## Red Cross Cites Need for Type AB Negative Blood

Do you have AB negative blood? If so, the American Red Cross wants you to register at the Twin Falls chapter. Call 733-8323.

This type of blood is very rare and at present there are only six persons having this type of blood registered in Twin Falls when needed.

More donors with AB negative blood are needed. Mrs. Bason said

expecting donations from people who live where accidents are likely to happen.

She said more accidents with AB negative should contact the Red Cross office in there is a very limited supply of AB negative blood.

If an accident happens and someone needs about four or five pints, there may be only one pint available. In that case, AB negative will have to be called on to provide the blood.

On July 20, Mrs. Bason was lucky in getting a donor to give a 40-year-old woman, the city's first donor, a pint of AB negative blood. The baby, Irma Olivas, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Domingo Olivas, Buhl, had AB-negative—and would die unless the blood was changed to AB positive.

Only fresh blood can be used in this condition, Director M. Wright, Twin Falls pediatrician, says.

The hospital officials called the Twin Falls Red Cross and—Buhl Red Cross started calling the donors who are registered with the Red Cross.

When the first donor arrived, Irma Rene, 354 Fifer Avenue west, was the only one in Twin Falls at the time—11 p. m. on July 20. Rene, a 20-year-old mother for Garrett Freightlines, Inc.

The Red Cross prefers persons who have AB negative blood—not to give the blood at the drop of a hat—but to call during an emergency. Names should be given to the Twin Falls Red Cross chapter office.

## Haggerty Says Criticism of Group Unfair

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1 (UPI)—C. J. Haggerty, president of the AFL-CIO building and construction trades department, today defended his organization's position that job discrimination against Negroes is far more prevalent in construction than in other industries.

Employment figures presented recently to Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz "showed a com-

parable picture," Haggerty said.

For comparison with the construction industry, Haggerty cited figures from the employment section of U.S. industries. The 93 firms are participants in the "plans for progress" program—a nondiscriminatory hiring policy.

Haggerty said the study made by the President's committee on economic opportunity showed last December that 12,110 or 2.6 per cent of the 65 companies 2.6 million employees were Negroes.

In construction, Haggerty said, the labor department made a similar survey of federal con-

struction jobs in a selected cities and found a ratio of 8.3 per cent of Negro journeymen and apprentices to total men employed.

The survey showed Negro apprenticeship rates ranged from 1 to 15 per cent of the total," said Haggerty.

The President's committee also studied transportation, aircraft, telephone, and electrical manufacturing companies which have voluntarily adopted "no-holds-barred" policies with regard to hiring and employment," Haggerty said. "Yet, the record clearly shows that the Negro's chance of employment opportunities to a much higher percentage of Negro craftsmen."







## Pool Means Trouble in L. A. Land

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 1 (UPI)—A 60-year-old service station attendant who was arrested earlier this year for making a 20-cent bet on a pool game at a bar he thought to have Mayor Samuel Yorty arrested for violating gambling laws by winning a \$5 bet made with Fresno Mayor George Christopher.

Robert T. Gibson offered a 20-cent per minute bet on whether the San Francisco Giants or Los Angeles Dodgers would win their game July 4. On that date, the Dodgers were leading by 2½ games and Christopher sent the \$5 by mail to Gibson. In turn, Gibson wired it to the Los Angeles Times summer camp fund.

Gibson, who also thought

the city of Fresno should be arrested for not enforcing the law, said "they're no better than I am."

In late April he was arrested after winning one pool game, losing two and then contributing a dollar to account for the bet.

He was fined \$100. He forfeited \$10 half after his daughter paid him off.

## Businessmen Say Inflation Won't Occur

NEW YORK, Aug. 1 (UPI)—New price indices show that inflation may be straining at the leash again.

But businessmen agree that it probably won't get out of hand. Conclude: "There has been more price raising in recent months than there has been in a long time."

The government cost of living index for June took its biggest

spurt in months, reaching a record high.

This specific figure, strongly influenced by an unusual increase in sugar prices, can't be taken too seriously, say businessmen. Businessmen are studying the index for what it reveals about the overall pattern.

That pattern has been deflationary, many busi-

nessmen say. There has been a buy-

er's market, with stiff price com-

petition.

During this period, wholesale prices indices slipped downward and retail averages held—despite the fact that the index inch upward, but this was almost exclusively because of higher charges for services (airfare, up 10 per cent; telephone, up 22 per cent, etc.) rather than goods.

Food prices have been almost steady for several years.

Rent, which has been rising longer, pastie because of property taxes, but by last year, they too had about flattened out.

P. S. Steel tried unsuccessfully to stop the price increases during the historic clash with President Kennedy in the spring of 1962.

This spring, the steel industry tried again, but on a smaller scale, and this time it worked.

Shortly afterward, aluminum producers gingerly raised some prices. Some brass and copper prices followed, when came more aluminum boosts.

At about the same time, sugar prices zoomed from near-record depths to near-record heights.

Some see a new inflationary climate developing from these developments. Many economists say this is illusionary, however.

"It's certainly a lot easier to raise prices than to cut them," said one, "but this is not any trend. At best, it's a very moderate drift."

The sugar and copper rises, the economists say, are highly individual things—having little to do with the general economy. And both especially sugar, appear to be headed downward again.

Many business economists sum up the price-level situation this way:

Competition, both foreign and domestic, will make it hard for producers to push their prices very high very fast.

The result of unemployment will discourage labor unions from pushing their demands too vigorously and forcing prices up.

The administration, faced with a major political and economic problem, will continue to discourage any general price increases.

ANSWERS to "Are You Really Happy?"

1. NO: Crowds are exhilarating, if anything, to the well adjusted.

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**Declo Hears Report on Alcoholism**  
DECOLO, Aug. 1—The seriousness of alcoholism as a public responsibility was cited by Burke Police Judge John Bowen at the noon luncheon meeting of the Declo Kiwanis club at Min's cafe.

Judge Bowen was introduced by Dr. John L. Johnson, who was in charge of the program. The judge recently completed a course on alcoholism at the University of Salt Lake City, where he heard lectures from throughout the United States and Canada emphasize the hazards of alcoholism.

He reported that more than 500 students studying social studies and welfare work at a college major were enrolled in the course.

Bowen explained that the drinking of alcoholic beverages is a social disease and marketing the Oriental nations once pronounced the death penalty on drunkards while Germany and Japan made public snake pits as a shock treatment.

Today, according to the judge, alcoholism is regarded as a disease that brings about deterioration of the functioning of the body. It brings total sickness to the individual, mentally, physically, socially and spiritually.

"Sixty-five million adults in the United States drink for pleasure," he said.

Alcohol is 10-15 times more dangerous than other drugs and for one out of 40 it brings tragedy, remorse, severe illness and permanent disability.

He advised his listeners not to belittle the alcohol but to recognize its problem and offer advice and help to those needing him to want to help himself.

Clifford Sutton called the meeting to order. Prayer was offered by Rev. G. O. Jordan and the pledge by Jack Jordan.

**Ike Approves Of Proper Discontent**

**NEW YORK, Aug. 1 (UPI)—**Former President Eisenhower said Wednesday that Negro civil rights demonstrators throughout the nation emphasize a proper discontent—the rightful discontent of a minority.

"I call your attention to their discontent by proper demonstrations. I feel it is all right," said Eisenhower before sailing to Hawaii to visit the Pacific fleet.

"I understand their purposes," said Eisenhower. "I agree with them that they are entitled to their just rights."

"Every individual in the United States has a legal and moral obligation to see others enjoy the same rights as himself, and every possibility of differentiating between political and economical 'rights' on the basis of color," he added.

**FBI Head Calls For Ethics Code**

Hoover, director of the FBI, said he has always believed that conduct in the profession because civil rights violations by law enforcement officers "stem from item after item of corruption, racialism, and a lack of proper training and un-tutored in the ethics of the profession."

**East Germany to Sign Test Treaty**

**BERLIN, Aug. 1 (UPI)—**German Chief of State Walter Ulbricht announced Wednesday his communist regime will sign the Moscow Treaty to ban nuclear weapons tests in West Germany to do the same.


Walker was hospitalized this week to be fitted with a leg brace. He was injured several months ago in an accident at a Richfield garage.

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## Committee Restores Cut In Aid Funds

**WASHINGTON**, Aug. 1 (UPI)—The Senate foreign relations committee voted to restore a \$1-million dollar cut in funds for the alliance for progress program for Latin America.

The committee also voted to reconsider another action which would have put tighter limits on development loans by requiring a maximum percent-interest rate and a maximum 30-year repayment provision.

Both the Senate and House actions were strongly opposed by the administration.

Sen. Frank J. Lausche, D.-O., and Karl E. Mundt, R.-S.D., co-authors of the tighter-development loan proposal, will submit a revised version of their amendment at the committee's next meeting Friday.

Chairman J. William Fulbright, D.-Ark., said he and his committee could complete action on the bill Friday.

## Sheepmen Hit Government Eradication

**WASHINGTON**, Aug. 1 (UPI)—Sheepmen testified Wednesday in support of a bill to pay indemnity to owners of sheep which are slaughtered under a program for the eradication of scrapie, a brain disease.

John Casparaitz, attorney for the National Sheep Association, Columbia, Mo., said the bill would "allow the federal government to make a raid on the federal treasury."

All they want, Casparaitz said, is to ensure a fair indemnity. The owners of infected animals that are slaughtered are paid by the federal government. The indemnity is based on the estimated value of the animal; some states also pay partial indemnities.

Allen L. Helms of Bellevue, Ill., said that in August, 1958, he sold a ram off his farm to an Oregon breeder and in 1959 it developed scrapie. He wants compensation. He said the agriculture department quarantined his herd of 273 sheep but no sign of scrapie was found in the herd during the year quarantine period.

"Yet," Helms said, "the federal government slaughtered the sheep without compensation." He had the sheep butchered. It had taken him a lifetime to build this flock and he had to start all over again. He said he had to sell his farm and incurred a \$30,000 cash loss.

Fred B. Hult, professor of animal diseases at Cornell University, Ithaca, N.Y., said there is no shred of evidence to show that scrapie is spread from one sheep to another. He said the only way to eradicate the disease by slaughter are unwaranted and futile.

**VISAS TO BE USED**  
**AMMAN**, Jordan, Aug. 1 (UPI)—The United Arab Republic will reintroduce visas for Jordanian citizens who travel to the Egyptian national visiting Egypt. It was disclosed in Amman. Previously Arab league member states could enter the UAR without visa.

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
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
