# Truck Loaded With Boy Scouts Plunges Down Embankment, 2 Killed

HOLE-IN-THE-ROCK, Utah, June 11 (AP)—A truck loaded with Boy Scouts plunged down an embankment in remote desert country Monday, killing eight boys, three of their leaders and a woman reporter. At least 23 were injured, some critically. Two of the young Scouts who escaped unhurt had to walk four miles before they found a farm road to help them and spread the alarm.

It was about two hours before sheriff's officers could get to the scene in southern Utah about 200 miles south of Salt Lake City. The bodies of some of the victims still pinned beneath the two and one-half ton truck, others lying about in "I just didn't have any brakes," said the truck driver, Elton A. Brown, 23, Provo. He seriously injured, he was taken to a motel room by officers and held in seclusion at nearby Richfield.

"The driver is in shock and about all he can tell us is that he stalled on a grade, tried to stop by shifting gears and then lost his brakes," said Officer Paul Blumhagen.

There were 47 persons in the truck, headed for an Explorer Scout boat trip on the Colorado river. The party included about 14 Scouts, ranging in age from 12 to 16.

The dead included three Scout leaders, two of them in English language professor at Brigham Young University; Merlin J. Shaw, an assistant professor and father of six children; and William A. Orer, 39, an assistant Scoutmaster whose son, Alvin, was among the injured. All were from Provo.

Dorothy Hansen, 24, a reporter for the Desert News in Salt Lake City, was on the truck on vacation but went along on the trip to get a feature story.

Dr. John H. Smith, a Salt Lake City physician, was in the truck. He was riding in the cab when the truck started to plunge wildly down the 100-foot embankment.

"I crawled out," he said, "and there were bodies all over. The first dead body I found was my brother."

Robert Cook, 26, a Salt Lake City high school teacher, was in the truck. He was riding in the back when the truck started to plunge.

It was he who organized some semblance of order from the chaos, he who dispatched the two boys for help, he who fastened make-shift splints, set bones, and calmed the frightened.

All the while he was in deep pain from his injuries. But he stayed at the scene until everyone was removed, then continued his trip to Richfield, where he is hospitalized in nearby Richfield.

The accident happened about 10:30 a. m. on June 10. It was reported by a Scoutmaster who was on the truck.

## Appeal Is Made for More Library Funds

Twin Falls city commission Monday night heard an appeal by Ted Roth, chairman of the city library board, for an increase in the library mill levy from three to four mills.

Roth is a possible curtailment of summer activities normally carried on by the library staff. Roth pointed out the library has been forced to cancel subscriptions to many magazines and purchase of needed reference material has been cut sharply.

Roth said increased costs have been away at the budget and the staff has had to make many operational functions. He also pointed out that improvements, such as maintaining and repairing the furnace, have been taken care of out of the existing budget.

Roth also said new lighting is necessary and, if possible, acoustic tile on the floor would be greatly improved.

The 1963 legislature changed the state law making it possible to raise the mill levy to five mills to maintain libraries.

Roth told the commissioners that the library is in a bind for the library to maintain its present public schedule.

In addition, Roth said the property adjacent to the library is for sale at a reasonable figure and he would like to purchase it for future expansion and a parking area.

Roth asked for an increase of one mill which would be used for increased operational expenses and the other half-mill would be used to purchase the available property. The levy could revert to a 3.5-mill levy.

## Emergency Egg Clause Is Enacted

**BOISE**, June 11 (AP)—State Agriculture Commissioner Stanley Brenhale has enacted the emergency clause in the new egg marketing law.

The clause is intended to take effect for a period of six months starting July 1 for the purpose of giving small producers time to comply and to avoid hardship in marketing.

Brenhale said there was "concern from those interpreting the law."

He explained enactment of the emergency clause relates only to Idaho producers with a flock less than 500 hens. He said small producers must sell whole and grade eggs; sell to the retail market; and mark according to state laws.

"This law was not intended to put the small producer out of business," Brenhale said, "but was enacted for the purpose of cleaning up the Idaho egg market and prohibiting the selling of any eggs which do not meet properly handled . . ."

## Nuclear Confab May Start Newest Phase in Cold War

**BY WILLIAM L. BYAN**  
**WASHINGTON**—Premier Khrushchev's agreement to U.S.-British-Soviet talks on a nuclear test ban has vast implications. It may presage an entirely new phase of the cold war.

The timing of Khrushchev's decision looks like a stupid slap at the Chinese communists, suggesting that division of the world into two camps is already a fact.

The Soviet leader's appearance of conciliation toward the West will be treated with skeptical reserve in Washington. The talks may be just talks and little more. But there is another aspect.

President Kennedy appears to be asking for a broad reappraisal, on both sides, of the whole cold war. There are indications that Khrushchev is willing to listen. To Khrushchev's proposals for peaceful coexistence, the Chinese have responded with a proposal to "make the world safe for diversity."

Khrushchev appears to be gambling, putting a great deal on the line to show the world—and its communists—that his way is the best one toward ultimate victory.

The test ban meeting in Moscow was tentatively for July. That may mean Khrushchev has run out of patience with Peking's wall-like red dissidents.

Another important Moscow meeting is scheduled for July, between representatives of the beleaguered Chinese party and members of the Soviet central committee. They plan to discuss their conflict.

Kennedy, announcing the projected test ban talks, said mankind need not accept the conclusion that war is inevitable.

The notably hopeful tone of the President's discussion of nuclear tests, which is all that was only enrage the Red Chinese, who have been loudly scornful of Khrushchev's peaceful coexistence line and have called for the Soviet leader's head on that score.

The Chinese categorically reject Khrushchev's line that a test ban can be avoided. Peking and the allies insist that total war is inevitable. The Russians, by much more to lose than the

- 4—Bonneville will have to ask Congress for an expenditure of about \$100,000,000 for transmission facilities to deliver power to eastern Idaho.
- 5—There is a surplus of firm power in southern Idaho. Bonneville can not justify squandering tax money to build duplicating power facilities.
- 6—Southern Idaho has a better record of industrial development—lower taxes—and far less unemployment than the Northwest areas which have been served by Bonneville for many years.
- 7—Bonneville power rates are artificial. They produce deficits in spite of taxpayer subsidy, tax avoidance and access to the federal treasury for capital funds.
- 8—Bonneville power supplants the facilities of taxpaying companies to the detriment of taxing districts such as schools, cities and counties, state and federal governments.
- 9—Bonneville is now taking over reclamation project power, and will sell it below cost to "preference customers." This will deprive Idaho reclamation projects of millions in legitimate revenues by substitution—the glib assurance that somehow Bonneville will replace these funds from its deficit-ridden operations.
- 10—There's no magic about Bonneville power. It is an example of the federal government in business—replacing taxpaying, investor-owned enterprises.

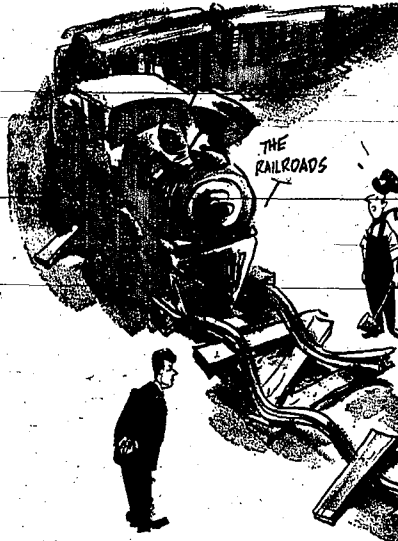

# That's Different

The result was the creation of the steel-strong Pathet Lao organization, which has been giving our side the back of its hand for years.

# THE DOCTOR SAYS

Q—Is here such a thing as being allergic to the sun? I am very dry skin. I lie in the sun and get a rash. My skin breaks out in hives, and itches. I've tried skin creams. They don't help.  
A—In this skin eruption, a person may have reddened, itchy, or burning patches, small wheals resembling mosquito bites, small blisters, or pustules resembling those associated with eczema.  
These different manifestations may all be present at once or may appear in different stages. The disease is apt to be persistent and recurrences are frequent.  
Although the cause is unknown, such things as iodides and iodized salt, bromides, chocolate, nut, fish and milk may aggravate the disease.  
Complete cures are rarely seen, but the disease usually subsides after a few months. During that time much can be done to make you more comfortable.  
Your doctor may want to use antihistamine, anticonvulsants, or corticosteroids as these are frequently used to relieve the symptoms. When the disease does not have a short course of corticosteroids may help.  
Some time ago I was sick. On the insurance form, the doctor wrote "Cholelithiasis." What is that? It was not incurable. Does that mean incurable? A—Cholelithiasis means "having gallstones." This is itself incurable, but it can be cured. Antihistamine drugs used for other kinds of allergy have helped.

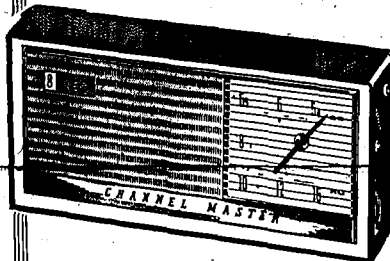

### News Around Idaho

**REKLOGO, June 11 (P)**—The 20th annual convention of the department of Idaho Disabled American Veterans is scheduled here June 13-15. Department Commander Howard J. Barker, Osburn, said 15 to 100 delegates are expected for the convention. The Spokane county chapter will be the largest. The convention will be held at the Holiday Inn, Boise. The national headquarters and Lynn E. Kopan, manager of the veterans administration center, Boise.

**SUN VALLEY, June 11 (P)**—The president of the American Bankers' association called Monday for a modification of gross farm settlement being a tax cut this year. Mr. Monroe Kimball, Thompson, Ga., told the Utah Bankers' association convention that "congress hasn't heard enough from back home about this proposal," he said.

**BOISE, June 11 (P)**—The department of commerce and development reported Monday that the film, "Idaho," produced for the Idaho territorial centennial, has been honored by the American Film Festival. The film was chosen for the festival's award. New York showings and received a citation that goes with the selection. said Miss Louise Shaddock, executive secretary of the department.

**KOOSKIA, June 11 (P)**—A film portraying the development of the Appaloosa breed of horses by the Nez Perce Indians will be shown for the first time in Idaho here Tuesday night. Louise Shaddock, secretary of the Idaho department of commerce and development, who will show the film, said it was designated by the Western Heritage association as the best western picture of the year. The film shows development of the breed by the Indians after its introduction into the Northwest from present-day South America.

**BOISE, June 11 (P)**—State Auditor Joe P. Williams said Monday that most state agencies are cooperating with Gov. Robert E. Smylie's request for a moratorium on general fund spending except for salaries and public assistance. Williams said he received a steady stream of calls Monday from state agencies with questions about how to proceed under the governor's Friday directive. Smylie's action was taken to help the state balance the books at the end of the two-year fiscal period June 30, as required by law. State tax collections are running behind estimates made for the biennium.

**BOISE, June 11 (P)**—Members of the state highway board Monday spoke out for "a more human approach" in highway right-of-way purchases, giving more consideration to damage and hardship factors. The subject arose when the board heard testimony before the appraisal section of the highway department right-of-way division in setting values in some cases far below those of outside appraisers hired by the department for land purchased for a one-way couplet through Boise.

**POCATELLO, June 11 (P)**—The possibility of storage and check dams on the Portneuf river watershed moved out of the talking stage and into the action stage Monday with arrival of two investigators from the U. S. army corps of engineers. Niel F. Meadowcroft, chief of general investigation for the army corps of engineers, and Della Walls, and Della E. Pugh, assistant chief, will survey the watershed Tuesday and Wednesday to determine storage possibilities which might be included in a proposed flood control program.

**BOISE, June 11 (P)**—A man accused of murder in Missouri failed Monday to win his freedom by legal action but he told Judge J. Dale Durstall he would appeal to the Idaho supreme court. Durstall dismissed in third district court a petition from Charles E. Smith, 31, for a writ of habeas corpus. Smith is accused of killing his wife, Donna Jean, 26, in Missouri on Oct. 26, 1961.

**POCATELLO, June 11 (P)**—The executive manager of the Associated Taxpayers of Idaho said that any cut in federal taxes should be accompanied by a similar cut in federal spending. "The shape of the tax cut and/or tax reform bill is slowly emerging in Washington and we are promised that maybe by Labor day we'll get a bill from the house," he said. "I don't know what the President will do," he said. "I'm not sure," he said. "I can find any timeable of federal spending reductions." He said there is room for belt-tightening.

**LEWISTON, June 11 (P)**—A resolution proposing abolition of the state income tax in favor of a 2 per cent sales tax is before the Idaho convention of the AFL-CIO, 11 to 12 states, here today. The resolution, which has the endorsement of a 35-hour work week and medical care for the aged under social security. Others include establishment of an Idaho department of labor field office and the creation of a state health department. The resolution was drafted by Dow E. Salter, Seattle, of the Washington bureau of labor management, contacted a Monday evening clinic on labor relations and management.

**SALMON, June 11 (P)**—About 125 delegates to the 33rd annual convention of the Idaho peace officers association turned back to Salmon today for the Idaho supreme court election. Williams takes over on the Monday afternoon schedule for the four-day convention which ends Wednesday after election of officers.

**BLACKFOOT, June 11 (P)**—The man who maintained throughout the trial that he isn't Clyde Glah faces a 10-year prison term in the Idaho state penitentiary for the slaying of Edward McKay in a bar at Atlantic City. Glah was arrested at the time of the slaying and committed to state hospital for treatment after a hearing. He walked away and some time later when a body was found in a remote area, authorities concluded it was Glah. But the man who called himself Ray Albert King was arrested in San Jose, Calif., last fall when fingerprints for a junk dealer's license matched those of Glah.

**BOISE, June 11 (P)**—The U. S. government has filed an \$23,400 lawsuit on behalf of the Nez Perce Indian tribe against a Lewiston, Idaho, firm. It claims the Nez Perce Mining corporation violated a lease agreement by failing to develop or operate a limestone mine on Indian property.

**IDaho FALLS, June 11 (P)**—Fred D. HOWARD, 68, well-known Idaho Falls polo player, died at a local hospital Sunday night. He had been ill for several years. Funeral services will be at 2 p.m. Wednesday in the First Presbyterian church.

### Climber Was Saved From Probable Fall

**KATMANDU, Nepal, June 11 (P)**—James Whitaker, first American to conquer Mt. Everest, was rescued from probable death near the summit by his climbing partner, Nepalese Sherpa guide Nawang Gombu, it was revealed today. American Expedition Leader Norman G. Dyhrenfurth, Santa Monica, Calif., told the story at the group's first news conference since returning from its historic triple assault on the world's highest mountain. He said Whitaker and Gombu were working their way back down from the summit when 25 feet of trail on a snow cornice gave way under Whitaker's feet and he suddenly found himself in mid-air, dangling upside down from a rope. Dyhrenfurth said Gombu's action in tightening a heaving rope saved Whitaker's life. Whitaker, 32, Redmond, Wash., said the snow cornice near the summit was extremely tricky and crossing them was highly hazardous. The two men reached the top May 1 in the face of heavy snow blizzards and howling winds, he said. "Everest seemed to me much higher than the height mentioned in geography books I had read," Whitaker said with a smile. Asked if he would like to climb the 29,028-foot peak again, he said, "Not in the near future." Whitaker said he had gone without food during the final 12 hours of the climb, partly due to poor appetite at the extremely high altitude, where even chewing became a great effort.

### Committee Dumps Tax Requests

**WASHINGTON, June 11 (P)**—The House ways and means committee has rejected President Kennedy's recommendation that the special tax treatment of dividend income be repealed. The administration had said that dropping the provision, included during the Eisenhower administration, would increase government revenues by some 400 million dollars a year.

A taxpayer now is permitted to exclude from his taxable income the first \$50 of dividend and to deduct from his tax bill an amount equivalent to four per cent of his total dividends. The committee also voted Monday for a liberalization of drug purchase deductions for persons 65 and older but rejected a proposal that could have encouraged purchases of private medical insurance.

### Gets Permit

**BOISE, June 11 (P)**—The Idaho public utilities commission announced Monday awarding to Arthur R. McCulliton, Burley, of a motor contract carrier permit. The permit authorizes McCulliton to haul whole milk in the Burley, Jerome and Rupert areas under contract with Idaho-Orem Dairymen, Inc.

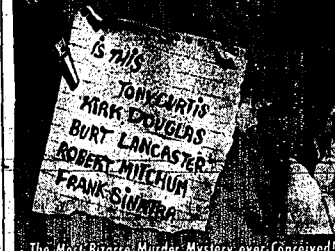

### Workmen Are Preparing For Conclave

**VATICAN CITY, June 11 (P)**—Vatican workmen worked up doors, stairways and windows today in preparation for the conclave June 19 to choose successor to Pope John XXIII. The 75 or 80 cardinals expected to attend the conclave will be sealed off from the outside world when they elect the new spiritual leader of the world's 800 million Roman Catholic and sealed doors and wooden barriers will restrict them to the limited area around theistine chapel. Workmen completed the installation yesterday of the tall chimney on the roof of the chapel through which smoke traditionally informs the world of the results of each ballot. The church continued today to mourn Pope John's death June 6 with its funeral mass at St. Peter's basilica and abolition of a symbolic catalogue on which rested the triple-tiered papal crown. Members of the sacred college of cardinals were choosing the choice of a successor. More than 50 of the 82 cardinals have arrived in Rome for informal discussions preliminary to the conclave. Age and illness was expected to keep a few of the priests of the church from attending the historic event. The cardinals represent diverse schools of thought on the direction the church should take. The lines are being drawn, but generally there appears to be a strong and active group in favor of continuing on Pope John's liberal policies, an other which favors a return to conservatism, and a third group of "moderates" who seek a middle course.

# Amazing St. Malachy May Have Forseen Next Pope

NEW YORK, June 11 (NPA)—The papal throne is veiled by death, the attention of the world is centered on the annuals of the Catholic church as they gather solemnly in the Vatican to decide who among them will become pope.

But across their conclave falls a strange shadow. This puzzling shadow is cast by a man who almost a thousand years ago seemingly foresaw all of the popes until the end of time, and left a series of brief descriptions suggesting who they would be.

For centuries, each time a new pope has been named, the college of cardinals has made the choice, but their selections have had a relation to ancient prophecies predicted by St. Malachy.

Those who have followed the course of events in an intelligent manner cannot fail to be impressed by these eerie prophecies, says the Catholic encyclopedia. "There is something more than coincidence in the designations given . . . so many hundreds

of years before their time." For example, the prophetic description of Pope John XXII was the Latin phrase, "The aureole of the boy," meaning "from the boy who made shoes." As it happened, this pope turned out to be the son of a shoemaker—whose family name was Ossa, meaning "bone."

Another of these prophetic phrases was "Ex rosa leonina," meaning "from a leonine rose." The pope to whom this description applied was Honorius IV, whose family coat of arms was a rose held by two lions.

"The prophet, St. Malachy, was a strange man who was elevated to sainthood. He was born in Ireland in 1094 to a noble family named O'Morgair.

A serious-minded youth, he did not care for the idle pastimes of the other boys in the village of Armagh. Perhaps influenced by a devout mother, young Malachy instead displayed an early interest in religion, joining the church at the age of 17.

Ordained at 23, by the age of 30 he had become bishop of Con-

nor; and at 38, Archbishop of Armagh.

What St. Malachy foresaw, so many centuries ago, he set down in a list of 112 brief phrases. They have become "the most famous and best-known prophecies about the popes."

These predictions do not foretell any actual names. They refer—in strict historical order—to birthplaces, coats of arms, titles or some identifying trait or activity. Still, they puzzle the imagination and defy natural explanation.

"Illum et rosa" was, for instance, the phrase Malachy used to describe the pope named in the year 1623. This turned out to be Urban VIII, whose family shield did indeed display—"lilies and roses."

"Angulus vir," meaning snake man, was the prediction Malachy made about the pope who would prove to be Gregory X. This pontiff had a snake on his coat of arms.

"Piccolini" was the saint's one-word forecast of Pius III.

And this pope was indeed noted for being a "piccolini," meaning a man short in stature.

St. Malachy left the phrase "pilgrim pope" to describe the man who ascended the throne of the Vatican in 1775. Pius VI fulfilled this prophecy with the unusual fact for a pope. He left Rome to visit Germany.

"A cross from a cross" are the saint's words about Pius IX, who became pope in 1846. The afflictions and crosses of Pius IX were more than felt to the lot of his predecessors, notes a religious historian, "and the more aggravating of these crosses were brought on by the House of Savoy."

What of Pope No. 261, Angelo Giuseppe Roncalli—John XXIII? St. Malachy's phrase about him is "Pastor et nauis," meaning "shepherd and sailor."

Well, John XXIII came to the Vatican from that city of ships and sailors, Venice. There he was known as an especially good friend of the boatmen, knowing many of the mariners by their

first names. He made his pastoral debut there, just 10 years ago, a watery affair—moving along the Grand canal by gondola. Later on he was often seen motorboating through the waters on church business.

As for the rest of St. Malachy's "shepherd and sailor" prophecy, John XXIII proclaimed on the day of his coronation the desire to be, above all else, a "good shepherd." He made it clear that his Papal mission would be "essentially pastoral."

He repeated the words of St. John regarding the good shepherd who "goes before the flock" and "lays down his life for his sheep."

Surely, declared a friend of the Irish archbishop who left predictions, St. Bernard of Clair-

Gloria olive—the glory of the olive.  
Romanus: Petrus — Roman Peter.

St. Malachy expanded his prediction on the last of the holy fathers. "There will reign Peter the Roman who will feed his flock among many tribulations," he wrote, "after which the seven-hilled city (Rome) will be destroyed, and the dreadful Judge will judge the people."

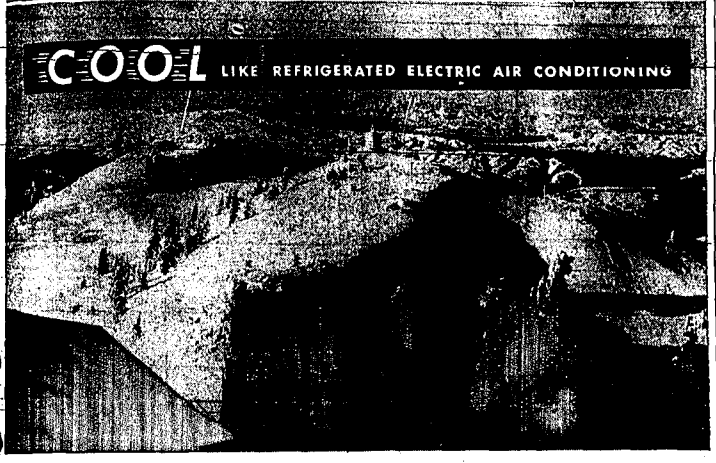
"This prophecy of Apian is best support by still another strange phenomenon. You may see it for yourself in the famous and beautiful basilica of St. Paul, outside the walls of Rome."

Visiting this church, thousands of tourists a year are struck by the beauty of the mosaic portraits of the popes that circle the majestic interior.

High up on the walls are 261 of these oval medallions portraying all of the popes, from St. Peter to John XXIII.

The disturbing thing is that only a handful of empty spaces are left for mosaic portraits of the popes who are yet to come—the same number prophesied by St. Malachy.

So in this basilica, founded in the year 386, just as in the eerie predictions made by St. Malachy centuries later, time seems to be running out for the world.

To make sure Churchill knows what his state produces, he also is getting a special five-gallon barrel of Kentucky bourbon.

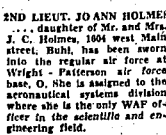
The commission and the key will be presented to Churchill on July 4—Independence day.

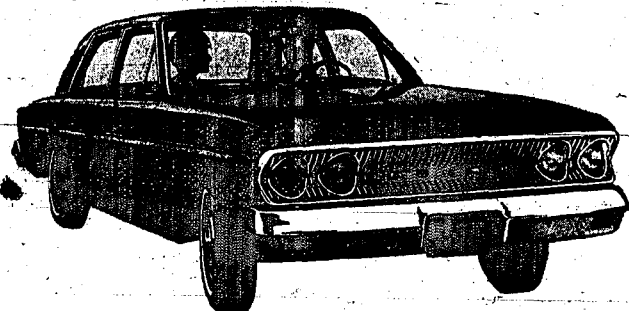

# Americans Must Chart City Future

HONOLULU, June 11 — Americans must decide whether they want their cities to become "ugly pits of economic decay and human suffering, or progressive, attractive, dynamic monuments to our nation."

With that admonition, Mayor Richard C. Lee, of New Haven, opened the 30th national conference of mayors Monday.

The rising tide of sums and blight, he said, will unless checked, wipe out the health and progress of the United States.

Local officials, he said, must strive to "overcome the decay, waste and human suffering that exists in our cities."

Lee, president of the conference, spoke to 500 mayors and city officials from across the nation and from Europe and Asia.

Topics ranging from new developments in police administration to a briefing on America's defense policies in the Pacific, were on the agenda.

Lee observed that growing demands placed on critics in the past 30 years have strained their facilities, resources and endurance.

The problems, in housing, transportation, education, crime, finance, and pollution, remain and are becoming more complex, he said.

In meeting these problems a civic leader "must be more than a ceremonial leader," the mayor continued.

"He must also be a planner, or organizer, a lobbyist and a technician. He must also be both the conscience and the leader of his community."

Lee said some of the top challenges faced by cities today are in civil rights, a subject explored Sunday by President Kennedy in an address to the mayors.

# Neutralist Blames Reds For Outbreak

VIENTIANE, Laos, June 11 — Neutralist Premier Souvanna Phouma today blamed his communist former allies for the renewed fighting on the Plain of Jars that has threatened to split his wobbly coalition government.

Souvanna issued a sharp communique rejecting "in toto" all allegations made by Prince Souphanouvong, leader of the communist Pathet Lao, in letters to the British and Russian co-chairmen of the Geneva conference that ended the Laotian civil war and "guaranteed" his government's neutrality.

During the civil war, the Laotian neutralist faction was allied with the Pathet Lao.

"The entire blame for aggressive acts and the rupture of the cease-fire can be laid on the Pathet Lao and their allies," Souvanna said in an apparent reference to communist North Viet Nam.

# Two Large Camping Sites, Boat Ramp Are Worked on in Alturas Lake Area

Work on three major camping facilities in Sawtooth valley was undertaken during the 1962 construction season—the Alturas Lake Inlet, campground, the Mt. Heyburn campground and a 50-foot boat landing ramp across the lake from Redfish lodge.

The Alturas lake inlet grounds has family units and four picnic units.

A family unit consists of a table, grill, parking and camping space, and available water and toilet facilities. Picnic units are similar, except they lack camping space.

The inlet camping area, located at the head of the lake where Alturas Lake creek empties into the lake, is bounded on the south side by the creek and on the east by the lake.

Construction on the site was started in the fall of 1961 and final work was completed in September, 1962.

One of the features of the campground is that it is located about three miles from the boundary of the Sawtooth primitive area. There are about 10 high mountain lakes within a one-day hike of the campground.

The Mt. Heyburn campground is located across the lake from Redfish lodge. Final work on the site will be completed by mid-summer, depending upon the weather. There are 30 family camping units.

The Sandy Beach boat ramp is located between the outlet campground and the Mt. Heyburn campground, less than a mile from the outlet bridge.

The ramp is 60 feet wide and 45 feet deep, permitting enough maneuvering room for five boat trailers. There also is adequate parking space nearby for 35 cars and trailers.

## Greek Raps His Queen's Planned Trip

ATHENS, Greece, June 11 (AP)—Premier Constantine Karamanlis has threatened to resign if Queen Paul and Queen Frederika do not cancel their state visit to Britain starting July 9, government sources said today.

The Queen is reported insisting on the trip although she was harassed in London April 20 by pickets demanding the release of 1,000 Greek prisoners taken during the communist civil war of 1947-49.

The government denies the rumors involved are political prisoners.

## Subcommittee Recommends Space Cuts

WASHINGTON, June 11 (AP)—A congressional subcommittee has recommended cutting the manned space flight budget by about 260 million dollars, it was learned today.

A house space subcommittee voted unanimously to trim by about seven per cent the \$7 billion dollars the administration requested for manned space flight activities for the fiscal year starting July 1.

The subcommittee's recommendations now go to the full house space committee, which is expected to endorse the panel's action.

Most of the reductions took place in the Apollo program to put a man on the moon by 1970. Additional cuts were made in the development of the M-Q engine.

It will be heard from are the views of the space appropriation committee. The space committee merely recommends to congress the cutting on spending. The appropriations committee recommends the actual amount of money to be allocated by congress.

The appropriations committee usually calls deep cuts in the committee's responsible for the authorization requests.

The senate space committee called more scientists today in an effort to evaluate long-range plans by the national aeronautics and space administration.

Opposing views were expressed yesterday by physicists on one hand and a chemist and biologist on the other. But they agreed that putting a man on the moon would not materially help the nation's defense efforts.

MANILA, June 11 (AP)—Malaya, Indonesia and the Philippines announced today "acceptance" of a Philippine proposal to form a Malaysian confederation which would unite the three nations "into the closest association."

The announcement was made in a joint communique issued at the close of a four-day conference in Manila between the foreign ministers of the three southeast Asian nations.

Australian diplomatic sources in Canberra called the charges a reprisal for the expulsion of Ivan Skripov (from Australia) in February for spying. Skripov was first secretary of the Soviet embassy in Canberra.

## De Gaulle's Provincial Tour Planned

PARIS, June 11 (AP)—President Charles de Gaulle today planned his 10th grassroots tour of the provinces despite the continued threat of assassination by die-hard members of the Secret Army Organization (OAS).

Yesterday police announced the arrest of four members of the outlawed OAS and its terrorist sub-group, the Counter-Revolutionary Movement (MCR).

The men were equipped with a mobile "command post" set up in a trailer in the southwestern area of France around La Rochelle. De Gaulle will visit the wine-producing region for five days beginning tomorrow.

The OAS has sworn to kill de Gaulle because he gave Algeria its independence. He narrowly escaped death in OAS attacks in September, 1961, and August, 1962.

During the last tour, police set up a two-mile wide "security carpet" manned by gendarmes armed with machineguns, helicopter pilots overhead and reserve forces controlled by radio posts along the route.

## Educator Told to Launch Study

LEWISTON, June 11 (AP)—The new acting president of Lewis-Clark Normal school has been directed to have a recommended curriculum ready for presentation to the state board of education in Boise July 10.

Wayne H. Sims, 37, appointed after the resignation of administrator O'Leon Caldwell, who disagreed with the board's policy, was directed to set up a curriculum committee.

It is to include representatives of Lewis-Clark, the University of Idaho, Idaho State college and the state board.

He was told consideration should be given the board's plan to start a training course for nurses; the curriculum should "strengthen the present two-year offerings," and the committee should "also work out a sound four-year program" in event the school's status is changed.

Caldwell had proposed a four-year curriculum but the board took the position that it wasn't possible to provide a sound four-year program on a two-year budget.

The 1963 legislature voted to commission a study of curriculum. Sims, who had resigned as assistant professor of English, was propositioned originally asked by Hawkes to stay on as administrator.

"I hope to lend my efforts to making this institution a strong part of Idaho's higher education," he said.

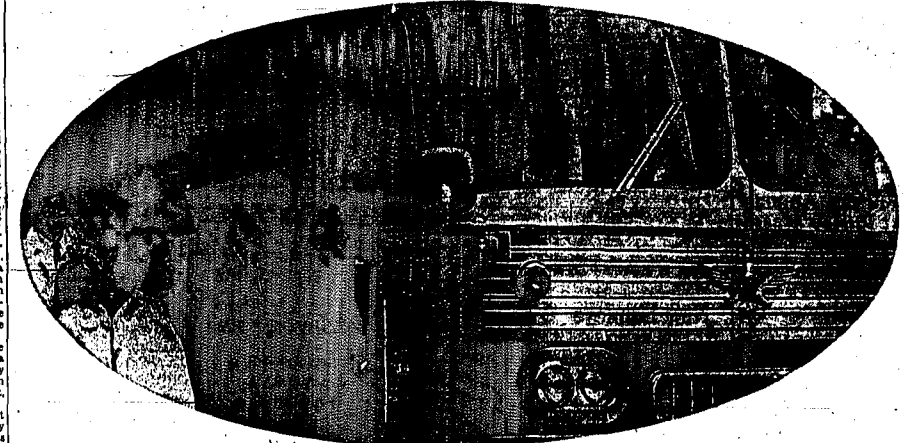

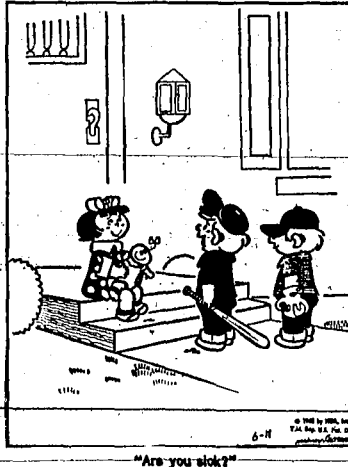

When he gets his associate in arts degree some of his 20 grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren will be on hand.

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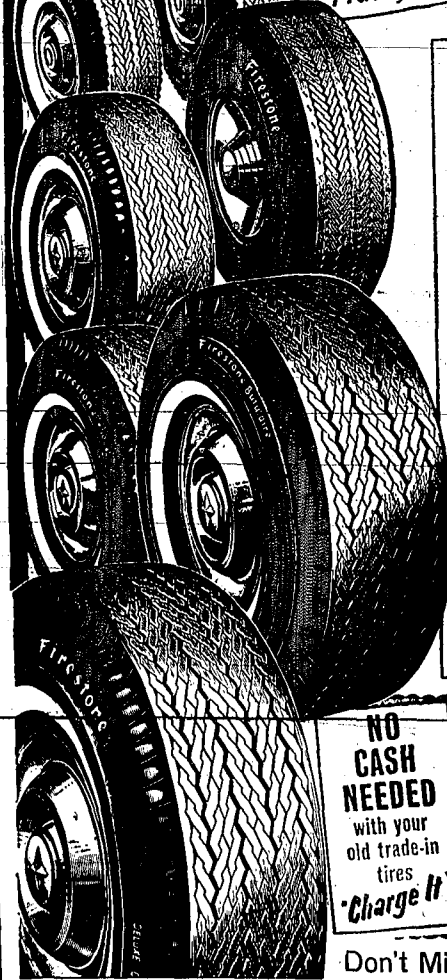
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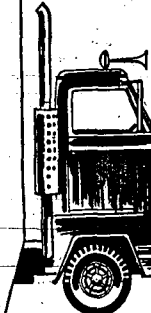


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
