## Lumatic Could Plunge Nation Into Chaos at Joint Session

**WASHINGTON, June 6 (U-P)—**A house document noted today that at joint sessions of congress, "one lumatic with a hand grenade could plunge our nation into chaos."

That observation was made by Rep. Charles E. Jochims, D., N.J., a member of the appropriations committee, and was made public by the committee in its printed report accompanying the annual legislative money bill.

"I get very nervous" at such sessions, Jochims commented. He referred to the customary presence at joint sessions of the entire chain of succession in the presidency.

At each annual joint session when the President delivers his state of the union message, the house chamber audience includes the vice president, the speaker of the house, the president pro tempore of the senate and most cabinet officers. They constitute the entire line of succession.

The vice president and the speaker sit directly behind the President, while the cabinet members sit nearby in front of him. They are in "pretty close proximity," commented Rep. Walt Horan, R., Wash.

"You may have noticed that seldom if ever, do the cabinet members show up for joint sessions. At least one of them usually stays downtown. Perhaps they have thought about this possibility," said a house official, who declined use of his name.

Jochims' fears were prompted, he said, by the fact that on March 1, 1954, a band of Puerto

Rican fanatics seated in the house gallery fired a volley of bullets into the house chamber and wounded five members.

Since then, no one is allowed in the galleries without an admission card, and guards are by members. Groups of tourists who pay a quarter each for an officially guided tour don't need by the committee in its printed report accompanying the annual legislative money bill.

All visitors are required to leave their cameras outside the gallery, but are not searched.

## Next Pope to Face Change In Papacy

VATICAN CITY, June 6 (U.P.)—The man who succeeds Pope John XXIII will come to a papacy significantly changed during his reign.

To many people, Catholics and non-Catholics alike, the papacy may seem closer now.

The tradition that Popes seldom leave the Vatican has been broken. Hesitation to receive Protestant leaders has been overcome.

Pope John brought the church to grips with the 20th century. On Nov. 4, 1958, the day he was crowned, no one dreamed of the changes that were ahead.

Then 76, the pontiff with the heavy features was appraised by many as an interim Pope. There were predictions that the papacy would remain fairly static until the emergence of a strong, vigorous, younger Pope.

Pope John at once shattered that concept, and he continued to sweep away the places as his reign progressed. He brought the Pope out of the Vatican and the Roman Catholic church out of the counterreformation, carrying both dynamically into a difficult, modern world.

The major works that marked Pope John as a great Pope were his Ecumenical council and his major encyclicals "Mater et Magistra" and "Pacem in Terris."

The qualities that endeared him as a person were his sweeping mental grasp of humanity as a single entity and his utter unpretentiousness.

He once said that he hoped his "single and true title of honor" would always be: "He was a priest before God and before the people, a free and sincere friend of all the nations."

The humble farmer's son had a difficult time at first adjusting to the papal or imperial "we" when referring to himself in public address. He would explain to an aide that it was awkward to think of oneself in the plural, and he often reverted to "I."

"Don't interrupt me—I mean I," the Pope once joked.

The new Pope of 1958 waited no time. One of his first acts was to announce in January, 1959, that he would call an ecumenical—or general—council of all his bishops.

There had been only 20 before in history, the last in 1600-70. Pope John explained that his council would be a council of "aggiornamento"—bringing up to date—designed to help the cause of Christian unity and restore to his own church the pure lines of early centuries.

He labored hard the next four-and-a-half years to bring the project into reality. He set up an elaborate preparatory program to sound out the bishops' ideas, and drew up topics.

He held consistories five times for the creation of new cardinals, raising the number from 52 to record highs of 74, 76, 85 and then 87. He brought in cardinals from distant lands where Catholicism is almost nonexistent and let every race be represented. He created the first Negro cardinal, the first Japanese.

He received 250,000 annually in huge weekly general audiences that ran twice the size of his predecessors' audiences. In private audiences he saw princes and kings, prime ministers and potentates, Protestants and atheists—including Soviet Premier Khrushchev's daughter (Rada) and son-in-law Alexi Adzhubel, editor of Izvestia. No other Pope had ever received such a personally from the Soviet Union.

The people of the Eternal city, which has seen virtually all the Popes of Catholicism pass down through 20 centuries, took Pope John to their hearts as their beloved pastor, one of their own.

Crowds pressed in light whenever he rode by their piazzas. They shouted their admiration until it rang from the Forum's ruins.

"Long live the Pope!" "Long live Papa Giovanni!" And they chanted the warlike of Italian endeavors, the di-himative: "Long live Pope Little John!"

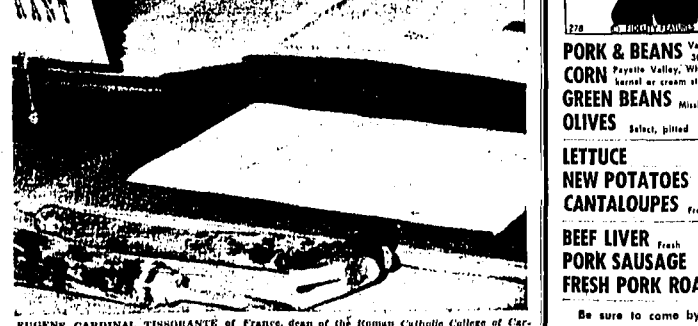

## Russ Settle Debt With Idaho Man

IDAHO FALLS, June 6 (U.P.)—Russia may pay its debts to the United Nations but it doesn't to the tourists visiting the iron curtain.

They advised him to bring the matter to the attention of the state bank of Russia officials at Leningrad.

But the day before May day, a holiday in the Soviet Union, he always a fervent of preparation. So Groberg and the bank officials made connections. Determined to see how the Soviet bureaucracy works in such matters, Groberg penned a letter to the bank and left for home.

In the mail recently Groberg received a 50 Finnish mark note (about \$15) from the state bank of Russia with great apologies for the mistake.

## Priest Permitted To Say Mass in Russian Church

MOSCOW, June 6 (U.P.)—An American priest was allowed to say mass in Moscow's only Catholic church for the first time in three years today at a special ceremony in memory of Pope John XXIII.

The mass was said by Father Joseph Ruffini, who serves as resident priest for the U.S. embassy and the diplomatic corps in Moscow.

The Soviet Union in general has barred resident American priests from saying mass in the city's Catholic church, St. Louis des Français, since 1949.

# London Man Has Unusual Hobby—Monster Watching

LONDON, June 6 (U.P.)—Richard Need is a man with an unusual pastime—monster watching.

Each year this 31-year-old documentary film maker drives 500 miles from London to Loch Ness in northern Ireland to watch and wait and film a monster—if one should ever show itself.

"At one time I felt there was something in the loch, but was not quite sure what," he said.

"Now, after reading all the books and articles and speaking to several eyewitnesses, I am prepared to stick my neck out and say that the animal in Loch Ness is as yet unclassified by zoology, that it is probably 30 or 40 feet long and that it probably resembles a plesiosaur (a prehistoric monster)."

Need has never seen a monster, but he is hoping.

He is convinced that a really well-organized expedition could settle once and for all the mystery of the 24-mile long loch.

But the difficulties, even for a massive scientific expedition, would be immense. At its deepest the loch goes down more than 700 feet—deeper than the North Sea, and the brackish black waters make diving and underwater camera work particularly difficult.

# Brown's Try To Close Gas Chamber Dies

SACRAMENTO, June 6 (U.P.)—Gov. Edmund G. Brown's latest attempt to close the California gas chamber died last night in committee.

The governor, who earlier had bombarded committee members with public statements and personal appeals, immediately issued another statement predicting that capital punishment will someday be abandoned as surely as other barbaric customs.

Brown's bill at this legislative session was a compromise measure that would have closed the gas chamber for only four years to all but certain kinds of criminals.

Exempted from its provisions would be double-killers, kidnappers, murderers, persons who slay police officers and prisoners who kill while in prison.

# Governor's Wife Makes N.Y. Debut

NEW YORK, June 6 (U.P.)—Mrs. Margaretta (Happy) Rockefeller played the game of political roulette yesterday night on a charity gambling cruise that marked her debut in New York City as the governor's wife.

Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller's new wife won praise and compliments from clubbed-out socialites, politicians, socialites and royals including the knowledgeable Duchess of Windsor who found her "an extraordinary person." The consensus was that Mrs. Rockefeller has "warmth," "animation," "simplicity," and "naturalness."

The occasion was the New York City Cancer committee's moonlight sail aboard the Holland-America line's flagship Rotterdam to raise more than \$100,000 for cancer prevention.

# U.S. Is Sued by Japanese Firm

SAN FRANCISCO, June 6 (U.P.)—A Japanese shipbuilding company filed a \$400,000 suit against the U.S. government yesterday in connection with a collision involving the freighter Kokoku Maru and an American military refrigerator ship.

The suit, filed in federal court by Kawasaki Kisen Kaisha line, charged negligence on the part of U.S. American coast guard, military sea transport service (MSTS) ship Asterion.

A spokesman for the U.S. justice department said a counter suit against the Kokoku Maru's owners would be filed in U.S. district court in San Francisco today.

# OAS Urges Ban On Cuba Travel

WASHINGTON, June 6 (U.P.)—A special committee of the Organization of American States (OAS) yesterday urged a ban on all travel from Latin-American countries to Cuba.

Concluding an investigation into communist subversion in Latin America the committee of the 20-nation Inter-American organization said it found the communists have turned Cuba into a Soviet military camp and a training base for Latin American communists.

The OAS council agreed to meet July 3 in a special session to take up the committee's recommendations. It also submitted the report to the member governments for their study.

Artist Tells of "Sittings" With Pope John

Editor's note—No man can be a stranger to the artist who paints his portrait. The brush is guided as much by the camera as by the hand of the artist. Thus it is to Pietro Annigoni, the great Florentine painter, that we turn when the editors turned for this feature with Pope John XXIII.

FLORENCE, Italy, June 6 (NEA)—My three portrait sittings with Pope John were an extraordinary experience. He talked a great deal and immediately put me at my ease. But he was by no means an ideal model.

"Where were you born?" he asked. I told him Milan.

"And I was born at Bergamo—so we are neighbors, eh?"

I faced him, holding my block in one hand and pencil in the other, unable to make up my mind where to start the preliminary sketch. Minutes sped.

Monsignor Capovilla, the Pope's private secretary, said: "Perhaps you are for much moved. A famous sculptor was here a while ago in such a state he almost fainted."

"No," the Pope interrupted. "He was a weedy little creature. This one here is fine and fat like me."

No, I was not crushed by emotion. I had a great desire to make something really worthy. "The Holy Father is so good," said Monsignor Capovilla. "Ask him not to speak or move: He will understand." But the Holy Father, who was listening, continued to speak and move. However I began to draw.

He recalled when he was a military chaplain during the first World war.

"There was a book which did much good for the soldiers. They returned from the front lines wounded or shell shocked, and this book made them laugh. 'The Voyage of the Ignoramus,' it was called. It was written by a 19th-century humorist from my home town."

"Ah, that was a really funny book. I'd like to give you a copy if we could find one." He began to quote from the book and laughed more and more.

"Oh, a really good writer, a really amusing writer, who made many people happier by making them laugh."

"He died of despair," the Pope added abruptly and seriously.

Pointing to a tapestry he said: "I bought it in Paris when I was Papal Nuncio there."

I discovered it by chance. I've given it to the Vatican. Then indicating the allegorical paintings on the ceiling: "They are the idea of reading to the Pope. Very beautiful and very valuable—unless if they are not very proper. Too many women. Too few clothes."

From time to time Monsignor Capovilla reminded him to pose, without much success. Meantime, I was charmed by the conversation, so simple, almost naive, but all the same pierced with "allusions" that would grow into memories.

I was really moved at last by the Pope's humility, a simple and profound humility.

What's the harm in letting millions more people admire it?"

He launched into a powerful condemnation of all that constitutes too strong an attachment, at the worst addiction, for worldly achievement, even if it concerns masterpieces of art.

"I remember when somebody stole the Gioconda of Leonardo Da Vinci from the Louvre. There again what a fuss. Ah well, to know how easily we poor creatures get carried away. Of course the thief deserved it. He gently made a spanking gesture."

"After all, the fuss about so small and so simple a thing."

Vanitas Vanitatum Omnia Vanitas (Vanity of Vanity, All Is Vanity).

It was my turn to become timid. Nevertheless I replied with respect that I was of the other party who protested the export of the Pietà. "We have a duty to safeguard works of art so we can pass them on to those who come after us," I said.

He did not reject this viewpoint.

On the day of the third sitting the Pope asked me: "Did you sleep well?" I assured him I had.

"Not me," he said. "I always corrects could be made. This fluid difficulty in sleeping. Last night I got up at two o'clock and I employed my time in preparing a discourse."

Now Monsignor Capovilla had a good idea. He would read this discourse aloud so that any corrections could be made. This

time the Pope was wholly attentive. I saw him in profile and with his most characteristic expression. I could really work now.

"I think," he told his secretary after a little while, "it would be better not to put these speeches onto paper. It would be better to supervise as one goes along. To say what one feels at the moment—what is in one's heart—directly to people who are looking into your eyes and feeling that you, the man, are really with them. When one writes one has the feeling of saying a good deal more and really saying a good deal less."

At the end of the sitting he wanted to see what I had done. "This one knows his trade," he told his secretary. And then, pointing at the large, flat and projecting ear: "I remember well how my pals in the seminary teased me about my ears. I went down on one knee to take leave of him."

"Courage," said the Holy Father, and tapped me lightly on the shoulder.

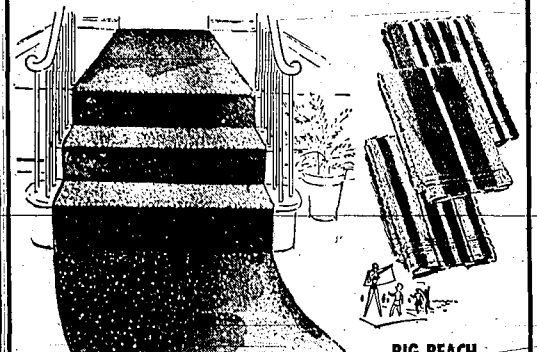

# War Minister Quits; Admits Improprieties

LONDON, June 6 (AP)—British War Minister John Profumo resigned Wednesday with an admission of "improprieties" with a beautiful model.

Admitting that his earlier denials of "improprieties" with the London playgirl were untrue, Profumo also resigned as a conservative member of parliament.

"I have come to realize that by this deception, I have been guilty of a grave misdemeanor," the war minister said in his letter of resignation to Prime Minister Harold Macmillan.

# Farm Bureau Says Controls Are Threat

POCATTELLO, June 6 (AP)—WASHINGTON, June 6 (AP)—Agriculture told congress Wednesday federal farm control programs are a threat, not an aid, to the family farm system envisioned by existing farm legislation.

John C. Lynn, the organization's legislative director, said in a statement prepared for a house committee hearing on the plight of the family farm that changes in farm programs are needed to maintain the family farm as the dominant unit in agriculture.

"There probably is no greater threat to the family farm than government programs that restrict the full utilization of family and farm resources and that attempt to fix or manage resources and ration the right to produce on the basis of some historical formula," he said.

Lynn said government price supports which result in a loss of markets to competitive products limit opportunity for family farmers.

Lynn said there is a trend toward the "multi-family farm"—large units operated by brothers or other relatives. He said this is a desirable trend.

# Cuban Status Depends on Reds' Terms

HAVANA, June 6 (AP)—Premier Fidel Castro, sporting Soviet medals picked up during his 31-day tour of Russia, said Tuesday night U.S.-Cuban relations can be "normalized"—if the Americans will deal on communist terms.

In a three and one-half-hour telecast, Castro denounced "clowns and demagogues" in the United States who insist that his revolutionary regime must break with Russia as a prelude to negotiations with Washington.

"If they (the Americans) want to talk with us, they must give up the idea that we must break our ties with the communist bloc," he said.

"We are communists . . . how are we going to break with our friends in order to talk with our enemies?"

Castro wore green army fatigues as usual, with the badges of the Order of Lenin and Hero of the Soviet Union pinned to the left breast pocket. The medals were awarded to him during his tour.

He flew to Russia late in April.
