Red Cross Cites Need for Type AB Negative Blood

Do you have AB negative blood? If so, the American Red Cross wants you to register at the nearest Red Cross office. This type of blood is very rare and at present there are only six persons having this type of blood registered with the Twin Falls Red Cross.

It is an emergency arises in which this type of blood is needed. Mrs. Helen Blason, executive secretary of the Twin Falls Red Cross chapter, tries to contact one of the six persons registered.

So far she has been lucky. One of these six persons always has been in Twin Falls when needed. More donors with AB negative are needed. Mrs. Blason said especially during the summer months when people are on vacation and more accidents are likely to happen.

Another reason more donors with AB negative should contact the Red Cross office is there is a very limited supply of AB negative in the blood bank.

If an accident happens and someone needs about four or five pints, there may be only one pint in the bank. So donors with AB negative will have to be called to provide the blood.

On July 20, Mrs. Blason was lucky in getting a donor to give a pint of AB negative to save a baby's life.

Olivia, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jennings Oliva, 347 E. 1st, had AB positive blood—the mother has AB negative—and would die unless the blood was changed to AB negative.

Only fresh blood can be used to correct this condition. Dr. E. M. Wright, Twin Falls pediatrician, says.

The hospital officials called the Twin Falls Red Cross chapter and Mrs. Blason started calling the donors who are registered with the Red Cross.

Of the six registered, Harold Rene, 354 Filler avenue west, was the only one in Twin Falls at the time—11 p. m. July 20. Rene, 35, is a truckdriver for Garrett Freightlines, Inc.

The Red Cross prefers persons who have AB-negative blood not to give the blood at the drawings but to wait until they are called during an emergency. Names should be listed with the Twin Falls Red Cross chapter office.

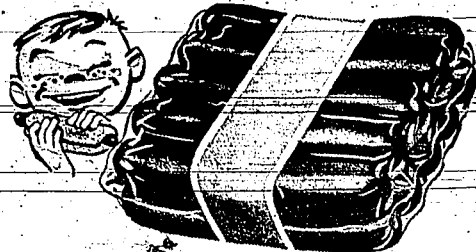

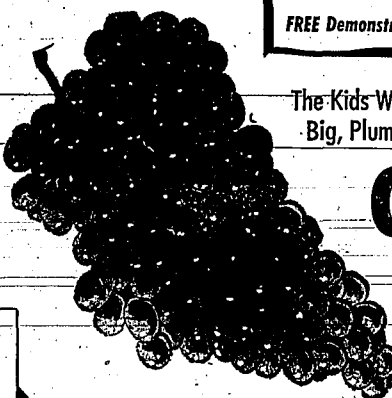

BURLEY, Aug. 1—A proposed drawing of a highway sign to be erected at city entrance was presented at the board of directors' breakfast meeting Wednesday at the city hall.

News Around Idaho

POCAHONTO, Aug. 1—The Pocahonto school board says it will ask district patrons to approve at an election Aug. 27 a \$8 mill plant operation and maintenance levy which was defeated Tuesday.

BOISE, Aug. 1—Idaho's general fund moved approximately \$10 million into the black today with tax anticipation notes. The notes were issued Wednesday to cover a general fund deficit which Bill Moore said was incurred July 1 by transfer of nearly a million dollars to the public school and public assistance funds. Under Idaho law the general fund can be overdrawn for 30 days before the overdraft must be paid or covered by tax anticipation notes after that time.

LEWISTON, Aug. 1—A spokesman for the Woodworkers' union says a serious disagreement has developed between the union and the local business community for a new contract. The talks were recessed Wednesday but either side can call for a resumption of the bargaining session. The union's contract with the local business community was extended until July 1, but the union's action Wednesday was not working without a contract.

IDAHO FALLS, Aug. 1—Patrons of Idaho Falls school district Wednesday turned down a proposed \$11 mill plant operation and maintenance levy increase. The proposal received a 233 to 1,544 favorable vote but was six per cent short of the two-thirds majority needed for passage.

BOISE, Aug. 1—Charles E. Juman, 23, one of two inmates who walked away from a prison farm in Boise May 31, has been apprehended by authorities at Sunnyside, Calif. Warden L. S. Clapp reported today. Clapp said Sunnyside authorities were alerted after he received a tip that Juman was in that area. Sunnyside officials said Juman was a graduate of the state prison for forgers in Canyon county. Juman was serving a six-year sentence for escape and persistent violation of the law from Gem county.

IDAHO CITY, Aug. 1—The body of a 23-year-old Aberdeen, Wash. man who drowned in the Broadwater river was found Wednesday two miles downstream from the spot where he disappeared while fishing. Two companions of the missing man were also found. The man was identified as John Williams, who could not swim, apparently was swept into a deep hole.

BOISE, Aug. 1—Louis Shaduck, executive secretary of the Idaho department of commerce and development, says a complete study being undertaken by his department may be a possible means of expanding Idaho's industry. The survey, a joint venture of the department—the University of Idaho and the Idaho employment security agency, will seek information on a confidential basis from all of Idaho's manufacturing and industrial firms. The information will be assembled under a three-year term. The study should be available before the end of the year.

Letters Seem To Favor Proposed Ban

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1—Messages to President Kennedy from the public seem to favor a ban on the use of nuclear weapons in the future.

Press Secretary Pierre Salinger said he picked at random a handful of letters and telegrams from the public and found 100 of the letters and telegrams favored the President's position and that slight opposition.

Over-all, Salinger reported, the White House has received more than 2,000 telegrams and letters in support of the President's position on nuclear weapons.

- 1 cup mayonnaise
- 1 cup dairy sour cream
- 2 tablespoons tarragon vinegar
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 1 cup minced parsley
- 3 tablespoons minced onion
- 1 garlic clove, minced
- 1 tablespoon finely cut chives
- 2 teaspoons capers
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper

Combine all ingredients; blend thoroughly. Cover tightly. Chill several hours.

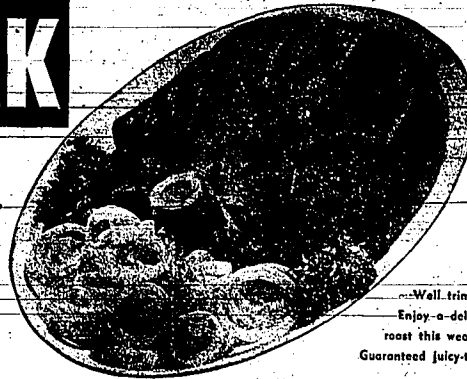

He said last April he was arrested after winning one pool game, losing two and then contributing a dollar to buy some beer for the winner. He forfeited \$10 bail after his daughter bailed him out of jail.

Businessmen Say Inflation Won't Occur

NEW YORK, Aug. 1 (AP)—New government statistics invite fears that inflation may be straining at the leash again.

But businessmen agree that it probably won't get loose yet. They concede there "has" been more price raising in recent months than there has been in a long time.

The government cost of living index for June took its biggest jump in months, reaching a record high of 106.6 per cent.

This specific figure, strongly influenced by an unusual increase in sugar prices, can't be taken too seriously by itself. But businessmen are studying the index for what it reveals about the over-all pattern.

For years that pattern has been deflationary, many businessmen say. There has been a buyers' market, with stiff price competition, since about 1950.

During this period, wholesale price indexes slipped downward and "retail" averages held about steady. The cost-of-living index inched upward, but this was almost exclusively because of higher charges for services (haircuts up 13 per cent, hospital care up 32 per cent), alcohol and taxes. Food prices have been almost steady for several years.

Real estate prices kept rising longer, partly because of property taxes, but by last year, they too had about fattened out.

U. S. Steel tried unsuccessfully to boost its price bringing the historic clash with President Kennedy in the spring of 1962.

This spring, the steel industry tried again but on a smaller scale. This time it worked.

Shortly afterward, aluminum producers gingerly raised some prices. Some brass and copper makers followed suit. Then came more aluminum boosts.

At about the same time, sugar prices scooped from near-record depths to near-record heights.

Some see a new inflationary climate emerging from these developments. Many economists say this is illusory, however.

"I've certainly no reason to take prices now than it was," said one, but this is not any trend. At best, it's a very moderate drift.

The sugar and cocoa rises, these economists say, are highly individual things, having little to do with the general economy.

And both, especially sugar, appear to be headed downward again.

Many business economists sum up the price-level situation this way:

Competition, both foreign and domestic, will make it hard for producers to push their prices very high very fast.

The high level of unemployment will discourage labor unions from pushing their demands too vigorously and forcing prices up.

The administration, faced with a continuing balance of payments problem, will continue to discourage any general price increase.

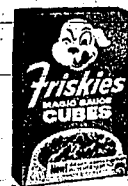

DELO, Aug. 1—The seriousness of alcoholism as a public responsibility was stressed by Police Judge John Bowen at the Monday noon luncheon meeting of the DeLo Kiwanis club at Min's cafe.
Judge Bowen was introduced by Elmer Mackie who was in charge of the program. The judge recently completed a course on alcoholism at the University of Utah, Salt Lake City, where he heard authorities throughout the United States and Canada emphasize the hazards of excessive drinking.
He reported that more than 500 students studying social studies and welfare work as college majors were enrolled in the course.
Bowen explained that the drinking of alcoholic beverages is one of the oldest customs of mankind and that the Kiwanis Club of DeLo has taken steps as a shock treatment.
Today, according to the judge, alcoholism is regarded as a disease that brings disorder in the functioning of the body. It brings total disaster to the individual, mentally, physically, socially and spiritually.
Sixty-five million adults in the United States drink for pleasure, he said.
For one out of 16 it threatens danger, trouble and regret and for one out of 40 it brings tragedy, removal, severe illness and progressive deterioration.
He advised his listeners not to belittle the alcoholic but to recognize his problem and offer advice and assistance in helping him to want to help himself.

The committee also voted to reconsider another action which would have put tighter limits on development loans by requiring a minimum two-percent interest rate and a maximum 30-year repayment provision.

Both the alliance fund slash and the loan limits actions were strongly opposed by the administration.

Sens. Frank J. Lausche, D., O., and Karl E. Mundt, R., S.D., co-authors of the tighter development loan proposal, will submit a revised version of their amendment at the committee's next meeting Friday.

Chairman J. William Fulbright, D., Ark., said he hoped the committee could complete action on the bill Friday.

Sheepmen Hit Government Eradication

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1 (AP)—Sheepmen testified Wednesday in support of a bill to pay full indemnity to owners of sheep which are slaughtered for scrapie, a fatal sheep disease.

John Canestrone, president of the National Furk Sheep Association, Columbia, Mo., said the "villains" were "have to make a rail on the federal treasury."

All they want, Canestrone said, is to secure a fair indemnity. The owners of infected animals that are slaughtered are paid by the federal government from a third to a half of the appraisal value of the animals, some states also pay partial indemnities.

Alvin L. Helms of Belleville, Ill., said that in August, 1968, he sold a ram off his farm to an Oregon breeder and in 1969 it was alleged that ram died of scrapie. He said the agriculture department quarantined his herd of 275 sheep but no sign of scrapie showed up during the 2 year quarantine period.

"Yet," Helms said, "the federal government slaughtered the entire flock and wiped me out of the sheep business. It had taken me a lifetime to build this flock and I had to start all over again at the age of 68 years. I sustained a \$65,000 cash loss."

Fred B. Hutt, professor of animal genetics at Cornell University, Ithaca, N.Y., testified there is no shred of evidence to show that scrapie is spread from one sheep to another.

Hutt said attempts to eradicate the disease by slaughter are unwarranted and futile.

VISAS TO BE USED
AMMAN, Jordan, Aug. 1 (AP)—The United Arab Republic will reintroduce visas for Jordanians, Syrians, Iraqis and Saudi Arabians visiting Egypt, it was disclosed in Amman. Previously, Arab league member states could enter the UAR without visas.
