Boat With More Than 400 Aboard Burns and Sinks

LA PLATA, Argentina, July 11 (UPI) — A ferryboat with more than 400 persons aboard caught fire and sank, a dense fog on the river Plate estuary early today while a number of rescue vessels steamed the water way looking for the stricken craft. There were at least 33 persons killed and possibly 30 more were reported missing. An Argentine naval communiqué said that 355 survivors had been picked up. The search was continuing for the 30 persons unaccounted for.

The communiqué said 418 persons had been lost from the boat, named Ciudad Alvear, but in the absence of a passenger manifest figure could not be accepted as positive. It also said the minesweeper Mururu was bringing in 22 bodies.

Tear Gas Is Used, Tires Are Slashed

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., July 11 (UPI) — Tear gas and Negro demonstrators clashed first and shattered windows in Seven-
gates, Ga., early Thursday morning. The marchers followed a march about 1,000 feet from a rally to the area of the city and county jail. Police and state troopers and anti-segregation demonstrators lay down on the streets, blocking traffic at several intersections.

When police placed some of the marchers in paddy wagons, others lay down and prevented the vehicles from moving. Some of the marchers slashed tires on the C. R. Wren, Deputy Police Chief C. Wren, Wren said. When those involved in the violence broke out, the marchers ran away.

The scattered Negroes roamed through the coastal city, breaking windows in cars and buildings. Some marchers were taken care of before they were restored.

A Baptist church, whose pastor has been an opponent of the march, was set afire. It was not severely damaged by fire during the early morning hours. A fire department spokesman said an initial investigation showed no evidence it was involved.

Farmers in Italy Cause New Trouble

ROMA, July 11 (UPI) — An estimated 100 million farmers and ranchers today staged strikes and demonstrations in a community-backed campaign to cause trouble for Italy's new government.

The temporary cabinet of Giacomo Lemmi, designed to see a smoothly continued and divided government, was forced to postpone its first session until its conclusion.

A confidence vote yesterday gave the 64-year-old premier a mandate to rule until July 31, when he has promised to resign.

In the senate, the upper house, approval to the new government last week, but only by left and right-wing critics who remained. A similar pattern was expected tom-

orrow.

Despite the government's new and rather characterless, it gave some ray of hope to leaving for the United States.

Speaking with the position of the industry's advertising is a custom of the cigarette advertising, "George Jones said in a statement. "Ads should be, and could appear to be, educational."

Ad said also that radio or television programs which are directed particularly to young people should not be sponsored by cigarette manufacturers.

He said this was preferable to voluntary restriction of sponsorship to certain "types" of the literature or music of the day.

With Canadian tobacco manufacturers announced they would not run cigarette commercials on radio or television before

the same time last month he announced that several U.S. manufacturers had decided to end their cigarette advertising and promotion campaigns on college campuses.

1. Arizona's Sen. Barry Goldwater is the first conservative in many years to find substantial support among the young people as well as the older citizens.

2. President Kennedy has been hurt badly in the South, but not yet in the West.

Both developments are some signs he can still hold

a majority of his electoral votes.

Parliament youth put a stamp of approval on Goldwater's policies.

The names of such Michigan's Gov. George Romney, New York's Gov. Nelson Rockefeller, and Pennsylvania's Gov. Bill Scranton are likely to provide an occasion for mass jolling.

THE VOTE. It is easy to dismiss them, young political colts of Idaho, whose John Birch mouthings were embarrassing to their own party's leaders. Certainly their convention was an exercise in frightening nonentity, shocked by three youths' interparticle attacks on decent Americans like Dwight D. Eisenhower. But the fact remains that the Young Republicans have chosen their "most representative voice" and neither Harry Goldwater nor any "candidate for president" is apt to refuse the support of any group merely because he finds its public performances disagreeable.

Moreover, this Young Republican organization is not alone among young people who favor Goldwater for president. All over the country, especially in the West, Goldwater is getting a lot of support among youth. During a recent cross-country lecture tour, for example, I found young people averaging five to one in their support of the Arizona conservative.

With a two-day session of the Idaho permanent building fund advisory council.

A good many public buildings, including virtually all public school structures, are financed through bond issues. In the process, taxpayers pay a good deal of money in interest. By contrast, the building fund as it is operated in Idaho now has no interest charges to increase costs of construction.

Basically, it's a reasonable, orderly program.

AND NO INSURANCE.

In these enlightened days, it's hard to understand the sort of thinking that leads persons to hide money at home rather than use a bank. Yet periodically there are stories of some tramp being picked up for something or other and police find a fortune in cash in his pockets. Or perhaps some reclusive dies and quantities of money are found in various hiding places. There's just no rhyme or reason to such deliberate action in avoiding banks.

Presumably everyone is well aware that banks pay interest on savings accounts. It's equally well-known that most banks have minimum balance requirements of \$100 and there is no limit to the number of accounts in different banks that could come under such insurance?

The possibilities of someone else liquidating such a home bank are almost endless. Rumor has a way of spreading the word of possible hidden wealth and sometimes friends or acquaintances who suspect such a home banking system can't fight off temptation. In addition, the nation's highly mobile population contains a certain percentage always watching for opportunities to score some windfall. In the absence of a bank, the chance of recovering a stolen cache are reduced rather sharply.

It continues to happen, as witness the case the other day in which a resident of Rigby lost some \$12,000 he was keeping in his home.

Regardless of the personal reasons or excuses for keeping so much money around the house, it's a senseless practice. One can conclude only that such persons either have isolated themselves from the rest of the world or have such a deeply ingrained distrust of banks that they're willing to take any risk.

ANOTHER TRAGEDY.

Another argument for action in detecting and treating mental ailments is found in the case of Thomas Lee Bean, 18-year-old Reno youth who faces the death penalty for the mutilation murder of a woman he didn't even know. The youth's family background didn't hold any promise that he could have developed into a renowned scientist, but he could have been a useful member of society. Instead, he faces execution at the very start of his adult life.

A few years ago, Thomas Lee Bean was apprehended in Utah for bothering a girl. His offense was a misdemeanor, but it provided a chance for mental evaluation and psychiatric treatment if indicated. Had the reasonable steps to follow, but society flubbed its chance to save the boy because too little consideration has been given mental health.

Now because society failed, a young woman dead and buried has decreed a youth, 18, must forfeit his life.

THE WIZARDS OF SPACE (15)

The first American trip to the moon? It could come as early as 1968—it will take place no later than 1970, if the nation meets its goal by President Kennedy.

In one day, only a few short years from now, a gigantic 355-foot Saturn V rocket will lift off its elevated and isolated pad at the Merritt Island complex at Cape Canaveral.

Six million pounds of men and metal will be sent into space by the giant engines generating 57 million pounds of thrust—100 times more than the rocket which launched America's first satellite in 1958.

It will not be the first flight for the Apollo. Unmanned capsules will be launched in 1964 and 1966. Early versions of the Saturn will

place the entire Apollo system with crew into earth orbit in 1966. Possibly as early as 1967, the first Saturn V will send an Apollo crew to the moon.

Apollo will consist of three major sections or modules: the command, service and lunar excursion module (LEM). • The command module, weighing 10,000 pounds, will carry the crew, guidance, communications and life-support equipment. • The service module, weighing 50,000 pounds, will carry propulsion systems for midcourse maneuvering and entry into and escape from lunar orbit. • Finally, the lunar landing vehicle, or LEM, which will weigh 25,000 pounds, will carry two of the three crew members to the moon's surface.

Before heading for the moon, the Apollo will spend about three hours in earth orbit.

After leaving earth orbit, the command and service module will swing around in a nose-to-nose position with the LEM. The first mid-course guidance correction will be made, determined by computers which will be in constant contact with the spacecraft throughout the mission.

While coasting toward the moon—the trip will take 82 hours from earth orbit to lunar orbit—two of the crew will transfer to the LEM and prepare for the landing.

Women Aren't Ready for Space Travel, Powers Says

SAN DIEGO, Calif., July 11—Despite the men's hue and cry to enter the astronaut ranks, American women aren't ready for space travel, says Dr. John (Shorty) Powers, voice

of Mercury control. Powers, on leave from his public affairs job with the national American Space Agency, says women "haven't got the guts" to go into space.

"We haven't found a woman in the country totally qualified," he said. The space office told a news conference.

Replying to a remark that women spacewomen would qualify for space travel, Powers said:

"We flew a champion in Mercury, but that doesn't prove anything."

"What would you get from pinching a woman?" Powers asked.

"I don't know what would you prove," Powers said.




