New-Name Thieves

There used to be a television game called "Beat the Clock." A game in real life that an enjoy a great favor today is called "second-chance."

Viewed lightheartedly, this is a kind of sports rebellion against too many laws and rules, too much massiveness in business and government, too great an entrapment in the tangled thickets of modern society.

Surely this revolt has many harmless, amusing and even heartening manifestations. It is also unhelpfully a fact that is indulged in by many individuals who are so busy that they can't ever get cheating. The scale can be grand, or it can be very small.

One of the new "sports" in the system-beating line is limited largely to New York's "fast" world, but it illustrates very well the way the game is played. It is sometimes called "second-chance."

You pick a musical or stage play you know or do badly, and then show up on the show floor, you can enter by a wall. When the crowd drifts back in, you go along for free. You take any empty seats you can find, or join the standees.

Of course, you never go to the play. You show up, but don't bother to complain when your paying seat-mate is putting out \$7.50 or \$9.00.

There are, naturally, many ways of vengeful your way into sporting events and into the world of the show business.

Where hotels, motels, restaurants and night clubs are concerned, beating the system consists mostly of talking things that don't belong to you. A line has to be drawn here. The fellow who backs up to a room right down to the lavatory seats is a thief. The man who walks out with a lamp or a television set is just proving to the management that it can't be done.

If it's just the profit-making outfits that suffer the indignities of the system-beater. In one large city, the public library loses 200,000 books a year—a tenth of its inventory.

Factory managers, store managers, construction supply bosses all agree, anywhere you'll get a well filled out picture of what "beating the system" means.

Kennedy Favors Commerce Deal

WASHINGTON, July 30—Sen. Edward Kennedy said today that he will support a Commerce bill to determine whether the proprietor of a business should be liable for the actions of his employees if he is required to hire a Negro.

This will happen when the bill reaches the Senate Commerce Committee and then the Senate floor. It is part of a bill to amend the Civil Rights Act of 1964.

Two approaches to the problem are now being debated in Congress. The first is the bill introduced by Kennedy, which prohibits any accommodation that denies equal access to the premises of a business. The second approach is the bill introduced by Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, which prohibits any discrimination on the basis of race in the hiring of employees.

Kennedy's bill is based on the Commerce Clause of the Constitution. It would require a business to provide equal access to its premises if it is engaged in interstate commerce. It would also prohibit discrimination in the hiring of employees.

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High Court Ducked

WASHINGTON, July 30—The Supreme Court ducked a challenge to the Civil Rights Act of 1964 today, saying it will not decide whether the act's ban on discrimination in the hiring of employees is constitutional.

The court heard arguments from the Kennedy and Humphrey bills. The Kennedy bill is based on the Commerce Clause, while the Humphrey bill is based on the Equal Protection Clause.

The court's decision today means that the Kennedy bill will go forward to the Senate Commerce Committee. The Humphrey bill will also continue through the legislative process.

Property Rights Claimed

WASHINGTON, July 30—The Supreme Court today refused to hear arguments on the constitutionality of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. The court's refusal means that the act's ban on discrimination in the hiring of employees will remain in effect.

The court's decision today is a victory for the Kennedy bill. It means that the bill will now move forward to the Senate Commerce Committee.

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Views of Others

The Senate struck a blow for social and economic responsibility when it voted 83 to 17 to approve the Commerce bill to determine whether the proprietor of a business should be liable for the actions of his employees if he is required to hire a Negro.

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WATCH QUACKS DUCK

There has been too much in the profession of those spreading lying to their readers on the subject of medical quackery, and various government departments and health agencies have long been waging the war against the quackery.

Whatever the forthcoming meetings produce in the way of weaponry against the charlatan is all to the good.

Hex Therapies Still Used for Certain Warts

NEW YORK, July 30 (AP)—Grandma told her decedee son, "Cut a potato in half, bury it under the wart, and then hope the wart goes away."

The annals of modern medicine that is known as a hex—a superstitious power of suggestion, and which houses her attributes of the type sometimes still are recommended slightly for removal of warts, is a plant-like kind that attacks the sole of the foot.

The medical text that recommends "hex" as a possible therapy for "plantar" notes that sometimes power of suggestion via the hex with this type wart works best in children.

Children, it seems, are most likely to get a hex—a full moon and then hope the wart goes away.

What has taken the place of the hex, as a thumb in the side of modern science, however, is another type of wart—the food wart, however, there's a fact.

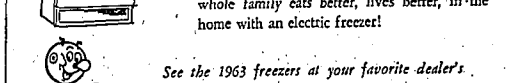

News Around Idaho

BOISE, July 29—The state health department warns campers and fishermen to avoid drinking water from streams or other sources because of the danger of infectious hepatitis. It said a number of cases in the late summer and early fall are normally blamed on drinking stream water.

IDAHO FALLS, July 29—A 12-year-old boy was found dead Monday night hanging from a rope in the basement of his home here. The victim was identified as John Wesley, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Newby, Idaho Falls. Police said it was probably "just an accident," but had no details as to how it happened. They ruled out murder or suicide.

BOISE, July 30—Idaho's congressional delegation has been asked to propose special legislation, if necessary, to make possible an exchange of state-owned timber lands with the federal land department. The request is from the state land board, which decided to seek congressional help in the face of a report from the Corps of Army Engineers that such an exchange doesn't appear feasible. The area to be flooded by waters backed up by the dam includes 8,000 acres of state timber land.

She was hit by a car driven by Philip C. Mack, 18, Wallace. The Dunn family was vacationing on Lake Ocoeur d'Alene.

KARLSRUHE, Germany, July 30—Another former member of the Third German Intelligence Service is on trial for spying. Rodo Schenck, 37, testified Monday he received between \$500 and \$1,125 a month for supplying military and political news to Communist Poland and Czechoslovakia.

CAIRO, July 30—The owner of the Nile ferry boat which sank and drowned 214 people last May 4 was convicted of negligence Monday and sentenced to four years in prison. Three crew members were sentenced to four years.

Owner Fawzy Tarouk was accused of allowing the boat to reach a "deplorable state of disrepair." He was not aboard at the time of the accident.

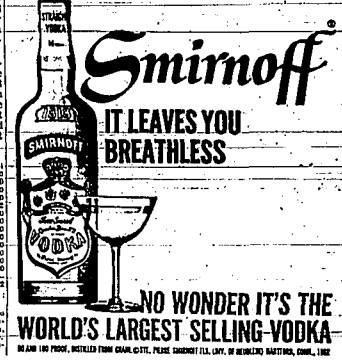

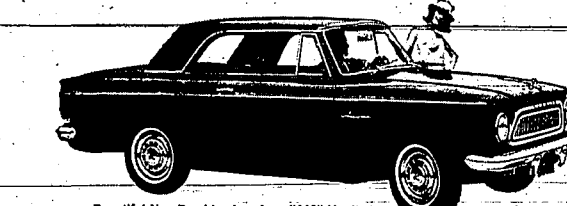

Wreckage of Arab Plane Found in Sea

BOMBAY, India—July 30—Indian navy ships today were reported to have found the submerged wreckage of the United Arab Airlines Comet which crashed in the Arabian sea Sunday with the loss of 83 lives.

A "major" wreckage was located at the bottom of the ocean, east of Bombay. It probably will be salvaged later this week, Indian navy officials were brought from the sea, bringing the total to eight; so far recovered.

The plane was en route from Tokyo to Cairo when it plunged into the sea about 1 a.m. Sunday as it was coming in to land at Bombay.

Among the victims were 20 Filipinos and 10 Americans on a world-tour—Athens.

Procession Is Reported By Buddhists

SAIGON, Viet Nam, July 30—President Ngo Dinh Diem's government made no attempt today to break up large crowds of Buddhists demonstrating against alleged religious persecution.

About 15,000 Buddhists staged a two-mile procession through the streets of the central city of Hanoi.

They carried portraits of the Rev. Quang Duc, the monk who burned himself to death in Saigon June 11 in the campaign for concession from Diem, a Roman Catholic.

In Saigon, about 5,000 Buddhists massed in streets around the city's main square with banners that said "religious persecution is an act of the Middle Ages."

"Unlike previous demonstrations, there was no violence, no barricades and, for the first time since tempers began flaring in the church-state dispute three months ago, combat police stayed away."

The Buddhists rallied in response to their priests' call for a nationwide strike and memorial service for the Rev. Quang Duc.

A general strike failed to materialize.

New Findings Support Atlantis

WASHINGTON, July 30—New scientific findings support the "tale of the tabular 'lost Atlantis'—submerged in the Atlantic and one-half to three miles deep.

At least, that seems to be the argument of Prof. George Lindberg of the Zoological Institute of the Academy of Sciences of the Soviet Union.

In the current issue of the commerce department's periodical report, on "Boreas-bio research," Lindberg's theories are described as some statements ascribed to Lindberg by the Soviet news agency Tass.

"The hypothesis that there is a North-Atlantic continent, presently submerged 2,000 to 3,000 meters of water," is confirmed by new findings, according to Lindberg as quoted by Tass.

What you might call fairly modern ancient, such as Plato and Ptolemy, referred from time to time to an island, name of Atlantis, which used to exist in the ocean west of Gibraltar.

Came an earthquake and Atlantis, with all its cities, castles, parks, and folk, sank beneath the waves. Lindberg's theory, however, suggests that the ancient peoples were based on reports by more ancient ancients.

Webster mentions "an obscure tradition of the existence of a Western continent" which presumably is no longer there. If Lindberg is right, this continent is there, all right, but "there" is miles deep under the sea.

Moreover, instead of being in the waters of Gibraltar, it is far to the north, up around Iceland and when it sank, no palaces, farms, livestock, or human beings were lost.

Lindberg's suggestion is that the lost continent was drenched some time before the end of the tertiary geological period which started around 60 million years ago and closed its accounts a million years ago.

"Palaeo" means "ancient" in this case, real ancient.
