U.S. Embassies Are Overstaffed

WASHINGTON, July 11 (AP)—Look into any U. S. embassy in the world, except perhaps in Africa, where thinness are not too comfortable, and what do you see?

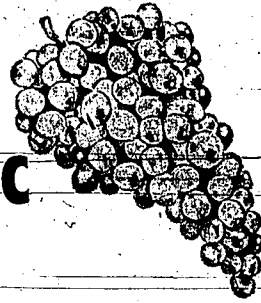

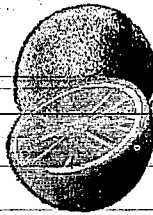

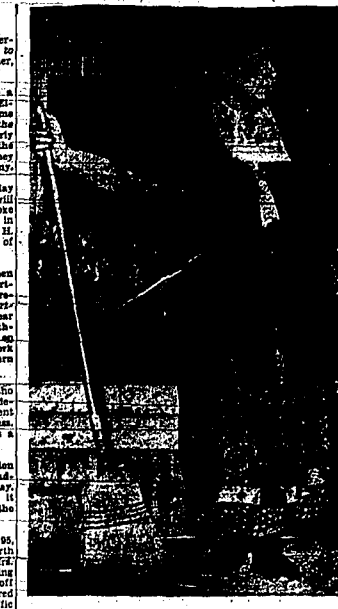

A new class for grade horses will be introduced and it is reported the classes are approved by the American Quarter horse association and the Arabian horse association.

Halter classes will begin at 8 a. m. July 28, and at 8 p. m. performance events. Friday and Saturday classes will include men's western pleasure; girls' clover leaf barrel race; open calf roping; musical chairs for children; seven straight barrels and an open costume class.

July 27 evening classes will include men's western pleasure; second round of calf roping; musical chairs for children; 12-11 year old; second round of calf roping; matches for pairs; musical chairs for children; 12 years and over; colorful horse and rider; second round of calf roping.

New Provisions of Labor Law Stressed by State Aide

BOISE, July 11 (Special)—Idaho Commissioner of Labor W. L. Robison today stressed that the new provisions of the labor law which are to be implemented by the state are of importance to Idaho employers and employees. They are the new minimum wage law, the new law governing female employees and the new law governing premium pay.

With the changes in the law which became effective May 15, all wages paid must be not less than \$1 per hour, with few exceptions.

Exceptions are those in a bona fide executive, administrative, or professional capacity, farm labor, domestic services, and outside salesmen. Special licenses may be issued handicapped workers, which will permit an employer to pay less than the minimum wage. These licenses are issued by the commissioner.

Any employer who refuses or fails to pay his or her employees the minimum wage will be liable for the amount of unpaid minimum wages as well as damages and costs. An employer who is convicted of violation of the wage law, an employer may be punished by a fine of not less than \$25 nor more than \$500.

In commenting on this new minimum wage law, which raised the hourly rate from 75¢ to \$1, the commissioner added that hospital, public librarians and certain business employees are subject to the state department of labor for special licenses. He pointed out, however, that they are issued only after investigation and when it is determined that the employer has not had previous experience and is not displacing a regular employee.

The other significant change, Commissioner Robison announced, alters the previous limitation of nine hours a day maximum for female employees to a payment of time and a half for each hour and an extra of eight in one day or for over 48 hours in any one week. This applies to nearly all occupations.

Significant exceptions are set for women employed in the harvesting, packing, curing, canning or drying of any variety of perishable fruits and vegetables, as well as agricultural and domestic employees.

One point in question, according to Robison, was whether a woman was entitled to time and a half for each hour worked in excess of eight in one day as well as the hours worked in any one week. He pointed out that the new law provides for a 40-hour week.

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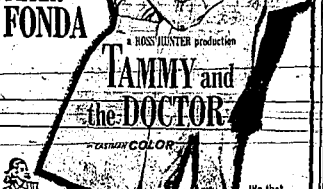

Billion Is Saved by Pentagon

WASHINGTON, July 11 (AP)—Secretary of Defense Robert McNamara said today his cost reduction program clipped one billion dollars from Pentagon spending during the fiscal year that ended.

McNamara told President Kennedy in a memorandum, "200 million dollars more than he estimated could be saved a year ago."

He also reported that plans for 1963 and following fiscal years would bring 1,004 savings to almost four billion dollars within five years instead of the originally estimated three billion dollars.

The savings have been in logistics—supply—costs and have not in any way been achieved at a sacrifice of national security, McNamara wrote.

On the other hand, he listed increases in combat capability which he said have been obtained during the past two years. They had been disclosed in various previous announcements.

Among them he mentioned: An increase of 100 per cent in the number of nuclear warheads for strategic warfare forces; a 60 per cent increase in tactical nuclear forces deployed in Western Europe; a 48 per cent increase in the number of combat-ready aircraft; a 30 per cent expansion in the number of air tactical squadrons; and a 200 per cent increase in special forces for dealing with guerrilla-type threats.

McNamara said the savings were from "improvements in operating efficiency," a point on which he has placed heavy emphasis since he came to the Pentagon from the motor manufacturing industry in 1961.

The defense chief called a late morning news conference to discuss his report. The President gave an illustrated talk. The next meeting will be held July 20 at the home of Mrs. Herbert Loughmiller.

The secret is the topping, which is made with a convenience package of easy coffee cake mix. Put the kind you blend right in the plastic bag, after adding milk and egg. Just squeeze to mix. For the base, peach slices are sweetened with brown sugar and the cinnamon topping which comes with the package of coffee cake mix. That's all there is to it.

EASY PEACH COBBLER
(Makes 3 servings)

5 cups sliced fresh peaches
1/2 cup firmly-packed brown sugar
1 envelope cinnamon topping from coffee cake mix

1 tablespoon lemon juice
Topping:
1 10-ounce package easy coffee cake mix
1 egg, unbeaten
1/2 cup milk

Heat oven to moderate (375 degrees). Slice peaches in 4-inch square baking dish. Sprinkle with brown sugar, lemon juice and envelope of cinnamon topping. Heat peach mixture in oven 15 minutes.

Put eggs and milk into large bag of mix. Squeeze upper part of bag to force air out. Close top of bag by holding tightly between thumb and index finger. With bag resting on table, mix by working bag vigorously with fingers. (Mix about 40 seconds or until egg is completely blended.) Squeeze bag to empty heater evenly over hot peaches. Sprinkle with one tablespoon granulated sugar. Bake in preheated oven (375 degrees) 20 to 25 minutes. Serve warm with vanilla ice cream.

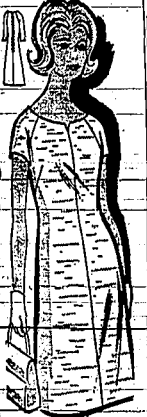

Negotiator Has Background Of Many Russ Conferences

By United Press International
W. Averell Harriman, the 71-year-old elder statesman of the new frontier, leaves today for Moscow on another diplomatic mission of delicate negotiation.

The former New York governor and No. 3 man in the state department has been chosen once again by President Kennedy to face the Russians across a conference table; this time to try to break the deadlock over a test ban agreement.

It is a reflection of the President's confidence in Harriman that he also departed with authority to discuss and explore any other East-West issues the Russians may bring up.

A former championship polo player and board chairman of the family-owned United Pacific railroad, Harriman first began his diplomatic missions during the new deal after his switch to the Democratic party to support Alfred E. Smith for the presidency in 1928.

President Franklin D. Roosevelt sent him as ambassador to Moscow, where he participated in almost every big international postwar conference. He served former President Harry S. Truman as secretary of commerce, ambassador to Britain and later as director of mutual security and foreign aid.

Arkansas Couples May Be Legally Married After All

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. July 11 (AP)—Hundreds of Arkansas couples who married in April that they may not be legally married under state law, may be legally married after all.

The question over what the law says, what the Arkansas supreme court says it says, and what the social security administration says it says was slightly clarified by a statement Wednesday from the Arkansas attorney general.

James C. Hale, former state representative who served the now-controversial law, disclaimed any design to "discriminate" when he wrote the bill.

Many Arkansians have remarried in private ceremonies, two mass weddings are planned for this week-end, and many other couples simply waited — some angrily.

The law, act 32, of 1961, reads: "Every male who shall have arrived at the 'full age' of 16 years, and every female who shall have arrived at the full age of 16 years, shall be capable in law of contracting marriage; if under those ages, the marriages shall be absolutely void."

Atty. Gen. Bruce Bennett said Wednesday that a marriage in which one or both parties were under the legal age would not be absolutely void, as the law states, but could be annulled upon petition by one of the parents in court.

Jerry Harrison, Bennett's assistant, said the marriage is legal until one of the marriage partners goes into court and gets it declared void.

Both Bennett and Patterson cited a 1944 ruling by the Arkansas supreme court in which the court ruled that such a marriage is a nullity, but is void only from the time it is so declared by a court of competent jurisdiction.

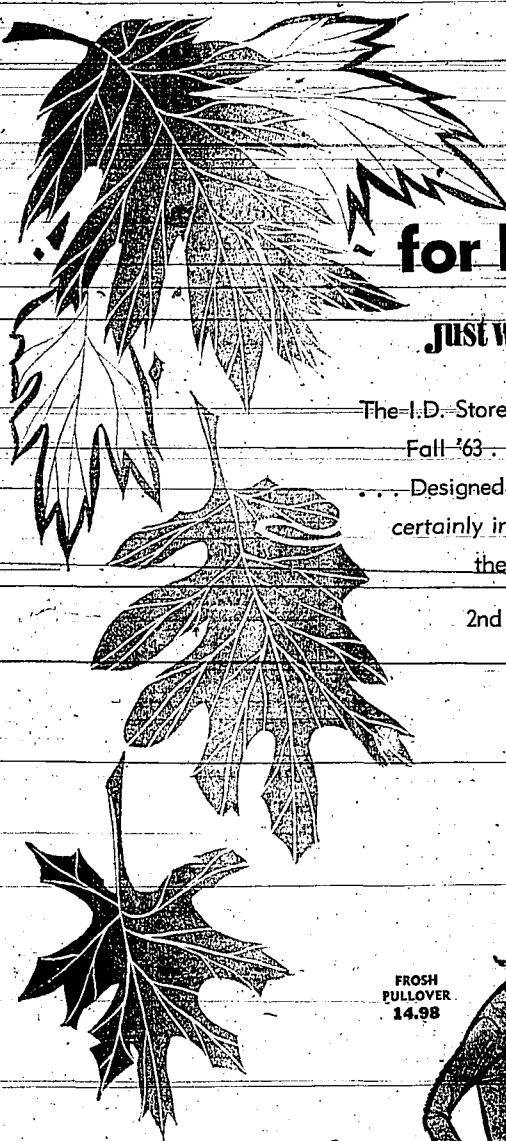

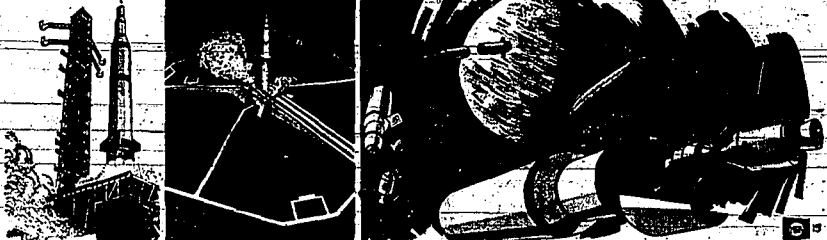

The first American trip to the moon? It could come as early as 1968—it will take place no later than 1970, if the nation meets the goal set by President Kennedy.

But one day only a few short years from now a gigantic 365-foot Saturn V rocket will lift to fill the sky and isolated part at the Merritt Island complex at Cape Canaveral.

Six million pounds of men and metal will speed into the heavens, pushed by five great engines generating 7.5 million pounds of thrust—100 times more than the rocket which launched America's first satellite in 1958.

It will be the first flight for the Apollo. Unmanned capsules will be launched in 1964 and 1965. Early versions of the Saturn will

place the entire Apollo system with crew into earth orbit in 1968. Possibly as early as 1967, the first Saturn V will send an Apollo crew to the moon and back.

Apollo will consist of three major sections or modules: the command, service and lunar excursion modules (LEM). The command module, weighing 10,000 pounds, will carry the crew, guidance, communications and life-support systems. The service module, weighing 30,000 pounds, will carry propulsion systems for midcourse maneuvering and entry into and escape from lunar orbit.

Finally, the lunar landing vehicle, or LEM, which will weigh 25,000 pounds, will carry two of the three crew members to the moon's surface.

Before heading for the moon, the Apollo will spend about three hours in earth orbit as final checks are made on all its systems. Shortly after leaving earth orbit, the command and service modules will swing around in a space-tight position with the LEM. The first midcourse guidance correction will be made, determined by computer calculations made on board and by ground stations, which will be in constant contact with the spacecraft throughout the mission.

While coasting toward the moon—the trip will take 62 hours from earth orbit to lunar orbit—two of the crew will transfer to the LEM and prepare for the landing.

Women Aren't Ready for Space Travel, Powers Says

SAN DIEGO, Calif., July 11—Despite the female hue and cry to enter the astronaut ranks, American women aren't ready for space travel, according to Lt. Col. John (Shorty) Powers, vice president of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA).

"We haven't found a woman in the country totally qualified for the job," he said.

Replying to a report that the Soviet woman Valentina Tereshkova was not a qualified astronaut, Powers said: "We have a few women who are qualified, but they don't have the technical background."

Powers wondered what Mrs. Tereshkova would have done if presented with the technical problems that faced Mel. Gordon Cooper during the closing stages of his flight.

"Who would you get from phasing women into the space program, what would you prove?" he asked.

He said a Negro, Catholic or Jew could argue for "a woman's job on a racial or religious basis as logically as a woman could on the basis of sex."

Child Observed After Popcorn Sucked in Lung

RICHFIELD, July 11—Franklin Robinson, 14-month-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Uell Robinson, is being kept under observation at his home after sucking popcorn particles into his lung.

The child strangled on the popcorn while being cared for by a baby sitter, but was sleeping when the parents returned home the day after.

Pneumonia developed the next day and the child was taken to Gooding, then sent to Twin Falls for further treatment and hospitalized for a week. An attempt to remove the popcorn particles was unsuccessful.

Mrs. Robinson reports the child is being observed in hopes he may be able to cough the popcorn or it may be absorbed. X-rays will be taken at about 10-day intervals during the six weeks.

Solon Urges Pressure for Nuclear Ban

WASHINGTON, July 11 (AP)—Sen. J. William Fulbright, D-Ore., has suggested that joint military pressure be applied to the Soviet Union and the United States to halt the spread of nuclear weapons to smaller powers.

Fulbright's suggestion came in a speech in the Senate in which he urged the United States and the Soviet Union to agree to a nuclear test ban treaty. He said the treaty would reduce the danger of nuclear contamination of the earth but also help stop other countries from joining the "nuclear club."

In his first public statement on the proposed treaty, Mr. Fulbright said it would be "limitless" and "infinite" in scope. He said the treaty must carry to the American people the conviction that the risk embodied in the proposed nuclear test ban are far greater than the risks of an untested, proliferating arms race.

He said the United States was "questionably" capable of detecting cheating and could then resume testing.

Supersonic Plane Order Pends

WASHINGTON, July 11 (AP)—Continental airlines is about to place an order for the British-French supersonic jetliner it was learned Wednesday. The decision could have wide-ranging effects on the course of U.S. aviation.

—Responsible government officials said Continental President Robert F. Six had advised the government of the tentative decision. It would make Continental the second U.S. major airline to buy the joint British-French jetliner. Pan American World Airways last month announced it was purchasing six of the Anglo-French planes, known as the "Concorde."

Continental was believed to have entered negotiations for at least three of the British-French planes. If it consummates the deal, it could have these far-reaching effects on America's own supersonic (SST) project:

—It might force U.S. officials to shift from present plans to build a Mach 3 transport, three times the speed of sound and develop a Mach 2 plane similar to the 1,500-mile-per-hour Concorde.

—It might prompt other major U.S. airlines to abandon their present waits for the American SST thinking and jump on the Concorde bandwagon for competitive reasons.

A Mach 3 airliner must be built of stainless steel or titanium. Such an aircraft could not be flown until 1970 or placed in regular service until 1972. The slower Concorde, made with conventional aluminum, may make its maiden flight by 1966 and could be in full production by 1968.

Continental presumably would place a supersonic airliner on its longest and most lucrative route—Los Angeles-Chicago. This would pit the 1,500 MPH plane against the 600-MPH supersonic jets of American, United and Trans World, Continental's competitors in the market.

The exact status of Continental's negotiations were not known. Continental itself had a blurb "in comment" on the purchase report. But it was learned that six informed Vice President Lyndon Johnson of the airline's plans. Johnson heads a cabinet-
