

Chinese, Russ Talk Continues

MOSCOW, July 10 (AP)—Premier Khrushchev met Communist boss Janos Kadar in a Kremlin unity session today, while Chinese and Soviet negotiators ground through another day of grain discussions aimed at finding some solution to their ideological split. The talks with the Chinese ended with no indication whether they would resume Thursday or whether delegates would make another consultation recess.

A new attack on the Soviet party from the Soviet and Chinese negotiators were making little or no progress and any significant improvement in relations between the two communists.

Kadar returned from Kier to greet the Hungarian premier and party leader and a large group of Soviet and government officials at the Moscow railroad station. In contrast to the Chinese negotiators last week, the Hungarians got the week's treatment of a big crowd in front of the station, a live telecast of the arrival of the national anthems.

The Soviet premier in his brief welcoming address to the Chinese-Soviet negotiators. But Kadar in reply pointedly said the Chinese negotiators are "guided by similar principles concerning the situation of socialism concerning all issues and questions of world workers' movements and of foreign policy."

Fravda, the Soviet communist party newspaper, used Kadar's remarks as a subtle statement of Soviet opposition to the Chinese hard line.

Referring to the Soviet Premier, Kadar said: "Our Marxist-Leninist parties, our fraternal parties, our struggle for peace and peaceful coexistence, for universal disarmament, for the revolution of the life of our society as the general line of our foreign policy."

Integration Is Ordered For Schools

MOBILE, Ala., July 10 (AP)—Ordered by a federal appeals court to start school desegregation in September, the Mobile city-county school board meets today to discuss the order.

Alabama is one of three states—South Carolina and Mississippi—where the federal government has no school integration below the college level. Units of the University of Alabama were ordered to desegregate a month ago with the aid of federal troops.

Franklin D. McNeil, president of the school board, said the board on future action will be made by the board and its attorneys have studied the integration order issued Tuesday by the fifth U. S. circuit court of appeals in Mobile. The order was issued 28 hours after hearing the appeal.

"I am sure to speak for the entire school board when I say that we are deeply disappointed by the court's ruling," McNeil said.

Constance Baker Motley, an attorney for the advancement of colored people, who filed the original suit, said in New York: "That's the fastest action we ever got. I think this certainly will help speed desegregation in the Deep South."

Kremlin-Washington "Hot Line" Will Start Sept. 1

MOSCOW, July 10 (AP)—The United States and the Soviet Union announced today that the Kremlin-Washington "hot line" communications link will go into operation next Sept. 1.

The communications link, designed to prevent the accidental outbreak of a new war, was agreed to by both nations in a Soviet Communiqué last month.

Racial Crisis Is Challenge, Solons Told

WASHINGTON, July 10 (AP)—Secretary of State Dean Rusk told congress today the present racial crisis divides and weakens the nation both at home and in the world struggle in which we are engaged.

"I deeply hope that the issues involved can be approached on the basis of genuine bipartisanship, just as are the broad objectives of this country's foreign policy," he told the senate commerce committee.

Rusk testified in support of a bill to ban racial discrimination in stores, hotels, restaurants and other private establishments serving the public. It is a key part of the administration's civil rights program.

Another cabinet member, Secretary of Welfare Affairs J. Edgar Hoover, strongly endorsed Rusk's administration proposal to bring about the elimination of school segregation and racial discrimination in federally aided programs. He cited the federal housing discrimination bill.

Rep. Emanuel Celler, D. N.Y., chairman of the house group, announced a July 31 deadline for completion of his subcommittee's hearings and said he would "break no delay." Night hearings will be held if necessary to meet the deadline, Celler said.

Record Low Temperatures Are Recorded

The lowest temperatures recorded in 100-year-plus history on the eastern half of the nation for the second consecutive day Wednesday.

The southwest gale on Wednesday in 100-degree-plus heat. The lowest recorded low was 42 at Findlay, O. Other Ohio records included 45 at Cincinnati and 46 at Cleveland.

Pittsburgh, Pa., had a low of 40 and Windsor, Locks, Ontario, Canada, 39 degrees, both new lows for July 10.

Another mark was set at Millwaukee, Wis., with a 46-degree reading. Temperatures dipped into the 30s at Milwaukee and Pennsylvania again. The nation's lowest temperature Wednesday was 33 at Grand, Mich., and 35 at Grand Junction, Mich.

In contrast temperatures at sunrise were near the 80-degree mark in the Arizona and California deserts and passed 100 degrees by midday.

Tuesday's highest readings were 106 at Imperial, Calif., and 107 at Phoenix, Ariz. Thunderstorms broke out Wednesday over the great plains from Oklahoma to Montana and Illinois. N. D. was drenched by 2.6 inches of rain.

Polish Family Flees to Berlin

BERLIN, July 10 (AP)—A Polish air force major crammed his wife and two children into a single-engine fighter plane and flew them to West Berlin today for political asylum, U. S. officials reported. The plane landed at West Berlin's Tempelhof airport. The names of the defectors were not disclosed. The major asked American officials for asylum, a U. S. spokesman said.

The fighter landed at the military side of Tempelhof, which is in the heart of West Berlin. The plane was quickly wheeled into a hangar and its occupants disappeared inside a building.

Tempelhof airport is part commercial. Only planes from the West, flying three air corridors across Communist East Germany, normally land there.

Isle Used as Way Station For Agents

WASHINGTON, July 10 (AP)—The state department said today that Cuba has been using Grand Cayman island, a British possession in the Caribbean, as a way station to sneak "potential subversive agents" into Latin American countries.

A spokesman said the United States has asked Britain if it can stop the traffic.

Department press officer, Richard I. Phillips, said three Soviet-built Cuban airliners have landed at Grand Cayman in the last several weeks. He said they carried 15 to 20 persons who later went to the United States.

Phillips said the flights originated in Cuba and the final landing was at Grand Cayman, the largest of the Cayman group of islands lying south of Cuba and north-west of Jamaica.

President Wages Last-Ditch Battle To Avoid Strike

WASHINGTON, July 10 (AP)—President Kennedy announced today that rail unions and management had accepted a new proposal that would prevent any railroad strike until at least July 23. The chief executive said he had named six members of his labor-management advisory committee to investigate the dispute and report to him by July 22.

WASHINGTON, July 10 (UPI)—President Kennedy waged a series of last-ditch battles today in hopes of flagging down the fast-approaching threat of a paralyzing both sides to a White House meeting at 4 p. m. (EDT).

Throughout the day to avert the rail tie-up, White House sources declined to indicate what the President's next steps might be in the dispute. But there was growing speculation that he might ask the railroads to postpone imposing their controversial new work rules which five unions have vowed to bring on a strike.

A morning meeting with representatives of the unions and the railroads ended in a setback to Kennedy's settlement efforts. The White House rejected a proposal that Supreme Court Justice Arthur Goldberg be allowed to arbitrate the dispute. Kennedy then met with Democratic congressional leaders on the statesman and workers' side of his top labor issues throughout the day.

The prospect of emergency legislation if the strike is called was discussed at the President's session with house and senate leaders. Among the latter were Chairman Lister Hill, D. Ala., of the senate labor committee, and Chairman Adam Clayton Powell, D. N.Y., of the house labor committee.

The unions and management representatives were recalled to their second White House meeting on the eve of a threatened walkout which could stop the nation's railroads in many places. Spokesmen for various industries warned that a strike of even a few days duration would result in massive layoffs and shutdowns. The auto industry, which employs more than a half million workers, could be among those paralyzed.

The vast majority of industries said they would continue normal operations up to the last minute in hopes that a settlement would be reached in Washington. No freight embargoes were imposed in the nation's major rail centers. Leaders of the five unions involved refused to discuss their picket plans in advance.

Most railroads said trains in transit would be kept moving. (Continued on Page 3, Column 1)

Idaho Notes Anniversary Of Territory

BOISE, July 10 (AP)—Idaho law observed the 100th anniversary of the start of organization of its territorial government today. Idaho Historical society records show that William Henson Wallace, President Lincoln's appointee as the first Idaho territorial governor, arrived in the Territory June 10, 1863, to take up his duties.

The Idaho Territory legislation was signed by the President March 4. The governor was appointed March 10 but did not take up his duties until four months later.

Upon arriving at Lewiston, the first seat of territorial government, Wallace issued a proclamation serving notice that he would proceed to organize a government.

Northwest Gets Bid on U. S. Power

WASHINGTON, July 10 (AP)—The house interior committee approved today a bill giving the Pacific Northwest first call on federal power produced in the area.

The legislation is regarded as a prerequisite to the proposed sale of surplus Bonneville power for use in California.

An initial form of the measure carried an amendment by Rep. Jack Westland, R. Wash., requiring specific authorization by congress for the construction of any federal transmission line outside the Pacific Northwest for the purpose of delivering Bonneville power.

It was understood that no detailed report had been received in Washington yet on Belgian President Leopold's letter to Spassk's meeting with Khrushchev in Kiev last Monday.

CHICAGO, July 10 (UPI)—A nationwide rail strike could paralyze some industries, deal a severe blow to others, and put a pinch on the pocketbook of the nation's consumers. This was the consensus of industry leaders on the eve of a threatened walkout which could stop the nation's railroads in many places. Spokesmen for various industries warned that a strike of even a few days duration would result in massive layoffs and shutdowns. The auto industry, which employs more than a half million workers, could be among those paralyzed.

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Envoy Given Authority on Soviet Talks

WASHINGTON, July 10 (AP)—President Kennedy has given W. Averell Harriman authority to negotiate with the Soviet Union on a nuclear test ban but only to listen and discuss other issues such as a European nonaggression pact.

This was reported by administration sources today as Harriman, undersecretary of state, prepared to leave for Moscow for talks beginning July 10.

Harriman is to take a late afternoon plane to New York, then fly to London for the first leg of the strike day. In London he is to confer with British officials, representatives of the British power at the Moscow meeting.

President Kennedy conveyed a national security council general directive to Moscow, said late Tuesday a final rundown on Harriman's assignment to the Moscow talks, starting next Monday.

The top strategy group, expanded to include senior advisers on disarmament, nuclear test ban negotiations with the Russians.

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Factional Divisions Spread in Red World

Whatever the announced outcome of the Soviet-Chinese communist talks in Moscow, the war between the two parties seems more intense than ever, and the battle is spreading a far wider throughout the world communist movement.

Communists face the prospect of other factional divisions having little to do directly with the Moscow-Peking split but resulting from its example.

Red China's negotiating team in Moscow is pressing hard for a meeting of communist leaders from the nearly 90 parties around the world. This would provide a platform for airing Chinese grievances against the Russians.

The Chinese demand for such a meeting on Peking's own terms seems more like psychological warfare against Premier Khrushchev than it does a proposal seriously aimed at settling differences.

Khrushchev undoubtedly takes a dim view of Peking's reported suggestion that voting in a world communist meeting be based on population. China backed by big

parties from the populous Asian continent, would give Khrushchev's supporters.

Acceptance of that Chinese proposal would be a sign that Khrushchev had suffered a setback serious enough to imperil his leadership.

Advisers from Indonesia say that D. N. Aidit, head of the two-million-member Indonesian communist party, is leaning to Peking and Moscow, possibly to propogandize for a world meeting. The trip seems to have the enthusiastic approval of Peking.

Recent statements by Indonesian communist leaders appear to place them firmly on the side of the Chinese. They approve the notion that what Communists call "just wars" should be welcomed as instruments for spreading communism throughout the world.

The Chinese picture Khrushchev and his followers as cowards who fear that so-called "imperial wars" would act off nuclear war.

This argument has lined up most of the Asian communist and tiny Albania in Europe on the side of Red China. Allied with Peking are the Indonesian communists, the North Vietnamese, most of the Japanese party, the North Koreans. Remaining with Moscow is the majority of the Latin party, largely because

of Red China's threats to Indian leaders.

The Russians are finding it necessary to dragoon their satellite leaders into public displays of solidarity.

Meeting in East Berlin recently, and with the visit of Hungarian communist chief Janos Kadar, at this particular moment, to Moscow.

The spectacle of successful defiance of the Kremlin, something new to the world movement, opens the door to development of even more splinter groups.



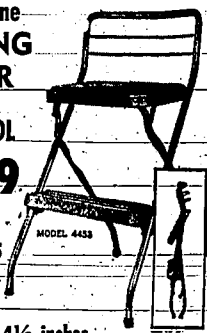

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift again. Melt shortening and 1/2 package of the chocolate chips over no water. Gradually add sugar to eggs, beating thoroughly. Add chocolate mixture and blend. Add flour and mix well; then add vanilla and vanilla square pan. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) about 25 minutes. 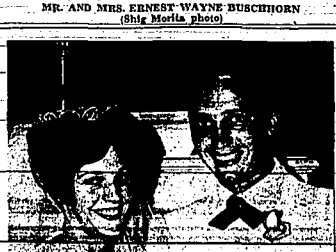

National Assembly Deputy Hocine Ali Ahmed, at a news conference in his mountain home last night attacked Ben Bella's one-party rule as a "policy of stagnation."

All Ahmed, who once was imprisoned with Ben Bella in France, has declared an "open political battle" to overthrow him.

He was the first Algerian politician to openly challenge Ben Bella's power, although recent incidents have indicated growing opposition.

Mostahammed Kichou, one of the revolutionary heroes, resigned as secretary of the nation's ruling politburo last spring. Ben Bella took over his job, replacing Kichou's members of the government and assumed the foreign ministry when Foreign Minister Mohammed Echeuati was assassinated.

Last month, Mohammed Boudiaf, a former vice-president of the Algerian provisional government, was arrested.

All Ahmed, speaking to a group of Algerian revolutionaries, said Ben Bella had been "betrayed" by Boudiaf and Tunisian President Habib Bourguiba, who had supported the government.

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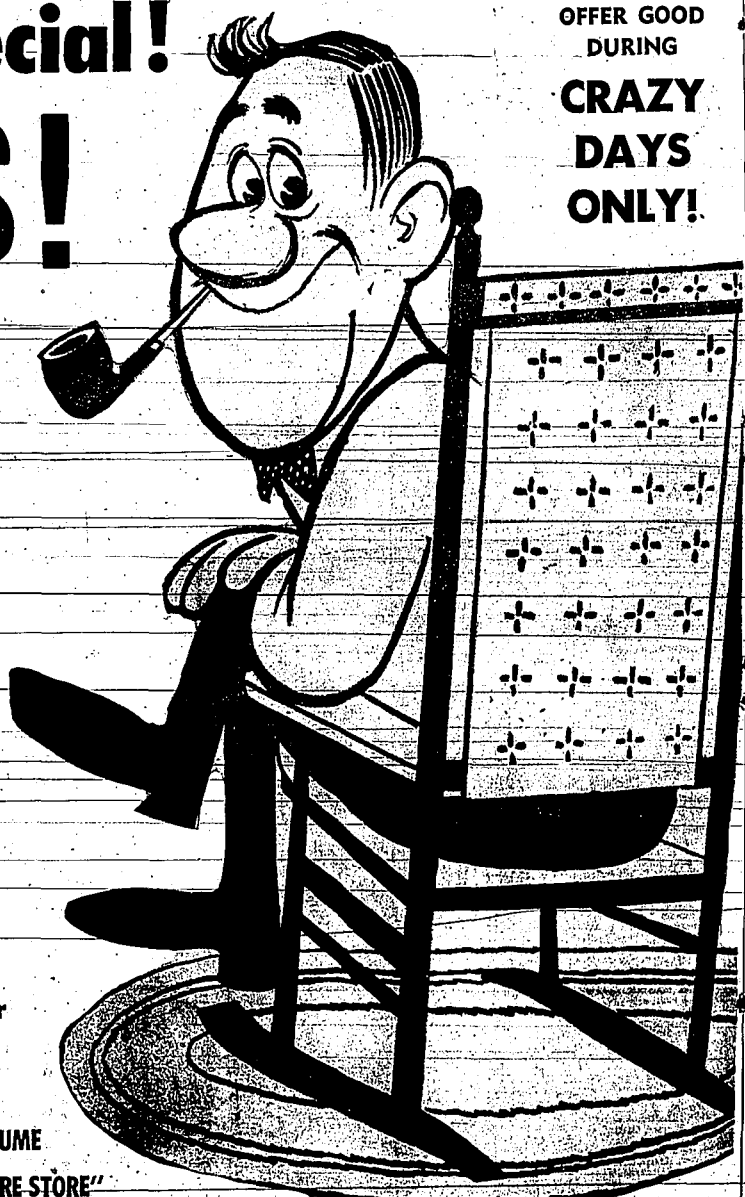

Al-Star Classic Would Have Been Bust Without Heroics of Willie Mays

CLEVELAND, July 10 (AP)—It's a good thing Willie Mays was there. Willie was not the whole show. He had led in leading the National league to a 5-3 all-star victory over the American league Tuesday. But without the brilliant San Francisco center fielder, the 34th all-star show would have been a bust. First of all, only 44,160 paying customers attended, filling about half of the huge Municipal stadium. The players and club owners were disappointed. Estimates had been for between 60,000 and 70,000.

The customers also were disappointed. They had paid \$6 and \$5 a ticket to see the greatest National league star and they never got to see Sandy Kousser, the senior circuit ball player; Warren Spahn, who keeps on defying age and enemy batters; and Earl Mann, the 34-year-old pitcher who recently defied Spanish in a spectacular 16-inning 2-0 duel.

What they saw was a lackluster game with few home runs, fair pitching, mediocre fielding and occasional hits. The biggest was a double by the American league's Alvin Dark, the littlest, all-around player.

The National league scored the tie-breaking run without the aid of Mays. The run came when New York Yankee Joe Pepitone chose to make an unassisted out at first instead of throwing to the plate.

The National league managed only one hit in the first three innings, scratchily-off five pitchers. The American league had 11 hits, but nine strikeouts and Bob by Richardson, another Yankee, hit into two double plays. The first second baseman, the Yankee infielder, missed a throw by third baseman Frank Malzone which led to a run.

The only outstanding defensive play was Tommy Davis' fine throw from mid-infield to double Nellie Fox at the plate. It was a good throw, but the fans are still wondering why he took Fox so long to sprint the 90 feet from third base. He was caught by the umpire.

The biggest noise was the booing whenever a Yankee came to bat. The Yankee pitchers did little to cover itself with glory. Peppitone, the only American pitcher to get a hit, went 0-4 and struck out twice. Richardson hit into two double plays. The only Yankee to get on base was Bouton, the young pitcher, did walk. He hurled one perfect inning.

The crowd loved Mays. And Willie earned every bit of their adoration.

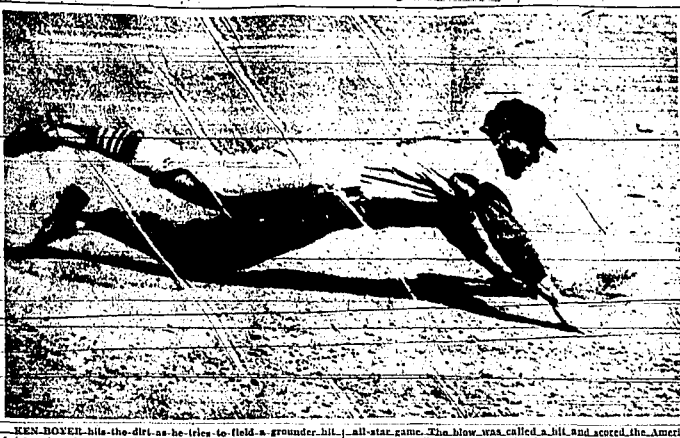

New Contract Reached by Phone Firms

DETROIT, July 10 (AP)—The Communication Workers of America (CWA) and the Michigan Bell Telephone company Tuesday reached agreement on a new contract that will set the pattern for other Bell system workers across the nation.

The agreement, which will be applied to other Bell systems, provides for a 38-month contract with a 20-cent an hour wage increase for the first 14 months.

CWA President Joseph A. Bierno, who announced the agreement at an afternoon news conference, said the 38-month contract will be worth 411 million dollars when applied across the country.

"It will be worth even more after the two wage increases are negotiated in 1964 and 1965," Bierno said, obviously happy at the outcome of the talks.

In Michigan, where the pattern was established, the contract will pour upwards of seven million dollars' buying power health care and retirement security into the hands of 7,000 employees and pensioners, Bierno added.

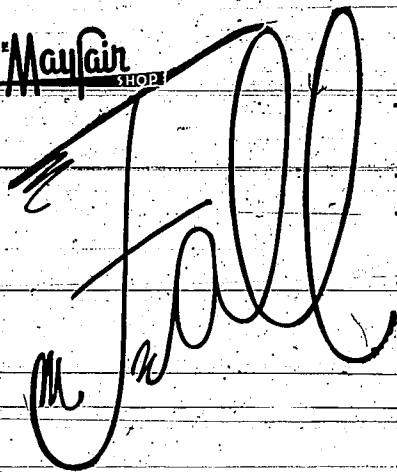

Walker will fly 3,550 miles an hour—nearly five times the speed of sound.

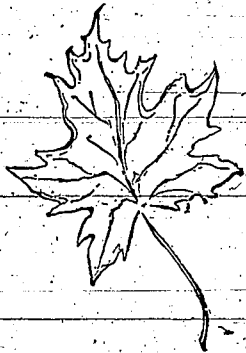

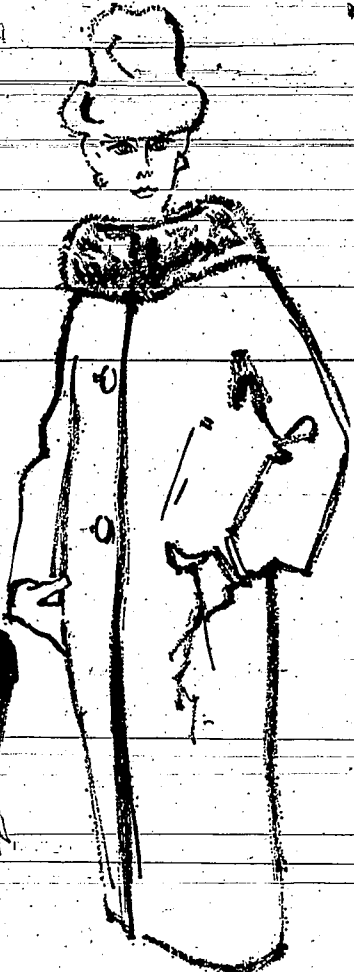

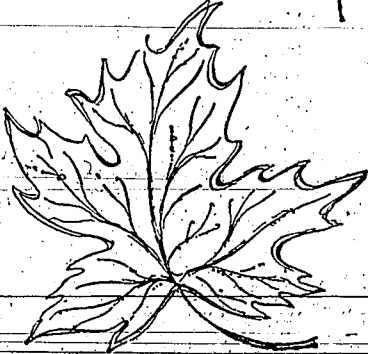

**Workers Go
Back to Jobs
After Strike**

COBODOTOWN British Guiana, July 10 (AP)—Workers struck back to their jobs today after an 80-day general strike and British Communist Party Relations Secretary Duhan Sands flew here on a trouble-shooting mission.

In London, Nigel Fisher, undersecretary of state at the colonial office, said that the British government is concerned about communist influence in this independence-seeking South American colony.

He said British has "legitimate fears about the future of the country in the context of communism."

But informed British sources said the prime minister Harold Macmillan had rejected suggestions reported to have been made by President Kennedy that Britain dissolve the government of Prime Minister Duhan Sands.

He is an avowed Marxist, and has made his American-born wife the home address of the British consul in Georgetown, Guyana.

She is the former Janet Roosevelt, Chicago, communist leader of the Young Communist League of the United States.

**Withdrawal
Of Troops in
Congo Eyed**

LEOPOLDVILLE, The Congo, July 10 (AP)—Diplomatic observers expressed concern Tuesday over reported plans of United Nations Secretary General U Thant to withdraw all U.N. troops from the Congo by the end of the year.

Reaction here to the withdrawal plan, reported by Thant's aides in Geneva yesterday, ranged from uneasiness to serious concern that the Congolese army might not yet be strong enough to maintain public order in the absence of U.N. forces.

Congolese government officials, who asked they not be quoted, were careful to avoid giving the impression their police could not keep order in the three-year-old state.

But foreign observers spoke bluntly.

"It would be a disastrous situation," one western diplomat said when informed of the proposed withdrawal.

The United Nations has done a good job here so far, but it still has a mandate to fulfill. How are they going to explain this withdrawal if violence breaks out in Katanga and Kasai on Jan. 1, 1964?"

Businessmen and officials agreed the Congolese army is not yet ready to keep the peace in this large nation with its poor roads and communications.

Justice Goldberg No Stranger To Role of "Man in Middle"

WASHINGTON, July 10 (AP)—Justice Goldberg, the tailor's son who rose to the supreme court, is no stranger to the role of man-in-the-middle.

He had a nationwide reputation for bringing warring parties together when he became labor secretary in January, 1961.

Since he came to the supreme court last October, the 54-year-old Goldberg has of course stayed out of the role of mediator. Many people felt he must retreat in some way his change to the more-solitary life of justice. He himself denied any deep feeling of nostalgia.

In a national crisis such as a railroad strike, however, Goldberg would probably be willing to pitch in despite his "topical" reluctance to take jobs outside the court's normal limits. He has always been a man ready to say "yes" when asked to do the impossible.

During his first term on the court, Goldberg has shown a prodigious ability to turn out work. The term which ended on June 30 was the busiest in the court's history. Junior justices seldom handle other than routine cases for the first time or two. But Goldberg spoke for a court minority in several of the more important decisions last term.

On the bench, Goldberg demonstrates his conscientious attitude towards his new job and long hours spent in "homework."

It is obvious that he has read the record in every case up for argument and knows exactly what questions he wishes to put

to attorneys. A sample question might be something like this: "How do you account for this statement in the middle of page 383?"

Goldberg has not been on the court long enough to develop for himself a judicial philosophy, but in close cases on individual liberties his vote has carried the day for the so-called "liberal bloc" made up of Chief Justice Earl Warren and Justices Hugo L. Black, William O. Douglas and William J. Brennan, Jr.

Despite the court's grueling schedule, the Golobertus manage to get in a little social activity. "It is important to converse about what is going on in the world," the justice said recently. "From a personal standpoint, I think this is needed."

U.S. Sergeant Shoots out Lights

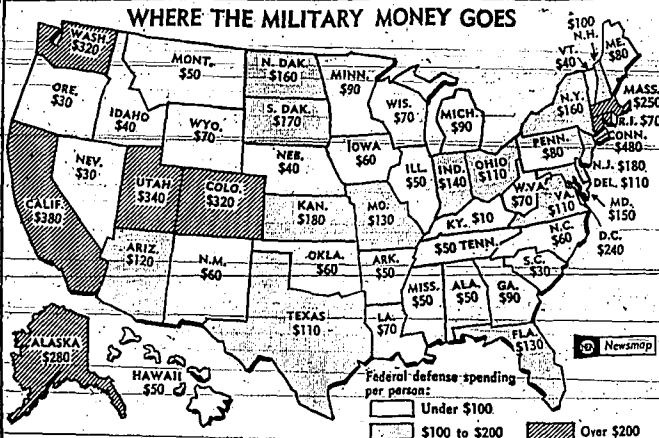

SEOUL, South Korea, July 10 (AP)—The city government ordered the capital's 1,500 restaurants "not to sell any rice" containing rice during lunch hours starting Wednesday.

The measure is designed to encourage the customers to take other food.

South Korea is experiencing a serious food shortage because of a poor rice crop last fall.

Premier for Italy to Get Major Posts

ROME, July 10 (AP)—Italy's center-right parties have agreed to give Premier Giovanni Leone's Christian Democrats chairmanship of at least 10 of the 14 member of deputy committees, informed sources said Tuesday.

Social Democrat Leader Giuseppe Saragat was to be chairman of the foreign affairs committee and Republican Ugo La Malfa, former budget minister, was to head the budget committee. Socialists Leonetto Amadio and Antonio Giolitti were to get two other chairmanships.

As an apathetic chamber of deputies began its second day of debate on a new confidence vote for Leone's government, the communist newspaper L'Unita hinted the party would turn the heat on the new premier through labor agitation.

Leone has promised to quit next fall after steering the budget through parliament. Christian Democrats leaders hope a new coalition with the socialists can be forced by that time, giving the nation a new chance for stable government.

The communists oppose any stable coalition and hope the government will fall.

Watch Out!

LUBAKA, Northern Rhodesia, July 10 (AP)—Anglers have been warned to watch out for a "toxic hippopotamus" in the Kafue river near Mufumbi.

The white fishermen in the area reported they had to swim for shore recently when the hippo bit a chunk from their boat.

Leone is expected to win the confidence vote when it is taken Thursday or Friday.

SENTENCED ST. DENIS, REUNION ISLAND, July 10 (AP)—Communist Party leader Paul Verges, who lost to former French Premier Michel Debre at a recent parliamentary election here, has been sentenced to three months in jail for defamatory articles written in a local communist paper in 1961.
