WASHINGTON, July 8—Now that the Greeds have come up with a spy scandal, it is not surprising that the House of Representatives has passed a bill to force naive Americans to learn their own country's history.

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Action or Reaction

Politicians are losing sleep these days trying to figure out an apparent boom in popularity of conservatives. Since the remaining of New York's Governor Rockefeller and what he is may portend there has been a clamor for Sen. Barry Goldwater, sometimes referred to as Mr. Conservative.

Not the least of the demonstrations for Senator Goldwater occurred during the Young Republican Convention in San Francisco, a session marked by unnecessary violence. The uproar has been blamed on both of two factions, Goldwater supporters and the John Birch society. Probably both factions were involved.

There's another element that shouldn't be overlooked by the politicians. There's a population a growing segment of the population is losing its enchantment for liberalism. Three decades of liberalism and "no isms" have left many Americans bewildered, fed up and looking for an antidote, John Birch conservative thinking citizens provide a ready-made reservoir of recruits for both Goldwater supporters and John Birch society.

So far as liberals are concerned, there's little difference between the Goldwater group and Birchers. And Democrats who recognize an election danger in Senator Goldwater are only too anxious to tie him to the extreme right Birch group. Although the senator is conservative, there has been no indication he's to be ranked with the ultra rightists.

Changes should keep in mind that even a danger to the welfare of the majority, Idahoans may prefer to remember that fact if Sen. Clair Engle, D., Calif., is right in his prediction of a right-wing drive in the Mountain states.

Senator Engle's "extreme right" wing fanatics will concentrate their drive in the Mountain states where "a few votes can swing an election." There's reason to believe even a moderate conservative would be dubbed a reactionary if elected in Senator Engle's boots.

It's anyone's guess whether Senator Engle is right or whether he's just laying the groundwork for attacks on a surging conservatism. In the absence of any obvious conservative drive, it may be assumed there is a good deal of ground to be made in the Mountain states before the year ends.

Don't expect the pendulum to stop anywhere around the center, but everyone can hope it doesn't swing so far to the left during the year as when it starts back again, it won't go as far to the left again.

CHEMURGY AGAIN

Perhaps Former-Vice President Henry A. Wallace wasn't thinking in terms of chemistry, but that branch of applied chemistry would be right in what Wallace has remembered best for killing little pigs and plowing up cotton when he was secretary of agriculture. Now he has a remedy for unemployment and greater security, namely, more jobs within driving distance of farms.

The great need in Magic Valley is not more employment for farmers but year-around employment for non-farmers. If the new employment could be tied-in with processing of agricultural products grown in Magic Valley, everyone would benefit.

If such industry could be developed in agriculture-agricultural centers across the nation, the crop surplus headache might ease considerably.

A few years ago, there was a great deal of talk about chemistry and how it could solve the farm problem. There has been some progress, such as the use of soybean oil in paint, but it's not enough to find other uses for such plentiful crops as wheat and corn.

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West German Face Charges Of Treason

KARLSRUHE, Germany, July 7 (AP)—Three West Germans are accused of spying for Russia because of high treason today charges of one of the men in the espionage trials in the city of Karlsruhe.

The major defendant is Heinz West German intelligence officer. He is a former high-ranking member of the West German intelligence office. He is accused of helping the Kremlin and other agencies to spy on the West German defense secrets to the Russians.

West German intelligence officer in World War II, is alleged to have worked for the Soviet Union from November, 1941.

The prosecution charges Feile photographed hundreds of secret West German intelligence documents for Soviet intelligence. His alleged betrayal of numerous Western secrets to the Russians was said to have resulted in their arrests and possible deaths.

Feile and Clemens are accused of regularly sending secret data to the Russians by clandestine radio and courier.

Roosevelt's Homes Given Government

NEW YORK, July 8 (AP)—Theodore Roosevelt White House has summer White House on Long Island today formally become government property to be used as national shrines.

Secretary of the Interior Stewart Udall, representing President Kennedy, will accept the title and deeds to the two properties and presentation ceremonies will be held in the White House.

The homes have been given to the government by the Theodore Roosevelt Association which will still for a \$200,000 check to Udall for the maintenance of the homes.

The Theodore Roosevelt White House in which the 26th president was born in 1858—the only President to be born in New York City—was turned over to the government at 11:30 a.m. EDT.

During the ceremony—Mrs. Sherman Haight, vice president of the Theodore Roosevelt Association, described the homes as acquired and restored.

Sagamore Hill—the home in Oyster Bay which Roosevelt used as his summer White House from 1901 through 1906, was presented to the government at 11:30 a.m. EDT. The ceremony was highlighted by remarks by Oscar S. Brown, president of the Theodore Roosevelt Association.

An address by Udall, accepting the gift and discussing the conservation needs of the nation, concluded the day's activities. President Kennedy signed the bill establishing the two homes as national historic sites last summer.

The board decided last March 21 that neither Bonanza, Pacific or West Coast airlines should be granted the route.

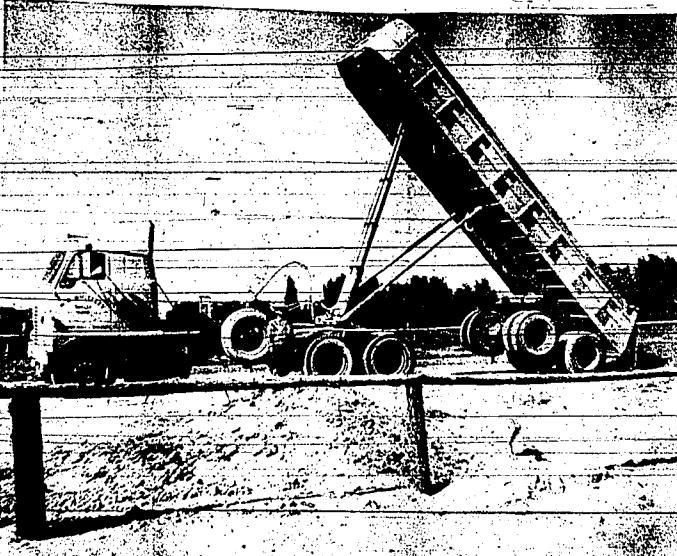

BOISE, July 8 (AP)—The personal income of Idahoans for the first six months of this year was four per cent higher than for the first half of 1962, the First Security bank reports.

State Fiscal Problems to Fan Flames

BOISE, July 8 (AP)—Gov. Robert E. Sproul's prediction that Idaho will have two million dollars less to spend in the next two years than planned, is certain to fan the flames of the great debate of the 1963 legislature.

Two schools of thought will speak of views—one that Idaho needs a sales tax to pay for education, health and other state services and the other that the state is already spending too much for such services.

Sproul's prediction in the next two years may depend on whether Senate says Idaho will either have to get along with the million dollars appropriated by the legislature or taxes will have to be increased by two million dollars. He recommends the reduced spending route.

The governor indicates he may call a special session of the legislature to deal with the question, but would leave it up to the lawmakers to decide.

In the proclamation, the lawyers said that being well aware of and deeply concerned with the fact that violation of the rule of law in international affairs by nations can only lead to the disturbance of peace and the destruction of mankind through nuclear holocaust, (the conference has concluded and hereby proclaims that law must replace force as the controlling factor in the fate of humanity.")

Prayer Hit by Russ Cosmonaut

MOOSJOVI, July 8 (AP)—Valentina Tereshkova, the Soviet Union's first cosmonaut, said today she cannot understand how U. S. astronaut pilot Jerris Cobb "can combine the piloting of supersonic planes and prayers."

The 28-year-old communist Party member made the comment to the Soviet government newspaper Izvestia while leaving through Miss Cobb's book, "Woman in Space."

An Izvestia correspondent who quoted Miss Tereshkova, the book said at one point that cosmonaut grinned at a photograph of Miss Cobb kneeling in prayer before a home altar.

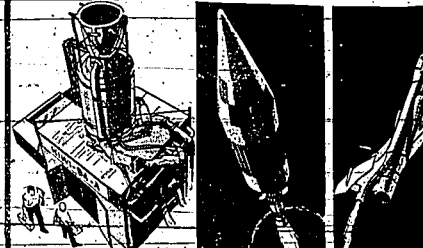

THE WIZARDS OF SPACE (12)

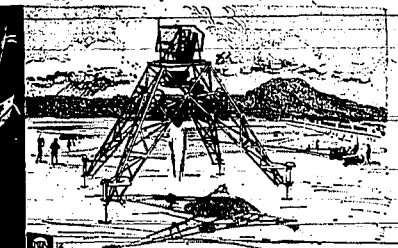


Only the power of the atom will give man true mastery of space travel. The energy in one pound of uranium is equal to that in 10 million pounds of gasoline.

Working to harness this stupendous energy is the Space Nuclear Propulsion Office (SNPO), a joint organization of National Aeronautics and Space Administration and the Atomic Energy Commission. Its headquarters are at Germantown, Md., with extensions at Lewis Research Center in Cleveland, Albuquerque, N.M. and at the Nuclear Rocket Development Station at Jackass Flats, Nev.

Nuclear rocket work was begun by the AEC in 1955. After eight years and \$400 million, such a rocket is still years away.

SNPO is also developing the SNAP reactors. Where the Kiwi reactor heats a light gas, such as hydrogen, and shoots it out the nozzle for propulsion, the SNAP reactor generates electricity to run a small electric engine.

SNAP-B will be flight tested in 1965; but the first 100-hp-high RIFT with a Nerva engine (second panel)—considered to be the first true nuclear space engine—may not be launched until 1968 or later.

At Edwards—AFB in southern California—is one of NASA's smaller installations—the Flight Research Center. This facility is responsible for the famed X-15 rocket research plane.

The X-15, an NASA-Air Force-Navy program, will continue. In the meantime, the Air Force plans to use modified F-104 Starfighters (jet plane) to train astronauts. A rocket booster will shove the planes up to 140,000 feet, above most of the atmosphere.

Also at the Flight Research Center, Apollo astronauts will practice moon landings in an ugly-looking simulator (fourth panel). A jet engine will counteract five-sixths of the earth's gravity. The remaining sixth, equal to the moon's pull, will be handled by rockets.
