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70 Million Jobs Reached During June

WASHINGTON, July 6 (AP)—For the first time, the United States has 70 million jobs—almost two decades after Henry A. Wallace stirred a fuss by predicting 60 million.

The department of labor reported that the 70 million total was reached in June. U.S. employment passed 60 million 15 years ago.

Wallace, vice president when he made his prediction, figured 60 million jobs would be the result of full employment.

Statistics released today showed 70 million jobs did not mean full employment. Teen-age unemployment jobs pushed the unemployment total to 4.8 million.

Harold Goldstein, spokesman for the department, said employment in June swelled to 70.3 million. The unemployment rate, despite the increase in unemployed, fell from 5.9 per cent in May to 5.7 per cent in June. This rate always is seasonally adjusted.

Wallace, now a farmer in South Salem, N.Y., wrote a book titled "60 Million Jobs" when he was vice president. It was published in 1945. The Democrats, who nominated Harry S. Truman to replace Wallace as the vice presidential candidate, used that sto-

Forest Visitor Center On Shore of Redfish Lake Is First In United States

By O. A. (Gus) KELLER, Times News Feature Editor

REDFISH LAKE, July 6 — See how the ground, forming what is known as a knoll overlooking the lake and commanding a sweeping view of the rugged Sawtooth mountains, the first visitor center in the United States on national forest land is open to the public.

Constructed in a manner to blend with the natural surroundings, this new showplace of the Sawtooth national forest will be a mecca to the thousands of tourists who visit this area each year. It is manned by United States forest service employees and will be open every day, including Sundays, from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m.

The new structure will serve as a "hub" for activities which benefit and entertain visitors during the season, according to Jack Lavin, Twin Falls sawtooth forest staff officer in charge of visitor information and recreation.

It is in territory supervised by District Ranger Ralph Cisco, Sawtooth Valley ranger station.

Dominating the structure are four large, connected picture windows which permit visitors a breathtaking view from the observation room. This new addition is a sweep of the rugged Sawtooth mountains including the Grand Mogul and majestic Mt. Heyburn, which towers 10,200 feet into the sky.

Below, in full view from the center, is Redfish lake, which owes its existence to the glacier period thousands of years ago. In fact, the knoll where the center is constructed was born of a glacier which started to recede 67,000 years ago.

forces' administration, fire protection and forest protection. These displays were created for the center by William Chapman, Gardner, Mont., and Grant Hagen-Jackson, Wyo., both commercial wildlife artists. Several of the exhibits are three-dimensional. Directed spotlights add to the realism.

Also reached from the reception room is the audio visual auditorium. Here "magic carpet" slide-show trips will take visitors over the entire Sawtooth forest and surrounding mountains.

They will be shown periodically throughout the day. Comfortable seating is provided for guests, viewing the 15-minute presentations.

Restrooms are reached by a walkway adjacent to the front entrance. Wooden benches double the interior design and heating is by gas.

Comfortable benches are strategically located beside the entrance walkway from the parking lot and also at the front entrance.

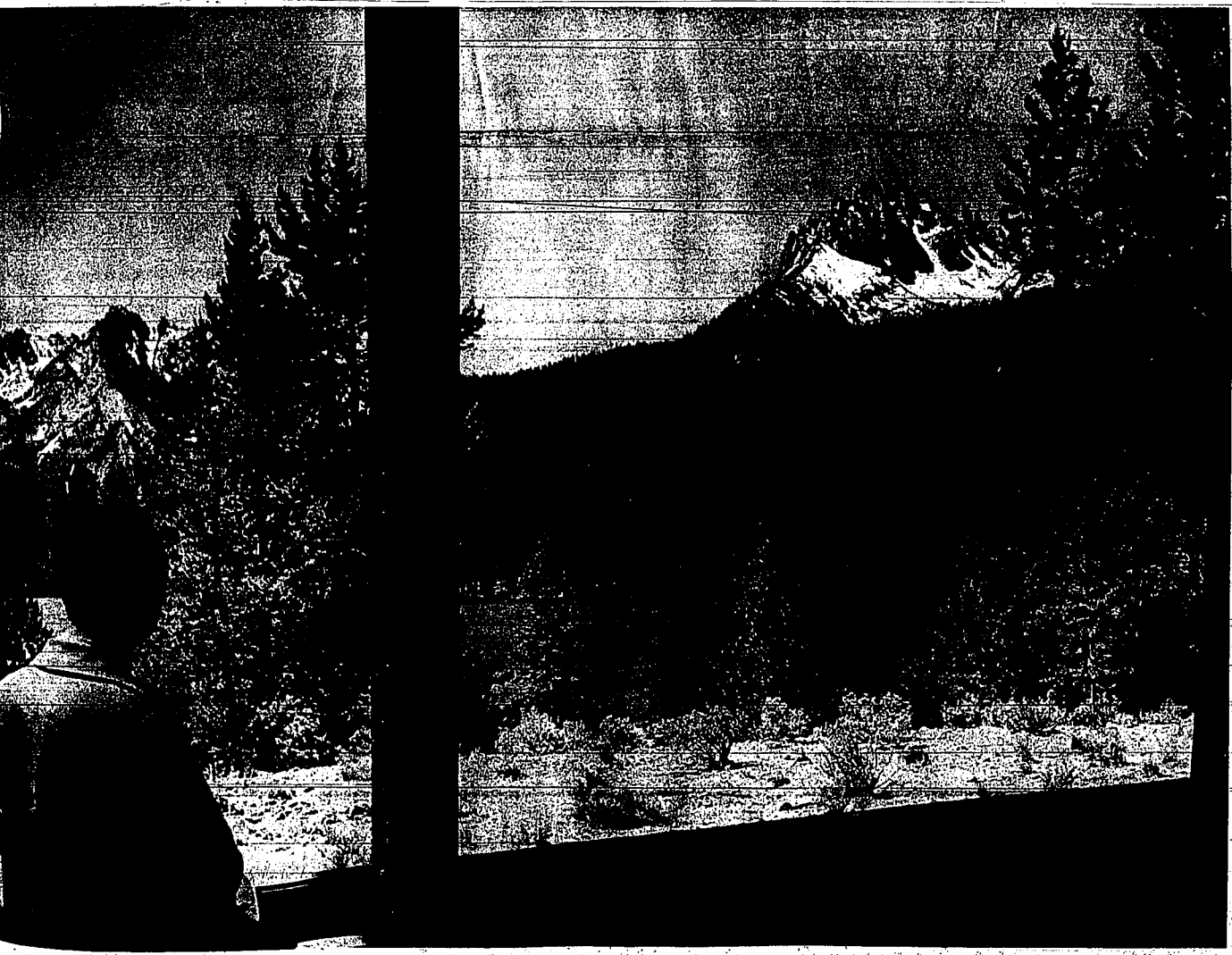
Although of only one level construction, for the most part, the building conveys the impression of a much larger building. There is over 2000 square feet of usable space inside the structure.

General contractor for the job was the Babbitt Construction company, Boise, while the Boise Stone and Tile company planned and installed the rockwork.

The center staff is headed by Dave Lee, chief forest naturalist and a permanent forest employee. (Continued on Page 40)

Life in MAGIC VALLEY

A 75-year-old-brass-knacker, a coal oil lantern and an old cow-bell are the things that Herbert J. Hardy, 67, has in his trunk. He shows for his childhood-days-in-old-Mexico. Born in Colonial Pacheco, Chihuahua, Mexico, in 1900, the second of eight children of Mr. and Mrs. George W. Hardy, he remembers distinctly the family fleeing for their lives along with 4,000 others who had been sent to Mexico to settle new land, begin farming operations and to raise cattle. He was one of six such colonies in the northern part of Mexico and we lived in Diaz," he comments. "In 1912 Pancho Villa, a Mexican general who was active in the northern Chihuahua colonies, issued an order to either give up all our arms and ammunition—leave the country or join with his Mexican rebels. President Taft told us not to do anything but come out of Mexico—in a short time while troops were sent to settle the problem.

Sooner than we had expected to leave, however, three soldiers of hand and we (parents and seven children) fled with two teams and two wagons and the clothes we had on our backs. Father was a blacksmith and a large rancher and the total value of our property was estimated close to \$100,000 dollars. We rode to a relative place about seven miles away where it was decided I should ride back and obtain the buckets, lanterns and the cowbell. The bucket being one of the wedding gift that my father saw to my mother when they were married. I returned and had to fill the lantern with oil, shaking up the tin. Hardy recalls the trip was made safely, but his mother decided she needed her own—a new day-bag.

Hardy notes that enough provisions were provided by the government for a three or four-week stay in New Mexico, but when the time elapsed they found they could not return to their homes so they began to seek work and manage as best they could. The family moved to Tucson, Ariz., where Hardy recalls, "Here we began to clear mesquite wood from the land to earn some money. Hay hauling was done in Mesa, Ariz., and a blacksmith shop was set up in Thatcher, Ariz."

He was 13 years old when he began driving a freight wagon loaded with lumber—from the Choharian mountains to Stafford, Ariz. In July, 1913, his father heard about the finishing of the Oakley road and the prospects of new farming projects. They made 1000 miles with two wagons, two teams carrying nine people and 25 cents in the rider Hardy's pocket.

It took nine days to make the trip. They arrived in September and during the winter they lived in a tent and two covered wagon boxes while the weather got 34 below zero.

None of the children had ever seen snow before and had seldom worn shoes. "It was quite a change from what they were used to."

"People tried to tell us what overcoats were when they had in Mexico and we thought they were crazy. We soon learned to appreciate them, however," he comments.

One more brother was born after the family reached Oakley. When this child was a year old the father died, leaving the mother to raise eight children alone. Hardy, being one of the oldest, went on the road with a traveling photographer where he learned many tricks of the

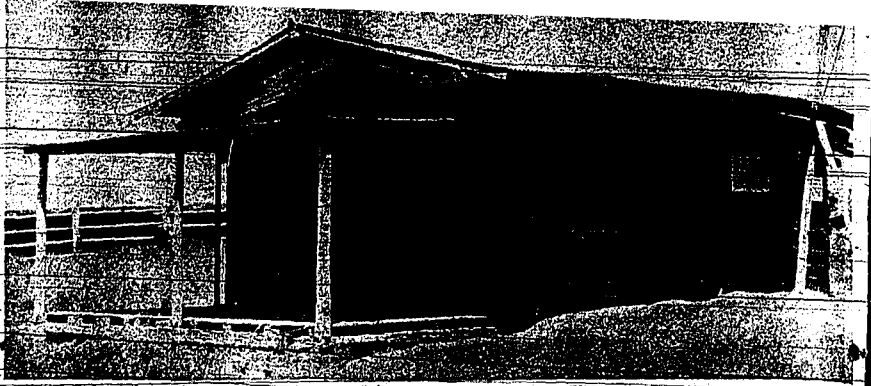

Sen. Jordan Disturbed by Medical Aid

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 6 (Special)—An anti-dentist by the persistent growth of federal aid and controls as applied to the health-guarding organizations. Sen. Gem State Collector Claims People Are Pretty Good About Paying Tax

Contrary to the picture painted by cartoonists and comedy writers, the tax collector isn't such a bad fellow after all—especially if the collector is Ralph E. Browne.

Browne is retiring as director of the Twin Falls office of the Idaho income tax division. He had fellow collectors on duty as federal government. According to Browne, most people pay their taxes with little complaining. They realize it is necessary and the collector is just working for the state and the people. In time all the workers had the original man picked up while the man didn't mind filing and "paying his tax." He just wanted to make sure every one was doing the same," said Browne.

Some of them make mistakes but they try to help them out of their situations. The state is a little easier to get along with than they have a little more soul," said Browne. Browne can recall the early days of the state tax department when it occupied the fourth-floor of the statehouse. The entire department consisted of four men and a few secretaries. The state didn't follow the federal pattern in those days and consequently, with each session of the legislature there were new bills. In time the department began growing and according to Browne, all the changes and responsibility from one department to another were pretty hectic. In 1953 Browne was put in charge of the Twin Falls office. Browne was no stranger to Magic Valley. He moved to Buhl in 1938 from Preston.

"One thing about those early days," said Browne, "not too many people had to file tax returns. This exemption was \$1,500 and not too many people in Idaho made \$1,500 a year. Only 10 to 15 percent of the people in those days ever filed."

The situation has changed since and now practically everyone files. The hardest part of the change has been getting people who have never filed to file.

"Once you found them and told them that they had to file, they accepted it with the consent that it was fun while it lasted," said Browne. In one of the neighboring towns, Browne recalls, he called a factory worker in for not filing. The worker protested, claiming none of the other workers were filing. Browne explained that they would all have to file and he wasn't picking on anyone. It just turned out he was the first man selected. In time all the workers had the original man picked up while the man didn't mind filing and "paying his tax." He just wanted to make sure every one was doing the same," said Browne.

In the days before the 10 percent deduction, everything had to be itemized for deduction. One taxpayer even listed his marriage license as a deduction, and another claimed his dog license. Without a doubt, men are easier to get along with than women, said Browne. There are a great many and are the hardest to convince, he believes. Other employees in the tax office need approval of Browne's comments. There is one thing a tax collector asks, and that is free advice. Browne estimates he has received more advice than he has given. "People come in with all sorts of ideas on taxes and how the state should be run," he says.

They have a hard time believing that there is very little I can do about it. When questioned about his retirement Browne said, "There is only one more return I'm going to file and that is my own. Through filing out tax forms, Browne pointed out one thing. The state usually wins in most of the tax cases that end up in court. However, he can recall that one or two people have won their cases. Most of those who beat the state out of taxes, however, are those people who move to another state. If all the people left the state who threaten to leave, Twin Falls would be a ghost town. Browne believes these same people would have trouble in other states. Browne figures his yard, garden and flowers will occupy most of his time. He is going to get caught up on his card playing and do a little fishing. What he can't catch up on that, he has several civic clubs to attend.

Public Recreation Is Becoming Big Item for Idaho Fish and Game Unit

The Franklin county waterways company cooperated in developing a boat ramp, cattle guard, fences, sanitary facilities and drainage at the Glendale reservoir. These facilities benefit everybody.

Fremont county uses its heavy equipment to grade and plow the road into the Sand Creek wildlife management area so that the public can get to it a couple of months earlier than would be possible every spring and use it later in the fall than would otherwise be possible without this work. County equipment also was used in making the road, ponds and for other work. The county obtained road surface gravel free of charge from the proposed improvement area.

The forest service, bureau of land management and fish and game department have a cooperative fire control program on big game range in the Mink creek area near Pocatello. This land is in the public domain.

In the Niagara springs area, the Idaho Power company donated some land to the department which has been developed by county and civic groups. This cooperative work includes the development of a water supply, landscaping and construction of a sheltered patio for picnic and sanitary facilities.

The new department-made Spring Valley reservoir near Moscow is another good example of cooperative effort from county and civic groups. These groups installed picnic tables, toilets and other facilities.

Idaho fortunately recognized the growing need for outdoor recreational space before it was too late, acquiring land over the years that perhaps would not be available now at any price. Now it is time to develop and maintain many of these public access sites, and this should be a cooperative effort on the part of all of us—the state, the counties, the municipalities and the civic and sportsmen's organizations.

The Twin Falls Canal company furnished a dragline and digging machine at cost for the development of a picnic area at Cedar draw. The fish and game department provided the soil pipe, and the Twin Falls waterways commission company dug the ditches and leveled the area.

Cwyhee county and the bureau of land management cooperated in building an access road into the two-foot area of Juniper mountain, which is used by many people other than hunters and fishermen.

The Welser boat club cooperated with the department in building a road for public access to the Snake river.

In north Idaho, Camp Parragut on beautiful Lake Pend Oreille could be a fine state park. The department merely is attempting to maintain fishing access to the lake. Although the "road" in a bad state of disrepair, each year several thousands of people visit the spot for picnics, boating, swimming and camping as well as fishing.

The Johnson creek segment of Albion falls, near the point where the Clark fork empties into Pend Oreille lake, also is a popular littering spot and needs an improved patio for picnic and sanitary facilities.

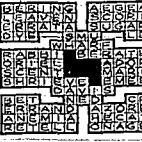

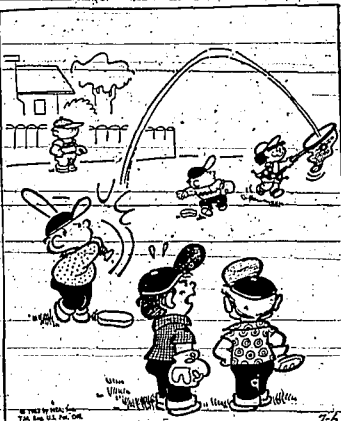

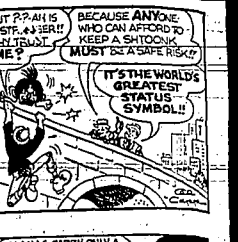

(Continued from Page 11) Assisting are two college students majoring in forest related subjects and a Twin Falls junior high school instructor, also trained in similar studies.

The college students are Gary Smith, Pocatello, and Gary Babbel, Twin Falls. Joe Bach is the instructor from the O'Leary junior high at Twin Falls.

Outside the center, forest employees have completed a self-guided nature trail which features various areas typical in the region. These include wild flower identification points, beaver working areas, pond life, tree identification and a bridge across Flahook creek where, in late summer, redfish can be observed as they spawn. This self-guided trail, surfaced in gravel, takes about 15 minutes to walk, officials point out.

Twice weekly, on Thursday and Saturday afternoons, guided nature hikes will leave from the center. These informative hikes will lead either to the Round lake or Pistol creek areas and will take about four hours.

The same nights, campfire programs will be sponsored by the Sawtooth experts in front of Redfish Lake Lodge. These will start at 8 p. m. and will feature slide shows on wildlife, flowers, fisheries and the geology of the area.

Nature hikes and evening campfire programs also are staged in the Alturas lake area each Wednesday.

"Although the center is now open to the public, formal dedication will not come until later in the season," Lavin said. "At that time state and national officials will attend."

Officials stipulated there is no charge for any activities sponsored by the center, including the nature hikes, lectures and evening programs. "It is our wish that everyone who loves the outdoors will visit the center and take part in the scheduled activities," J. L. Sevy, supervisor of the Sawtooth national forest, said after an inspection of the area.

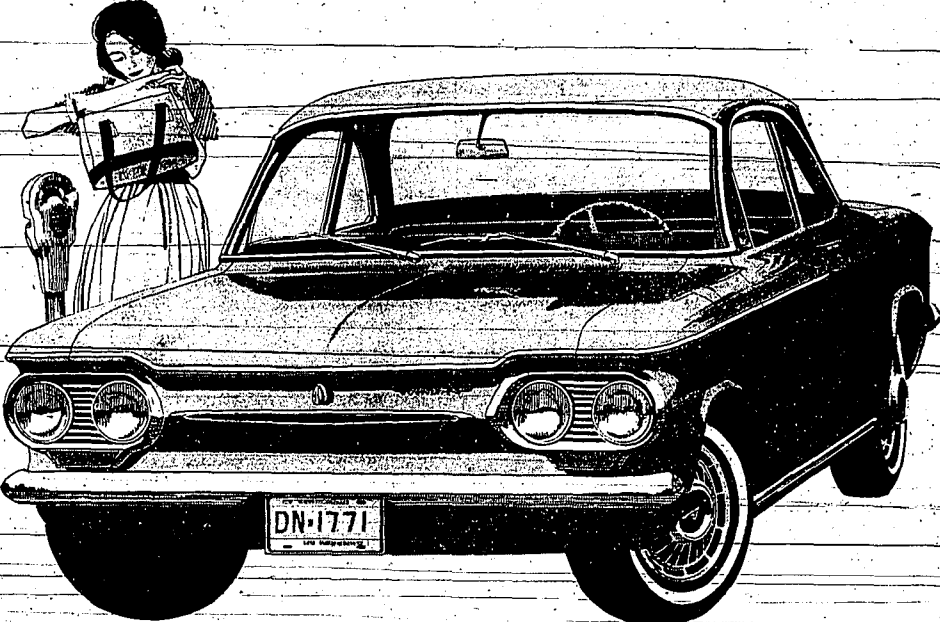
School Facility Rentals Closed
