

Big Crowds Visit in Sawtooths

Record crowds visited and camped in the Sawtooth national forest during the Fourth of July weekend, according to Jack Lavin, Twin Falls visitor information in charge of the forest service. Lavin said the attendance in the Sawtooth national forest was excellent and if the conditions were not so hot, the attendance will hit another all-time record. Last year, 100,000 people visited the national forest during the Fourth of July. "Most of the visitors during the week-end came from out-of-state," Lavin said.

Ranger Melvin Stock reported there were 10,000 people over the three days in Howell canyon and an estimated 4,000 people at Redfish lake. There were about 2,000 at Alturas lake, 1,600 in the Rock Creek area and 200 people visited the area and 200 people visited the area and 200 people visited the area on Saturday, Lavin said. The area was very busy and fishing in the mountains are ideal, Lavin added. He said all resorts are operating as good to excellent throughout forest lands.

Several new fire grounds are open to the public for the first time this year. They are: Redfish lake, Rock Creek area, Baunarter campground on the South Boise river, Redfish canyon, Alturas lake, Howell canyon and the area on Frye creek east of Ketchikan and the Redfish lake inlet campgrounds. The Redfish lake inlet campgrounds are being constructed at a new boat launching ramp at Redfish lake.

Lavin said three small fires were reported in the Sawtooth national forest over the weekend. The fires were small and were started by man, Lavin noted. A fire in Howell canyon burned about two acres and a fire near Prairie creek and at Redfish lake burned about an acre. The forest service urges everyone to be careful with fires since the dry conditions exist and will continue to exist throughout the summer months.

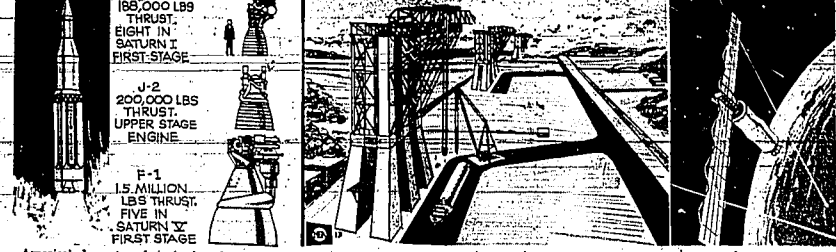

THE WIZARDS OF SPACE (13)

America's largest rockets (and as far as we know—the world's largest)—are designed and manufactured, fittingly enough, at the largest facility operated by NASA.

This is the George C. Marshall Space Flight Center, which covers 1,600 acres on the Redstone Arsenal reservation near Huntsville, Ala. Directed by Wernher von Braun, former German V-2 rocket engineer, the center has 7,000 persons working in nine laboratories on a variety of problems. Marshall spends more than any other center: Its 1962 budget was more than \$200 million; this year it will handle contracts of over \$1 billion.

Best known and most glamorous of Marshall's projects is the giant Saturn booster, which will

carry the Apollo astronauts to the moon. Actually, there will be three Saturns: First is Saturn I, the first stage of which has been successfully launched three times. It will place the Apollo capsule carrying three men into earth orbit for up to two weeks.

Five times more powerful is the Saturn V, whose huge F-1 engines will start the three Apollo astronauts on the way to the moon. Between these two is a hybrid model, Saturn IB, consisting of the first stage of Saturn I and third-stage of Saturn V—it will be used in early development and training phases of the Apollo project. Same size as Saturn I, it will use the powerful J-2 engine as its upper stage. Eventually, production models of the Saturns

will be manufactured at the Michoud Plant near New Orleans, La. From there, they will carry them 50 miles to the \$93 million Mississippi Test Facility now under construction (second panel). Finally, barges will transport the boosters to Cape Canaveral for launching.

Another program under Marshall's management is a huge meteorite detection satellite, which will be orbited late in 1964 by a Saturn I. In space, the satellite will deploy two large flat wings with an area of more than 2,000 square feet and record meteorite hits.

The growing effects of these dustlike particles is one of the questions that must be answered before man can roam at will in space.

WASHINGTON, July 9—California and Florida will have relatively bigger voices in the Republican convention while states as West Virginia, Pennsylvania, Nevada, Connecticut and Louisiana will have substantially lower voices than in 1960.

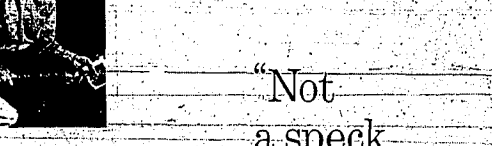

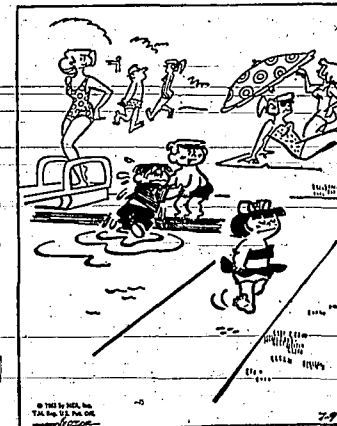
