# Evidence of Red Test Inconclusive

WASHINGTON, July 1 (AP)—The atomic energy commission says it has inconclusive evidence of possible recent Soviet nuclear tests of very low yield.

The evidence remains inconclusive and it is expected that more definite conclusions must await further evidence and analysis, an AEC spokesman said in a brief announcement prompted by published speculation of such tests.

An informed source said a Soviet test in the range of one kiloton apparently took place June 12, two days after President Kennedy announced the halt of any further U.S. atmospheric tests provided other nuclear nations also restrained.

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## Try to Survive

Summer weather appears to be firmly established and the Fourth of July falls on Thursday, this week, a combination that's bound to put thousands of Mountain Valley residents on the highways. Some motorists will have only a one-day outing, while others will be able to take full advantage of the holiday and take full-day excursions. Highways are dangerous all the time, but under such circumstances, they're bound to be deadlier during the long Fourth of July holiday.

Such conditions have prompted more families in recent years to spend a "safe and sane" Fourth of July at home, displaying the American flag and relaxing in the comparative safety and quiet of the backyard.

Those who cannot bring themselves to observe such a tame holiday are urged to remain especially alert to all normal hazards of swimming and boating and to the special hazard of highway accidents. Keep in mind that it's not always the "other fellow" who keeps in mind that mechanics, poor drivers, poor roads and similar causes are low on the list of reasons for auto accidents. The prime causes for driver error and lack of judgment which account for something like nine out of 10 accidents are:

1. Keep all these things in mind if you want to keep all the highways over the four-day holiday, be doubly cautious and make every attempt to survive. Let's avoid any tragedy that might mar the holiday.

## TRACK FOR LEASE

Any Idahoans eager to get into the race track business might be interested in leasing Green Mountain park in Vermont. The park has a few tracks, the track operators have the facilities. The operators fully expected to make a killing because it's the state's only race track open since the legislature legalized pari-mutuel betting. Things haven't quite worked out the way they expected.

When the track opened for its first season, after much ballyhoo and predictions of great throngs of bettered egos to lose their money, the crowd was rather sparse. Frantic operators discovered only a few Vermonters and the rest from such neighboring states as Connecticut, Massachusetts and New York.

Betting totals were far under what the operators said they needed to break even, let alone make a profit. And things went from bad to worse.

The latest chapter in Vermont's experiment with pari-mutuel betting was a bill in the Vermont house of representatives designed to give temporary financial aid to the race by reducing the state's tax on the betting take. The bill went through to its third reading and was killed 116 to 93. Whereupon Gov. Philip H. Hoff, a prime supporter of the move, said the track might have to close if it didn't get some other help.

It might be noted in passing that one of the biggest factors in defeat of the bill was that several legislators recalled a statement by Lou Smith, president of the track, to the general effect that he had to have a rolling in the coin.

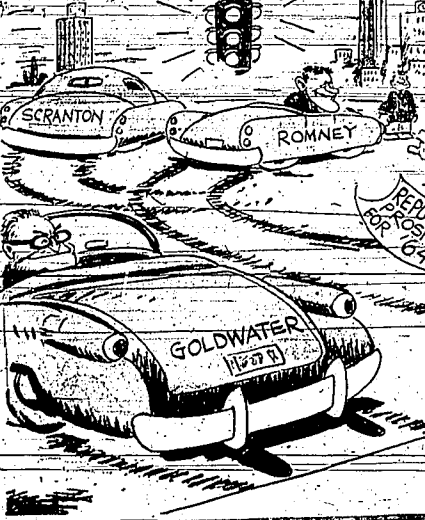

# Idaho State Has Plenty of Youth as Name Changed

# Coeds Shatter Old Tradition At Dartmouth

POCATELLO, July 1 (UPI)—Idaho State college lacks youth means vigor and enthusiasm as it becomes the country's newest university today. The average age of Walker, and his five administrative deans is only 40 years. But that's just part of the story.

She announced to all that the new president would be Donald E. Walker, the 38-year-old dean of students at San Fernando Valley college in California.

It was an historic choice for Idaho State.

Walker became the school's first new president since it had become a four-year, degree-granting college in 1947. The school's first and only president until then had been Dr. Carl W. McIntosh, who left after 12 years to become president of Long Beach State college in California.

McIntosh had directed the col-

lege through its formative years. Walker would be given the task of leading it through a period that would see it seek equal standing in the state with the long-established University of Idaho at Moscow.

At the time of his selection, Mrs. Campbell praised Walker as "a man of high moral character." His twin brother is a minister, and Walker served in the Methodist ministry for two years before deciding, as he put it, that he was "better qualified for academic than clerical pursuits."

He holds bachelor of arts and master of theology degrees from the University of Southern California. He earned his doctorate in sociology at Stanford.

His career in education started at Stanford where he was a teaching assistant. He later became an instructor in sociology at San Diego state college and assumed the rank of assistant professor there.

In 1954, he was named dean of students at San Diego, and became dean of courses and testing in 1959. That same year he went to San Fernando Valley State college as dean of students.

Walker wanted no time in making himself known at ISU and throughout the state.

He is a friendly extrovert who is at his best among a band of fellow Rotarians club in some distant community about the institution the taxpayers are supporting at Pocatello.

He has a firm command of the English language and speaks in a smooth flow of adjectives describing Idaho State. From the first, he seemed to consider it one of his main objectives to acquaint the people of Idaho with the school.

As a transplanted Californian where colleges larger than ISU and its 3,000 students spring up almost overnight, Walker found

it hard to believe that so much of Idaho knew so little about ISU. But all this has changed after three years of speechmaking and the publicity given the school in its fight for university status.

Few Idahoans could say now they don't know about Idaho State.

Walker is optimistic about the future of the institution.

"I think the future will see Idaho State assume an expanding and increasingly significant role in the state," he said.

"The people of the state didn't realize the size and maturity that the institution had achieved, the quality of the faculty and the quality of the student body."

"The institution has grown so rapidly," Walker said, "and in some ways so quietly, that it was here before many had realized it was here and what it was."

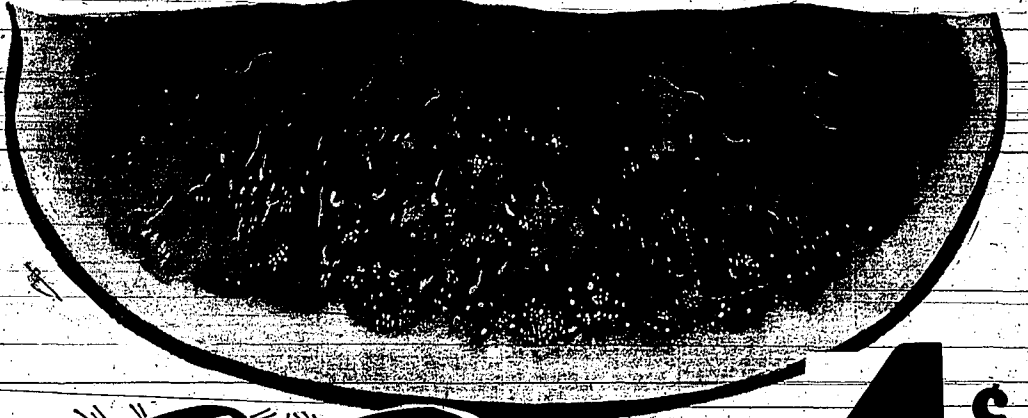

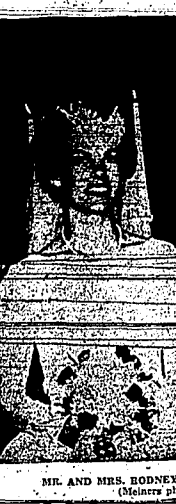

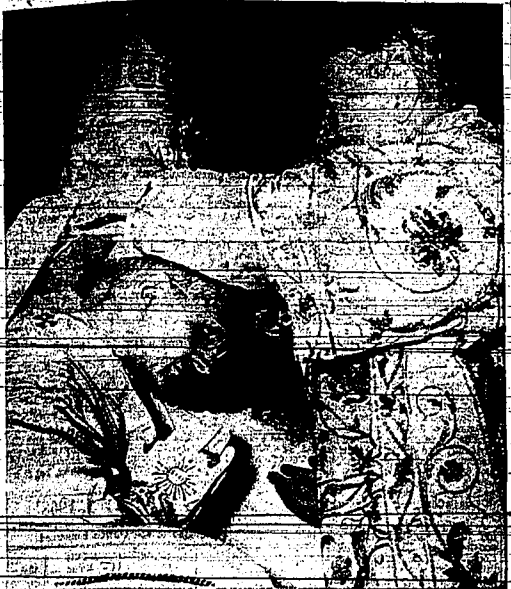

**MCKAY BAY, July 1**—The state aeronautics director blames what he describes as violation of safety precautions for the crash of a single engine plane that killed a passenger.

The sources estimated the damage on the basis of what it would cost to relocate secret airfields, radar installations and other apparatus for Sweden's defense, now feared hopelessly compromised.

Wennerstrom pleaded guilty at a preliminary hearing last week to selling defense secrets to the Russians since 1942.

### Raiding Launch Sunk by Cubans

**MIAMI, July 1**—Cuban gunboats sank an anti-Castro raiding launch in a running sea battle off the north coast of Cuba yesterday, Cuban exile sources reported today.

They said the raiding crew jumped into the water and was captured by the gunboats. At least one of the anti-Castro party was wounded, the sources said. The number of captives was not known, they were believed taken to the port of Calbarien.

The raiding launch managed to shoot up one of the communist gunboats so badly in the exchange of cannon fire that it had to be towed to shore by a government tugboat, according to the reports.

## Utahns Feel Sharper Bite Of New Taxes

SALT LAKE CITY, July 1 (AP)—Utahns started shelling out more taxes today in a flow that is expected to pile up an additional 1.7 million dollars in state coffers within the year.

Tax changes passed by the last legislature became effective today. They include two tax increases—and some new taxes—expected to produce 12 million dollars a year.

But there is one sales tax exemption expected to reduce income tax by 14 million dollars for the net gain of 10.3 million dollars.

One of the tax increases affects one almost everyone. It is a one-half-cent increase in the three per cent state income tax. This is expected to boost state income 8 million. All other tax increases will yield 12 million.

The tax reduction is an exemption from the sales tax of certain items, such as the purchase of a new automobile. The value of the item will be exempt from the sales tax.

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## Experimental Sugar Beet Plots Start in South

MEMPHIS, Tenn., July 1 (AP)—A Colorado sugar manufacturing company announced today it has begun experimental sugar beet production in three parts of the South which may make the area self-sufficient in sugar.

Recent price hikes have raised the wholesale cost of sugar to about three times what it was a year ago.

The Great Western Sugar company, Denver, said the experimental areas are in Dyer and Lake counties in Tennessee, in the Kennel section of the Missouri Bootheel and near Paragould and Joplinville in Arkansas.

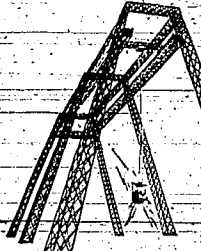
Philip B. Smith, general agricultural director of the firm, said prospects are 2-3 in favor of a flourishing sugar beet industry in these areas.

## Efforts Aided to Avert Rail Strike

CEDAR RAPIDS, Ia., July 1 (AP)—The Order of Railway Conductors and Brakemen (ORCB) today called the nation's railroads to "return to genuine collective bargaining" to avert a nationwide railroad strike later this month.

The board of directors of the ORCB said that if railroad labor faces another strike in the current work rules dispute, it will be because railroad management has abandoned collective bargaining.

Langley Research Center, a traditional leader in aeronautical research, is a key member of the great national task force dedicated to answering the challenge of space.

Langley was the major research establishment of former National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics from 1917 until 1958, when NACA became the nucleus of National Aeronautics and Space Administration, America's first major space program. Project Mercury, was conceived at Langley.

Located at Hampton, Va., the 770-acre center has 30 major research facilities, plus shops and administrative buildings—an investment of about \$250 million. It has a personnel of over 4,000.

Though only \$451 million out of NASA's requested 1964 budget of \$57 billion is allocated for aeronautical research, Langley is carrying out an intensive program in this field. Major goal is the development of a supersonic conventional transport (SCAT). One model, SCAT-15, is illustrated in first panel. With movable wings that can be swept back in flight, it would operate in the 2,000 m.p.h. range.

The rest of America's goal of reaching the moon, Langley is doing important work in piloting techniques for lunar vehicles. Second panel shows a 240-foot-high landing simulator which is designed to duplicate conditions of an actual landing on the moon.

Langley scientists and engineers are also studying the problems and potentials of self-erecting space stations. One of them under study is a 30-foot-diameter rubber doughnut which would inflate itself in space and support 2 to 10 men.

Other work at Langley includes:

- Guidance and control of satellites and spacecraft;
- Orbital rendezvous and docking of spacecraft;
- Paragliders for bringing satellites back to earth;
- Echo balloon communications satellite;
- Scout launching rocket;
- Project Fire (high-speed re-entry of space capsules into the atmosphere);
- Boost-glide and winged re-entry vehicles;
- Noise problems of large boosters.

## Aide to Baruch Wins \$140,000 In Sweepstakes

NEW YORK, July 1 (AP)—Mary A. Boyle, a longtime secretary of Richard Baruch, won \$140,000 in the Irish Sweepstakes derby Saturday. It was displaced today.

A spokesman for Miss Boyle, who held a ticket on winner Richard Baruch, said the prize was "determined to have no publicity about this."

Miss Boyle believes there are far more important things to consider in the world today in the newspaper than her personal affairs, the spokesman said.

## Space Woman Rejects Reports

MOSCOW, July 1 (AP)—Soviet space woman Valentina Tereshkova today brushed aside "rumor-mongering" western press reports that she planned "a day or two" in "orbit" during the flight.

She said she has "many things" scheduled for the 24-hour flight. She said she was originally scheduled to be extended to three days as "a 'fill' capsule" to "continue the flight," Miss Tereshkova said at a news conference.

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## Goose Future Is Topic of 5-State Meet

ISLAND PARK, July 1 (AP)—Canada's maintenance of the Canada goose population for western hunters will be considered by representatives of five states here Tuesday.

Wildlife technicians are expected from Montana, Wyoming, Colorado and Utah, as well as Idaho. Edward Blacum, state bird supervisor, said Nevada and California areas also concerned with problems of the Canada goose but may not be represented.

**Long Clan Is Seeking Power Again**

NEW ORLEANS, La., July 1 (AP)—A new power struggle is on in the Long family, Louisiana's No. 1 political clan.

Two young cousins of the dynasty's famous founders, Kingfish Huey and O'Earl, are battling for the gubernatorial nomination.

The tussle will be decided Dec. 8 in the Democratic party primary, a balloting usually regarded as tantamount to election.

Seeking the nomination are State Sen. Speedy O. Long, 34, and U.S. Rep. Gillis Long, 32. Comparatively new on the statewide stage, both are a blend of Long—college elites like Russell Long, now the clan's political senior with 14 years in the U.S. senate.

The picture is complicated by another "muckraker" exposure, John McKeithen, 45, a member of the family in all our remembrance, who, it is alleged, is running with the blessing of some of the clan.

It was inevitable that the two young Longs would be compared with their fabulist cousin. The late Earl Kemp (Ole Earl) Long, three-time governor, and his brother Huey P. (Kingfish) Long, who had Louisiana in his hip pocket until he was assassinated in 1928.

But there's quite a difference in personalities between the old and new Longs.

O'Earl put his finger on the coming change some years back. He mulled over the potential of youngsters crowding up from behind and rasped: "I'm in the best of the red hot zone in politics. When I'm gone there won't be any more."

Nobody disputed him. Even Louisiana could hardly be expected to produce another poli-

...tician who packed as much color and enjoyed as many fights and frolics as Earl Long.

...Speedy studied under the old master and expects to benefit from it.

...He boasts that he made his first stump speech at age 7 for Cousin Earl and was the last man to speak for him before the old champion died in 1960, soon after winning the congressional race in the eighth district.

...Earl was his often rowdy, freckled, earnest and born pre-empture, which is how he got his odd name.

...True to his nature, Speedy was first to jump into the gubernatorial race.

...Speedy will say my announcement is a private matter. He announced that I find there is confusion and fear among many that there will not be a Long in Louisiana this year. I am eliminating that confusion and fear."

Gillis, a stocky Alexandria lawyer, made his debut after a promise, unmaking Rep. H. B. McSwain in the eighth district, a largely rural section in Protestant central Louisiana.

...Through Speedy was first, Gillis' political assets include a combat service in World War II, the bronze star and purple heart.


