





### Baton Rouge Schools Must Start Change

**BATON ROUGE, La., July 18**—The Baton Rouge parish school board must begin desegregation of schools this fall, U.S. District Judge Gordon West U.S. District Judge Gordon West approved yesterday the board's proposed desegregation plan, beginning with the 12th grade, but ordered it to be completed by the fall of 1959, rather than the fall of 1960 as planned by the board.

### Philosophy Of Church Helps School

**CEAR FALLS, Ia., July 18**—The National Education Association official investigating the Utah school crisis says the Mormon faith is a major role in the situation.

Dr. Oscar Thompson, professor of education at State College of Iowa, made the statement to 300 graduate students and educators Tuesday. Thompson, chairman of the NEA Commission on professional rights and responsibilities, which is investigating the Utah teacher crisis.

He referred to what he said was a Mormon philosophy of education which he said was being used for the children. And Thompson said probably more than 100,000 children are being taught the Utah teacher crisis.

The teacher and education officials are demanding an additional appropriation of 2.7 million dollars for the Utah teacher crisis.

The Utah Education Association asked for the NEA investigation.

Thompson said, "The complexity of the situation in Utah demands a study of the situation."

He said it will take his team about a year to investigate the Utah Education Association's charge of membership. But he said every effort will be made to reach a solution in the next few months.

Thompson said it appears the only possibility of any immediate, if temporary, solution is in the hands of a committee named by Gov. George H. W. Bush, who will decide whether to call a special legislative session.

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### Soviets Not Slowing Race, Aides Think

**WASHINGTON, July 18**—U.S. space authorities from President Kennedy on down take no stock in a British scientist's report that the Russians may abandon the "race" to the moon.

American authorities are sure the Russians are driving to put men on the moon and, eventually, Mars, in any case, they noted, this is what the Russians themselves have been saying again and again.

Sir Bernard Lovell, Britain's famous radio astronomer—who had just returned home from three weeks in Russia, said Tuesday Soviet scientists were not convinced it was a good idea to send people to the moon.

In the lunar sweepstakes, he suggested the Americans are racing themselves and not the Russians.

Kennedy asked at his news conference yesterday about Lovell's statement, replied: "His information is not true. The Soviet space capability is substantial and here is a very definite indication they are carrying on a major campaign and diverting greatly needed resources to their space effort."

"I think we ought to go right ahead with our own program and go to the moon before the end of this decade," Kennedy said.

Cardiac Station First-in-West

PORTLAND, Ore., July 18 (AP)—The first cardiac telemetry station on the West coast and one of the first in the world is opened at St. Vincent hospital here yesterday.

The station used two "dynamic electrocardiographic" units which are available at only five institutions in the world, including Cape Canaveral, Fla.

The health organization in Portland is the first to use the new equipment to obtain by tape recording complete uninterrupted records of heart activity during periods of time and without operation.

# British Peers Vote to Shed Their Titles

LONDON, July 18 (AP)—British peers in the House of Lords today voted to shed their titles and become citizens of the United Kingdom.

The vote, which was 105-25, was the first since 1925, the year the House of Lords was reformed. It is the first time since the peerage was created in 1066 that the House of Lords has voted to shed its titles.

The bill that will enable the peers to do this is expected to be introduced in the House of Commons in the next few days.



WHEN MEN FINALLY journey to the moon and return in the Apollo capsule, the end of the decade after expenditure of at least 20 billion dollars and the concentrated effort of a large part of the nation's intellectual energy, the question for national aeronautics and space administration will be: What next? There are three possibilities, said a permanent scientific space station in Earth orbit; building a permanent moon base and exploring the moon; manned flights to other planets.

But the earliest benefits to Earth-bound men, serving among other things, as a zero-gravity medical laboratory, weather research laboratory and distortion-free astronomical observatory. Scientists believe a moon base could be virtually self-sufficient, manufacturing oxygen and water from rocks, growing its own food in chemical gardens. The moon would be a much better platform for studying the universe than an Earth satellite. And

as a fueling station on interplanetary flights, it could cut years off NASA's tentative schedule for Mars and Venus "interplanetary travel." It is hardly likely that having reached the moon, men will stop there. Flight to the next planets will definitely occur before the end of the century. 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# Young Republican Leader Believes in Sen. Goldwater

WASHINGTON, July 18 (AP)—Donald E. (Bud) Lukens, elected Young Republican national chairman after a public convention of Sen. Barry Goldwater for president, pledged himself today to a neutral stand on political issues.

Lukens is a 30-year-old, 5-foot-10 1/2-inch veteran of seven years of overseas experience, much of it as a swimmer, diver, boxer and holds the "black belt" of the Judo-Karate system. He is a proficiency in judo and karate. His black hair is crew cut. His blue eyes are deep set and intense. He speaks five languages.

Q—Accounts of your convention appear to show the convention was mostly for Goldwater. Is that correct assessment?

A—That accounting of the convention, yes, I wouldn't agree with many others.

Q—And you yourself endorsed Goldwater? How can you be neutral now?

A—I can be neutral, simply by doing my job. The Federalist philosophy said a conservative Republican "will run better next year than a too candid, and predicted defeat of President Kennedy no matter who was the victor."

Lukens, a bachelor from Xenia, O., is a self-styled "amateur" newsworker. He politics. He won the chairmanship of the Young Republican federation in San Francisco last month after what he conceded was a "tempestuous" convention and what his predecessors called a "nightmare" session at which opponents were called to keep order.

In his campaign for the two-year office Lukens, who previously had won chairmanship of the federation's District of Columbia unit, publicly committed himself to Goldwater; advocated repeal of the income tax and called for withdrawal of the United States from the United Nations.

Lukens, whose campaign and election prompted some concern among senior Republicans about the GOP image, projected from the Young Republican convention, said nobody in the party hierarchy had contacted him. And he said he had not been contacted by friendly cooperation at party headquarters here.

# Harding Praises Decision to Hold Bill on Potatoes

WASHINGTON, July 18 (AP)—Rep. Hal Harding, D., Idaho, praised a decision of the House Agriculture committee holding for further study a bill that would authorize an acreage control program on Irish potatoes.

# Burns Creek Bill Written By Committee

WASHINGTON, July 18 (AP)—A controversial Burns Creek dam project which has been before congress for a decade has finally been written into a substantial bill by the senate public works committee.

The 32 million dollar Snake River development, proposed for near as a recreation project in the house and senate interior committees, was added to the annual house-passed bill Wednesday.

Opponents of the project contended that it would destroy the 1600 cunibus bill which contained navigation and flood control projects in the region. Burns Creek and several other controversial projects were eliminated and the bill was passed.

Burns creek, which would produce some electricity and also generate some recreation activity for the Palisades dam upstream, also has been opposed by private power groups.

# Circus Acrobat Killed in Plunge

SALEM, Ore., July 18 (AP)—A 33-year-old circus acrobat fell 21 feet to his death during a performance at a circus here yesterday before a crowd of some 3,000 persons.

The audience which saw Mrs. Arthur Duchek fall was not aware the fall was fatal. She toppled from a high wire during an act billed as the "cosmos."

The show went on while Mrs. Duchek was carried behind the scenes. A doctor said she received a broken neck.

# Explosion Rips N. J. Apartment

JERSEY CITY, N.J., July 18 (AP)—An explosion ripped off the corner of a four-story apartment building, tearing through a row of living rooms from the first floor to the roof Wednesday night.

Eight residents of the building were taken to a hospital where three were detained in serious condition from burns. Ten to 15 others were treated for minor injuries at the scene. There were no deaths.

# Lesson on Health Given at DeLo

DELO, Wis., July 18 (AP)—Mrs. Josephine DeLo, a 40-year-old mother of five, held the first meeting Tuesday night in Birmingham, which has been ordered to substitute a school desegregation plan in August.

J. Vernon Patrick, an attorney who has helped lead the residential suburb of Westview, presided in a courtroom on the main floor of the DeLo family court house. With him up front were six or seven PEP leaders who had hoped to attract a crowd sympathetic to keeping schools open, even if desegregated.

# Amount of DDT Said Harmless

WASHINGTON, July 18 (AP)—A government pesticide inspector has told congress that DDT has been found in every meat analyzed. This could mean that the amount in the animal, and for the meat, is harmless.

Dr. Hayes, public health services (PHS) toxicologist, told a senate subcommittee yesterday that the amount of DDT in their body fat is some 10 times as much as in the annual U. S. death rate as to pesticides is about one per one million persons.



### Chamber Aide Urges Cut in Defense Fund

WASHINGTON, July 18 (AP)—A U. S. Chamber of Commerce spokesman urged congress today to cut 22 billion dollars from President Kennedy's \$23 billion dollar defense appropriation request.

### Tax Asked to Help Close Payments Gap

WASHINGTON, July 18 (AP)—President Kennedy asked congress today to enact a temporary tax on foreign borrowing of U.S. capital in a stepped-up effort to close the growing balance of payments gap.

The President said the new dampdown was needed to help make further "inroads into the hard core of our continuing payments deficit."

Kennedy's recommendation, made in a special message to congress, was intended to add more authority to an interrelated effort to reduce the deficit which began this week with the raising of short-term interest rates.

A payments deficit develops when U.S. citizens and the federal government spend more dollars abroad than foreigners spend in this country. The result is a growing U.S. gold stock.

The President proposed a program mixed with both old and new ideas for resolving the balance of payments dilemma—one of the most nagging economic problems facing the nation.

He urged renewed emphasis on previous drives to increase exports, promote U.S. tourism, and reduce dollar expenditures by military and foreign aid.

Kennedy's bill on long-range payments outlook was hopeful, but that action must be taken quickly to replenish "our stockpile of arrangements..." during our return to equilibrium.

The nation ended 1962 with a balance of payments deficit of 22 billion dollars, which amounted to an annual rate of 2.3 billion by March of this year. Government economists indicate the deficit is still climbing.

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### South Korean Demo Party Resumes Job

SEOUL, Korea, July 18 (AP)—The South Korean Democratic party, ousted from power and dissolved by a military coup just more than two years ago, resumed activities today. It pledged to fight for an end to military rule and restoration of constitutional civilian government.

Mrs. Park Boon-Chun was elected party president by unanimous vote. She had served as minister without portfolio in the cabinet of Premier John Y. Chang until the government was ousted by military officers May 16, 1961.

Chang attended the inaugural convention as an honored guest. A decree from the ruling junta bars him from rejoining the old party.

When the gauzy, gray-haired ex-premier entered the convention room at citizens' hall in downtown Seoul, the 800 party delegates gave him a standing ovation.

The Democratic party thus became the third political party to be formally inaugurated since the formation of Park Chung Hee's government. Park Chung Hee permitted resumption of political activities.

### Unpledged Elector Movement to Name President Seems Withering on Vine

Unpledged elector movement to name President seems withering on vine. The Associated Press reported that the movement is fading.

But Democratic politicians outside their states — and some within — Wallace are wary of being regarded as a rival of Kennedy's bid for reelection.

WASHINGTON, July 18 (AP)—An unpledged elector movement aimed at forcing the choice of George Wallace as president by the house of representatives is withering on the political vine in Dixie.

An Associated Press survey of 11 Southern states indicates that of only three—Mississippi, Alabama and South Carolina—does there appear to be any significant possibility that major party nominees might be denied electoral votes.

Even if the "thin lot" of 23 electoral votes of the three states were withheld — which doesn't seem likely — the action would be ineffective until the next election provided the closest electoral vote outcome since the Woodrow Wilson contest of 1916.

Woodrow Wilson won the presidency by a margin of 23 electoral votes.

Under state law, party conventions could not put loyalists and unpledged delegates on after the national convention nominates their presidential candidates. The delegation which would be dropped from the general election ballot, it could petition its voters that ballot put could not use the party emblem.

Mississippi gave 10 electoral votes to the States Rights ticket headed by Strom Thurmond in 1948. In eight unpledged elector votes for Ben Harry E. Byrd, D., Va., in 1960.

Alabama-Wallace has urged Dixie Democrats to join in setting the stage for a candidate from movement by the States Rights ticket.

Despite the closeness of the popular vote results in 1960, President Kennedy still would have been elected if 23 had been tugged off his 303 electoral vote total. Election in 1964 will require a minimum of 270 electoral votes.

Alphonsus J. Spakman and Lister E. Gov. Ross Barnett of Mississippi are expected to support the na-

tion Democratic ticket, as are several house members. Alabama gave 11 electoral votes to the 1948 States Rights ticket. It split its 1000 votes, giving Kennedy five and Sen. Harry E. Byrd, D., Va., six.

South Carolina—E. P. Riley, Democratic state chairman, thinks it's too early to predict whether there will be an unpledged elector movement in the state.

J. Drake Edens, Republican state chairman, said history has proved that unpledged electors may "offer some attraction in theory" but never work out.

When Thurmond was governor and headed the States Rights ticket in 1948, he got 39 electoral votes including South Carolina's eight. The state went to Kennedy in 1960.

North Carolina—Dirt Bennett, Democratic state chairman, says the unpledged elector movement is a "realistic North Carolina way of doing things."

Robert Gavlin, who recently resigned as Republican state chairman, observed, "I think the fight in 1964 is going to be between the regular Republican and the regular Democratic party."

North Carolina always has voted with either the Democratic or Republican parties.



# -NUCLEAR POWER PLANTS-

How the Atom Is Being Harnessed in America



OVER 20 YEARS since the first controlled nuclear chain reaction and six years after the first commercial reactor went into operation at Shippingport, Pa., atomic power plants are beginning to sprout over the face of America, as depicted on Newsmap, above. (One is also being built in Puerto Rico.) The plants range from a small 11,400-kilowatt plant in Plaquemine, La., to a one-million-kilowatt powerhouse planned for New York City. Buhl will be the first city in the nation to operate its own nuclear power plant station. The plant, built by Atomics-Interstate, will generate steam, which will then be piped to the municipal power plant where it will turn generators to manufacture electricity. Constant improvements are bringing atomic power competitively closer to conventional fuels. It will be fully competitive within five years, says the atomic energy commission, which is the source of cheap and abundant energy liberated from the atom.

# Epidemic Caused by Cracked Eggs Is Believed Contagious

**WASHINGTON**, July 18 (AP)—An outbreak of intestinal bacteria from cracked eggs has led public health service physicians to believe the disease may be contagious.

Before the current epidemic, the bacteria, known as salmonella derby, was believed to emanate only from outside sources such as contaminated eggs.

But Dr. Eugene Sanders of the public health service's communicable disease center in Atlanta, Ga., has reported there may be "strong evidence" that it may be contagious.

"There is a reasonable possibility in some of the more recent cases that the bacteria has been spread from one person to another," he said. "We are now investigating this possibility."

Sanders said all of the original cases reported in the epidemic stemmed from a common source. The PHIS said last week that there was enough evidence to indicate this common source was cracked eggs from a farm in an unidentified area.

"But the large majority of cases now are secondary cases, transmitted from person to person," Sanders said.

He said physicians at the disease center also were "quite excited" because for the first time they had "recovered some of the bacteria from the air" in hospitals where there were outbreaks.

The epidemic first gained widespread public attention when the public health service issued a warning against eating cracked or uncracked eggs, especially if they were not thoroughly cooked.

The PHIS warning said more than 775 cases of salmonella derby had been reported in 23 states and the District of Columbia since March.

"At least 20 new cases have been reported since the warning was issued last week," Sanders said. "There is every evidence that the epidemic is continuing." The bacteria cause dysentery and can cause death. At least 16 deaths have been reported among persons who contracted the bacteria while suffering from other diseases.

In its warning last week, the PHIS said persons who are ill, especially infants, the elderly and individuals suffering from intestinal diseases or malnutrition should not be fed raw or undercooked eggs.

The current epidemic was first noted in hospitals in New York but soon spread to New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Massachusetts, it has continued to fan out since then.







# Diplomats Rest at Geneva

## Awaiting Outcome of Talks

GENEVA, July 18 (AP)—The diplomats who are waiting for the outcome of the Geneva disarmament conference which is now in a six-week recess, taking it easy here while the United States and Britain negotiate for a possible test ban in Moscow. Disarmament delegates who haven't gone home relax in the sun and the shade of beautiful Lake Geneva.

"I just came in to see what the news is from Moscow," says one of the British delegation officials.

Although resting, the "diplomats" also keep a careful finger on the pulse of the Moscow talks and find the recess a good time to sum up on what has been done and what the future holds.

"They consider the 10 months since the Geneva disarmament conference began—March 14, 1963—time well spent, despite the frustration."

"Aren't the nuclear powers waiting the neutral diplomat said.

If the Moscow negotiations fail, many more months of dead-end disarmament talk is predicted. But if the talks are successful, it is expected that the United States and Britain will be able to agree on greater things in the future.

The disarmament problems are severe.

There are four areas of disarmament decision—a conventional weapons, nuclear weapons, nuclear delivery vehicles and also measures to reduce tension and prevent accidental war.

The first three run hand-in-hand and conventional disarmament is the most difficult part of the deal that has been said and agreed in the past 10 months.

The West has proposed a first stage reduction of conventional weapons to 2.1 million men. The Soviets have proposed that 1.5 million men be retained. This is the most difficult part of the deal.

On the removal of nuclear weapons, things are more complicated.

Basically, the West proposes in the first stage a reduction of 50 per cent of these weapons by 1968, and a complete removal of the remaining 50 per cent in the third stage. This includes the proposed method of nuclear weapons disarmament.






