

Troops Returned To Cambridge After Violence

CAMBRIDGE, Md., July 12 (AP) — National guard troops entering this city today after a night of rioting were described as akin to "warfare." They were the vanguard of 400 state soldiers ordered here, under instructions to carry fixed bayonets to quell any further outbreaks. Six white persons, including three off-duty national guardsmen, were wounded by roving bands of gunfire last night and early today. Gunfire pierced the darkness so frequently that the city's public safety officials were alerted on one point: There is shooting all over the city—almost—on the rear of the city.

Delegates to Red Conclave Fail to Meet

MOSCOW, July 12 (AP)—Russian communist delegates failed to meet today for the first time since they were called to a face-saving way to end the talks. The delegates, headed by Yuri Zhidov-ping, drove from their Lenin Hills residence to the city to meet Russian delegates who did not show up at the conference hall either. The delegates spotted the crowd and fled to the city streets with other communist delegates at the time. Embassy spokesmen said this is our territory and told the correspondents to go away.

WASHINGTON, July 12 (AP)—Sen. Jordan said his letter, addressed to Secretary Stewart, was answered by Assistant Secretary Kenneth E. Johnson, who is in charge of the feasibility report on which the extension order is based. Jordan said he sent another letter to Utah, asking him again to answer the question: "What is the present administration concerning the rights of the federal government to water?"

Treaty Banning Nuclear Tests Is Outlined at Meet

LONDON, July 12 (UPI)—U. S. Presidential Envoy W. Averell Harriman and British government leaders today approved the outlines of a treaty banning all but underground nuclear tests for presentation to the Russians at a three-power conference in Moscow next week. The six-nation treaty draft proposed a ban on nuclear weapons tests in the atmosphere, on the ground and under water. It rules out any aid by the United States, Britain or Russia for nuclear weapons tests by other nations—implicitly—Red China and France.

WASHINGTON, July 12 (AP)—President Kennedy's special fact-finding committee met for an hour today and agreed to consult Monday with parties involved in the railroad labor dispute. Secretary of the committee, Wirtz, said representatives of the carriers and the unions involved in the four-year-long dispute will be questioned on their exact positions on various issues. The secretary has said previously that many people are not aware of the many facts of the dispute, thinking merely that it is a labor dispute.

Known Death Total 40 in Ship Sinking

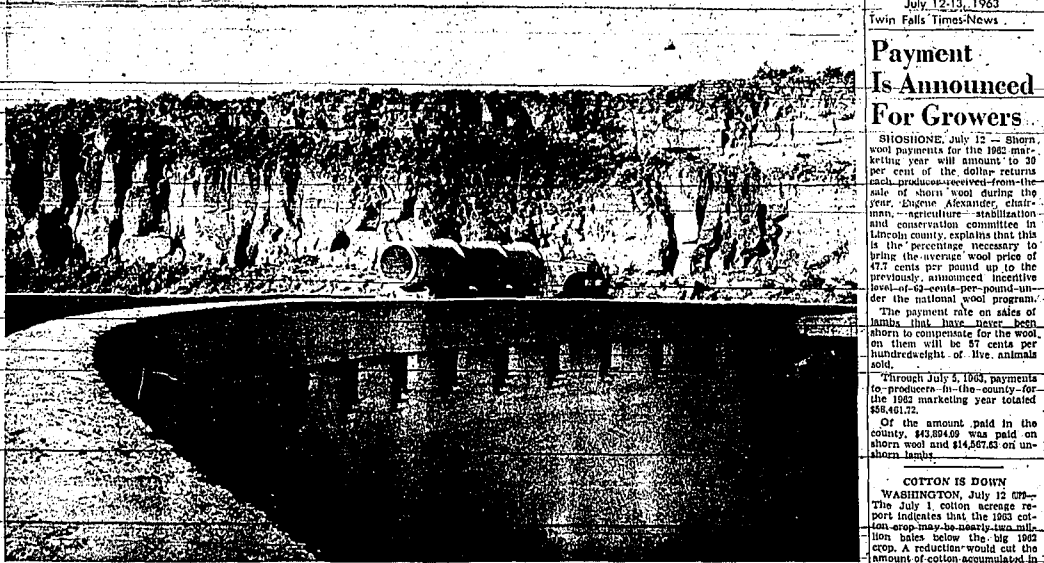

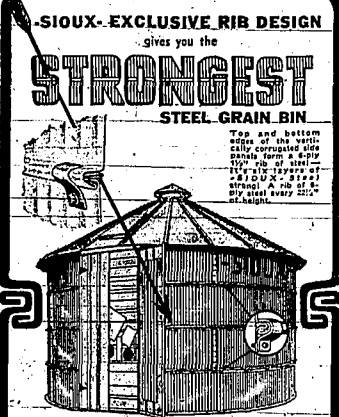

Payment Is Announced For Growers

STIOSSIONE, July 12—Shorn wool payments for the 1962 marketing year will amount to 30 per cent of the dollar returns each producer received from the sale of shorn wool during the year. Buhl Builder Constructs Truck-Bed To Transport Machinery for Dealers

BUHL, July 12—Years ago when a farmer had to move a piece of machinery by truck it involved considerable hard work, cune wedges and a bit of manipulation.

There used to be several ways to load machinery on a truck. One method was to build a ramp back the truck against the ramp and load. Another way was to use big heavy planks and a third way was to find a borrow pit and back down into it. There were a lot of variations of these methods and each was difficult.

In 1948 Richard Love, owner of Buhl Machine Works, developed a till trailer to transport farm machinery. The trailer was much in demand by equipment dealers.

Now, after almost two years one—the product—has developed a truck bed that will accommodate the loading and unloading of farm machinery.

With Love's latest invention, the loading and unloading of machinery is almost automatic. All one has to do is pull two pins and one lever to operate the truck bed.

Keeping the design and function of the new machinery bed simple was the most difficult task facing Love. He wanted a truck bed that wasn't bulky; too high of cost; easy to operate and maintain; strong enough to handle big loads; and that would fit on any highway in the United States, and operate with a flip of a switch.

All these things were found on Love's new truck bed.

"To load a tractor, the driver simply parks the truck on a

flat piece of ground. He walks to the back of the truck and pulls a lever to the right which releases a controllable tailgate. Then the driver walks back to the cab of the truck; starts the motor so the hydraulic system will work and pulls one lever.

The bed of the truck begins to slide backward. After it has slid about a third of the way back it begins to tilt. When the tailgate hits the ground the apparatus moves the truck chassis forward until the back of the bed is even with the end of the chassis. Then the farmer moves the lever of the truck stops. The degree of climb is about 10 degrees.

The tractor, or whatever the driver wants to load, is driven on the truck bed. The driver simply pushes the lever in and the truck bed moves to its original position automatically. The truck can accommodate loads up to eight tons.

In case the loading requires additional muscle, there is a power winch mounted on the front end of the bed which can be manipulated from the truck cab or be side the chassis.

To boost the effectiveness of the truck bed, Love added a ball joint to the front of the bed. His lifting capacity is one ton.

It is possible to take the motor out of a combine with the "hot" hook can perform a number of small lifting jobs.

Love feels his new truck bed will make it possible for the small equipment dealer to deliver machinery over the road, in a short period of time with a minimum of time and effort. Large farmers and ranchers are finding the bed desirable in their operations.

The best way to understand the operation of the new truck bed is to view the machine and watch it operate.

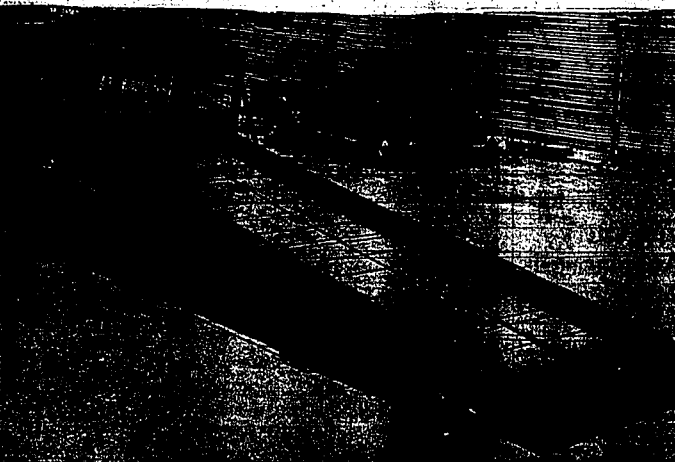
Tom Gibson Named Grassman

Spring Pig Crop Falls Below Goal

WASHINGTON, July 12 (AP)—The agriculture department said the spring pig crop totaled 50,018,000 head, an increase of one per cent but sharply below earlier department expectations. Department predictions had anticipated an increase of four per cent over the 49,822,000 figure for the comparable period a year ago.

The spring pig crop includes animals born during the December-May period.

The department predicted that fall pig crop, pigs born in the June-November period, at 44.5 million head, an 8.5 per cent increase over the 40,963,000 head of the year before.

If the anticipated fall crop materializes, pig production for the year would be 94.5 million head, slightly more than last year's 94.1 million head.

Gains in the heavy producing north central and in the western regions were partially offset by small decreases in the other regions. The east north central area had an increase of one per cent and the west north central area two per cent.

Undersized Calf too Short To Reach Udder of Mother

HEYBURN, July 12 (AP)—Noel Croft is going to have trouble feeding the calf several times a day Croft convincing people one of his calves is as old as he says it is.

One of Croft's helpers gave birth to a calf that is one-third the normal size. The calf was born in late June. None of the Croft family expected it to live more than a few days. The calf was a bare 18 inches high and weighed about 20 pounds.

Evidently the calf's mother ignored her offspring because Croft said he had difficulty in locating the mother. It was just as well because it was impossible for the calf to nurse from the mother. It was simply too short to reach the mother's udder. As one of the Croft boys put it, "The calf can't carry a stool to stand on."

However, the undersized calf had great difficulty in getting to its feet and was several days before it could venture out into the world on its own power.

LINCOLN, Neb., July 12—Decoding the messages of a live beef animal by unorthodox adaptations of map making and submarine warfare will be demonstrated here July 18-19 in the annual cattle and beef industry leaders' conference.

The displays of photogrammetry and sonar techniques are features of the second Coordinated Beef Improvement Conference at the University of Nebraska. The two-day study of beef carcass evaluation is co-sponsored by the American National Cattlemen's Association, the American Society of Animal Scientists and the Animal Science department of the university.

Nebraska faculty members, headed by Dr. Robert Koch, will demonstrate the use of sound waves in probing under the hide of a live animal to measure levels of lean meat, bones and fat. Dr. Harold Hill, Great Plains Institute of Animal Reproduction, Topeka, Kans., will show

how stereoscopic photographs are used to measure the relative muscling of an animal.

Keynote speaker July 18 will be Charles M. Quarles, manager of the cattle division, Kern County Land company, Bakersfield, Calif. Others on the opening session include Dean E. P. Frouin of NYU college of agriculture; Cushman S. Radebaugh, Orlando and Fort Pierce, Fla.; president of the American Meat Packers' association, and Dr. Marvel Baker, Lincoln.

Other speakers include Dr. James H. Hines, director of the American Society of Animal Science.

Three general workshops devoted to production, evaluation and merchandising of "superior beef" will occupy the afternoon of July 18. That evening cattle breeders, ranchers, meat research specialists, packers and retailers will hold separate meetings on specific subjects. July 19 will be spent in review of the carcass demonstration techniques and segment meetings.

Farm Safety

CHICAGO, July 12—National Farm Safety week is scheduled for July 15-17. The theme is "Inspection—plus correction equals protection."

Emphasis is being placed on falls and fires around the farm, which takes a large toll of lives in rural America.

Wood Ticks Can Carry Anaplasmosis

WASHINGTON, July 12 (AP)—Anaplasmosis, a disease costing the U. S. cattle industry 50 million dollars a year, has been found to survive for at least six months in uninfested male Rocky mountain wood ticks. This discovery has led to better understanding of the organism. U. S. department of agriculture scientists reported.

Infested cattle become anemic because of attack on their red blood cells by a protozoan parasite—Anaplasma marginale. Many species of ticks and biting insects can transmit anaplasmosis.

Mechanical transmission is also possible through the use of veterinary bleeding needles, dehorning, and other instruments. The disease does not affect man.

WASHINGTON, July 12 (AP)—The value of foreign agricultural products imported into the United States in June 1963 is likely to be 10 to 15 percent above the previous year, according to the agriculture department's economic research service.

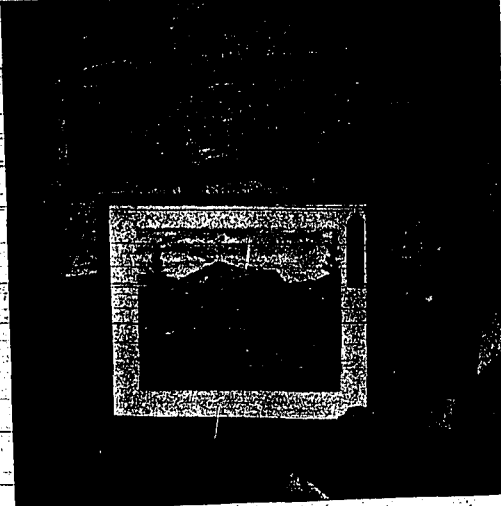

ERB said the rise in imports of animals and animal products was dominated by meats, apparel wool and suitable cattle. Larger sugar imports reflected increased domestic distribution since December, 1962.

ERB said there has been a substantial increase in recent years in U. S. demand for beef from overseas suppliers. The domestic supplies have not been large enough to meet the needs of producers of processed hamburgers, frankfurters and luncheon products.

Other supplementary imports that were purchased in larger amounts included fruits and nuts. There was declines in imports of cotton, grains and tobacco.

2 teaspoons parsley flakes
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper
2 eggs, lightly beaten
1 cup water or beef stock
Combine lamb, bread crumbs, instant minced onion, parsley flakes, salt and black pepper. Eggs and water or beef stock. Mix well. Turn into a greased loaf pan 7 1/2 by 2 1/2 inches. Bake in preheated moderate oven (350 degrees) 1 hour or until done. Serve with Rosemary sauce.
