# Rockefeller Strategists Calm Over Growing Swell for Goldwater

ALBANY, N.Y., July 25 (AP)—Strategists in Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller's political planning today calmly view the growing strength in such states as Arkansas, Maryland and Idaho.

The New York governor and the Arizona senator are the two men most prominently mentioned for the Republican nomination for president next year, although neither has formally announced as a candidate.

### Cuban Aide Ends Algerian Visit

ALGERIA, July 25 (AP)—Cuban economic chief Ernesto Che Quereza left by plane for Cuba Wednesday after a 20-day visit to Algeria.

Quereza was accompanied by a delegation headed by Col. Houari Boumediene, Algerian deputy premier and defense minister.

Many observers think Goldwater is well ahead. Even Rockefeller's most ardent supporters concede the governor lost ground this year when he married the divorced mother of four children.

Nevertheless, Rockefeller is mounting a strong campaign for the nomination.

The report of Goldwater's strength are interested here not by numbers of states but by deluge of strength in the nominating convention next July.

### Guard Flees

BERLIN, July 25 (AP)—An East German border guard fled over the communist wall to West Berlin today, authorities said.

West Berlin police said the 20-year-old defector wore his full uniform and carried his weapons with him when he leaped over the wall, unaided by fellow guards.

A majority of 635 votes will be needed for nomination.

This is the way the Rockefeller strategists view the situation: Goldwater's main strength lies in the South, Southwest and Midwest. Give him every vote in every delegation from the 23 states—11 in those regions—and he would have 372—short of the nomination.

The nine big industrial states—New York, New Jersey, Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan and California—will have a total of 612 votes. Rockefeller is counting on strong support from them.

He also looks to the 70 votes in the rest of New England, the 60 votes in the Western states of Oregon, Washington and Colorado and to the 37 votes in the combined delegations from Alaska, Hawaii, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands.

Other states are harder to classify, even in general terms. The arithmetical exercises assume, of course, a convention showdown between Rockefeller and Goldwater.

Some observers are talking of a Rockefeller-Goldwater stalemate that could send the convention searching for other candidates.

## Benito Mussolini Made Mark on Italian History

ROME, July 25 (AP)—I want to make a mark on history with my will, like a lion with its paw.

The words were Benito Mussolini's. He made his mark. History records that he made Italy's trains run on time. History records that he made a national policy, and history notes that, 20 years ago today Benito Mussolini came to the beginning of the end.

That was the day King Victor Emmanuel III put Mussolini under arrest. The shock of Allied landings in Sicily 16 days earlier had been too great for collecting Italy's fascist leadership. Field Marshal Pietro Badoglio replaced Mussolini as premier.

German forces freed Mussolini and helped him set up a fascist puppet government in northern Italy. The end came on April 28, 1945, when the communists of Italian partisans, Clara Petacci.

Fascism's flame still burns in Italy. A million and a half Italians voted the fascist ticket in national elections last April. Thousands of young fascists still thrill to a street fight with communists — as their black shirt fathers did 40 years ago.

But the fascist vote represents only five per cent of the electorate, and there is no apparent heir to Mussolini, creator of fascism whose doctrine inspired Adolf Hitler.

Mussolini came to power in 1922, just before his 40th anniversary. Thousands of his followers marched on Rome and forced the king to turn over the government to Mussolini.

Mussolini, once a socialist himself, said Italy needed a strong and vigorous leader. He took the title of duce—the leader.

He replaced Italian parliamentary institutions with what he called a corporate state—an economy of privately owned industry directed by the state through "corporations" of business, labor and government representatives.

In 1929 Mussolini led Italy against Catholicism. Then came the "stab in the back" against France and World War II.

Mussolini had become Adolf Hitler's partner. It was soon clear Hitler was the dominant partner.

No attempt is made in the average history book to explain the fascist rise to power in Italy. The accounts are straight, and somewhat thin.

There is an Italian saying: "What has been, is."

## Art Activity Planned for T.F. Teachers

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



# Speaker Tells Kiwanians of Farm Danger

**FILER, July 25**—Farm is rated the third-most hazardous occupation in the United States, a study released today by Farm Insurance Brokers, Inc., when he addressed members of the Kiwanis club Tuesday.

Murphy added that a death occurred every hour in a farm accident and someone is injured seriously in a farm accident every 10 seconds.

## 2 Governors Toss Barbs At Conclave

**MIAMI BEACH, July 25**—Governor Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York and Wendell P. Peabody of Massachusetts met today at the national governors' conference.

Peabody accused the New York governor of "playing politics" and "trying to make a face" out of the conference.

The verbal battle resulted from Rockefeller's refusal to sign a petition of conscience circulated by Peabody.

The civil rights petition was signed by 23 Democratic and 14 Republican governors. Rockefeller refused his signature on Peabody's behalf. Massachusetts governor filed the document as part of the conference record.

Rockefeller would not sign it. He tried first unsuccessfully to turn the petition into a resolution, and was defeated 76 to 12. Next, he asked to be recognized "on a point of personal privilege."

"I don't think we should make a face of this conference," Rockefeller said. "I am a governor who solicited the signatures for this petition in trying to address his people and country. He circulated the petition and is now trying to read it into the record."

But Gov. Albert D. Rosenthal of Washington, the conference chairman, said such action had been the practice during previous conferences. "If things go wrong, Peabody is completely within his right," he said.

Peabody said: "Rockefeller said he hadn't voted for the civil rights petition and he wasn't going to sign the petition. However, I pointed out that he was going to give the executive committee the power to make civil rights top priority at this conference. This was essentially what he wanted—and he has said so."

Peabody said Rockefeller was "playing politics by declining to sign the petition, and by trying to force southern governors to take a public stand, although some of them were hard at work trying to solve racial problems in their states."

## Integration Is Ordered by Judge

**DURHAM, N. C., July 25**—The city of Durham must integrate all elementary and junior high schools this fall and set senior high schools next year.

U.S. Dist. Judge Edwin M. Peabody Wednesday issued an order requiring parents of Negro children to choose their schools if they make application by Aug. 13.

He told the Durham board of education to submit by next May a plan under which senior high schools will be fully integrated completely by 1964. Arguments for high school students, both Negro and white, will remain as they are for the 1963-64 term.

# News Around Idaho

**BOISE, July 25**—The U.S. department of agriculture reported today that 1,155,000 Idaho children are being raised on farms. That is down three per cent from last year and is 18 per cent less than the average for the preceding five years. The department said the 1963 census was the first in the state for Idaho since record keeping began in 1954.

## House Okays Clean Air Legislation

**WASHINGTON, July 25**—The house approved a new "clean air" bill yesterday which would allow \$100 million dollars over four years for federal anti-pollution work.

The secretary of health, education and welfare would be authorized in some circumstances to go into courts and seek binding orders against industrial or other contamination of air.

Under the bill, the health agency could call local, state or regional conferences on specific pollution hazards, after which recommendations would be made to the responsible agency for correcting the problem.

States would have first responsibility for imposing the corrective steps. Only in cases of

interstate pollution, where the governor of a state certified that he sought and failed to win cooperation of another state, could the federal government act through the courts.

Other developments: Billboards—The house agreed to extend for two more years the experiment of cash rewards to states for curbing billboards along their portion of interstate highways. The bill would revise and extend the "house" offer, which expired July 1.

Propaganda—The advertising industry told congress that approval of two bills designed to prohibit commercial propaganda and obscene literature from the mails would create a nation of censorious and timid private business. Robert

De Lay, president of the Direct-Mail Advertising Association, told a house postoffice subcommittee that the legislation would produce a "series of judicial nightmares because they impinge upon basic freedoms of expression guaranteed by our constitution." He said the proposed bills "would give us a nation of more than 184 million censors."

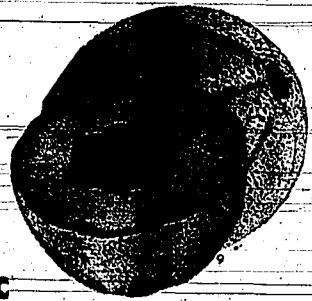

Cambridge Race Agreement Credited to Burke Marshall has done it. Marshall's work — handled in the Cambridge case without going to the same in person — was largely instrumental in bringing opposing factions together and producing the climate that made negotiations possible.

Marshall did not seem to buy much of a figure as he worked down a long corridor at the chamber of commerce building and into a board with the Birmingham committee.

The quietest voice in the room was that of Marshall, a 42-year-old Harvard-trained lawyer who had no civil rights experience

### License Is Taken From N. Y. Man

NEW YORK, July 25 (AP)—Garth Martins is without a driver's license today, and it may be a long time before he'll be given another chance to sit behind the wheel of a moving vehicle.

A key figure in an accident in which five persons were killed, the 23-year-old judge's son became the center of a public outcry earlier this month when a panel of judges—all colleagues of his father—cleared him of several charges stemming from the accident.

But yesterday the state of New York revoked his license for 30 days, and strongly hinted that Martins may only be wanting reinstatement at the end of the 30-day period.

State Motor Vehicles Commissioner William B. Hulte reduced Martins to the status of "young driver" within minutes after a hearing into the traffic deaths conducted by a referee for the motor vehicle department.

Martins, son of Criminal Court Judge Joseph A. Martins, was acquitted July 17 by three other criminal court judges of charges of drunken driving, reckless driving and leaving the scene of an accident.

The panel deliberated only five minutes before reaching the decision that touched off a storm of public protest.

At the completion of yesterday's hearing, Referee Rodgers Whelan went into a hallway with Martins and the revocation announcement swiftly followed. Martins, ignoring a subpoena, was not at the hearing.

Specifically, Hulte revoked his license for leaving the scene of an accident, reckless driving and refusing to submit to a sobriety test. This cleared the way for future revocations.

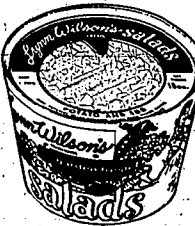

3. Undesirable reactions can, in most cases, be prevented if the child gets a shot of gamma globulin at same time he is given the measles shot.
4. Immunity to measles is known to last at least four years if live virus shot is given alone; three years when gamma globulin is given at the same time. Time will tell if immunity lasts longer, perhaps for life.
5. Vaccines protect against "Red" measles only—the 7-to-14-day variety. It won't prevent three-day German measles or other virus infections that produce rashes.
6. There are certain persons who should NOT be inoculated with the live virus vaccine. Your doctor will check for conditions which make its use inadvisable.

### The Killed Virus Vaccine

1. Vaccine in which killed viruses are used to produce immunity is of the type best known to most of us through use of the Salk polio vaccine.
2. At least 90 per cent of children who get "killed" virus vaccine develop immunity. Three shots spaced a month apart are required.
3. Reaction to the shots is minimal. If any occurs, it is apt to show as brief soreness where needle entered skin, and/or mild fever.
4. How long immunity lasts hasn't been determined, but a fourth shot of killed vaccine indicates immunity lasts at least a year, because it works like a booster shot.
5. Vaccine protects against "Red" measles only—the 7-to-14-day variety. It won't prevent three-day German measles or other virus infections that produce rashes.
6. Killed vaccine can be given to anyone.

## Sino-Soviet Split Causes Worry for Overseas Chinese

HONG KONG, July 24 (AP)—The open split between Peking and Moscow has apparently seriously undermined the Red Chinese president's effort to win the important economy of more than 10 million Chinese living abroad, principally in Southeast Asia.

As a consequence of its increasingly obvious isolation from the communist world, Peking is now giving reassurances to the "overseas Chinese" that it can produce enough foodstuffs, industrial and consumer goods to survive on its own.

Letters received here from Chinese friends and relatives in Southeast Asia, however, do not give a general picture of the present predicament of communist-run China. There is a worry over the future.

The overseas Chinese have always considered the "home" their mother land will one day become prosperous and strong. The collapse of Peking's "great leap forward" has shown them that China cannot do without outside aid on a gigantic scale. It alone rate the living standard of 100 million people.

Most of the overseas Chinese have little understanding of the issues involved in the Sino-Soviet quarrel. But they know of the withdrawal of Russian economic assistance and technicians from their country.

"What will come to China now?" is a frequent question asked in letters addressed to Hong Kong, where people are regarded as being better informed about mainland conditions than they are in Bangkok, Singapore or Java.

In an apparent attempt to counter this disillusionment, the communist newspapers in Hong Kong have in recent weeks filled their columns with reports of improved living conditions in the country, of progress in agriculture and industry.

This emphasis on economic reports is coupled with a top-level insistence on the necessity of relying on one's own strength.

For instance, during the visit to Peking last month of the North Korean delegation led by President Chon Yu-Kon, Chinese Head of Staff Liu Shao-chi promised the Koreans to build an independent economic aid program in their country. This example for other countries.

Always with a sensitive ear to the needs of the overseas Chinese, Peking gave a warning to follow Asians against economic dependence on non-Asian countries—such as the Soviet Union.

The desire to build up good relations with other Asians, and to stress the importance of economic assistance and technicians to have been the motivating reason behind Peking's attitude toward the anti-Chinese riots in Indonesia last May.
