

# Baton Rouge Schools Must Start Change

**BATON ROUGE, La., July 18**—The Baton Rouge parish school board must begin desegregation of schools this fall, U.S. District Judge Gordon West U.S. District Court judge ordered Wednesday the board's approved desegregation plan, beginning with the 12th grade, but ordered it to comply with the fall of 1969, rather than the fall of 1968 as planned by the board.

# Soviets Not Slowing Race, Aides Think

**WASHINGTON, July 18**—U.S. space authorities from President Kennedy on down take no stock in a British scientist's report that the Russians may abandon the "race" to the moon. American authorities are sure the Russians are driving to put men on the moon and, eventually, Mars, in any case, they noted. This is what the Russians themselves have been saying again and again.

Sir Bernard Lovell, Britain's famous radio astronomer—who had just returned home from three weeks in Russia, said Tuesday Soviet scientists were not convinced it was a good idea to send people to the moon.

In the lunar sweepstakes, he suggested the Americans are racing themselves and not the Russians.

Kennedy asked at his news conference yesterday about Lovell's statement, replied: "His information is not true." The President said the Soviet space capability is "substantial and here is a very obvious indication they are carrying on a major campaign and diverting greatly needed resources to their space effort."

"I think we ought to go right ahead with our own program and go to the moon before the end of this decade," Kennedy said.

# Princess to Study Away From Home

**LONDON, July 18**—Princess Anne, who has studied in England, is to study away from home at Buckingham Palace next year, will go away to school for the first time this fall.

The 17-year-old is a only daughter of Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip will attend the private Eton school in Kent. She teaches riding as well as ballet dancing to boarding school.

Princess Anne will be following the tradition-breaking footsteps of her mother, Princess Margaret, who was sent off to Gordonstoun school in Scotland last year. The same school attended by her father.

Up to now, Anne has received the same sort of education her mother and her aunt, Princess Margaret, received.

Palace sources said the decision to let Anne go to a public school was a difficult one for Queen Elizabeth, who maintained the traditional idea of a palace of education for children of the reigning family.

Princess Anne is said to be disappointed in the boarding school. The Eton school, which has 1,200 boys and 318 girls in total, is one of the 15 "houses" with 41 to 50 girls in each house under a house mistress. The princess will enter the fifth form.

Princess Anne will be the second of three girls of high school in the United States.

**Cardiac Station First-in-West**  
PORTLAND, Ore., July 18—The first cardiac telemetry station on the West coast and one of the first in the world is opened at St. Vincent hospital here yesterday.

The station used two "dynamic electrocardiographic" units which is available at only five institutions in the world, including Cape Canaveral in Florida.

The health organization in Portland is the first to use the new equipment to obtain by tape recording complete uninterrupted records of heart activity during periods of time and without interruption.

More information has previously been unobtainable.



### British Peers Vote to Shed Their Titles

LONDON, July 18 (AP)—British peers today voted to shed their titles in order to speed the day when they may become just plain citizens.

By an overwhelming vote of 100-25, the house of lords defeated a government bill and adopted a motion that probably will make the new peerage bill effective next month.

The bill that will enable the peerage to be a "commoner" and "retire" and regain the political advantages of a "commoner."

In Britain, earls, dukes and peer nobles are barred from the house of commons. But the peerage of the house of lords has been so trimmed in the past 30 years that a peer politician is in common.

By tradition, no peer can become prime minister. The vote last night would have made it possible for a peer to become prime minister.

Lord Hailsham, the former foreign secretary, was the only peer to vote against the bill. He said he could not vote for the job as long as the peerage was a privilege.

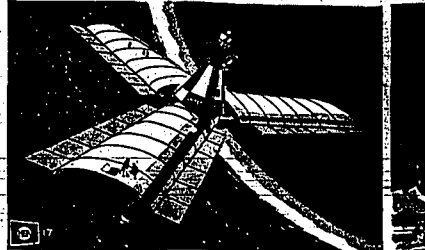

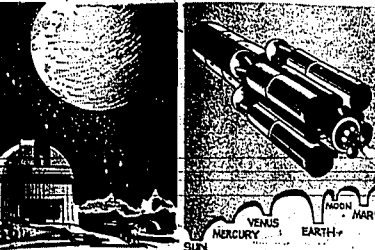

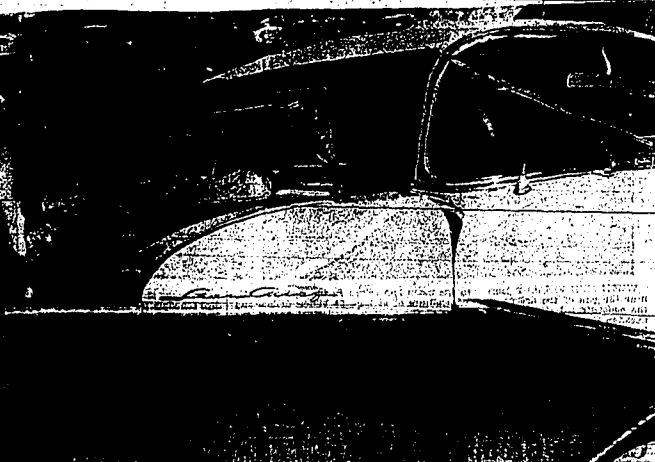

### Tax Asked to Help Close Payments Gap

WASHINGTON, July 18 (AP)—President Kennedy asked congress today to enact a temporary tax on foreign borrowing of U.S. capital in a stepped-up effort to close the growing balance of payments gap.

The President said the new dampdown was needed to help make further "inroads into the hard core of our continuing payments deficit."

Kennedy's recommendation, made in a special message to congress, was intended to add more authority to an interrelated effort to spend more dollars abroad than foreigners spend in this country.

The President proposed a program mixed with both old and new ideas for resolving the balance of payments dilemma—one of the most nagging economic problems facing the nation.

He urged renewed emphasis on previous drives to increase exports, promote U.S. tourism, and reduce overseas dollar expenditures by military and foreign aid.

Kennedy's bill on long-range payments outlook was hopeful, but that action must be taken quickly to replenish "our stockpile of arrangements... during our return to equilibrium."

The nation ended 1962 with a balance of payments deficit of 22 billion dollars, which amounted to an annual rate of 2.3 billion by March of this year. Government economists indicate the deficit is still climbing.

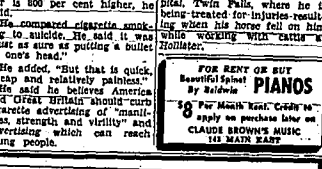

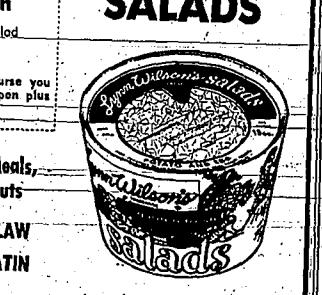

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### South Korean Demo Party Resumes Job

SEOUL, Korea, July 18 (AP)—The South Korean Democratic party, ousted from power and dissolved by a military coup just more than two years ago, resumed activities today.

The party pledged to fight for an end to military rule and restoration of constitutional civilian government.

Mrs. Park Boon-Chun was elected party president by unanimous vote. She had served as minister without portfolio in the cabinet of Premier John Y. Chang until the government was ousted by military officers May 16, 1961.

Chang attended the inaugural convention as an honored guest. A decree from the ruling junta bars him from rejoining the party.

When the gauzy, gray-haired premier entered the convention room at citizens' hall in Seoul, the 800 party delegates gave him a standing ovation.

The Democratic party thus became the third political party to be formally inaugurated since the formation of Park Chung Hee's government in 1948.

### Unpledged Elector Movement to Name President Seems Withering on Vine

WASHINGTON, July 18 (AP)—An unpledged elector movement aimed at forcing the choice of George Wallace by the house of representatives is faltering.

An Associated Press survey of 11 Southern states indicates that of only three—Mississippi, Alabama and South Carolina—does there appear to be any significant possibility that major party nominees might be denied electoral votes.

Even if the "thin lot" of 23 electoral votes of the three states were withheld—which doesn't seem likely—the action would be ineffective until the next election provided the closest electoral vote outcome since the Woodrow Wilson contest of 1916.

Woodrow Wilson won the presidency by a margin of 23 electoral votes.

Under the Constitution, the house selects the president only if none of the candidates receives a majority of the electoral votes. If the house rejects the verdict, each state delegation casts a single vote, regardless of the state's size.

Despite the closeness of the popular vote results in 1960, President Kennedy still would have been elected if the 23 had been tipped off his 303 electoral vote total. Election in 1964 will require a minimum of 27 electoral votes.

### Move Started to Keep Body Of Governors From Fighting

MIAMI BEACH, July 18 (AP)—Governors were being urged today to keep the national governors conference which starts Sunday from becoming a stormy battleground over the civil rights issue.

The issue which threw their 1962 conference into revolt again is prominent this year. But the governors will be asked at an opening session to adopt a rule requiring unanimous vote on all resolutions.

Alabama Gov. George Wallace and Arkansas Gov. Orval Faubus were reported leaving off to battle with New York Gov. Nelson Rockefeller over the hot civil rights issue.

Rockefeller says he plans to press the racial issue and lower the boom on states' rights during the four-day conference.

The governors are already arriving here well in advance of Sunday's opening session. Many of them are bringing their wives.

The rule change, if adopted, would not preclude informal discussion of the rights issue, and some mildly worded resolution acceptable both to the north and the south might come from the conference.

"Politicking" is also expected to be a big feature of the meeting. For years this has been the biggest unofficial business at the gathering.

The list of GOP hopefuls includes Rockefeller, Michigan's Gov. Romney and Pennsylvania's Gov. William Scranton.

Two other issues are expected to be prominent in the governor's coalition, informally if not officially.

One is health care for the aged and the other is the Supreme Court's recent decision outlawing religious services at public schools.

None of the issues which caused trouble last year was on the agenda. Nor are they this year.

This meeting is to debate such mild topics as international trade and economic development; science, technology and research; employment opportunities; operations of a governor's office; institutional correction and civil war education.

The host governor, Florida's Paris Bryant, said he also will try to introduce the tideland dispute and reiteration of Cuban coastal states to press for state ownership of oil-shores lands and he will ask the governor to help in the relocation of refugees.

Last year the conference split over civil rights—Southern governors threatened at one point to break from the meeting. The conference ends on Wednesday.

"You have an adjustment to make from the small ball back to the big ball, that's the device," he's hotter and the courses are different, that's all true," he said. "But if I received the correct word from the DGA, last year, didn't he after playing in Britain. How did that happen if it isn't possible? Rodgers was due off in today's first round just after the device (if such a thing is possible in day-after-day 100 degree heat) was off the fairways."

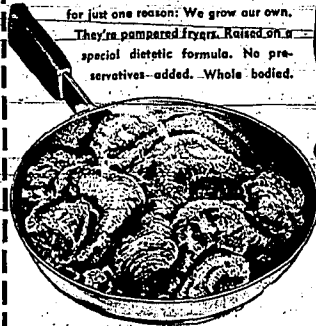

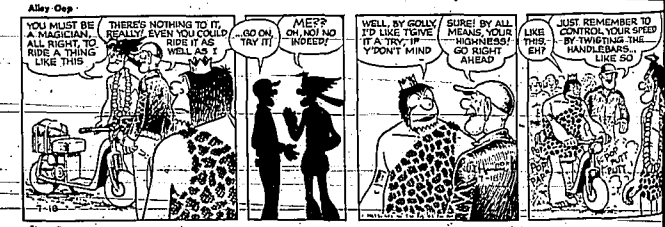

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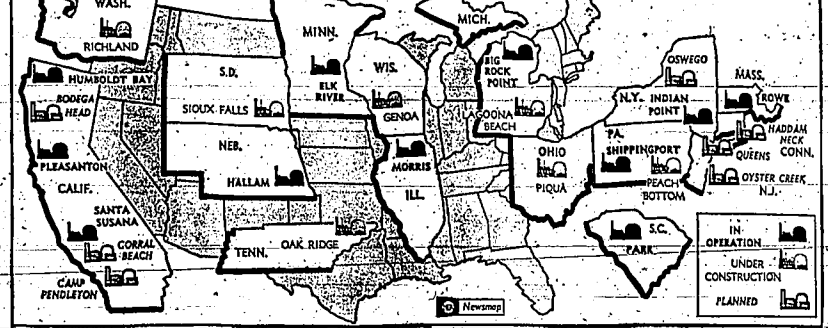
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# -NUCLEAR POWER PLANTS-

How the Atom Is Being Harnessed in America



OVER 20 YEARS since the first controlled nuclear chain reaction and six years after the first commercial reactor went into operation at Shippingport, Pa., atomic power plants are beginning to sprout over the face of America, as depicted on Newsmap, above. (One is also being built in Puerto Rico.) The plants range from a small 11,400-kilowatt plant in Plaquemine, La., to a one-million-kilowatt powerhouse planned for New York City. Buhl will be the first city in the nation to operate its own nuclear power plant station. The plant, built by Atomics-Interstate, will generate steam, which will then be piped to the municipal power plant where it will turn generators to manufacture electricity. Constant improvements are bringing atomic power competitively closer to conventional fuels. It will be fully competitive within five years, says the atomic energy commission, which is the source of cheap and abundant energy liberated from the atom.

# Epidemic Caused by Cracked Eggs Is Believed Contagious

WASHINGTON, July 18 (AP)—An outbreak of intestinal bacteria from cracked eggs has led public health service physicians to believe the disease may be contagious. Before the current epidemic, the bacteria, known as salmonella derby, was believed to emanate only from outside sources such as contaminated eggs. But Dr. Eugene Sanders of the public health service's communicable disease center in Atlanta, Ga., has reported there may be "strong evidence" that it may be contagious. "There is a reasonable possibility in some of the more recent cases that the bacteria has been spread from one person to another," he said. "We are now investigating this possibility." Sanders said all of the original cases reported in the epidemic stemmed from a common source. The PHIS said last week that there was enough evidence to indicate this common source was cracked eggs from a farm in an unidentified area. Sanders said: "But the large majority of cases now are secondary cases, transmitted from person to person." Sanders said. He said physicians at the disease center also were "quite excited" because for the first time they had "recovered some of the bacteria from the air" in hospitals where there were outbreaks. Sanders said. In his warning last week, the PHIS said persons who are ill, especially infants, the elderly and individuals suffering from intestinal diseases or malnutrition should not be fed raw or undercooked eggs. The current epidemic was first noted in hospitals in New York but soon spread to New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Massachusetts, it has continued to fan out since then. 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**Diplomats Rest at Geneva**  
**Awaiting Outcome of Talks**

GENEVA, July 18.—The diplomats who are waiting for the outcome of the Geneva disarmament conference which is now in its sixth week, taking it easy every time the United States and Britain negotiate for a possible test ban in Moscow.

Disarmament delegates who haven't gone home lack the sun which bathes beautiful Lake Geneva.

"I just came in to see what the news is from Moscow," says one of the British delegation officials.

Although resting, the "disarmers" also keep a careful finger on the pulse of the Moscow talks and find the news a good time to sum up what has been done and what the future holds.

"They consider the 16 months since the Geneva disarmament conference began—March 14, 1963—time well spent, despite the frustration."

Are the nuclear powers steadily reducing and keep working for general disarmament as well as a test ban as a major step forward?

If the Moscow negotiations have many more months of dead-end disarmament talk is predicted.

It is the task of the disarmament conference to see if it has succeeded in achieving in Moscow, disarmament delegator hope impetus and encouragement will be given for agreement on greater things in the future.

The disarmament problems are severe.

There are four areas of disarmament decision—a conventional weapons, nuclear weapons, nuclear delivery vehicles and also measures to reduce tension and prevent accidental war.

The first three run hand-in-hand and conventional disarmament appears less difficult than nuclear disarmament on the basis of what has been said and done in the past 16 months.

The West has proposed a first stage reduction of conventional weapons to 2.1 million men. The Soviet Union has proposed that 1.5 million men be retained. This is a million more men than are now on hand.

On nuclear delivery vehicles, the West proposes a first stage reduction of 30 per cent, a second stage reduction of 35 per cent and complete removal of the remaining 35 per cent in the third stage. This repeats the proposed method of nuclear weapons disarmament.

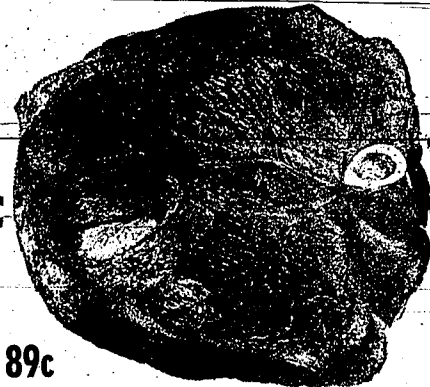

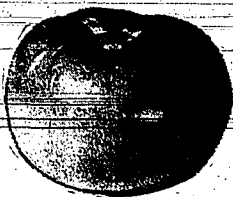

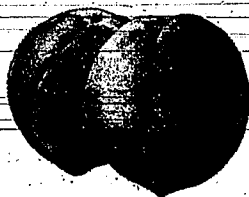
