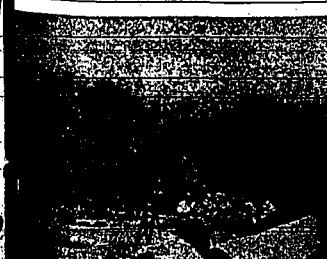

## Jerome Agent Warns of Meadow Mouse Damage

JEROME, July 26 — W. O. Priest, Jerome, county agent, said that meadow mouse damage in many grain fields will exceed damage from mice. Priest said this build-up has been continuing for one and a half years and more is expected. He said that natural diseases will develop in time to lower the population of the mice and that the reduction should be carried out on days that are warm and quiet—no wind.

Priest said that meadow mice are moving out of dry areas and into moist areas in the late afternoon. Therefore, the best time to apply bait is in the evening. He said that the mice are leaving the area undisturbed for 24 hours to allow optimum feeding conditions to develop.

Priest said, "Meadow mice can be controlled any season of the year if growth habits are observed." He pointed out meadow mice do not burrow under the ground. Their feeding activity is largely confined to the runways they build and constantly extend. Poisoned bait in lethal amounts must fall on the mice directly in these runways.

"Meadow mice are uneasy when there is no overhanging vegetation," he said, at cost.

## Special Stripe Rust School Held for Farmers and Ranchers in Cassia Area

BURLEY, July 26 — An estimated 100 farmers and ranchers crowded into the demonstration room of the Cassia county courthouse during a special "wheat day" to hear Dr. Harry Fenwick, extension pathologist, say "things don't look good."

Dr. Fenwick was referring to the recent infestation of stripe rust throughout Idaho. The picture darkened when Dr. Fenwick said he "expects stripe rust to be with us again next year." He said that the stripe rust has hit new to Idaho. Northern Idaho has been fighting the problem for the past few years and they are defeating it up there, said Dr. Fenwick. He pointed out to the crowd that this has been an unusual year for stripe rust. Stripe rust hasn't been a problem in southern Idaho for almost 30 years.

Most of the research on stripe rust has been conducted by the University of Idaho, and because it hasn't been a problem here, research has all but been abandoned in many areas. With infestations hitting California, Oregon, Washington, Montana and Idaho, research has picked up, but knowledge is limited. ## Grassman Winners Listed In Jerome County Contest

**JEROME, July 26**—A tour of the Jerome county grassman contest winners will be held Wednesday. Those interested in taking the tour are to meet at 10 a.m. at Wood's cafe.

Dale Schwanerick, 1, and the first place winner; Love Spencer, 2, and Max Butler, fourth, were 100 acres under cultivation when Schwanerick started seven years ago. Now some 400 acres are under sprinklers.

The crop consists of about 225 acres of alfalfa; 225 acres of pasture—140 acres of small grain and 80 acres of hay.

His main income comes from his cattle operation. He specializes in a Holstein spring-calving operation, buying them at about 200 to 300 pounds and raising them until eating time. He runs between 450 and 500 head.

All residues are worked into the soil—Manure is applied to the fields and pastures each spring. Commercial fertilizer is used as a supplement.

Jackson uses Later orchard grass on all new sods. Jackson has obtained 400 pounds of beef per acre and hopes to raise as much as 1,000 pounds in the future.

# Twin Falls County Grassman of Year Title Is Won by R. Callen and Sons

Twin Falls Times-News 21 July 26-27, 1963

 Richard Callen and sons, Shoe-Sole ranch, has been named Twin Falls county "Grassman of the Year." The announcement was made today by Harvey Gossett, county commissioner.

The announcement was made after the judging committee met in the county fair building. The winners were Richard Callen and sons, Shoe-Sole ranch, and Bill Callen, Jr., and David Callen, Jr., of the same ranch.

Few Magic Valley residents have ever heard of the Shoe-Sole ranch. It is one of the oldest and best known ranches in the valley. The Shoe-Sole had something else besides a good reputation. It had problems. And these problems faced Richard Callen and his sons, Richard Callen, Jr., and David Callen, Jr., when they purchased the place in 1957.

Some of those problems included wet pastures, pastures that couldn't be drained; dry pastures, alkali soil, and a soil that packed when wet and slumped on. There was grass on the Shoe-Sole and there was thistle.

"Most of the grass on the Shoe-Sole was Kentucky blue grass," says Richard Callen, Jr. "I got it with early day grass producers and growers."

The new grass, bromus, orchard, and others weren't in abundance. Because of the soil, alkali and under pastures, the seeding was a problem and getting a new stand of grass was difficult.

Thus the story of the Shoe-Sole is one of restoration and rebuilding. One often thinks of grass programs as seed and fertilizer from the doers and the brush. The grass was on the Shoe-Sole, managing it was the key to its successful operation.

Essentially the grassman program is one of grass management. The contractors are just set on the main items of grass, the man and the livestock.

"Of the present-time there are 160 head of cattle on 275 acres of irrigated pasture on the Shoe-Sole. In addition there is some 200 acres of dry pasture and other land leased from the Larsen spread which adds to the Shoe-Sole."

The cattle, mainly Harzards and cross-breds, are split into four bands and those four bands are rotated on 11 pastures. Callen likes to buy his animals when they weigh 350 to 400 pounds.

The animals are sold the following year. Then they clean up their marketable cattle.

The Callens began their restoration operation by leveling the high pastures and digging the low pastures to drain a couple of the pastures to leech the salt and alkali from the soil. These new rejuvenated pastures were seeded with orchard, bromus and tall wheat grass.

In other pastures, simply draining the land and giving the Kentucky blue grass and timothy grass an opportunity to grow was sufficient. During this time the "thistle" problem was tackled. The Callen spray, a special lime year for thistle, according to Richard Callen they sprayed and even took an irrigating shovel to it. Slowly and surely the thistle is beginning to disappear.

To replenish the grass, the Callens spread manure during the last part of the year, November and December and in some cases a special "drag" is used to work the manure into the soil. The "drag," like many other pieces of equipment, was constructed by the Callens. It may not look fancy, but it does the job," said Richard Callen, Jr. A cylinder, chopper is used to make the grass palatable.

Total land under irrigation is 400 acres of which some 250 acres is devoted to hay and other crops. There is one 100-acre field that needs no irrigation. Alfalfa is the main hay harvested and is not harvested; it is usually grazed. However, they harvest enough for "pallets."

"Open drains and sub-surface drains have been used extensively on the Shoe-Sole. Water recovered from one spot may be pumped to another. In addition to Rock creek water they also have canal company water and springs on the ranch. Working in cooperation with Callen they have improved several feeder ditches and drains.

One of the most important things the Callens do, and they restored.

feel strongly about this, is they keep the cattle off the irrigated pastures during the spring when the ground begins to thaw. This gives the soil a chance to stabilize, absorb the moisture and get sufficient growth to sustain the cattle.

During the summer the Callens stick to a 10-day rotating plan. The third cutting is not harvested; it is usually grazed. As a rule they never pasture animals while they are "heating." They believe the cattle will rot down when the grass will be damaged.

Adequate growth between feedings is one of the keys to a successful operation on the Shoe-Sole.

"We don't have immense dry land range pastures. We have to support the cattle on the land we have; that's why we began to make changes," said Callen.

And there are plenty of changes on the Shoe-Sole. It has been the Callens do, and they restored.

## Gem Farm Bureau Chief Insists on Free Market

POCATELLO, July 26—(Times-News)—Gem Farm Bureau President B. Martin insisted today that an administration which underlook such a decision lost of farm sentiment in the recent wheat referendum now has a moral obligation to honor the results of the test.

"Much of the reaction in Washington has been unbelieveable and unrealistic," he told members of the Idaho Farm Bureau state board meeting in Pocatello, "for farmers to turn sharply away from the public trading plan to vote down higher guaranteed prices must seem like an incredible development to big government," and there has been widespread misunderstanding, and in some cases deliberate distortion of what farmers actually voted for on May 21st."

"This is not only wholly untrue," said Martin, "it is wholly unfair to farmers who voted against the blandishments of high fixed, government guaranteed prices in spite of a long campaign conducted by the secretary of agriculture to convince them they would go under financially if they did. Farmers voted for fewer controls, and chose to take their change in a dynamic market system. They don't ask for a market, but only fair acknowledgment that what they voted for was a temporary adjustment program to ease the transition to free markets."

"If this administration means to be responsive to the people," Martin challenged, "then it has a solemn obligation to respond to what people on the farm voted for in a treaty concluded election it initiated and supervised itself."

"Clearly," he said, "farmers voted to turn away from the management of their farms by the government to their farms by themselves."

But after 25 years of increasing addiction to government programs," he added, "it is not realistic to expect them to break away in one whack."

Martin said here the program Farm Bureau endorses is a temporary program to serve as a transition between where farmers have been under an era of controls, and where they voted they want to be in a new era without controls.

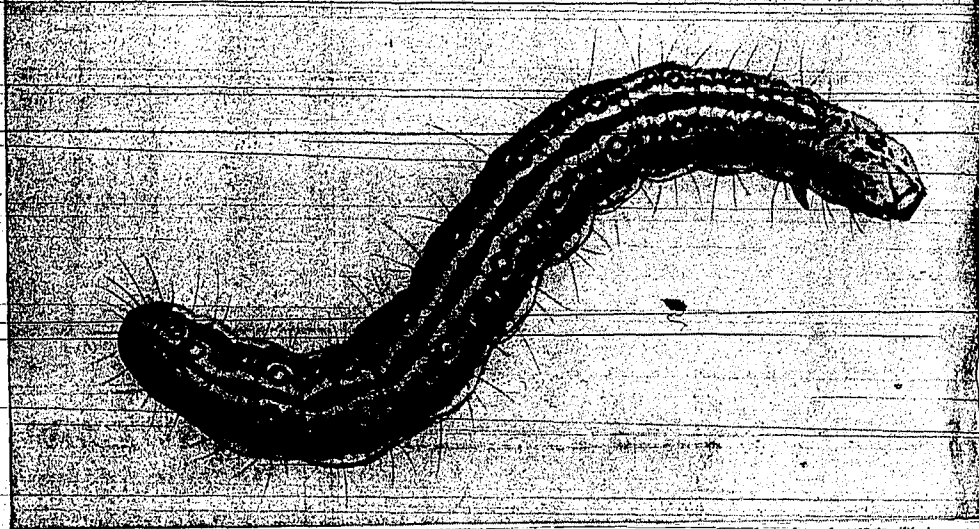

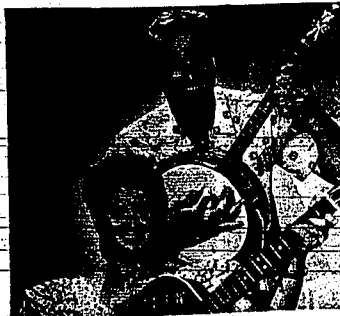

Hawkins, 39, whose only PGA tour triumph came in 1955, shot 67 in the first round of the Oklahoma City Open, had 13 one-putts and used only 27 strokes in the 18-hole round over sun-scamed Beverly Country club.

The year's low putting round was the 51 total by Bob Pratt in the Waco Turner Invitational early May. Hawkins' 13 one-putts matched the year's low also set by Pratt.

Bracketed at 68 were Joe Campbell, Gene Riegel and Bruce Devlin, 1960 Australian Open champion. On the other hand, defending Western Open champion Jack Cupit and Sammy Sneed finished at 71 with Sam Snead and Sammy Snead finishing at 71 after an opening 2-under-par 37.

Arnold Palmer, slumping leading money winner, wound up with a two-over-par 73 after a four-putt green on the 464-yard 15th, twice flubbing from within three feet for 37.

Southwest Bob Charles of New Zealand, showing little of the form which recently gave him the British Open crown, finished at 71-39-75.
