# Director of Flight Research Center One of Top Glider Pilots in Meet

HAILEY, July 27—One of the world's top glider pilots, Paul Bikle, director of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration flight research center at Edwards Air Force Base, Calif., was named as one of the top glider pilots in the world at the Pacific Northwest regional soaring championships in Halley, Idaho, today.

Bikle, who holds the world altitude record, set an unofficial world altitude record today at Halley by flying 42,900 feet. This is the highest altitude ever attained by a glider.

"Even if I can't set an altitude record, I'm going to set a speed record," Bikle said. "I'll be going 100 mph in the air."

Bikle is a graduate in aeronautical engineering from the University of Michigan and works at Northrop, a division of the Ford Motor Co., in Torrance, Calif. He is also a member of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration flight research center at Edwards Air Force Base.

# Hot Weather Bothers East Area of U.S.

 Extreme heat and high humidity blanketed the north and mid-Atlantic states Saturday and the official temperature in New York City's Central park reached 93 degrees.

The New York reading tied the record both for the year and for the date.

Forecasters in New England predicted the heat wave would last at least until Tuesday and maybe longer.

Atlanta's bid lake beaches were crowded by fugitives from the heat, which sent the temperatures into the 90s at Boston for the third consecutive day.

Atlanta at Quincy, Mass., ordered a partial ban on the outside use of water as water consumption kept pace with rising thermometer.

In New England, authorities blamed the heat wave for five deaths and half traffic accidents on crowded highways claimed five more lives.

The mercury soared to 97 at Atlantic City, N. J., yesterday, N. H. by mid-afternoon.

By contrast, heavy clouds over northern Colorado and drizzle along the northern Pacific coast held the temperature in both of those areas near 60.

Torrential rains dumped 7.8 inches of rain on downtown Tulsa, Okla., during a storm Sunday.

Storm sewers were unable to carry so much rain water and poured into basements forcing a number of families from their homes.

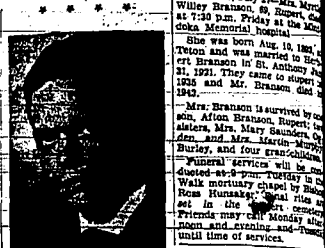
## German Student Will Attend T.F. High School This Fall

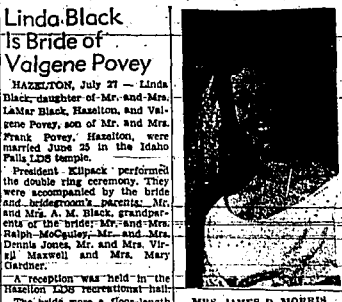

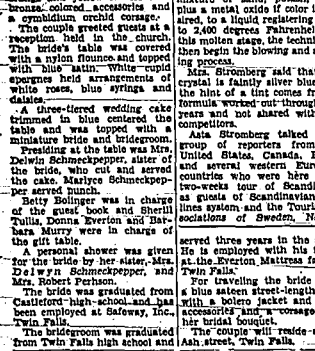

### Lapp Customs Described by Woman Reporter

COLE VALLEY, July 27 (AP)—The Lapps, the Nomads of Europe's Arctic north, now of their wandering in subarctic Norway. They are knowledgeable of all things, it is known. The first group of reporters visited a Lapp camp where the dirt floor of the canvas pole-supported tent was covered with a carpet of fresh twigs and leaves. I sat down on the carpet—and on a coke bottle.

This is a sparsely populated portion of the world where the ancient and modern are in sharp contrast. Drive through Lapp country on a well-kept, though narrow highway and there are dozens of Lapp tents, much like the American Indian wigwam, indicating the people's nature to follow their reindeer herds and the streams where the fish rise in the summer season is good.

But a guide points out a country church—new one the Lapps built," he said. "Lutheran."

Stop at a tiny kiosk where refreshments are sold and you'll find not only American soft drinks but varma-polkka—hot dog.

In this reindeer country I kept looking for Santa's sleigh pullers at every turn of a road that wound through some of the most spectacular mountain and lake scenery in Scandinavia. I found sleighs, "parked" for the summer in tundra-covered areas far north of the Arctic circle.

And I saw one reindeer—a many-horned bird near a road-side stand where Lapps were selling reindeer skins, necklaces, charms made from reindeer hoofs, and other souvenirs. No great herds of magnificent reindeer deer which are a vital part of the Lappland economy.

Our guide explained why. The herds had made their way into the highest altitudes for summer to graze and also escape the insects, especially mosquitoes which thrive in lowland areas where water—drained—from melting snow in the mountains has settled.

We were 16 women reporters.

## Barefoot Kicking Outlawed by New Football Rules

**BOISE**, July 27 (AP)—There will be no more barefoot pnce, kicking on Idaho high school football fields this fall. Rule changes voted by coaches for 1963—and announced today by the Idaho High School-Intercollegiate Activities association include a requirement that all players must wear shoes.

The barefoot kicking was introduced in the college ranks, primarily by players from Hawaii, and a few of the high school kickers adopted it.

E. P. Grider, association executive secretary, said the reason for the rule change is safety for the players. He said the coaches' danger appears to be not from kicking, but from the check-out of other players.

The rules permit schools to issue football equipment Aug. 10 and start practice Aug. 20. The first game can be played on Aug. 23 if the team has had 10 days of practice. The rules require 10 days of practice for each boy before he can play.

During the 1962 season, 120 of the state's 331 high schools fielded football teams, or 93 percent of the total. This year two new schools are expected to field teams, Highland high school at Pocatello and Volturnus high school near Caldwell.

Other rule changes require an incoming substitute to have all required equipment, permit a team to put the ball in play anywhere between the inbound lines on its 20 yard line after a touch-back or safety; permit a pliable kicking tee of 2 inches or less and provide that the clock will start after a free kick when the ball is legally touched.

Another change gives a team three choices if there is a fair-weather interference call during the last timed down of a quarter.

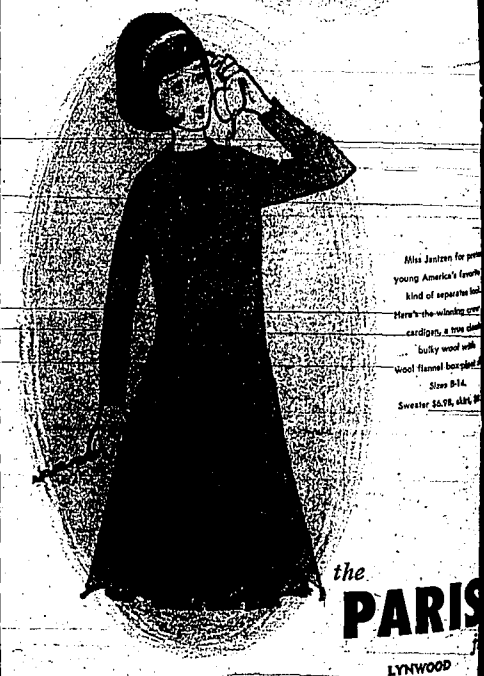

## Mother of Wendell Woman Passed Here by Pioneer Wagon Train in Summer of 1863

It is a habit and a discomfortable when the wagon train of which a young girl named Phila Anna Bixby was a member passed through what is now the city of Twin Falls. It was in the summer of the great southern Idaho desert.

To the north was the deep gorge cut by the mighty Snake river and past that, more scrub and dust. The town of Wendell now stands in that area and reading there is Mrs. M. D. (Grace Pence) Bradshaw, a daughter of the girl who passed this way 70 years ago.

Phila Anna Bixby was a young girl at the time the wagon train went through this area. She was traveling with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Seth Bixby. They were en route to Oregon. Possibly she had not yet met her husband-to-be in that summer of 1862 and of course she had no way of knowing then that a daughter of hers would someday live in this same area after men and water had changed it from a desert to an oasis.

The pioneer family first went to Auburn, Ore., and the next spring moved into the Boise basin where she was to spend the rest of her life and where she was to marry in Boise City on Feb. 4, 1863. Her husband's name was Peter Pence, later to become the father of Mrs. Bradshaw.

The ceremony was performed at the Bixby home in Boise City. Only 20 years before, according to an account of her wagon train trip given by the pioneer girl about 1890, her father had only about 10 cents in cash when they reached Oregon. Now the family home was fully decorated for the wedding at which C. D. B. Miller, pastor of St. Michael's church, officiated. The diocese of the church at that time comprised all of Montana, Utah and Idaho.

The recounting of the trip from Brownville, Neb., to Oregon, is one of the prized possessions of Mrs. Bradshaw and her husband. He is the founder of the A. Bradshaw and Sons Honey company, the largest independently owned concern of this type in the nation.

## Twin Falls Resident Still Uses Bedsprad Made Many Years Ago



When Mrs. Ora Allred was 14 years old she made a bedspread like many girls her age who lived in Allred, Ark. That was in 1895. She still uses that same bedspread and has used it for some years.

The bedspread has since lost much of its luster, but anyone who examines it would consider it only a couple of months old. According to Mrs. Allred the spread has been in continuous use since the day she stitched it together. The spread has undergone countless washings and dryings. It has hung on the line to dry in all kinds of weather and adorned the Allred bed for many a night.

However, the past few years the spread has received special care. The spread is now considered a family heirloom. It is used only on special occasions. For the past few years it has been kept in a protective cover. According to Mrs. Allred, it can hold its own with anything purchased today.

When she speaks of the spread, being handmade, she knows exactly what the term means. The wool from the spread was clipped from the family sheep flock. Mrs. Allred then began the task of making the spread under the guidance of her mother. The wool was carded and combed. Next came the spinning of the thread - on an old fashioned spinning wheel. Following this, was the dyeing of the wool.

In addition, her sisters were also making bedspreads.

The colors chosen were red and white and finally a pattern was chosen.

## Nehru Asked to Stop Tide of Bribery in High Places

NEW DELHI, July 27.—A rising tide of public opinion is calling on Prime Minister Nehru to take action on charges of graft and bribery in high places. The charges began to grow last April when police seized the books of a manganese export firm in Calcutta. Enquiries revealed that large payments had been made to a number of high government officials.

Nehru turned the case over to a supreme court judge for a secret inquiry. The results of the probe have not been released completely, but a parliamentary session next August.

rumors of what the judge might have found have already led to the resignation of oil and mines Minister Keshav Dev Malviya. The senior civil servant has been suspended from his job.

Malviya's resignation had scarcely been announced when police made a vigorous search of a century-old British firm in Calcutta, which deals in jute, coal, paper and engineering goods. The firm was suspected of secretly piling up profits overseas by evading government currency regulations.

Calcutta newspapers since have claimed that the company's books showed payments to at least one minister of the national government, and a minister of the Bengal state government. The report has not been challenged by the police.

Internal squabbles in the state of Kerala have, meanwhile, led to charges and countercharges among members of the ruling Congress party.

State Party Boss C. K. Govindan Nair said that he had asked Nehru to personally investigate charges that one minister had traded favors for gifts from private businessmen. The minister was alleged to have done favors for a firm which gave a costly diamond necklace to his wife.

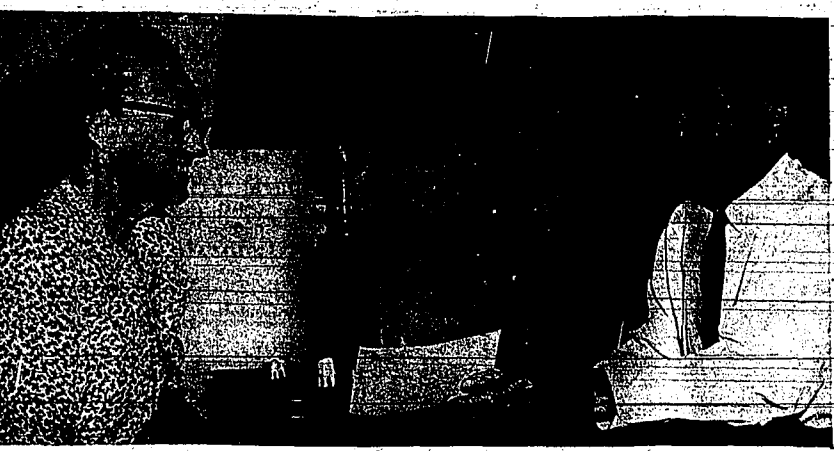

"In the spring of 1863 we moved to Boise basin and as we were the first children in that camp the miners used to gather round our camp in crowds, and they remember me under fence. 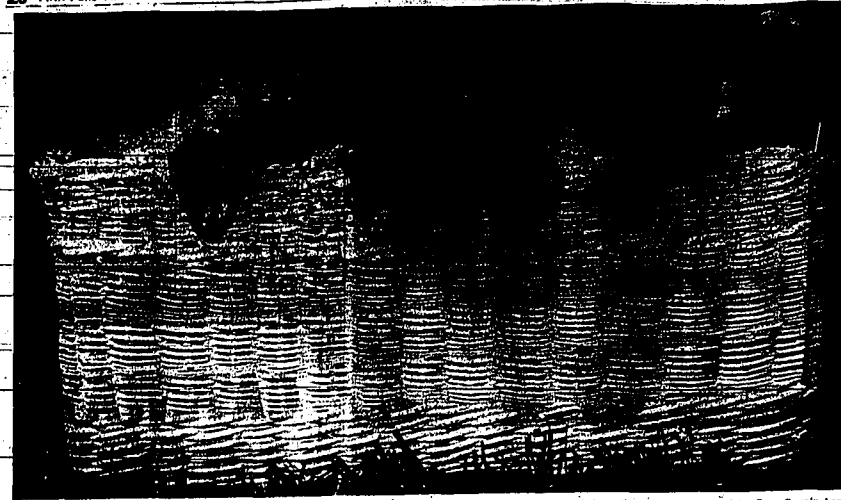

### West Point Changing in Modern Age

WEST POINT, N.Y., July 27 (AP)—This citadel of tradition is moving through a period of sweeping transition, striving to meet the challenges of a swiftly changing world.

William Childs Westmoreland has been a prime mover in the period of transition. As West Point's superintendent the past three years, he has been charged with directing the flow of change.

"It has imposed a tremendous burden on us to keep abreast of the advance of the world," the newly promoted lieutenant general said recently on the eve of his departure for his new post as commander of the XVIII air-borne corps.

"The role of the military man is more far ranging, more vital, domestically and internationally, and to better prepare our professional soldier. West Point has had to widen its educational outlook, recruit our academicians. Our educational philosophy still is to provide broad training, but we're enlarging in the area of study in depth."

### Record Litter of Eight Pups Born to Basenji Dog; Bred 6,000 Years Old

A multiple birth of nature's note, because it was probably the largest litter born to a Basenji dog, took place in Twin Falls last four weeks ago.

The mother, Chetia, age 4, and the eight puppies are doing just fine, according to Gene Cunningham, the dog's owner, who resides at 228 Fourth avenue east. The father, Koli, 8 years old, is owned by Hazel Terry, who resides southeast of Kimberly. Five of the pups are male and three female.

"To some breed of dogs a litter of eight or more puppies is not uncommon but so far as is ascertained this number is a record for the Basenji. An authoritative book on the history of the breed mentions one litter of seven but none greater in number than that one.

The Basenji breed is one of the oldest of all breeds. Egyptian rock drawings of 4000 B.C. indicate that he was a court favorite of Pharaohs. He has survived virtually unchanged as the native hunting dog of central Africa.

The dog is unique in several ways, so far as not dog barking at night—or anytime.

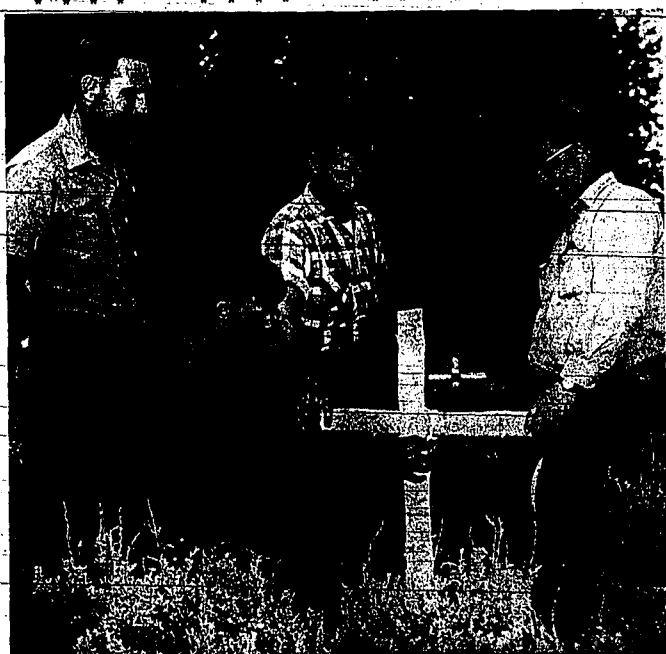
