

Jerome Couple Killed in Crash Near Hazelton

HAZELTON, July 17—A Jerome couple was killed at 6:30 a.m. Wednesday when their car collided with a semi-trailer truck two miles east of here on highway 25, Charles Young, 35, and his wife, Ann, 37, were traveling east on the highway when their 1960 Chevrolet collided with a frozen food express truck which was headed west. The truck driver, V. J. Williams, San Antonio, Tex., who received minor injuries, said he tried to avoid the collision by steering the car off the road. It crashed through a series of ditches, officers said, and remained upright. The truck hit the right front of the car and crumpled the front bumper of the truck for 20 feet before the car slid off.

The 21st and 22nd traffic fatalities in Magic Valley were killed in a head-on collision on Highway 25 near Hazelton, Idaho, July 17 as a result of an accident in Jerome county.

The accident was investigated by Jerome Sheriff James (Pat) Burns, Deputy Sheriff Gordon Newberry and Sgt. Patrolmen Marvin S. Wright and S. D. Leckert. According to Sheriff Burns, Vining was traveling on his own side of the road and when Williams was traveling on the wrong side of the road, saw the Vining vehicle in front of him and tried to avoid it by turning into the ditch, but the truck hit the right front fender of the Vining car. The couple's death is the 21st and 22nd traffic fatalities in Magic Valley. The last fatal traffic fatality in Jerome county was Monday afternoon when Mrs. Wilford W. Release for Prisoners Is Predicted

MIAMI, July 17 (AP)—A Miami attorney claimed Tuesday night the Cuban government will release all its political prisoners if the United States will admit that all the political prisoners are waiting to leave Cuba. The attorney, Jack Nagley, gave this report to 175 members of the House of Representatives from Kingston, Jamaica. Nagley represents Harold Barber, president of the 175-member group, who is seeking to set up a congressional committee to study the Cuban government's refusal to release all its political prisoners in Premier Fidel Castro's jails and dungeons. U.S. government officials in Washington recently announced that visa waivers—permission to enter the United States—will be granted to at least 300 Cuban political prisoners who have been unable to leave Cuba because of lack of transportation. Barber, a British subject, arrived in Kingston from Cuba last Sunday. "It was informed that the political prisoners would be permitted to leave for the United States ahead of the United States visa waivers if that is preferred," Nagley said.

Indian Delegation Gets Warm Welcome

MOSCOW, July 17 (AP)—An Indian military delegation arrived in Moscow today and was received warmly by Soviet officials in yet another sign of the Chinese government who regard India as their ally. Peking already had denounced the Indian visit as another Soviet effort to aid its enemies but the Kremlin went ahead with the visit. The Indian mission was headed by Defense Minister Subramanian Bhabhalingham who has been seeking military aid in the continuing border dispute with Red China. Top-level Chinese and Soviet negotiators resumed their peace talks today with no apparent sign of progress and the Chinese later retired behind the "Chinese wall" of their villa to ponder the situation.

Buddhists in Saigon Riot, 50 Are Hurt

SAIGON, Viet Nam, July 17 (AP)—Swingling rifle bullets and clubs. South Vietnamese riot police rushed into a demonstration of Buddhist monks, nuns and laymen and children followers today, injuring at least 50. 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U.S. Trying to Reduce Balance of Payments Deficit

WASHINGTON, July 17 (AP)—which is a source of growing concern to the government today opened an intensified campaign to reduce the balance of payments deficit by turing dollars away from more attractive investment markets outside U.S. borders.

It set off a chain reaction of economic forces expected to push U.S. dollars abroad, including a 100-100-100 plan to make them more competitive with those of foreign countries.

Negroes Urge Action in Utah

SALT LAKE CITY, July 17 (AP)—Racial segregation in the Salt Lake City area, particularly in housing, came under attack Tuesday by two representatives of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

The Salt Lake city and county commissions were meeting today to consider establishment of a human rights council to handle complaints of segregation.

Frank Dink, a member of the NAACP's housing committee, told the city commission Tuesday there are definite, although unofficial, housing boundaries in the city, which he said is difficult for the Negro to cross.

The Negro, he said, is generally confined to an area within Bertha Easthigh West, Ninth South and Fourth North streets.

Dink, himself a Negro and a resident of Salt Lake City for 10 years, said he spent several years trying to buy a good home for his family outside of the area, but finally gave up and built a home for himself.

"Things are better now," he said, "and getting better all the time."

But he added that it's still a "guessing game" for the Negro as to whether he will be accommodated at a particular restaurant or motel.

"When I take my wife out to dine, maybe we'll be accommodated, maybe not," he said.

He said he would welcome establishment of a Human Rights Council as proposed by City Commissioner Herbert F. Smart. He also said the NAACP is "keeping tabs" on places that refuse service to Negroes.

Dink's sentiments were echoed by Bob Wood, another Negro and chairman of the NAACP housing committee in Utah.

There was no hint from either man that there will be any picketing or mass demonstrations in Salt Lake City that have marked integration drives in other U.S. cities.

But the fact that the NAACP now appeared before the city commission was an indication that the Negro is not at all satisfied with his lot in Salt Lake City, or all of Utah, for that matter.

There have been other signs of "restlessness" in the Negro community in recent months. Several hundred Negroes and whites gathered at the state capitol to protest the legislature's failure to enact a "meaningful" civil rights legislation.

And, in June pickets were posted outside a downtown Salt Lake City department store to protest a demonstration for Negroes seeking equality in the South.

B. A. Wright, executive vice president of the Salt Lake Real Estate Board, told the city commission Tuesday that if there is discrimination in housing "I don't know what to do."

He did say, however, that "we have been trying to find a property to rent a fine colored family, but have not been able to do so."

Wright said the only way discrimination in housing can be overcome is "voluntarily."

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12 Russians Are Killed in Cuban Battle

MIAMI, July 17 (AP)—A Cuban exile organization reported today that 12 Soviet soldiers were killed in a battle with Cuban rebels led by a Russian-occupied base in Oriente province last month.

The report, dated June 29, was received here from the Sembrillo Liberty Underground organization.

It said the Cuban "Soviet base" at Sayar Arriba near the Bay of Nipe on North-Central Oriente coast, was a few days ago. A combined force of Russian and Cuban troops engaged the rebels, according to the report.

"We scored a great victory," it said.

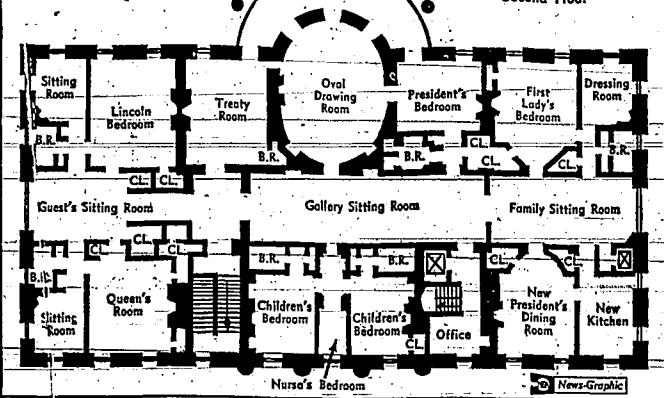
It said the Cubans were fighting the anti-Castro forces or for the Cuban government troops.

The bodies of Cuban commandos were also flown to Santiago by helicopter.

Leaders Hail Los Angeles Racial Pact

LOS ANGELES, July 17 (AP)—Negro leaders are hailing an anti-discrimination agreement worked out with Los Angeles apartment owners as an important step in the local integration of the city.

The pact, announced Monday by the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People and the Apartment Association of Los Angeles provided for:

1. Establishment of a permanent liaison committee of members of the association, the United Civil Rights committee, and the county commission on human relations, to consider housing problems.
2. Establishment of standard qualifications to govern policy on rental of units and eviction of tenants, to be applied without regard to race, creed or color.
3. An educational campaign to acquaint apartment owners, managers, and tenants with rights and responsibilities under the state's fair housing act.
4. "Agreement in principle" for the permanent liaison committee to work toward establishment of a central clearing house on rental availabilities.
5. Efforts to reach "universal application" of the standards of the fair housing act throughout the housing industry.

Czechoslovakia's Lowering Birth Rate Causing Alarm

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia, July 17 (AP)—Will baby carriages become a curiosity in Prague? That was the recent headline in an evening newspaper here. It reflects communist leaders' growing concern at Czechoslovakia's steadily declining growth rate.

Other countries are faced with a population explosion, but it is just the contrary here.

In 1962, the birth rate was 16.7 per 1,000, roughly two-thirds of the U.S. and Soviet rates and well below that of Czechoslovakia's neighbors in capitalist Western Europe.

The development threatens the already shaky Czechoslovak economy.

Industry suffers from an ever-increasing lack of manpower—a particular problem—because productivity is much below Western levels. Also, the population, now numbering 13.5 million, is getting overage.

At the same time, the number of legal abortions per year stays above the 100,000 mark despite a tightening of the laws. Last year, there was still one abortion for every birth in Prague. The capital's population figure has reached a million, but only because outsiders moved into the city. Since 1953 the death rate has been higher than the birth rate, despite an all-time low in infant mortality.

What's behind all this? That's the question all get a frank answer. In most cases it boils down to something like this: "I'd like to have a baby but we just cannot afford it." Both of us have to work if we want to have "some extra money." "We're trying to get an apartment first." "We would like to have a car first."

The answers probably would be similar from many young couples in the West. The difference is that many people in Czechoslovakia will have to accept these answers for many years.

Try Made to Halt 'Weasel Words'

OAPF-CANVERAL, July 17 (AP)—A couple of companies instrumental in the success of the Minuteman missile are making a determined effort to close the space industry's "wordbook gap."

The war on this game of verbal hide-and-seek, sometimes called "weasel words" is being waged by the Boeing company and Space Technology Resources.

According to Kenneth L. Calkins of the Boeing public relations department, this type of writing often chivits itself in the protective shroud of jargon and can be identified by its artificial way of saying nothing.

Calkins' crusade is aimed at the people within the industry. Industrial writers and other employees whose job it is to write letters, memos and reports deal with the extremely complicated business of making mistakes.

Here is an example of the kind of "writing" Calkins hopes to eliminate: "Man-machine requirements impose severe visual acuity problems."

"This translates that you can't see the instrument panel," Calkins said that about a year ago STL Project Manager Ivar M. Holliday looked at some Boeing and STL reports and correspondence on the Minuteman program and—although he is quite familiar with the missile—he couldn't decipher some of them.

Holliday decided that what was needed was some quality control of the hundreds of pages of writing about the Minuteman.

Partially as a result of Calkins and Holliday's efforts, Boeing and STL employees have attended classes aimed at lifting the fog from their writing.

Calkins believes that unexplained abbreviations have no place in a field that already is highly complex.

Typical air force engineers' manuals were pointed out heavily to the use of unexplained abbreviations, but Calkins said

"The space saved by using abbreviations does not begin to compensate for the loss of clarity that may result."

Calkins said he knows of one Boeing employee who collected source material to help cope with the abbreviation problem, including a sheet entitled "AF (air force) abbreviations used on the Bomarc program."

It is this kind of non-writing that pushes the cost of correspondence up to \$20 a memo," Calkins said.

Forces to Unite To Fight Reds

BANGOR, Thailand, July 17 (AP)—If the shaky truce in Laos collapses, neutralist and right wing forces will unite to fight the communist-led Pathet Lao, says a ranking Laotian neutralist.

Jordan said there are four marked graves in the area which will be flooded when the Lower Monumental dam is complete.

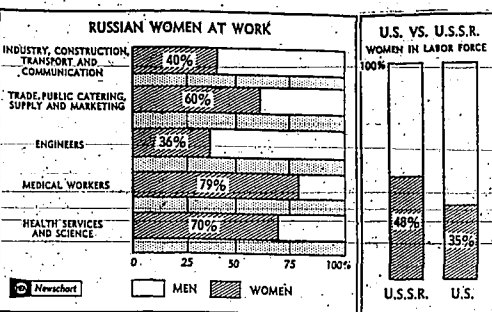

Launching Set For Satellite

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla., July 17 (AP)—The Syncom 2 communications satellite with improved motor is scheduled for launching here Tuesday.

The satellite will be launched by a Delta rocket toward an orbit 20,000 miles above the Earth.

If successful, it will become the world's first working synchronous orbit satellite—one which appears to hang stationary over one spot on Earth because it revolves around the Earth with the same 24-hour period that the Earth rotates on its axis.

Two-Thirds of Motorists May Have to Use Seat Belts

DETROIT, July 17 (AP)—Within the next two years more than two-thirds of the nation's motorists will be required to have seat belts on their cars.

A survey taken by the Allied Chemical Corporation showed 20 states and the District of Columbia have passed laws requiring seat belts in new automobiles. Fifteen of the states came during the 1962 legislative sessions, the survey showed, and six other states were scheduled to vote on similar laws this year.

The survey indicated the laws will affect nearly 11 million of the nation's 65.5 million cars.

Ward's Automotive Reports, the statistical Bible of the automotive industry, also did a seat belt survey that showed that new cars equipped at the time with seat belts have more than doubled this year from the 33,413 cars equipped with seat belts in the entire 1962 model year.

The cars equipped with belts, the statistical agency said, numbered an estimated 11.2 per cent of the total passenger car output, compared to 6.7 per cent during the 1962 model year.

The increase in the seat belt surge, and so intense are efforts by civic groups and legislative bodies to make them mandatory, they may become an integral part of most new cars by the 1965 model year, Ward's said.

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Iron Curtain Nations Closed to Each Other

LONDON, July 17 (AP)—The communist countries behind the iron curtain in East Europe describe themselves officially as "fraternal nations."

But they are in many respects almost as tightly closed against each other as they are against the West. There are iron curtains within iron curtains.

Though linked by the same ideology and armed political and military ties, they have developed into near-autocracies, separated from each other by a network of barbed-wire fences and sentry towers.

A traveler finds it easier today to cross the iron curtain from the communist lands than it is for the individual nationalities of one satellite to enter another East European country, let alone big brother Russia.

The individual Pole, Czech, or Romanian hardly stands a chance of visiting his neighbor unless as a member of an official delegation or with a carefully shepherded group with a firmly controlled itinerary.

Communist has, consequently, taken on divergent shades in the various member countries of the east European red bloc. So has the de-stalinization campaign and the subsequent political and economic liberalization.

Poland openly boasts she holds a special position among the socialist countries of the communist bloc.

Czechoslovakia considers herself the "most communist" among the satellites and has even changed her official name from "people's Republic" to "socialist Republic."

Romania, demonstratively steering clear of the ideological dispute in the communist camp, accuses her own economic development. Hungary appears at present one of the most "Western" of the satellites.

Even nationalist trends and traditions have begun lately to emerge here and there and to determine some features of the public life of satellite nations.

Some differences of communist practice behind the iron curtain are striking.

Poland, for instance, has a prevalence of private agriculture. Some 85 per cent of Polish farmers run, more or less on traditional private lines, in Czechoslovakia all the land is nationalized or collectivized as it is in most of the other—Romania, Bulgaria and Hungary.

The Poles are consequently are doing relatively well in agriculture, while the others are plagued by shortcomings, common to collectivized farms everywhere including the Soviet Union.

But nearly all of the satellite regimes have realized lately the importance of incentives to stimulate production. This is done by bonuses in industry and by easing of compulsory delivery in agriculture.

Industry is nationalized everywhere behind the iron curtain. But Poland allows small private workshops and a limited number of private retail shops. Czechoslovakia has abolished every type of private enterprise—everywhere. Other satellites like Hungary or Romania allow individual "handicraft" enterprise, like tailors and cobblers. But in Czechoslovakia even the dress shops are state-run.

Planning differs to some degree in the satellites. Poland, trying to go too fast and in too many directions in her industrial buildup is faced with a serious crisis presently because the phasing of her plans has gone wrong.

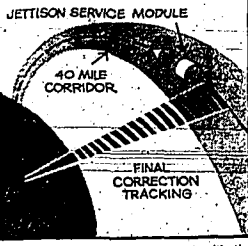

Many Nations Compete for Minds of Japanese People

MANCHESTER, England, July 17 (AP)—Sir Bernard Lovell, director of the Jodrell Bank radio astronomy station, said today the Russians were having a second thought about sending a man to the moon and might explore it if that there is no conviction that it is scientifically or otherwise desirable to have a man on the moon, he said.

He also said the Russians hope within five years to be operating an optical telescope from a space platform orbiting the earth. He said the plan of the moon race is to be decided by linking up several Volok-like space capsules and would be manned by a series of cosmonauts.

As for the moon race, Lovell told newsmen after a three-week visit to the Soviet Union. "I would say that the Americans are racing themselves."

The Russian second doubts recalled the controversy in the United States over the feasibility of a manned moon landing.

Lovell said there was no evidence of a Soviet project similar to the U.S. "Apollo" lunar probe but did not say that a lunar landing would not be made first by the Soviets. At present there are problems which appear to be insurmountable, he said.

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Bridges Hits Kennedy in Rail Dispute.

LOS ANGELES, July 17 (AP)—Union leader of Longshoremen on the West coast, Harry Bridges, said yesterday that the deck-riders "knocked the deck" against unions by their actions in the railroad dispute.

In a speech before the Town Hall, Bridges said railroad management is not under any real pressure to surrender government intervention and compulsory arbitration.

Bridges spoke against a house bill aimed at compulsory arbitration of maritime disputes but said management relations in general.

"The management strikes is another way of outlawing effective unions," said Bridges, "because they're bargaining in a fraud."

Bridges argued the right to organize doesn't mean workers are on strike. He said there had been no West coast strikes of his kind since the Longshoremen's union for an extended period because it remained an effective bargaining power.

Soviets Are Pondering Moon Flight

TOKYO, July 17 (AP)—"Hello, Japan,"

Cracking through the air waves, words bombard Japan daily from all directions in a massive international battle for the minds of 93 million Japanese.

Oiant radio transmitters in 12 nations aim Japanese-language propaganda at Japan. Eleven others, using the international language of English, broadcast each day air programs designed specifically for Japan.

A host of smaller nations enter the battle of the air-waves occasionally—when they have a particular point to sell in Japan.

The communist bloc, by sheer weight of round-the-clock programming and superior technical facilities, all but overwhelms broadcasts from the non-communist West.

In communist eyes, the prize is the allegiance of a vigorous, highly-industrialized and geographically strategic nation now beginning to play an important role in international affairs.

The Voice of America daily broadcasts 20 minutes on short-wave for an exclusively Japanese audience. The Soviet Union takes their waves every day for four and one-half hours, much of it on medium-wave which can be heard on the cheapsets in the smallest mountain village.

Red China comes in with another tone and another hours daily, mostly on medium-wave and with such strength that it sometimes knocks out radio stations in Japan.

U.S. officials say the Voice of America, with its closest transmitter on Okinawa, is not equipped for medium-wave broadcasting to Japan, and, anyway, favors more broadcasting to other critical areas in Asia.

In addition, it is felt the U.S. viewpoint is well distributed by Japan's own radio stations and newspapers and that with 88 per cent of the population literate, the Japanese are well served.

None of the East-West giants, however, is rated first in broadcasting quality. Monitoring officials of Japan's government radio network say Japanese give the best radio broadcasts for their musical and cultural programs.

American programming is criticized as being directed almost solely at Japanese intellectuals. "Hearst the communist deliver news and political talks" aimed at broad masses.

Extension Asked On Alaska Lands

WASHINGTON, July 17 (AP)—Sen. E. L. Bartlett, D. Alaska, said yesterday that time for re-opening the statehood question for the state of Alaska should be extended.

Bartlett has introduced legislation to give the state five more years in which to select lands under the statehood consent authorization would end Jan. 3, 1964.

If not extended, he said, it would lead to an "irreparable and confusing rush" to select lands before the deadline.

The legislation, Bartlett said, was necessary in the interests of both the state and the federal government.

No Intervention

LONDON, July 17 (AP)—Col. Sec. Dening Sandys has returned from British Columbia and urged United Nations intervention in the racially divided South American colony.

"With all respect to the United Nations," Sandys told reporters, "the situation is complicated enough without introducing any state elements."

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Cuban Peasant Life Worse Now Than Before Castro

The Cuban peasant, once cheering supporter of Fidel Castro, today mutters increasingly that the communist regime which has made a joke of land reform, while spreading day by day on his way of life.

Still as appallingly poor as before the advent of the bearded ruler, most peasants this correspondent met during his stay in Cuba yearn for a return to the past. They say that their present they were free to do as they pleased.

"Things have never been so bad before," a 63-year-old re-

ferred cattle foreman said, shaking his head.

"Fidel has turned former dictator Fulgencio Batista into a pawn by compulsion," commented a Matanzas Province squatter.

"Batista, been satisfied with stealing only three, maybe four million pesos, maybe would have gone well," the squatter added.

"The peasant life in the back-hills is rough. Showages here far more acute than those experienced in Havana."

"Havana is paradise, compared to Oriente province," a Negro peasant said.

Milk, beef, rice, bread, even sugar, are frequently absent from country store shelves for long periods.

Take the case of Pipo Diaz, a Pinar del Rio Province squatter who lives in a thatched wooden hut with his wife and five children.

He claims he has had no beef for almost a year, because peasants are forbidden to slaughter their steers and no meat is being sent from the cities.

The white-washed hut lies up from a brook, between a patch of corn and some native potato plants. Pipo's children, many around the hut riad in faded cotton, none wears shoes.

"Look more than a year now there've been no boots or shoes for us squatters peasants. If you want boots you have to join the militia or a government cooperative," Pipo says.

"Everything in a mess these days," his wife chips in. She bends over all open charcoal fire, fanning the embers on which the onion meal roasts.

"Cooking oil—when we get it—water-like motor-oil—lard—the poor and mostly rural; they are always out of hard crackers. To get a tin of evaporated milk you have to obtain a coupon from the committee of the defense of the revolution."

Launch is served; boiled corn meal with a handful of chopped onion on-top and boiled mangle Black coffee.

"Why doesn't Pipo raise more chickens and loaves, or plant more vegetables?" Biga asks.

"First of all," he explains, "at the prices the government pays us for plus and produce we make no profit and are never sure they will pay. Secondly, in case we harvest a surplus, they force us to sell it to them."

Pipo shows off his three-room hut. In the bedroom there are two large beds, one for the

couple and the latest baby, the other for the three-boys and the 12-year-old girl.

In the living room two rocking chairs face each other. Stiff posters reflect and attract infant peer from framed sepia photographs. A faded picture of Castro torn from a magazine is tacked to the wall.

"You never know what'll come around," Biga explains.

As it does with other independent farmers who refuse to vote—the party line—the government is applying subtle pressure to force Pipo to join a cooperative or people farm. Unless he does so, it will be increasingly difficult for him to obtain feed, fertilizer, loans, wire and other farming necessities.

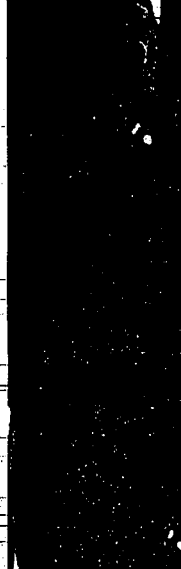

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Astronauts Chosen From List of 271

HOUSTON, July 17 (AP)—America's next 10 to 15 astronauts will be picked from an application list of 271 civilians and 71 military recommendations, the national aeronautics and space administration (NASA) announced yesterday.

NASA said America's first man on the moon may come from the group.

NASA said three of the applicants were women, including Oklahoma-Aviation, Jerris Cobb. The manned spacecraft carrier could not reveal details of any of the applications, nor would it give names of the other two women. It was not known whether any applicant was a Negro.

The NASA list showed recommendations received for astronaut selection from the military were 55 from Army, 10 from the Marines and one from the Navy. The 200 civilian applicants were up from 175 received a week ago.

The increase in civilian applications came because several candidates were eliminated from the pool through the small postmarked before the deadline, NASA said.

The applicants will be put through a series of evaluations and 10 to 15 astronauts will be chosen this fall.

Seven astronauts were chosen for the Mercury series, and nine new astronauts were selected for the next series of missions, the Apollo and Gemini series.

The 10 to 15 newest astronauts to be selected from the current applications will be added to the Apollo and Gemini pool, from which will come the man who makes America's first moon trip.



Flood Waters Devastate Resort Area

NOT SPRING, Ark., July 10 (AP)—Hours of hard rain brought 400 feet deep to this town, closing its bath houses and interrupting only briefly the gambling.

A helicopter and boats rescued some stranded residents. No injuries were reported.

Downtown streets resembled rivers at the height of the flood. Store windows were smashed and merchandise ran through the streets. Cars were washed onto sidewalks.

Large boulders, almost as big as a house, rumbled 50 yards and stopped in a street near the Deale hotel.

The rain began around 1:30 a.m. and stopped at 10:30 a.m. Damage was expected to reach several hundred thousand dollars.

Hot Springs got 8.1 inches of rain in the nine-hour period. An extensive downtown drainage system finally took the water away at midnight.

Dazzling Celestial Treat Is in Store for Saturday

(Editor's note: One of the most magnificent celestial events of a lifetime will occur on Saturday and all America will have a treat.)

NEW YORK, July 17 (AP)—The sun, earth and moon have a date Saturday for a dazzling celestial treat—a total eclipse of the sun.

For some ancients, an eclipse was a case of a dragon swallowing the sun.

For today's scientists, it's a rare opportunity for a host of studies and measurements, with some astronomers planning to chase the moon's shadow in airplanes, and space satellites engaging in some special sniping, too.

For the public, it can be an awesome display as the sky darkens and, the air cools, as stars appear and the great pearly halo or corona of the sun springs into view.

Only a relative handful of Americans will be lucky enough to see the full spectacle, for the eclipse will be total along a path, averaging only about 60 miles wide, sweeping across Alaska, Canada and Maine, to Maine, totally will occur between 4:42 and 4:44 p.m. (EST).

But, weather permitting, almost everyone else can see the sun partially eclipsed as the moon swings between the sun and the earth.

The sun will be 94 per cent covered for watchers in the Boston area, 49 per cent for those in Miami, 77 per cent in Chicago, 64 per cent in Denver, and 34 per cent in San Francisco, for example. Hawaii loses out altogether.

Your eyes can be irreparably damaged, unless you take the greatest precautions in watching the show. Experts advise using a double thickness of black and white film which has been exposed and developed to maximum density. Ordinary sunglasses or a hunk of smoked glass are by no means safe enough, they warn.

In all areas where the eclipse is not total, indirect-viewing is safest. One method is to make a small hole in a piece of cardboard and hold it toward the sun, letting the sun's image be projected through the hole onto a white surface. On that target, you can watch as the moon takes a bite out of the sun.

The big treat comes to those in the path of totality, and Maine is expecting scores of thousands of eclipse viewers. Television cameras will try to record the big show, too.

Closed Meet Held on Utah Park Bill

WASHINGTON, July 17 (AP)—The senate subcommittee on public lands headed by Sen. Frank E. Moss, D., Utah, began closed sessions this morning to consider the senator's Canyonlands national park bill.

Moss said Tuesday Senate Interior Committee Chairman Sealie Ainsworth, D., Nev., would preside over the sessions and that he would introduce amendments to the bill.

The amendments, he said, are ones agreed on last May by Gov. George D. Clyde, Sen. Wallace F. Bennett, R., Utah, and others of Utah's congressional delegation.

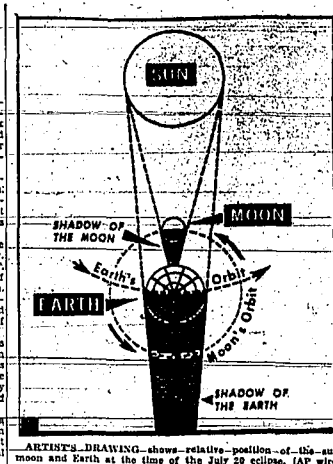
He also said he would introduce other amendments proposed by the Republican members of the delegation.

"I believe this bill represents a reasonable compromise between those who favor single-use parks and those in Utah who believe we must have a full opportunity to explore possible minerals and other resources," he said.

"The Democratic bill calls for a 250,000-acre park in southeastern Utah and a 25,000-acre park for a period for mining and mineral exploration."

The bill would set up a period for mining but ultimately mark a traditional national park in the canyonlands, he said.

The park would be located in the rough, but geologically spectacular area that surrounds the confluence of the Colorado and Green rivers near Moab, Utah.

Congress Sets Debate on When Peanut Is Not Peanut

WASHINGTON, July 17 (AP)—When is a peanut not a peanut? With no other legislative issues scheduled for floor debate, the house today turned its full attention to this provocative question.

The right answer, according to Rep. Billy Matthews, D., Fla., is that a peanut—when boiled—is not a peanut but a vegetable. That happens to be the law of the land. But the law is scheduled to expire next year.

Unless the law is extended, producers of "boiled peanuts"—a specialty food product that enjoys a growing market in certain southern areas—will become subject again to the government planting and marketing controls that apply to peanuts.

Matthews hoped to persuade the house to approve and send to the White House a bill to continue this law for two more years.

Two months ago, Matthews tried to push his non-peanut bill through the house, but he could not manage it, even with the help of a co-sponsor. Everything went wrong.

The can opener was pushed to the house floor by a hastily summoned party member when several members demanded a "taste" of the boiled peanuts.

After the can was opened and the "non-peanuts" were passed around to the members, Rep. Wm. T. Hays, D., Tex., warned Matthews that he had committed a tactical error.

"You should have kept the can closed," Hays told him.

Hungary Arrests 3 for Espionage

BUDAPEST, Hungary, July 17 (AP)—Communist Hungarian authorities today announced the arrest of a West German woman and two Hungarian citizens on charges of espionage.

The announcement said the trio worked for the West German intelligence agency. They were identified as Mrs. Konrad Krenner, János Holczmeister, and the latter's son, Janos, Jr.

The announcement gave no further details.

Belgium Decides To Move Troops

BRUSSELS, Belgium, July 17 (AP)—The defense ministry said the decision to withdraw some of its NATO troops from Western Germany and station them in eastern Germany. These troops will nevertheless remain committed to the North Atlantic treaty organization.


The decision involves four battalions. The ministry said the decision was taken to improve contacts between the Belgian army and the country.

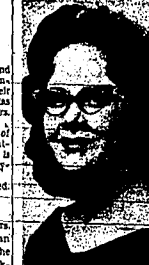

Home Sawn in Two as City, Homeowner Refuse to Budge

CHARLOTTE, N.C., July 17 (AP) — When an irrefutable force like Joe Conrad, owner of a home in Charlotte, meets an immovable object like Joe Conrad, something is going to give.

But, after three years of wrangling, neither Conrad nor the city has given an inch and it appears a superior court jury will have to decide the issue.

In the meantime, Conrad has been sued by the city which wants the space to extend an avenue several blocks.

It all began when the city notified residents in the area that it planned to extend the thoroughfare, which runs in front of Conrad's two-story, frame home.

The city then determined it would need only the area occupied by half of Conrad's home. It approved that half of his house at \$23,262.50. But Conrad turned it down pointing out that the entire house would have to be torn down and therefore it should be worth more to the city.

The two forces—Conrad and the city—have been at it ever since, with no sign of either budging an inch.

"They want to be hard-headed about it," Conrad said. "I can be hard-headed, too."

So the city exercised its legal right, which allows it to take only that part of private property it must have to extend or build roads, without getting the owner's permission. In the instance, only half of Conrad's house.

Pressure Is Mounting on South Africa

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., July 17—African pressures on Portugal and South Africa are mounting at the United Nations, with possible far-reaching consequences for the world organization.

In respect are meetings of the U. N. security council, at which representatives of the 32-nation African group will make requests for punitive action against Portugal for alleged acts of repression in the African territories. They will seek similar action against South Africa for its refusal to abandon white supremacy policies.

Before any such line is set new, but some heads of Western delegations are apprehensive about these two possibilities in the wake of the council meetings, tentatively set for the end of this month.

Portugal and South Africa may quit the United Nations.

The African nations may send "freedom fighters" into West Africa and set the stage for outbreaks of even greater violence than encountered to date.

In the past, Portugal and South Africa have raised, themselves, the question of whether they should stay in the United Nations, and remain targets for increasing attack.

The decision to bring new pressure was reached by the African nations at the recent heads of state conference in Addis Ababa.

Alex Quaison-Sackey, Ghana's ambassador to the United Nations, said at a new conference at U. N. headquarters one purpose is to discover "who are our friends" among the big powers on the security council.

This puts the United States, Britain and France, as Atlantic allies of Portugal in a difficult position—to the obvious pleasure of the Soviet Union.

Last December the three Western powers voted against a resolution in the general assembly that requested the security council to impose penalties on Portugal unless it took immediate steps to place Angola on the road to independence.

With Soviet bloc and Asian-African support the resolution was approved 57 to 14, with 18

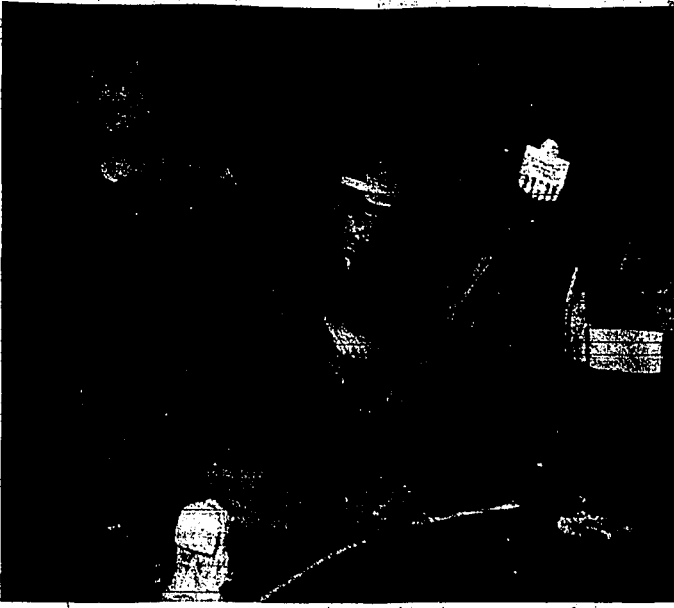

Simultaneous Fires Rout More Than 1,000 Guests From 2 Chicago Hotels

CHICAGO, July 17 (AP)—Simultaneous fires routed more than 1,000 guests from the neighboring Drake and Knickerbocker hotels today and authorities said at least one of the blazes was the work of an arsonist.

Carl Walter Braun, head of the fire department's arson squad, said the fire which drove 900 persons from the Drake hotel was touched off by an arsonist at two separate places. In the hotel's Walton room.

The fire's points of origin were draperies and a table at opposite sides of the room, Braun said. He said they appeared to have been started by matches.

Braun said it was not determined whether the fire at the Knickerbocker hotel across the street, which broke out a few minutes earlier, was also a case of arson.

One of the major reasons is the population shifts. White residents moved out as Negroes moved in.

Washington schools lowered racial barriers without trouble in 1954. Virtually all the schools had racially mixed student bodies.

Negroes then were in a slight majority. Now they comprise 83 percent of the enrollment, and a majority of the teacher staff.

An massive population shift followed.

From 36 per cent Negro in 1950, the capital went to 44 per cent in 1960 and an estimated 67 per cent now.

The population moves appear to be the main factor, Saunders said. "This is one of the reasons that NAACP must demand a better housing opportunity."

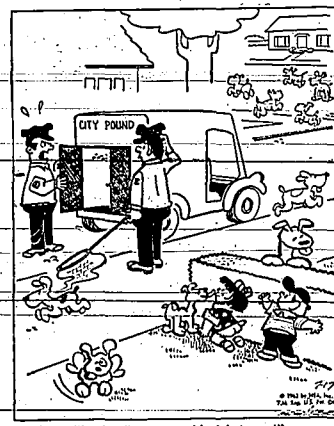
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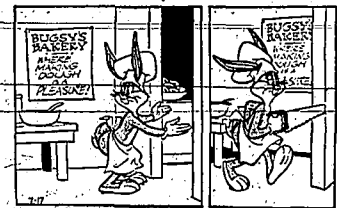
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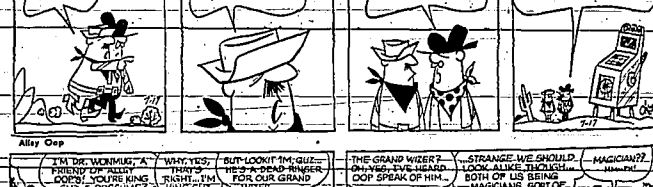
