recent Soviet moves at the 12-nation conference have brought hope that the Russians have tired of talking the talks on almost empty stomachs and are ready for at least some meaningful negotiations.

The Russians last week agreed to direct negotiations with the United States on disarmament based on the Soviet Gromyko plan for the reduction of nuclear rockets during the disarmament process.

The proposal does not, Western diplomats said, meet Western demands for establishment of a protective nuclear "umbrella" throughout disarmament, but is regarded as "a slight move forward."

The Soviets as yet have made no reply to American proposals for similar talks on two other measures to reduce the risk of nuclear war by accident: An exchange of military missions and a mutual commitment to prior advance notification of any major troop movements or maneuvers.

Western diplomats expected Soviet Minister Semyon K. Tsarapkin soon to give some indication of the Soviet reaction to the proposals.

A Russian acceptance would confirm the apparent slight thaw in the Soviet position, Western sources said.

Soviet-American "hot-line" talks have been stepped up to four or five public meetings a week from the former three after the joint announcement last week on agreement to "intensity the negotiations."

The Knowles reservoir on the Flathead river in Montana would be the first major storage dam in the area, Udall said, and as such would step up the efficiency of 18 private and public powerplants in the Columbia river system.

In fact, he said, the resulting smoothing out of river flows would boost firm power production at the Grand Coulee dam by more than the production of two proposed private dams.

Relations With Haiti Will Resume

PORT AU PRINCE, Haiti, June 5 (U-P)—U. S. embassy announced late yesterday that Charles d'Amalre, Edward G. Curtis has been instructed to resume normal relations with President Francois Duvalier's government.

Although the United States had not broken off relations with Haiti, embassy officials had not been speaking to the government. The embassy announcement said Ambassador Raymond L. Thurston, who is in Washington for "consultations," will remain there for a few more days.

The embassy said also that about 30 members of the U. S. naval and air missions whose withdrawal has been demanded by Duvalier were preparing to leave the country.

Another 20 to 25 mission members have been transferred to the U. S. military aid mission here, whose withdrawal has not been requested.
