Railroads Asked To Delay 30 Days On Work Rules

WASHINGTON, July 24 (AP)—Chairmen Orr Harris, D. Ark., of the house commerce committee, asked the nation's railroads today to hold off for another 30 days on new work rules they propose to put into effect on Aug. 1. Harris said Congress will not enact legislation to avert a strike by that time. Harris asked for an answer within 24 hours. He addressed his request to Daniel P. Loomis, president of the Association of American Railroads, at a hearing on the railroad work rules before the committee opened hearings on President Kennedy's plan to have the interstate commerce commission consider work rules for train crewmen.

Loomis said he couldn't give a yes or no answer but that the railroads would consider the appeal.

Railroad management has endorsed the Kennedy proposal to put the controversy before the ICC but there is union opposition.

H. E. Gilbert, head of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers, told a news conference in St. Louis "the union side of the unions involved are all opposed."

"Each action would set the interlocking committee up as a labor court," he said.

"This would be only the first step toward a national labor court throughout the country. I've seen labor courts in action and they're a disaster," he said.

A spokesman here for the five brotherhoods told newsmen he "hasn't seen any formal group statement on the Kennedy proposal until union representatives today and the railroad side of the unions involved are all opposed."

Loomis added another point: "The interstate commerce commission is 'the life blood of an antitrust industry' which already has been delayed and this has continued for some four years," Loomis said.

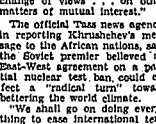

Khrushchev Calls For Nuclear-Free Africa in Talks

MOSCOW, July 24 (UPI)—Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev today pledged to "go on doing everything" to ease international tensions and called for a nuclear-free Africa in a move that could lead to further high-level East-West talks. Khrushchev's latest potential "cold war" peace bid came as American, British and Soviet officials met here to discuss a partial nuclear test moratorium agreement. Observers said the agreement—originally expected to be initiated to help settle a dispute over the Bay of Pigs—has been delayed by protocol differences, including the wording and who would initiate each of the world's major nuclear powers.

Scientists Comfortable In "Flight"

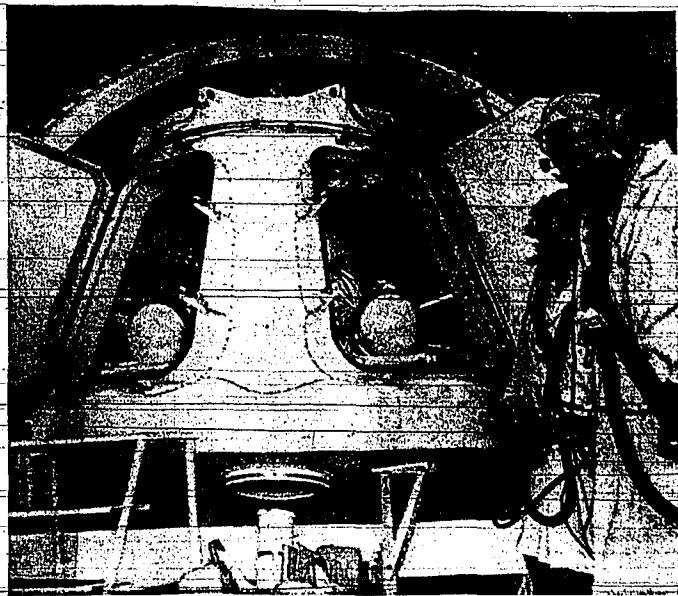
LOS ANGELES, July 24 (AP)—Scientists who have the first practical demonstration of a mock-up version of the Gemini space capsule were so comfortable during the simulated flight "as would have been in our own living room."

The Gemini spacecraft is designed to orbit the Earth for a period of up to two weeks in 1968 and to the forenoon of the 1965 as the forerunner of the three-man Apollo moonship. The two-hour flight yesterday was made in a large high altitude chamber which simulated the conditions of space.

The purpose of the test was to determine man's capability with an environmental control system which keeps him comfortable in space.

Two scientists made the "flight" in the Mercury space capsule. Each could regulate ventilation to suit himself with a new apparatus. The main improvement over the Mercury project—Bell—was a new electric blanket of his own.

The test included simulated launch, orbital flight, re-entry and post-landing conditions.

U. N. Marks 13th Year in Korea

SEOUL, Korea, July 24 (AP)—The 13th anniversary of the United Nations command in Korea celebrated its 13th anniversary today, still guarding the longest, still in history.

But it is a shrunken command that the United States is having a tough time keeping together. Of the 18 countries which sent combat units to Korea in the part-days of the Korean war only two besides the United States still maintain troops in Korea.

These two countries are Thailand and Turkey and they only have a combined total of about 600 troops among the 600,000 that make up the UNC. The rest—built—are Americans and the UNC headquarters in Seoul.

According to informed diplomatic sources, it is a constant battle for the United States to persuade Thailand and Turkey to maintain even their tiny contingents.

The other countries "pulled their troops out long ago. Now, only about 10 even bother to maintain small liaison offices at the UNC headquarters in Seoul.

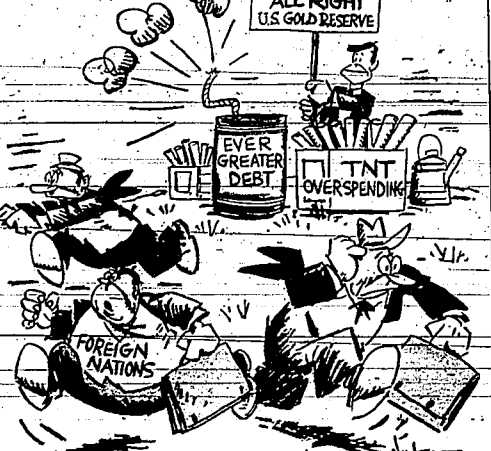

The Nixons walked along the grim street, peering at the ugly anti-refugee wall, the bricked-up windows and the Vopo (communist police) guards on the eastern side.

Bomb Disposal Job Starts For Mysterious "Thing"

LONDON, July 24 (AP)—Army experts said today they are tackling a "normal bomb disposal job" the mysterious "thing" beneath Roy Blanchard's Willshire farm.

"The character of the 'thing' has caused some controversy here. Whatever it is, it left an eight foot wide crater with a small hole in the middle in Blanchard's barley fields.

Blanchard, who says he thinks the crater was created by a flying saucer, has said whatever it was caused his barley and potatoes to disappear and apparently scorched one of his cows. The cow began shedding its skin about the time he discovered the saucer-shaped crater, according to Blanchard.

The army says its instruments show that the thing gives off a metallic reading. They are digging to find out what lies under the crater.

But an army spokesman em-

phasized no positive finding has been made yet. He said the readings "indicating metal" beneath the crater "could come from anything—an old bomb, a shell, anything at all."

"We just don't know at the moment," he said.

Others have speculated the crater might have been formed by a shower of meteorites. The London Daily Sketch reported today that one army expert indicated he thought the hole might have been made when a World War II bomb exploded after deteriorating for 20 years.

Yesterday a man who identified himself as an Australian scientist named Robert Randall showed up and claimed the crater was made by a spacecraft from the Dracnis. But a check of Australian officials in London failed to turn up anybody who knew Randall.

"We may block truck entrances if we have enough people on hand," he said.

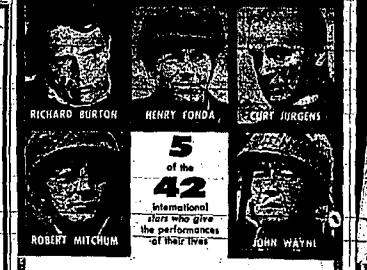

On that occasion he announced he was vetoing British admission to the European Common market and sharply rejected President Kennedy's policies on nuclear arms.

The sources said this time de Gaulle would be "constructive and friendly" in his remarks about the United States.

They said he would make clear his readiness for high level talks to smooth over the political and military problems which caused a crisis between the United States and France.

Although the French leader is widely expected to specifically refer to the situation in Washington, the sources said, his aim would be to prepare the groundwork for an improved relationship.

The subjects of de Gaulle news conferences always are well prepared in advance by means of planned questions arranged with French newsmen. Other questions are actually filed out. The sources said de Gaulle will review the world situation in the light of the Moscow "talks" break over communists world leadership and the conclusion of a limited nuclear test ban agreement.

Portugal Invites Critics to Visit Its Territories

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., July 24 (AP)—Portugal today invited Tunisia, Liberia, Sierra Leone and Madagascar—African "observators" of changed admission in the security council—to observe conditions for themselves in its territories in Africa.

Portuguese Foreign Minister Alberto Franco Nogueira issued the invitation at the end of a four-hour speech to the security council in which he denied charges made against Portugal's policy in its overseas territories.

Nogueira scathingly disposed of allegations made yesterday by Soviet Ambassador Nikolai T. Fedorov, who demanded the "liquidation" of Portugal's African empire by the end of 1953.

Hungary's Leaders Work on Individualism Under Reds

BUDAPEST, Hungary, July 24 (AP)—Hungary's red masters are working on the task of reconciling the undoubted individualism of their people with the harsh laws of life under communism.

The outcome will show how far the regime can go on the road toward liberalization.

It may affect Soviet Premier Khrushchev's battle for peaceful coexistence, opposed by the Red Chinese ideology of world revolution by war.

Initial outward success is reflected in a decrease of individual freedom and economic progress nearly unparalleled in the communist bloc. It was obviously this that prompted Khrushchev to summon Janos Kadar, Hungarian premier and party boss, and parade him in Moscow as a model pupil of the Soviet school of communism.

Some Westerners readily testify to the efforts of the Kadar regime to build "a socialist society" and erase the stigma which the Soviet crushing of the 1953 revolution impressed on Kadar and his followers.

U. N. Secretary-General U. Thant after his recent visit to Hungary, complimented Kadar on the stability of the country and its improved standard of living.

Former U. S. Vice President Richard M. Nixon was impressed by the frankness with which Hungarians criticized the regime.

In granting the people so much leeway, Kadar is obviously playing on the innate liberalism of Hungarians and their fierce national pride. He knows there is hardly another way to make his people believe "the Soviet Union, whose armies suppressed Hungarian rebels in 1948—and USSR, is Hungary's best friend."

Kadar's philosophy led him to form a brand of communism specifically safe from straying into the sinister zone on the extreme right and left. This theme is, "he who is not against us is with us."

Rockefeller Will Go to California

ALBANY, N.Y., July 24 (AP)—Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller's office said today he will go to northern California this weekend on a "social visit."

A spokesman said Rockefeller, potential candidate for the Republican presidential nomination, will visit his old alma mater, the University of California, north of San Francisco. He will fly Friday from New York City and return on Sunday.

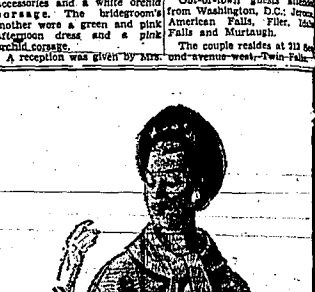

Reds Distort U.S. Policy, Jews Charge

NEW YORK, July 24 (AP) — Jewish organizations have charged that the Soviet government was guilty of "distorting" American anti-communism in the United States.

The charge was made yesterday in an open letter to Khrushchev, official organ of the Soviet government, signed by A. ... president of the American Jewish committee, Dr. Joseph ... president of the American Jewish congress, and ... president of B'nai B'rith.

The three groups said the Soviets had made the distortion of policy in order to divert world attention from the other anti-communist policy of prejudice and discrimination against its own Jewish population.

According to Bombardier, Prinz and Katz, anti-Semitism in the United States today is a "historic" level in American history.

The Jewish leaders said that in the United States they have the right to freely criticize and combat imperfections, to make demands of our leaders and our government, to change institutions and the climate of opinion.

It was said in the Soviet Jewish Jews "are deprived of official policy of religious and cultural activities in all other countries and groups in the country here" and that "Jews are the victims of discrimination in the USSR and in basic sectors of employment."

Further, said the Jewish protesters, "For years the anti-Jewish press (which is admittedly controlled by the government) has conveyed to the world a viciously negative image of the Jew, drawn in all the traditional anti-Semitic stereotypes."

In the last two years, they added, "The ominous impact of the 'new' campaign, which has targeted the Jew as a 'super-race' has led to the isolation and alienation of the Jew, aggravated by a systematic campaign against his economic status, for which the Jews have been held as the scapegoat."

Soviet's Current Cooperation May Be Just "New Zigzag up Mountain"

NEW YORK, July 24 (REAP) — Moscow's charge that Khrushchev has abandoned the Marxist-Leninist strategy "is not fighting about anything," the Russians asked the Chinese. "We are united by a common struggle for the victory of communism. We have the same aim, the same aspirations and hopes."

Lenin, the creator of Russian communism, once compared the Chinese war against domestic reaction to an attempt to climb an unexplored mountain. It might be necessary, he said, to bring organized aggression from time to time or even to abandon the route to the mountain if they had first chosen when to better one have into view.

But Lenin cautioned the faithful not to forget that, whatever the route, their final aim must be the destruction of Western democracy.

Isn't that what Khrushchev and his parliament meant when they wrote in their recent letter to Mao "we not only believe in the inevitable destruction of capitalism but we are also doing everything for this to be accomplished by way of the class struggle as soon as possible?"

In Red doubletalk "capitalism" means, of course, democratic society, especially the United States.

The Soviet rulers, unlike the Chinese, obviously believe that advice and execute another zigzag in foreign policy in order to bring about the destruction of Western institutions.

No doubt about it, as their letter makes it "empty" rear they fear America's nuclear might. They want to avoid a general war. They hope to "destroy capitalism" through the use of the version and "limited" wars of national liberation.

Here is how the Russians said to the Chinese: "There will be wars of liberation as long as imperialism exists. These are revolutionary wars. But wars are not only permissible but even unavoidable. Therefore it is only through struggle, including armed struggle, that the peoples can win their freedom and independence."

In the view of specialists on communism, the Kremlin's letter to the Chinese is, in effect, Nikita Khrushchev's "Mein Kampf." As in the case of Hitler's "Mein Kampf," it reveals Russia's true "aims," "motivations" and hopes—the ultimate destruction of democratic society through armed revolution.

Why, then, should the West fall into Khrushchev's trap and give him an opportunity to pose as a smiling and jovial man of peace? Why choose sides in the conflict between Russia and China? Why create the illusion that Khrushchev's dictatorship is more "reasonable" than Mao's? The philosopher George Santayana once said that "men who do not learn from history are doomed to repeat it."

Burely this is not the time for the West to learn from history, are doomed to repeat it.

It is a historic opportunity to strengthen the P.C.O. alliance, inject some vigor into the ailing Alliance for Progress and spur the growth of democracy in the undeveloped nations of Asia, Africa and Latin America.

Ceylon Hit By U.S. Over Oil Firms

WASHINGTON, July 24 (AP)—The United States today accused the government of Ceylon of waffling on its promise not to drive private American oil companies entirely out of the country.

The U. S. statement, issued by the State department, was prompted by the Ceylon government's introduction in parliament last Wednesday of a bill which would turn over to a government corporation all internal distribution of petroleum products.

Ceylon last year set up 25 percent of its petroleum facilities of the two American companies there, Caltex and Standard Oil, and so far has failed to pay compensation.

The United States earlier this year cut off its aid program to Ceylon under a congressional mandate requiring such action within a certain period when U. S. private property is seized without adequate compensation.

The State department said Ceylon's decision to nationalize the petroleum industry was regrettable because:

"This action is at variance with assurances given earlier by the government of Ceylon that a certain period would be paid to the American companies for their properties which were taken over in 1952."

The State department said the United States would continue efforts to obtain compensation for the fair value of the properties seized in 1952.

Eye Damage Is Reported From Eclipse

DAYTON, O., July 24 (AP)—A case of serious eye damage from an eclipse that occurred last week-end, was reported here Tuesday when Paul Lewis, 23, consulted an ophthalmologist.

Scar damage was found and Lewis was referred to the clinic at Ohio State university in Columbus. Lewis said the damage was "terrible. I have kind of a blank spot when I look at things."

A "victim" was Larry Davis, 20, Dayton, a journalism student at Ohio State, who was examined at a hospital here. No permanent damage to his eyes was found, however.

Lewis said he was wearing sun glasses Saturday and looked at the eclipse for five minutes periods for a total of 15 minutes.

Base Hospital Readied for Mrs. Kennedy

WASHINGTON, July 24 (AP)—A wing of the base hospital at Oia air force base, Mass., has been specially prepared as a maternity suite for Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy at a cost of more than \$12,000.

It was understood that the facilities were set up for Mrs. Kennedy to have her baby next month at the hospital, 18 miles from her summer home at Hyannis Port, if she should decide against returning to Washington for the birth.

Original plans were for the first lady to go to Walter Reed Army hospital here. This still has not been ruled out, but the arrangements are being made for her care at Oia AFB on an "if needed" basis.

The wing being reserved for Mrs. Kennedy was reported to contain seven or eight rooms, connected by a corridor to the main hospital building. Her room would be about 100 feet from the delivery room.

The suite includes a room for the President, which is said to have bullet-proof windows. Other features are a special kitchen, nursery, a medical room, and a doctor's room.

The bed for Mrs. Kennedy was described as the standard military hospital type, but other furnishings were reported to be more elaborate. Among them are color television receivers.

The wing, which has not been in recent use, was repainted and redecorated. One source put the total cost at more than \$12,000.

Gilbert voiced opposition to President Kennedy's latest formula for solving the rails dispute. He led a news conference Tuesday to turn the interests into a

mercer commission (ICC) into a labor court.

"Once the railroads of this nation know that their employes do indeed have the power and right to exercise self help, we can expect an attitude of engagement at the bargaining table," Gilbert said.

"Turn us loose and a four year dispute will be settled in less than four hours."

Of the President's proposal, Gilbert said "It is difficult for me to come to any other conclusion but that compulsion is indicated."

He added that the business background of ICC members in-

dicated they might not be "completely unbiased."

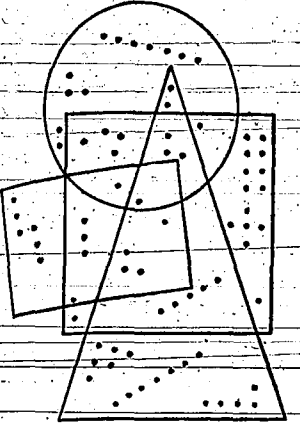

Chances of Thurston Morton For GOP Top Spot Pondered

Morton's name—What are the chances that Sen. Thurston Morton might be named GOP national chairman in 1964? The former GOP national chairman has been mentioned in the past by several GOP leaders. From his reelection in 1962, Morton has been mentioned in the following ways:

WASHINGTON, July 24 (AP)—Sen. Rogers C. B. Morton, R-Mo., said today he feels his reelection in 1962 has given him a "real excellent chance" of being the Republican presidential nominee in 1964.

The Maryland congressman acknowledged that the brothers had discussed the suggestion with former President Dwight D. Eisenhower and others, but that the senator was a darkhorse possibility for the GOP nomination.

"I think he would be a candidate if he were approached right," said the towering, 6-foot-7-inch Rogers Morton. "Of course, we're so close and we've talked things over for so many years that it's awfully easy for me to second guess him on his plans. But I think he's got a real excellent chance, with nearly 20 years experience in government to his credit."

The senator, former GOP national chairman, was asked on a recent television show, "How dark a horse are you?"

"Just about midnight," he quipped. "I'm certainly not anything." He added that he had been reelected only last fall to a second one-year term in the senate and was looking forward to serving there.

His brother, laughed at that reaction.

"Well, I've never seen a man who was nominated who would not accept the job, have you?" the congressman asked.

The Morton brothers have been allied in politics and business for many years.

Thurston, a congressman served as finance chairman of the Kentucky Republican party from 1947-51. He was active in Thurston Morton's campaigns when he served in the house before the two brothers joined in one of the earlier frozen food products, biscuits in the can.

The biscuits (Bisc) were named for their late mother, Mary Ballard Morton.

Morton moved from Kentucky to the eastern shore of Maryland in 1952 and became active in politics again in 1960, when he helped manage the unsuccessful campaign of Rep. Edward T. Miller.

Morton decided to run for the house from Maryland last year. He faced tough general election opposition from Rep. Thomas F. Johnson, a Democrat who had unseated Miller.

Morton won handily after Johnson was indicted on charges of influence peddling.

"Turning from his broad-based presidential position, Representative Morton viewed with grave concern the racist problems in his home district which include Cambridge, Md.

"If the news media would stop their racist outbursts over there, the Negro and white demonstrators would calm down and an equitable solution could be reached," Morton contended.

He said the demonstrators "were originally good . . . they produced a sobering effect on the white people," made them think.

"But it seems to me," Morton went on, "this entire business is being kept alive for ulterior reasons not genuine to Cambridge. If the press would pull their fat out of their story would fall flat on its face."

He said generally supported the administration's civil rights package with the exception of the proposal to ban discrimination in hotels, restaurants and other private business serving the public.

"That would amount to police tactics and I can't buy that," he said.

A sea-going tug, escorted by a coast cutter, was towing the straggled homnor at about five knots toward New York. The damaged San Juan from Wilmington, Del., was proceeding under its own steam and was expected to reach New York Tuesday.

Request for Air Officer Refused

WASHINGTON, July 24 (AP)—The United States Air Force has refused a request for return of a "flying major" who deserted to Germany recently to a training plane with his own two children.

Official sources said yesterday that the state department last week by the air embassy in Bonn for the return of Maj. Richard J. O'Connell, a pilot who had not returned the major even under terms of the extradition treaty between the two nations and that those did not appear to apply in this case.

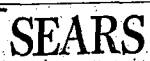

Witness Says Business Will Welcome Law

WASHINGTON, July 24 (AP)—Undersecretary of Commerce Franklin D. Roosevelt, Jr. testified yesterday that "big" and "large" oil business, North and South, will welcome legislation to ban racial discrimination in places of public accommodation.

He presented data compiled by the commerce department to show what he termed the "adverse effect of racial discrimination in public accommodations on interstate commerce."

But aside from the business effects, he told the senate commerce committee, the legislation is necessary because "discriminatory practices are inconsistent with our Democratic ideals."

The bill, applying to "hotels, motels, restaurants, stores and other privately owned establishments serving the public and having a substantial effect on interstate commerce, is a key part of President Kennedy's civil rights program.

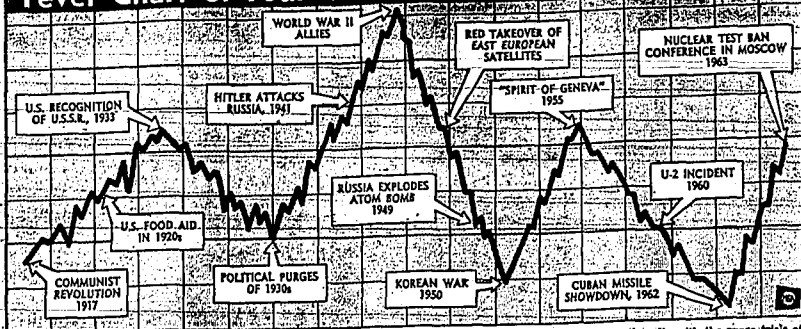
At the outset of today's hearing, Sen. Norris Cotton, R., N.H., raised the question of how the commerce committee is going to handle both the public accommodations bill and the measure submitted by Kennedy Monday to avoid a full shutdown in the dispute over work rules.

"Are we going to recess the hearings on civil rights to devote full time to the railroad bill or are we going to try to carry one on each shoulder?" asked Cotton, top GOP member of the committee.

An executive session was set up to make that decision.

THE EAGLE AND THE BEAR. Since the Bolshevik Revolution (or counter-revolution) of 1917, U.S.-Russian relations have varied from cool to very warm to very chilly and all the degrees between. Chart above visualizes this changeable international temperature. Cold and warm readings are Lenin's takeover of the Russian Revolution. American troops actually fought Red soldiers on Russian soil during the ensuing civil war. In 1920s, much American economic and technical aid was extended to the Soviets. A high point was reached in 1933 when the United States granted diplomatic recognition to the Communist regime. Interestingly, this was partly at the urging of capitalists who hoped for increased business be-

tween the two nations. Feelings took another dip with the purge trials of the 1930s and the Nazi-Soviet nonaggression pact of 1939. But Hitler's invasion of Russia heated Russo-American friendship to its highest point. This was shattered, however, by being chilled by Red coups in Europe and obstructionism in the United Nations. The Cold War has, for the most part, lived up to its name with only a few warming periods. There was a sudden plunge in the fall of 1962, but the recovery has been quick. Cordiality appears to be approaching another high with the current nuclear test ban talks in Moscow, at the same time as Russia's relations with Communist ally China are dropping to the freezing level. In spite of the warmth directed toward the West, diplomats are not discounting their overcautions.

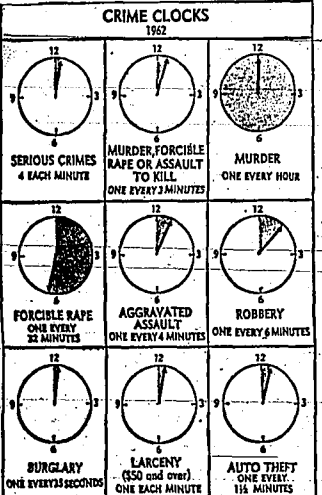
