Chinese, Russ Talk Continues

MOSCOW, July 10 (UPI)—Premier Khrushchev met with Hungarian communist leader Janos Kadar in a Kremlin unity session today, while Chinese and Soviet negotiators agreed on another day of armistice discussions aimed at finding some solution to their ideological split. The talks, which began in Moscow on June 26, will continue Thursday or whether delegations would take another consultation recess.

Messages from the Soviet party from Peking bolstered reports that the Soviets and Chinese negotiators were making little or no progress toward any significant improvement in relations between the two communist giants.

Khrushchev returned from Kiev to Moscow the Hungarian premier and party leader and a large group of Hungarian party and government officials at the Kremlin yesterday. In Moscow, he had the low-key reception for the Chinese negotiators last week, the Hungarians got the full treatment. —Khrushchev's speech was given in front of the station, a live telecast of the arrival, a crowd review and playing of the national anthems.

The Soviet communists' final communiqué statement made no reference to the Chinese-Soviet negotiations. But Kadar said racial crisis divides and weakens, and challenges the nations both with their own communist parties are guided by similar principles of socialism, concerning the conservation of socialism, concerning all issues and questions of international relations and of foreign policy."

Pravda, the Soviet communist party newspaper, urged its party members to work for another statement of Soviet opposition to the Chinese hard line.

Referring to the Soviet Union's "line of peace," Pravda said: "Our Party—Leninist parties, our fraternal peoples, revere the struggle for peace and peaceful coexistence, for the elimination of war from the life of society, as the general line of their foreign policy."

Integration Is Ordered For Schools

MOBILE, Ala., July 10 (UPI)—Ordered by a federal appeals court, the Mobile public school board must begin school integration next September. The Mobile city council voted school needs today to consider the next move.

Alabama is one of three states—Alabama, Mississippi and Louisiana—which have no school integration below the college level. Units of the University of Alabama were desegregated a month ago with the aid of federal troops.

Charles E. McNeil, president of the school board, said no decision has been made when integration will begin. He said he and his staff have studied the integration order issued Tuesday by the fifth circuit court of appeals in New Orleans. The court ruled only 28 hours after hearing the case on appeal.

"I am sure I speak for the entire board when I say that the court's ruling," McNeil said.

Counselor—Baker—Motley, attorney for the Advancement of Colored People, said he expected the original suit March 28, said in New York: "That's the fastest we ever got. I think this trial will be over and speed decision in the Deep South."

Kremlin-Washington "Hot Line" Will Start Sept. 1

MOSCOW, July 10 (UPI)—The Moscow will be sent in English and messages from Moscow to Washington will be sent in Russian. The communications link will go into operation next Sept. 1.

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Polish Family Flees to Berlin

BERLIN, July 10 (UPI)—A Polish air force major crammed his wife and two children into a single-engine fighter plane and flew them to West Berlin today for political asylum, U.S. officials reported. The plane landed at West Berlin's Tempelhof airport. The names of the defectors were not disclosed. The major asked American officials for asylum, a U.S. spokesman said. The fighter landed at the military site of Tempelhof, which is in the heart of West Berlin. The plane was hijacked while it was flying over Germany and its occupants disappeared inside a building.

Tempelhof airport is part commercial. Only planes from the West, flying the three air corridors across Communist East Germany, land there.

ATLANTA, Ga., July 10 (UPI)—Ku Klux Klan leaders said today they had received word from their chief that they will begin a large-scale racial integration drive in the South.

The credo of the Klan generally has been "no violence, but protection."

"The thing we've got to do is shock them into reality," said Robert W. Shelton, Jr., Tuscaloosa, Ala.

Shelton's grand design, Cal.

G. F. Clegg, Klan spokesman, voiced a more cautious assessment of the race conflict:

"The Negroes are not going to be satisfied until we have to leave this country. One

radical group will have to dominate."

Shelton and Craig belong to

the United Klans of America, Inc., Knights of the Ku Klux Klan.

Both groups say their order is

the only authentic Klan.

Craig, 35, tall and heavy set,

said the Klan would "break

street march" in Atlanta, Sava-

nna, Ga., where Negroes have

been conducting demonstrations

against segregation.

omy, according to U.S. estimate

"Free-world shipping to Cuba has been reduced drastically, from 128 ship arrivals at Cuban ports in January 1962 to 40 in January 1963," the estimate showed.

Townsend Plan Co-Author Held

AMARILLO, Tex., July 10 (AP)—(Bob) Clemente, co-author of the Townsend Plan, which the nation's elderly in 1930's went on trial today on a 17-count indictment charging him with interstate transportation of counterfeit money, was sentenced yesterday to 15-months-dollar fine, entire sentence suspended from the Billie Sol Estes scandal.

Conviction on any of the counts could carry a maximum of 10 years—Estes and his wife were fined up to \$5,000.



SHOBONE, July 10 (UPI)—Gov. Robert E. Smiley's recent order to hold back on general fund appropriations until the legislature reconvenes was just what the legislature intended, a key Republican senator said Tuesday.

Sen. Sam Murphy, R., Lincoln, president pro tem of the senate, said he agreed that the governor should "balance" the budget and the state's financial resources.

Pilots Sign Agreement For Airlines

NEW YORK, July 10 (UPI)—American airlines have signed a two-year contract with the airline pilots' union being challenged by the AFL-CIO's airline pilots association (ALPA).

The airlines announced yesterday that they had reached an agreement with the newly formed Allied Pilots Association (APA) and covered the wages and working conditions of the carrier's 1,500 pilots.

The contract is subject to ratification by members of the APA, organized earlier this year by former members who left the pilots who formerly belonged to the ALPA.

The ALPA has a temporary federal contract with the mediation board committee of the rival APA. An ALPA spokesman had no immediate comment on the new pact, but noted it was signed before a restraining order is scheduled in U.S. district court in Washington July 23.

An ALPA spokesman said: "The APA's President, Nicholas J. O'Connell had submitted 'documented proof that a substantial majority of the members of the organization' designated the new union their collective bargaining agent as provided by law."





million. The \$3.7 billion budget for fiscal 1964 proposed by NASA's Administrator, James E. Webb, includes \$1.2 million for the development of the first man-in-space program; \$65.5 million to build facilities to support work in this field; and \$1.2 million for the first American landing on the moon. The cost to NASA is expected to be conservative, estimated \$20 billion to get them there. This is 10 times the cost of the atomic bomb project of World War II.

An estimated 100,000 government, industry, military and educational personnel are being assigned to the project.

Headquarters for manned space flight will

be in Houston. The Manned Spacecraft Center on J. L. Kilby Drive, a mile from downtown Houston, is now under construction near the two-thousand, 432,000-square-foot mark.

At present, America has three active man-in-

space programs: • Mercury, in its concluding

phases. • Gemini, a two-man capsule which

will develop the techniques needed for the trip

to the moon. • Apollo, the three-man moon

program, currently in planning.

At Manned Spacecraft Center, every phase

and aspect of the actual Gemini and Apollo

flights will be duplicated on the ground as far

as possible. A huge centrifuge will subject cap-

tains and crews to the same gravitational exper-

iences as in orbiting. Environmental chambers

for both men and capsules will simulate condi-

tions in space. In other simulators, men will

practice orbital rendezvous and lunar landing.

Gemini's second panel, scheduled for launching in 1964, will be capable of earth-orbiting flights of at least two weeks' duration. Besides training astronauts in rendezvous with other

spacecraft, it will provide a laboratory for in-

vestigations of the physical and psychological

effects of prolonged stays in space.

Gemini will also be an important advance over Mercury because it will be piloted to a pinpoint landing on the ground, rather than drop by parachute into the sea. Present plans call for it to be used as a mid-point of the triple-plan

(third panel). If successful, the method

may be used on the Apollo capsule.

New Contract Reached by Phone Firms

DETROIT, July 10 (UPI)—The Communication Workers of America (CWA) and the Michigan Bell Telephone company Tuesday reached agreement on a new contract which will set the pattern for 730,000 Bell system workers across the nation.

The agreement, which will be applied to other Bell telephone firms nationwide, called for a 38-month contract with a 20-cent an hour wage increase for the first 14 months.

CWA President Joseph L. Dearborn, who announced the agreement at an afternoon news conference, said the 38-month contract will be worth \$11.5 million dollars when applied across all Bell telephone companies.

"It will be worth even more after the two wage re-openers are negotiated in 1964 and 1965," Dearborn said, adding he was happy at the conclusion of the talks.

In Michigan, where the contract was established, the contract "will pour upwards of seven billion dollars into the state for health care and retirement security into the hands of 7,000 employees and pensioners," Dearborn added.

Workers Go Back to Jobs After Strike

GEOGERTOWN, British Guiana, July 10 (UPI)—Workers trickled back to their jobs today after a British Commonwealth Relations Secretary Duncan Sandy flew here on a trouble-shooting mission.

In London, Nigel Fisher, undersecretary of state at the Colonial Office, said that the British government is concerned about the situation in British Guiana, the independence-seeking South American colony.

He said British has "genuine fears about the future of country in the context of communism."

But informed British sources said that Prime Minister Sir Anthony Eden had no objection to negotiations reported to have been made by President Kennedy that Britain dissolve the government of Prime Minister Forbes Burnham.

Burnham is an avowed Marxist, and has made his American-born wife the home affairs minister.

He is also a former police officer.

She is the former Janet Roemer.

Chicago, one-time member of the Young Communist League of the United States.

Withdrawal Of Troops in Congo Eyed

LEOPOLDVILLE, The Congo, July 10 (UPI)—Diplomatic observers expressed concern over the withdrawal of United Nations Secretary General Thant to withdraw all U.N. troops from the Congo by the end of the year.

The withdrawal of the UN drawdown plan, proposed by Thant's aides in Geneva yesterday, ranged from uneasiness to serious concern. Some observers felt the UN might not yet be strong enough to maintain public order in the absence of U.N. forces.

Congolese officials and officials of the United Nations, they noted, may not be quoted, were careful to avoid giving the impression their police could not keep order in the three-year-old state.

But foreign observers spoke bluntly.

"It would be a disastrous attempt" of one western diplomat said when informed of the proposed withdrawal.

The United Nations has done a great deal for the Congo, but it still has a mandate to fulfill. How are they going to explain this withdrawal if violence break out in the Congo and ended on Jan. 1, 1964?

Businessmen and officials agreed the Committee of Seven is not prepared to keep the peace in this large nation with its poor roads and communications.

Magistrates Form in Magic Valley

Magic Valley Magistrates association was organized Monday night at a meeting held at the Twin Falls Justice courthouse. Some of the problems of the lower courts discussed by the group included lack of communication between the different judicial districts, building the prestige of the lower courts, financial problems of the courts, effectiveness of the court system, juvenile problems, and the scope of the courts in dealing with traffic violation prevention.

Next meeting of the association will be Aug. 10 in the Twin Falls Justice courtroom.

U.S. Sergeant Shoots out Lights
