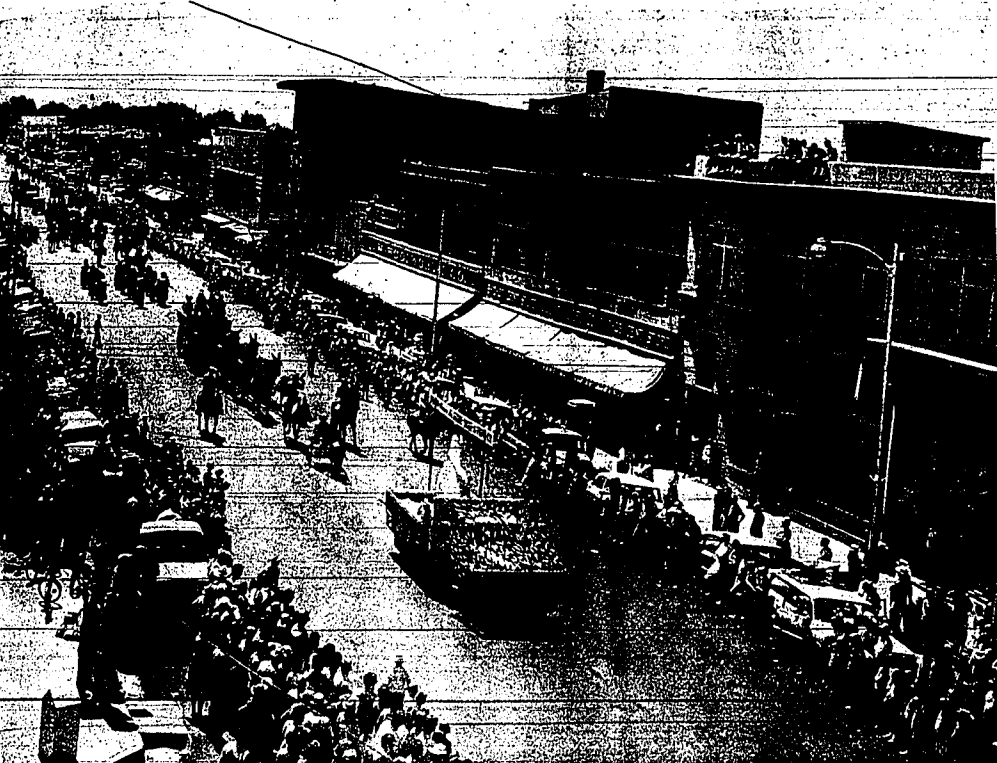

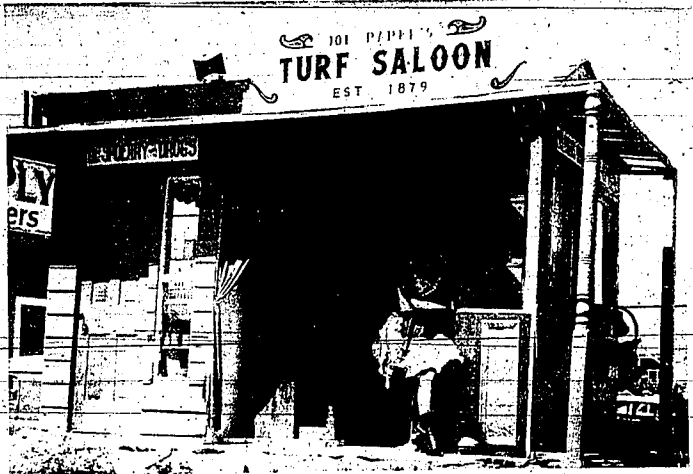

### Viewing of Eclipse Is Dangerous

WASHINGTON, July 13 (AP)—The U.S. public health service warns that looking directly at the sun during the solar eclipse next Saturday could cause serious and permanent eye damage.

"There is no safe way of viewing the eclipse directly," Surgeon Gen. Luther L. Terry cautioned. He said that neither sunglasses, smoked glass nor exposed photographic film offer adequate protection.

"Watch the eclipse on television or by the cardboard-reflector method," he advised.

"The danger lies in the fact that the dazzling rays which usually keep a person from looking directly at the sun are blocked during an eclipse, making it possible to look directly at the sun without pain."

However, the invisible infrared rays from the sun still are there and, when focused on the delicate retina of the eye, can cause harmful burns of which the victim is unaware at the time.

"Such a retina burn causes a permanent incurable blind spot in the field of vision," Terry warned.

The National Society for the Prevention of Blindness, Inc., says that a simple and effective method of observing the eclipse can be made with two pieces of white cardboard.

A pinhole or pencil hole in the top cardboard serves to project and focus the image of the eclipse on the second cardboard. The size of the image can be changed by altering the distance between cardboards.

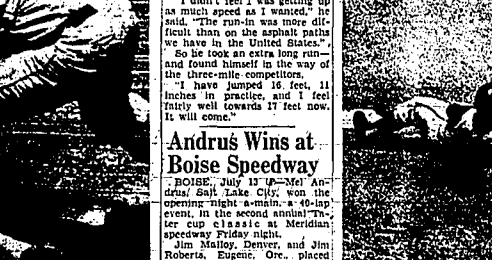

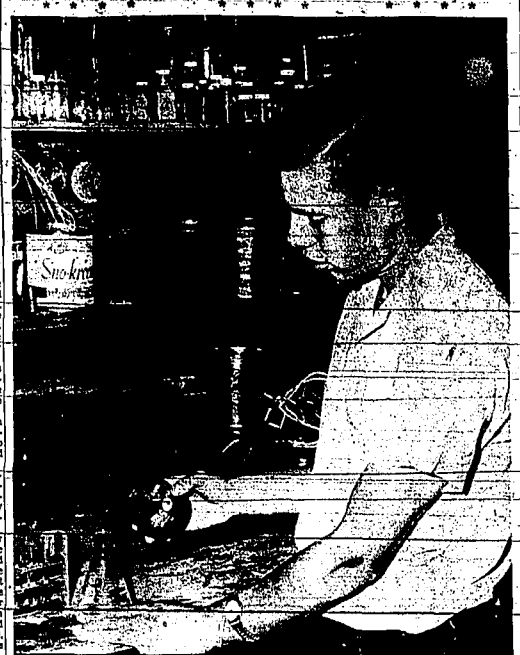
## 36-Year-Old Plant Is Showing Little Signs of Growing Old

## Dietrich Farm Boy Spends Spare Time Observing Echo Satellite

DIETRICH, July 13—On Aug. 12, 1960, the United States launched Echo I, a 100-foot diameter aluminum balloon. At the time of the launching there was considerable comment and many people were out in the evening to see the satellite as it slipped through space. Now, almost three years later, there is still one satellite observer. He is Jack Cooper, 18-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Cooper. Cooper, at this three-year period Cooper has observed some unusual things about the satellite. Cooper also has had some unusual experience in trying to keep track of Echo I.

He always has maintained a high interest in science. As each year has progressed, the observer's interests have changed. In his first interests were in biology, then astronomy, chemistry, space, and now he is tinkering in electronics. His future plans include space specialization in some field of science, probably at Idaho State university.

"The Dietrich youth didn't give up on his observations. He merely went back to his paper and pencil projecting his information," says Cooper. "I don't know what time the satellite would come back in view."

When the satellite finally returned to view he did not spend several days checking it. It was necessary for Cooper to study the path of Echo I for several nights to correct his figures.

Cooper learned of the Goddard Space Flight Center while visiting the Seattle World's Fair. He wrote to them to find out more about Echo I. At first his requests were ignored. Finally they began making him the schedule of orbits. However, they were for Boise passage and he would have to make adjustments.

Cooper has learned one thing about the high orbit satellite—mistakes—more than once. The information forwarded to him was completely inaccurate. Passage times were listed a.m. when they should have been p.m.

One of Cooper's handicaps is that he has no telescope to observe outer space happenings. As he explains, a young boy only

## Twin Falls Red Cross Chapter Boosts Water Program in Area

## Taxpayers Urged to Check Rolls

When it is all over, and the revaluation takes on real proportion in Twin Falls county is complete, you can just about bet that your bill will either be up or down.

There is very little chance that it will be exactly what it is now.

Clifford Thompson, county assessor, points out that actually there will be no reason for a taxpayer not knowing the "ups or downs" before he is billed.

All the taxpayer must do is visit the assessor's office at the courthouse and ask.

Right now it is hoped that the revaluation program can be fully completed and that the changes can be on the tax rolls for 1964. Thus the first revised notices would be mailed out in November of 1964.

At present, Thompson points out, revaluation of all residential property is completed. Farm revaluation is ex-

pected to be completed by October. The values set now are tentative but are expected to be reasonably accurate for both city and farm property.

In the last eight or nine months, an estimated 1,000 letters from the assessor's office have provided for such a mailing and that present clerical aid could not handle such a job.

Because of this, all city and town residential property owners are being invited by advertising

in the newspaper or by stories such as this one to drop in "and find out where they stand before the notices are due to be mailed."

Under the revaluation law, commercial buildings, commercial lots and residential lots are being revalued by persons from the office of the state tax commission. The workers directly from the assessor's office are handling all farm land and buildings and all residential buildings in the county.

Size of the job can be realized when it is known that every residential building—for instance, must be measured around the entire structure, the type of construction noted both inside and out and many other pertinent facts written down.

After the outside workers bring back the data to the assessor's office, Thompson has this to say about the complication:

"Even the simplest of houses will take from 15 to 20 minutes to have the data transcribed to our computers in order to scientifically figure out the revaluation. There are some complicated farms, for instance, that will take a day to transcribe in this manner."

"You put all this data compilation together, you can see what a great task it is."

The "bible" used in the work is a manual which is furnished by the state tax commission. In the case of residential buildings, for instance, the labor and material cost for the year 1961 is computed, less depreciation for the entire structure, the type of construction noted, to arrive at the assessed valuation.

In the case of farms the type of land is taken into account, the soil character, the farm buildings and the cost of water delivered to name a few.

"Naturally it is not right to

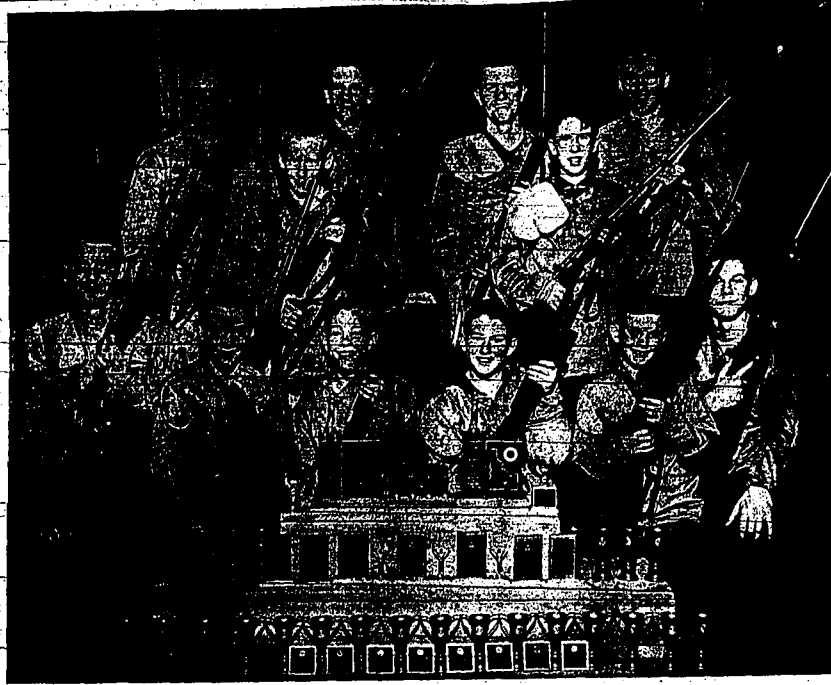

### Jobless Claims Filed At Agency

Over 300 people have filed new claims for unemployment compensation this week at the local employment security agency.

The transitional period which began Monday is the time when all unemployed workers have to file new claims against their earnings in a new year.

This was amended later to provide for several excessive numbers of game animals. One provision reads in part, "The state game warden may issue public drawings and issue permits to take buck deer, bull elk, moose, buck antelope or buck sheep on any game preserve or elsewhere... for a fee of \$10."

Historically, it was not until 1935 that the law was amended to allow the taking of... any class of game animal specially designated by the fish and game warden. Fee changes and other modifications also were made.

After the formation of government was established for the department, a few additional amendments were made to change the name of the department head from "state fish and game warden" to "director."

In 1945, the law was changed to provide that "such special hunt permits to hunt any game animals are not transferable."

There were few other rules established other than fees and hunting areas until about 1946 when it was required that any person obtaining a permit and hunting bull moose must be accompanied by a conservation officer, or a person designated by the district supervisor, to advise which bull could be shot.

This, too, has been changed. Controlled hunts today, however, do provide a good method of controlling the game harvest, to give hunters equal opportunities to try for a favorite species, though limited in numbers, does provide accurate management data, and is of aid to hunter safety where thousands of nimrod might otherwise concentrate if an accessible area were thrown open to general hunting. Increasing hunting pressure and limited numbers of game animals in some areas makes it imperative that some form of special, or controlled hunt be used.

## Historically Minded Local Resident Finds Recalling Marriage Is Simple

### Deadlines Announced for Special Gem Hunts for Moose and Mountain Goat

By JIM HUNTER

The Fish and Game Department is announcing to hunt Idaho moose, antelope or mountain goat this fall, but who has not completed and mailed his application to the Boise office of the fish and game department, must do so by the closing date for filing, or wait another year.

Public drawing by lot as prescribed by law will be held in the state capital for those species beginning at 8 a.m. July 31.

The closing date for receipt of applications for controlled elk and deer hunts in designated areas will be Aug. 6, with the drawing for these permits scheduled for Aug. 21.

Although public interest in the drawings is increased in recent years, especially for those allocating moose, antelope and goat permits, the average attendance is no more than 20 to 30 people.

Full state-wide publicity will in advance, however, seems to be increasing compliance with the honesty of the drawings. In the past, reports came to the department that controlled hunt permits were available if an applicant had enough money—or the right connections.

Drawings are handled as follows: All application cards for a hunt are placed in an electrically sorted revolving drum. After the cards are sorted thoroughly by visiting sportsmen and women or by department personnel, the number of permits available is checked and the number of permits available, the balance of the cards go back into the drum. In the event an applicant wishes to check the date of his application, the number of permits available is checked as soon thereafter as possible.

Applications for all deer, elk and antelope controlled hunts are placed in an electrically sorted revolving drum. But not more than four applicants may apply for a group for these hunts. Not more than two persons may apply as a group for mountain goat and moose hunts. Group applications for more than the specified numbers will be voided and returned. One unreadable, illegible or incomplete application in a group disqualifies the entire group. In general, controlled hunt drawings are open to any holder of a valid Idaho resident combination fish and game license or game license or nonresident combination fish and game license or game license. A nonresident holding only the nonresident deer or bear license is ineligible to apply for any controlled hunt permit.

If fewer applications are received than the number of permits available for moose, antelope and goat for the July 31 drawing, a second drawing may be held Aug. 13 for moose, antelope and goat. The same is true for deer and elk. If insufficient applications are received in time for the originally scheduled drawing, the application filing period will be held open longer and a second drawing will be held Sept. 4, except for hunt 103 in unit 54 for which only one drawing will be held. All correct and complete applications received prior to the original drawing will receive permits.

In the event that enough applications will have not been received in time for the second drawing date, the remaining permits may be sold on a first-come, first-served basis. Incomplete or illegible applications will not be entered in the drawing. Applications with return envelopes, license number or with incorrect fees will be considered incomplete. Fees must be accompanied by means of certified check, cashier's check or money order. Personal checks are unacceptable.

Deer and elk now are available in many more areas than the year ago. For example, they are available on general hunting in 1,000 permits to be allocated through public drawing do not have enough applications. ### Shoshone Man Finds 1864 Tri-Weekly Boise Newspaper Still Informative

BOISE, July 6 — Paul Cline, Shoshone, publisher of the Idaho Tri-Weekly Statesman and the one owned by the local man use of the press in the then Idaho Boise City, Idaho territory on Tuesday, July 26, 1864.

"My wife has the habit of saving clippings, and about a year ago we were going through a pile when this newspaper came to light.

"My father, the late Harmon Cline, was publisher of the Idaho Tri-Weekly Statesman from 1871 to 1891 and perhaps he is the one who saved it. This peculiar thing is that I never remember seeing it before it turned up with the clippings," he said.

The historic publication, identified as Volume One, Number One, is only four pages. The paper is about nine by 15 and one-half inches. The story type is small although it can be read easily and the newspaper is in excellent condition. Cline has had it covered with clear plastic to protect it.

Interesting stories contained in the publication include one dated July 4, 1864, from Washington, D.C., which would make publication date 17 days after the event around it detailed. A Civil war battle between 1 1/2 forces of General Wallace and the Rebels. General Wallace "forced" to order a retreat, the story claims because his force was outnumbered. Wallace had ordered cutting of that community to organize for their defense.

An editorial detailed the trials of "dream-makers," defined as "one who by deed or talk were always getting into trouble."

Of interest to present-day Idahoans is the "Boise City Daily Statesman" which was published in Boise other things, beats sold for 25 and one-half cents a piece, change for 25 cents a piece, new potatoes 15 cents a pound, oats 12 and one-half cents a pound and hay from 83¢ to 90 a ton.

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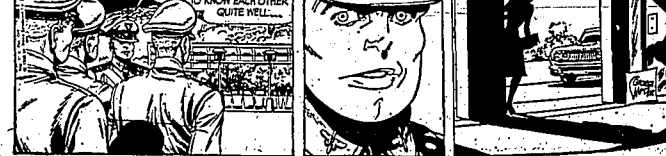
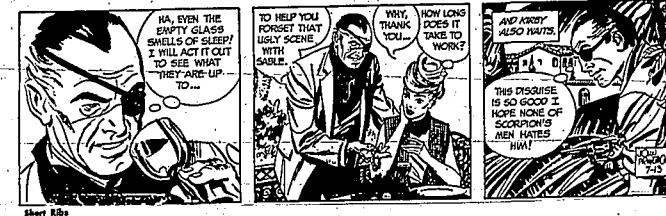
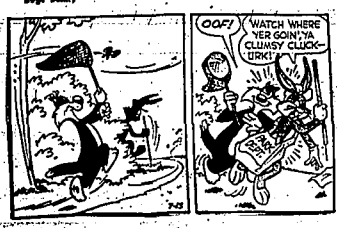

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# Dietrich Farm Youth Spends Spare Time Observing Echo I Satellite

has so much pocket change and with several hobbies, all except one do not go too far. Cooper has made all of his observations, usually with the naked eye.  
Information back in 1960 on Echo I was scanty. However, he was able to pick up a newspaper which gave a two-day schedule on Echo I, listing the times it could be seen. The youth took this information and putting together with another piece of information, that an orbit took two hours and 48 minutes, he began to compute.  
For several days Cooper would go out and observe the satellite based on his own computation

worked out on paper. Each night he would correct his figures. There as the orbital pattern would change he would take notes. The Earth would revolve around the sun and the satellite around the Earth.  
Finally the satellite was no longer observable.  
In three years Echo I has slowed somewhat. It now takes two hours and seven minutes to make its orbit. The viewable hours depend on the season of the year and the path the satellite takes. There is more opportunity to study Echo I during the summer months because the days are long. Another factor

that Cooper takes into consideration is the reflection of the sun from the satellite at certain times of the year.  
Keeping track of Echo I is typical of Cooper's destination. For example when Cooper's efforts to build a chemistry set took some doing. Getting chemicals took some effort.
