PALERMO, Italy, July 1. Eight policemen were killed and 15 others were injured yesterday when a dynamite charge exploded under a parked car they were searching.

Police said the officers were investigating an explosion that had rocked a car in a Palermo suburb, killing four men and injuring five others.

The officers were dispatched to the scene and approached a parked car. When one police officer touched the car, it exploded.

Police said people as far away as 200 yards were injured by the blast.

Mandatory Death Law Dead in N.Y.

ALBANY, N.Y., July 1.—The mandatory death penalty for premeditated or committed murder was abolished in New York state today.

Under a law effective today, the penalty for premeditated murder will be life imprisonment unless the jury, meeting in a separate session after returning a verdict, agrees unanimously on the death penalty.

The new law makes the last state in the nation to eliminate the mandatory-death sentence in convictions for premeditated murder.

In the change, the state also has eliminated a long-standing distinction between first-degree and second-degree murder.

Red Protest

PENNSYLVANIA, FRANCE, July 1—(UPI)—A protest against red beret-style hats worn by students at the University of Pennsylvania and the Sorbonne here was shattered yesterday when they tried to stop a farmers' protest parade.

About 2,000 fruit and vegetable growers joined in the demonstration protesting low prices and poor markets. They marched from the district government office, farmers pulled up two truckloads of tomato plants and buried them near their offices. Police retaliated with tear gas.

The farmers also dumped several tons of tomatoes and apples from their trucks toward Spain. Traffic soon produced a slippery mixture and it took three hours to sort out the resulting traffic jam.

For the first time since it had founded in 1769, women attended undergraduate classes at the Ivy League college in conservative New Hampshire's rugged north country.

Today, all 146 of them enrolled in the school's first summer session. There are 153 men attending the classes.

But at the conclusion of the six-week session, Dartmouth again will become a bastion of male study and sports.

The school has had no coed dormitory since its first year, but now it is planned to transfer to the institution.

Idaho State Has Plenty of Youth as Name Changed

POCATELLO, July 1 (UPI)—The junior member of the school's five deans is Dr. John V. Bogen, 35, of the college of pharmacy.

He is 41. The senior dean of the university, Dr. Launcelot E. Gale, is 38; as are Drs. Stanley J. Heywood, 35, dean of the college of education, and Dr. Charles H. McIntosh, 35, of the college of liberal arts.

An exception is Frank Scely, dean of the college of business administration. While at 50, he is the only one of the five who is not a native of Idaho.

Dr. Walker is in his fourth year as head of the Pocatello institution. It is appropriate that he should be the one to lead the college into its new status as a university.

"In the past there has been a significantly undeveloped institution," he said. "What we can do is to increase its full stature as a service to the state," according to Dr. Walker, who is continuing to consider a new president for the school. His choice for the college, Pocatello and Idaho State, was Dr. Donald E. Walker.

The state board of education fact that the institution has been a university in all but name for the school had narrowed down his choice to Dr. Walker.

The list of 70 applicants to about 100,000 people who have applied for admission over a period of four years. A decision of the university's board of trustees is expected in a few weeks.

Walker has been interviewed over a period of four days. A decision was near.

In a near-dramatic atmosphere, Walker, who has been a teacher and administrator in the state, appeared with a statement in hand at the door of the chambers where the board was gathered.

He announced to all that the new president would be Donald E. Walker, the 38-year-old dean of students at San Fernando Valley State College in California.

It was a historic choice for Idaho State.

Walker became the school's first new president since it had become a state college by the act of granting college status in 1947. The school's first and only president until then had been Dr. Carl Oberg, who left in 1945 after 10 years to become president of Long Beach State College in California.

McIntosh had directed the college for 10 years.

In 1954, he was named dean of Idaho State's five deans. Walker will be given the task of leading it through a period of "counseling and testing" in 1963. That same year, he went to San Fernando Valley State College as dean of students.

Walker wanted no time in making himself known at ISC and there few Idahans could say, "I know him." Fewer still, however, know about Idaho State.

Walker is optimistic about the future of the institution.

"I think the future will see Idaho State assume an expanding role in the educational field," he said. "The people of the state didn't realize the size and maturity that the institution had achieved, the quality of the student body."

"The institution has grown so rapidly," Walker said, "and in some ways, quite quickly, that it was here before us, so to speak."

As a transplanted Californian, he can appreciate the difference between colleges larger than ISC and its 3,000 students springing up almost overnight, Walker found.



GASCADE, July 1 (UPI)—A Montana scuba diver who ran out of air 90 feet down and spent 2½ hours in a decompression chamber after recovering his tanks says he will have two air tanks if he goes down again.

"I haven't decided for certain that I am going to dive again, but I am quite sure I will," said Koppang, 20, Columbia Falls.

Koppang and his father came to Cascade to visit a sister and planned to return home today.

The diver emerged at 4:39 a.m. Sunday from the 100-ft. Idaho Power company's Brownlee dam on Snake river.

"I learned a lot here about diving and I think it is going to help," Koppang said.

He has been diving since he was 12, who drowned despite his efforts.

STOCKHOLM, July 1 (UPI)—The harm caused by air force Col. Sig-Werner Ulrich's 15 years spying for the Soviet Union may cost Sweden more than the \$1 billion dollars to repair, informed sources said today.

The sources estimated the damage on the basis of what it would cost to relocate secret airfields, radio intercept stations and other facilities for Sweden's defense, now feared hopelessly compromised.

Ulrich, 39, pleaded guilty at a preliminary hearing last week to selling defense secrets to the Russians since 1948.

raiding launch in a running sea battle off the north coast of Cuba yesterday. Cuban exile sources reported heavy losses.

The Cuban raiding crew jumped into the water and was captured by the gunboats. At least one of the anti-Castro party was wounded.

The number of captives was not known. They were believed taken to the port of Cienfuegos.

The raiding launch managed to shoot up one gunboat in the exchange of cannon fire that it had to be towed to shore by a government tugboat, according to the reports.



Utahns Feel Sharper Bite Of New Taxes

SALT LAKE CITY, July 1.—Utahns will feel the bite of a new tax today as a flow that is expected to pile up an additional 107 million dollars in state coffers within the year.

Tax changes passed by the legislature will take effect today. They include two tax increases and one new tax expected to produce 12 million dollars.

There is one sales tax exemption—expected to reduce income by 1.3 million dollars for the net gain of 10.7 million dollars.

Two of the tax increases affect almost everyone. It is a nine-half-cent increase in the state sales tax, to a total of three per cent. The state's total personal income tax is increased 3 million. One-half of the increase is earmarked for the state building program.

The cigarette tax is doubled to a total of eight cents per pack. Revenue from this is expected to be 25 million. Other tobacco tax increases will yield \$300,000.

The new tax reduction—an exemption from the sales tax of exchanges of tangible personal property. For instance, in the purchase of a new automobile, the value of the trade-in will be exempt from the sales tax.

Experimental Sugar Beet Plots Start in South

MEMPHIS, Tenn., July 1.—A modern sugar manufacturing plant announced today it will begin experimental sugar beet production in three parts of the South which may make the area self-sufficient in sugar.

Recently, officials have raised the wholesale cost of sugar to about three times what it was a year ago.

The Great Western Sugar company, Denver, which has experimental plants in Dyersburg and Lake counties in Tennessee, in the Kennett section of the Missouri Bootheel and near Paragould and Blytheville in Arkansas,


Philip B. Smith, general agricultural director of the firm, said prospects are 8-2 in favor of a flourishing sugar beet industry in these areas.
