

Idaho and Wyoming Split On Advisability of Building Burns Creek

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7 (P)—Spokesmen for Idaho and Wyoming split today over whether Burns Creek dam in Idaho should be kept in a water project authorization bill. Ralph E. Harding and Compton J. White, Jr., Idaho Democrats, urged the house public works flood-control subcommittee to approve the \$2 million Snake river water project. Gov. Clifford P. Hansen, Wyoming, criticized the project as being a threat to his state's economy and a potential "death blow to future reclamation in the West."

He said there is no need for Burns Creek power and it would not affect Wyoming's coal industry. Other Idaho witnesses testified at the opening of a two-day hearing on a project which for years has been opposed by private power groups and Wyoming coal interests. All the witnesses recommended the dam.

Opposition witnesses will be heard Thursday. Church said no other Idaho project has such general approval as Burns Creek. Support has been bipartisan in Idaho and also at the national level, with both the Kennedy and Eisenhower administrations backing the project, he added.

Idaho Woman Found Dead In Portland

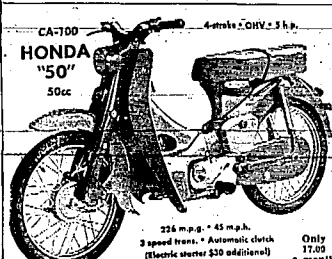

 Theatersgoers, with nothing to do during intermission, flocked over. They quickly took sides, singing with the group they championed.

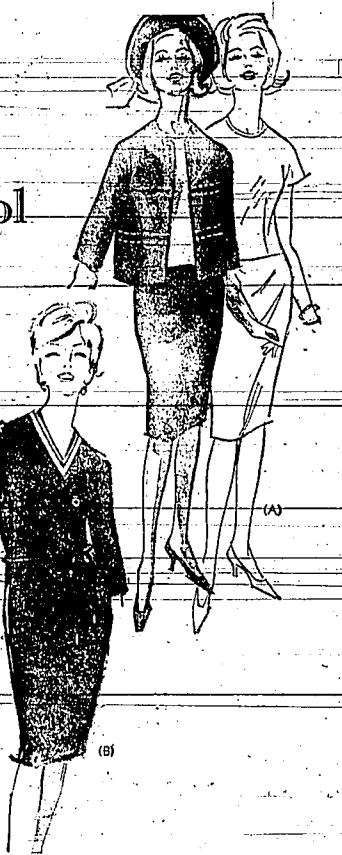

Notions Rank Extremely High In Sales Rate

NEW YORK, Aug. 7 (AP)—Little things mean a lot of dollars for the notions industry. The president of the National Notion Association predicted in February, at the industry's semi-annual trade show, that the retail volume for little things would reach a record \$1.25 billion in 1963.

Notions, said Harold Rattner, president, at the rate sales have gone so far, he may have to revise that estimate upward. Rattner spoke at the opening of the association's August trade show in New York.

Buttons, for instance, sold at a clip 50 per cent ahead of 1962 in the first six months of 1963, he said. Sales on these dark speck globe may reach \$150 million this year, he said. "Button sales are at an all-time high," Rattner continued, pushed upward in part by ready-made and long-sleeved blouses with buttoned cuffs.

Closest accessories spurred by the new see-through hanging shelf and garment bags, will exceed the 1962 volume, he said. Sale of hair ornaments is 50 per cent over last year, with headbands selling at a booming rate.

Rattner said the notions boom apparently is part of a general retail sales increase. He cited a study by the National Retail Merchants association showing that retailers expected the second half of 1963 to run five per cent ahead of the same period last year.

Notion sales of everything from zippers to rain hats to curlers to sun spec to can openers have been climbing for the last 15 years, said Rattner. Fashion is one reason for the climb, because of the home sewing market.

New home construction is another and this affects the demand for closet accessories, storage devices and other household notions," he said.

"Travel, (more) leisure and outdoor living" also have boosted sales.

"There are notions made for automobiles, boats, patios, terraces, for all members of the family, all parts of the house," he said.

The association president said that selecting at random from the variety of notions available, he found one Los Angeles store carrying 6,000 notions, not counting color and size variations.

A Washington, D. C. store had nearly 50,000 items on its notions counters, he said.

What's new in notions? Well, there's a "quickie" pattern, with a minimum of pieces to make the popular shift dresses.

There are the nylon zipper, which takes dye with the fabric; a new metal frame for a handbag so that the home seamstress can create purses to match garments through a hidden curtain rod device which holds the fabric to the fabric, and iron-on replacement pockets for men's and boy's trousers.

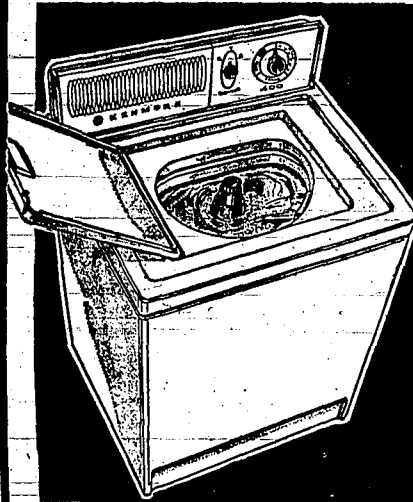

Tariff Fight With Mart Explained

Editor's note—The United States says it will retaliate against the European Common Market for boosting tariff duties on U.S. goods. The action raises the question of international trade in a time of peace. The following story analyzes the situation.

BY DARDEN CHAMBLISS
NEW YORK, Aug. 7 (U)—The move reflects a new American attitude and tactic—a get-tough policy. It also reflects these newly complicated circumstances in world trade.

The United States, after weeks of wrangling with the European Common Market, announced Tuesday it will retaliate against tariff increases on American poultry.

The government, if a settlement is not reached, will raise duties against European products to equal the loss of 46 million dollars a year in American poultry exports.

The U.S. move would affect the prices Americans pay for imports, but the dollar amount isn't nearly as important as what the action means.

The last poultry sales are only a fraction of the 3.6 billion dollars worth of U.S. goods exported to European Common Market countries each year.

The move reflects a new American attitude and tactic—a get-tough policy. It also reflects these newly complicated circumstances in world trade.

—The Common Market has asserted itself as a strong-willed equal in trade dealings with the United States.

—Europe's farm bloc have made it clear they are keeping a sharp eye out for their own interests, which often clash with those of America.

—Europe, having trouble working out its own agricultural policy, has resisted U.S. efforts to link agricultural and industrial products in trade talks.

—Protectionist sentiment in the United States—in the shoe and textile industries especially—shows signs of rallying.

Some trade observers question the wisdom of retaliation. They say the situation is far too complicated to be solved merely by acting tough.

Others agree with Sen. Frank Carlson, R. Kans., that the United States might be "out-traded and sold down the river unless we adopt a hard line."

This kind of tariff-raising reverberates around the non-Common world because of international trade rules that say all cuts and boosts must be applied to everyone.

In the early post-war years, Americans grew progressively wary toward liberalizing world trade. The idea of "trade, not aid" to get ravaged nations going again was appealing. When low-priced imports began brightening American shop counters, buyers were pleased.

Then France asserted its ambitions to sell its farm surpluses to Common Market neighbors. American regulators, asking that farm goods be tied to industrial goods in trade talks, hit a brick wall.

Smylie Gives Support for Burns Creek

BOISE, Aug. 7 (U-I)—Idaho's support of the controversial Burns creek project was voiced anew Tuesday in a telegram offered as part of the record for a congressional hearing.

Gov. Robert W. Smylie said he would be unable to appear personally at the hearing in Washington today and Thursday.

But he said in a telegram to Rep. Ralph R. Harding, D-Ida., that "the government of the state of Idaho regularly supports and continues to support construction of the \$2 million dollar project."

Burns creek is proposed for construction on the Snake river in eastern Idaho to serve as a re-creating structure for Pullman dam. It was added by the senate to an omnibus authorization bill and the hearings are being held by the house.

A year ago the senate acted similarly but the house refused to accept the project on the ground it is primarily a power-producing dam. Supporters contend the project would have multipurpose benefits.

Smylie's telegram to Harding was made public by the governor's office.

"I regret that hurried scheduling of hearings on Burns creek authorization makes it impossible for me to comply with your request for personal appearance at those hearings," Smylie's telegram said.

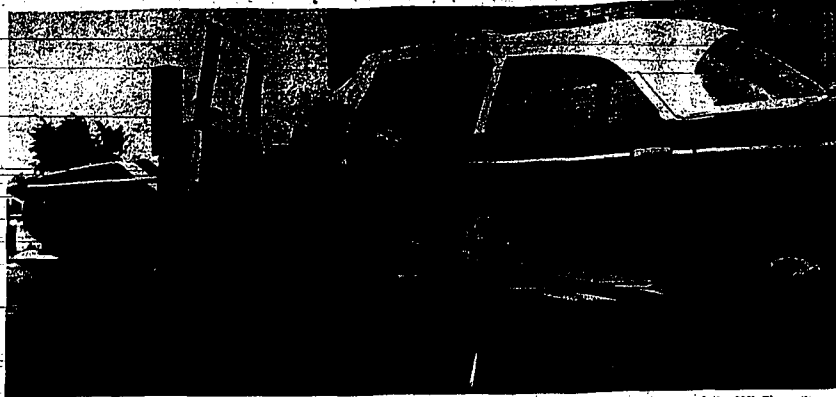
"As you know the State of Idaho formally endorsed over my signature early authorization and construction this reclamation project—in a letter to the secretary of the interior under date of Nov. 27, 1959."

"While position was reiterated on May 25, 1962, in a letter to the chief of engineers when the project was considered as a flood control project."

"The Idaho legislature by adoption of house joint memorial No. 3, 1961 session . . . endorsed the reclamation proposal and urged immediate construction. Republican party platforms in 1958, 1960 and 1962 endorsed the project generally."

"I am informed that all of these documents are in both the public works and reclamation committees of the house of representatives of the state of Idaho regularly supported and continues to support construction of project. You are hereby authorized to make this telegram a part of the record of these current hearings."

Idaho State Police Receive New Patrol Cars, Weapons

District 4, Idaho state police, headquartered in Twin Falls, has been issued three new patrol cars. The district usually has 11 such cars used for road patrol in the district, which extends as far north as Cape Horn and as far east as Hart River.

The cars, 1963 Dodge 500 Specials, known as police pursuit cars, will replace the 1961 Plymouths as soon as they are available. Ideally, the patrol cars are "retired" after two years or 75,000 miles, whichever comes first.

However, due to the vast area the few men in the district have to cover, the demand for cars is greater than the supply. Corporal Richard Burns' Plymouth has more than 80,000 miles on it before it could be replaced this summer.

The engines in the new cars have a 411-cubic-inch displacement and are built to the specifications set down by the state police supply department in Boise.

One section of the Dodge plant closed down its entire commercial operation to build police cars. Lieutenant M. J. Bays, Jr., head of the district, points out these cars are the first four-door patrol models they have received. The door handles on the inside of the back doors have been removed to "slow down anyone who wants to leave in a hurry."

Other different items on the cars since the last shipment are new tire sizes and a new 68-amp alternator. The old ones carried only 30 amps. The alternator is a new piece of electrical equipment which replaces the generator. The stripes of white, along the

sides of the black auto, were painted. At Boise in one of the state equipment shops and the front and rear lights have been rewired so that they blink when the car is stopped along the road.

A hand throttle has been installed to keep the car idling at high speed when it is stopped on the road so it doesn't heat up or run the battery down.

Each man in the district is issued a rifle, shotgun and side-arm, and in their area they have been in short supply. Bays said some of the men have had to carry their own personal rifles.

This situation is also on its way to being solved. The state police headquarters now is issuing new rifles to the patrolmen in the various districts. The new rifles, Savage model 308-E, 308 caliber, are carbine styled and have 20-inch barrels.

In the past, the men have carried Winchester model 94 carbines, but the new Savage 308s are believed to be more reliable, faster and more accurate. Bays pointed out the U.S. army is considering the carbine for future government use.

They also carry Winchester, model 12, 12-gauge pump, or Remington model 11, semi-automatic, 12-gauge shotguns. The same side-arm is a .357 magnum Smith and Wesson Highway Patrol revolver.

Without a doubt, the patrolmen are prepared for almost any emergency that could arise. Packed away in the patrol cars is a vast amount of equipment for use under any circumstances and in any weather. They have a first-aid kit, a

shovel, ex. emergency rations, canvas water bag, blankets, a fire extinguisher, a tow cable and a set of portable caution signs that can be set up at the scene of an accident.

They also carry two types of tires, one of which is the 90-

minute railroad flare, wig-wag caution signals which are powered by flashlight batteries, foul-weather clothing, resuscitation equipment, a camera, measuring tape and binoculars.

One of the new pieces of equipment just issued is called a No-

drunk suspect is checked for being piece of webbing known as a safety belt. "We've seen what can happen when people don't use them," said Bays. "That made us say other cars—in the simple (firmed) belief: We use them."

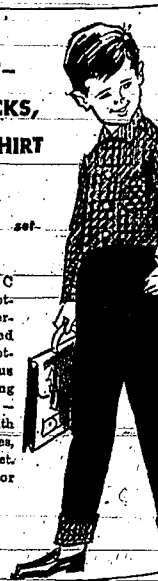

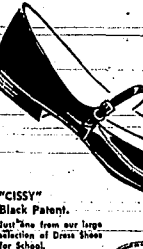

Next Peace Round With Khrushchey May Be Tough

By JOHN M. HIGHTOWER
WASHINGTON, Aug. 7 (AP)—As East-West negotiations so, the recent conclusion of a limited nuclear test ban treaty with the Soviet Union was a breeze. The next round won't be so easy.

Premier Khrushchey's insistence call for an East-West nonaggression treaty seems certain to provide the central issue in negotiations at the next stage.

The problem of finding out how the United States should approach those negotiations—and what Khrushchey wants to accomplish in them—is being explored by Secretary of State Dean Rusk in talks with top Soviet leaders in Moscow.

Khrushchey has made his main point clear: At the signing of the test ban pact Monday in Moscow he declared that "the next step, in our opinion, should be to conclude a nonaggression pact between member states of NATO and the states belonging to the Warsaw treaty."

While the United States position on his proposal is publicly flexible, American leaders undoubtedly are opposed to the pact in the form in which Khrushchey wants it.

The public flexibility is due to a desire here to keep Western negotiations with the Soviet government moving "to a safe" and find out whether a modified nonaggression agreement—acceptable to both sides might be worked out.

What course Khrushchey eventually takes depends on his real goals, about which Washington officials are uncertain. In many aspects, he is angling for some kind of recognition of communist East Germany, the United States and its allies will face extreme difficulty in coming to terms with him in the next round. The Western powers do not recognize East Germany, a member of the Warsaw treaty.

In the view of some of the best informed authorities here a nonaggression pact would be meaningless except as a kind of good will gesture toward peace. All the countries which are members of the United Nations, including the Soviet Union and the United States, are already committed to nonaggression by the U. N. charter.

Silver Ore Shipment to U. S. Probed


WHITEHORSE, Yukon Territory, Aug. 7 (AP)—The Royal Canadian Mounted police has started investigating the shipment of \$100,000 worth of high grade silver ore to Helena, from the Yukon.

Inspector J. L. Vachon said the shipment is believed to have been made in June or July by rail from Whitehorse to Skagway, Alaska, and by boat to the U.S. mainland. Officers said the investigation began last week after they received word a shipment of ore was traced to Helena. It is being held by police until the RCMP can determine who shipped the ore and where it came from.

Vachon said the investigation is being made in the Whitehorse area and he expects the investigation will take it well south of here.

The ore, filling two railroad cars, was shipped by Gerald Henry Priest to the Anaconda company smelter at East Helena. Priest, reported to be a former lawyer for a Canadian firm, was in Helena for a time and later returned to Vancouver, B.C.

Authorities said no charges had been filed in connection with the investigation. No shipping charges were paid on the ore, reported to be extremely rich. In Helena, estimates of its value ranged up to \$200,000.

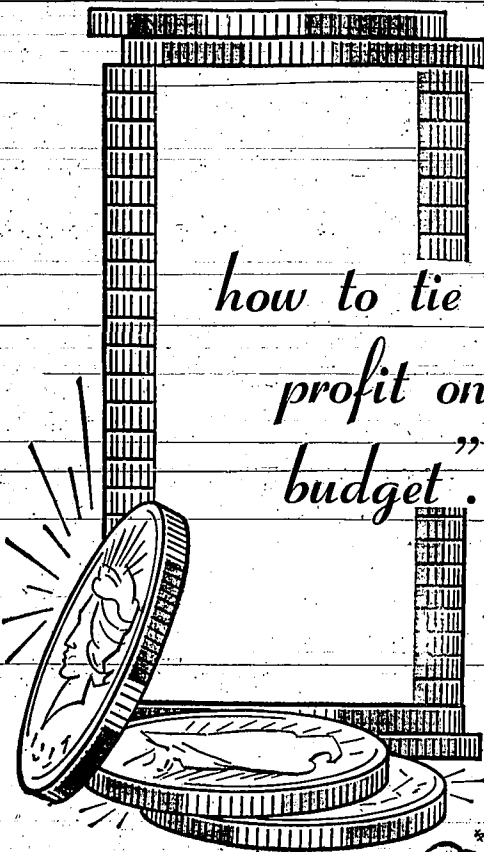

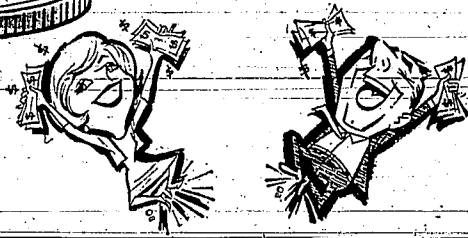

She will wear gold pants and vest, a white shirt, beige hat, brown boots, and white gloves. Her horse is a 4-year-old sorrel gelding.

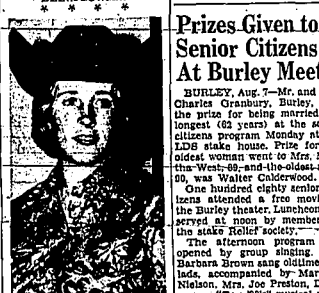

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Georgia Coach Maintains Notes Could Help Foes In Fixing Grid Ambush

ATLANTA, Aug. 7 (AP)—Georgia football coach Johnny Griffith testified Tuesday that information allegedly passed to a rival coach disclosed the only two playing formations employed by his squad in their 1962 opener against Alabama. Griffith took the stand in a civil suit filed by Wally Butts, former Georgia athletic director, against a 10 million dollar libel suit by Butts, former Georgia athletic director.

Senators and Yanks Trade Victories

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7 (AP)—The Yankees' lead in the brilliant one-hit, 1-0 shutout at the Washington Senators Tuesday night, enabling the New York Yankees to split a doubleheader after the Senators had bombed the Yankees with four home runs and handed him his third straight loss in the opener 8-5.

Some of the terminology in the notes was that used by Butts during his coaching career at Georgia, Griffith said. Going over the scoring plays—Alabama won 35-0—Griffith admitted that the first three touchdowns were scored because of errors or weakness on the part of Georgia players.

"I didn't think we played well," Griffith said. Griffith testified that some of the notes meant nothing to him, some of them were not important and others were not true. He also denied several quotations attributed to him in the magazine article.

"I made the statement that I figured somebody had been giving information to Alabama," Griffith said, but he denied a quote from the Post which said: "We had no idea it was Wally Butts."

Griffith also denied saying, as quoted by the Post, that he told university officials he was resigning if Butts were permitted to remain in his job as athletic director. During the game, Griffith said some of his players said the Alabama men knew what plays Georgia was running and were even calling out our plays and when we were going to do it.

However, he said Georgia did not have a play called "88-pop" which the Post said was yelled out by Alabama players. Griffith said, under questioning by Schroder who went into detail about formations and plays, that any number of plays could be run from his two formations.

He said the final game plan for the Alabama game was not decided on until Sept. 17, five days after the allegedly intercepted Butts-Bryant call.

Griffith said that if Alabama scouted Georgia, then Bryant would know Georgia had used the two formations.

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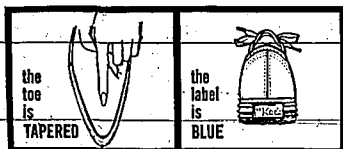


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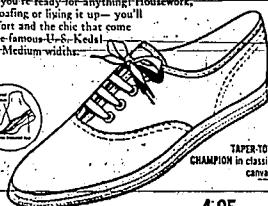

Red China May Explode A Bomb in Reply to Ban

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., Aug. 7 (UPI)—Red China is expected to explode an atomic device in October as Mao Tse-tung's answer to the treaty on a partial test ban among the United States, Britain and Russia.

Asian diplomats in touch with Peking predict that the Chinese test will take place in the province of Sinkiang on the 15th anniversary of Mao's seizure of power.

Nikita Khrushchev, Soviet Premier, said today that he trusted the Chinese and did not adhere more to the test ban than the Chinese.

But Ho Chi Minh, president of Communist North Viet Nam, says Peking will be producing nuclear weapons in the near future.

Ho Chi Minh, who backs Mao in his conflict with Khrushchev, is a battle-scarred Red who was once the Communist International's chief of Southeast Asia. To retain power in Viet Nam, he had to calculate shrewdly before throwing his support to Mao.

Despite Khrushchev's assurances, Asian diplomats also are convinced that the Chinese are well advanced in their nuclear program. They fear the psychological impact the Chinese explosion of even a "crude" bomb will have in Asia. In their view, it will be foolhardy to let enthusiasm of the test ban treaty blind the United States to the peril of relying on the Russians and freeing out the Chinese.

Could it be that American leaders underestimate Red China as they once underrated Khrushchev himself? It is a historic fact that the Russian bomb and

the first hydrogen bomb explosion came well before the dates forecast by the United States experts.

As early as 1953—shortly after Khrushchev met with General Eisenhower at the first Geneva summit meeting—the Russians began to supply China with nuclear uranium, thorium, uranium 235 and 238, tritium, plutonium and heavy water. They also delivered to Peking T-4 bombers—Russia's equivalent to the U.S. B-29 which dropped the atomic bomb on Japan—and twin-jet IL-28 light bombers.

These presumably produce enough plutonium for two test explosions a year and a dozen devices this year and a dozen

more in five years. Although it will undoubtedly take some years before the Chinese develop modern delivery systems, they have enough T-4 bombers to threaten India and terrorize all Asia.

The world must therefore be prepared to see the infamous mushroom "cloud" over China this year. And those who think seriously of international affairs must be prepared for the waves of public reaction that the Chinese explosion will produce.

The Chinese bomb, coupled with what is known of Mao's ambitions, will strike fear into the hearts of millions.

Why, then, did Khrushchev, in his confidential talk with Ambassador Harriman, show "complete unconcern" with China's nuclear program? It is hardly in the nature of the man—unless he has urgent and compelling reasons—to invite more bricks from the Reds by revealing to a "capitalist American" military secrets about a Red nation with whom Russia is still allied through a mutual military assistance pact.

In the view of specialists on communism, Khrushchev needs badly the "historic" diversion of the test ban treaty while he mends his crumbling fences in the Red world.

He—desperately—wants to avoid

what every statesman dreads—a two-front conflict with China and the West. He also hopes to gain other benefits at a summit meeting with President Kennedy including expanded East-West trade that will serve as a bridge

for Russia's renege allies. But the United States senate cannot underwrite or ignore China in the debate on the ratification of the test ban agreement.

Retaliation On Tariffs

Set by U. S.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7 (AP)—The United States took steps today to retaliate against the European Common market for its policy of increasing tariffs on U. S. goods.

Commerce Secretary C. Douglas Dillon announced that a public hearing will be held next month to discuss the U. S. policy of withdrawing trade concessions granted the European Common market.

The European Common market, composed of France, West Germany, Italy, Belgium, the Netherlands and Luxembourg, has raised the tariff on U. S. poultry products from 4.8 cents a pound to 13.45 cents.

The tariff increase has been an unreasonable restriction on U. S. poultry shipments. It estimated the loss at 46 million dollars a year. Concessions which would be withdrawn by this country would be of an equal amount.

Jordan Scores Aid Recipients

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7 (AP)—Sen. Jordan, R., Ind., says 14 nations which have received economic aid from the United States now either lean toward communism or have totalitarian governments.

He said that in those 14 nations "the cause of freedom has been much more than the amount of money spent there would indicate it should have."

The 14 nations are: Argentina, Brazil, Cuba, Haiti, Indonesia, Iran, Laos, Poland, Portugal, South Vietnam, Turkey, Venezuela and Yugoslavia.

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Florida Man Freed After Struggle of Two Years

PANAMA CITY, Fla., Aug. 6 (AP)—Clarence Earl Gideon went off to prison two years and two days ago, convicted of breaking into a poolroom but convinced his poverty had not him a fair trial.

Today, because he kept fighting in his prison cell for his belief that he had the right to a lawyer even though he couldn't pay for one, Gideon is free, and in Florida and other states have the hope of new trials, with lawyers to defend them.

Gov. Smylie Is Unable to Attend Project Hearing

BOISE, Aug. 7 (AP)—Gov. Robert E. Smylie said today he will be unable to attend congressional hearings in Washington on the proposed Burns Creek project but he called attention to previous statements putting the state of Idaho on record in support of the project.

Smylie's office made public a telegram from the chief executive to Rep. Ralph Harding, D., Idaho, who had urged the Idaho governor to appear personally at the hearings Wednesday and Thursday.

The governor said the conference was concerned with the newly formed Republican government.

"A little bit from one fellow, and something else from another man, and it started falling together," Gideon said.

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Workers Labor to Re-Build Skopje

BELOGRADE, Yugoslavia, Aug. 7 (AP)—Workers have begun constructing housing settlements for the refugees of Skopje, devastated by an earthquake that took more than 1,000 lives July 26.

The settlements are expected to house 12,000 persons before the end of the year. Eventually the city of 270,000 will be rebuilt on a different site.

A light earthquake was felt at Skopje, 200 miles north-west of Skopje, this morning. There was no material damage.

East Pakistan May Harbor Reds

NEW DELHI, India, Aug. 7 (AP)—The Indian government has received reports that a number of "Chinese" communist military officers were seen recently in East Pakistan, a spokesman for the foreign ministry said today.

The Indian government has recently expressed fear of a possible Chinese-Pakistani alliance against India.

Skyscraper Has 50th Anniversary

NEW YORK (AP)—America's first skyscraper, the Woolworth building, is celebrating its 50th anniversary.

The 60-story building, rising 282 feet and one inch above the street, "is so tall" people said in 1913, "it gives you a crick in the neck to look up at it."

Today it is considered one of the country's architectural landmarks with its gothic lines, flying buttresses, gargoyles, a lace-like stone exterior, and three-story vaulted entrance arcade.

The building is still headquarters of the F.W. Woolworth company.
