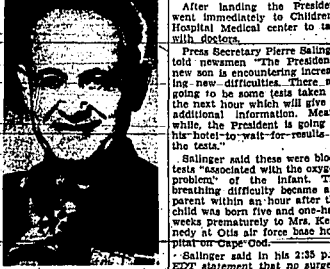


President's New Son Has Taken Turn For Worse

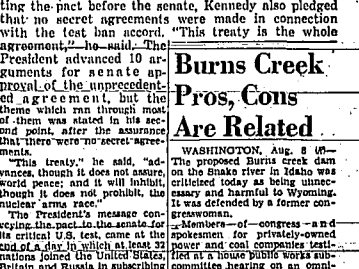

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T.F. Bicycle Safe Driver Plan to Start

A safe bicycle driving campaign will be started this month in Twin Falls by the Joe Salasbury agency as part of the national bicycle safety campaign sponsored by the American Insurance company of Newark.

Salasbury said the agency will seek to promote bicycle safety among the youngsters through distribution of a 16-page, color illustrated booklet on bicycle safety, metal license plates and wallet size safe driver's license card.

This card will be his certification that he has qualified as a safe bicycle driver.

Salasbury added these license plates and driver's license cards will be given only to those who pass the tests that are in the booklet.

The primary purpose of the campaign, Salasbury said, is to instill good habits of safe driving in young persons while they are riding bicycles, so when they are old enough to drive automobiles, they will do so in a safer and more responsible manner.

"Today's bicycle riders are tomorrow's automobile drivers," Salasbury said. "As an insurance agent, we are concerned about the rate at which motor vehicle accidents cause injury, death and economic loss to the public."

"We believe this rate can be decreased in the future by making certain that tomorrow's driver operates his car safely and responsibly."

Record Haul

Tablets Tell If Teeth Are Well Brushed

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—A little red tablet has brought drama to the dentist's chair. Some dentists are now using a harmless food coloring dye to show their patients the "ineffectiveness" of their tooth-brushing exercise.

The dye is contained in a red tablet (on the market as X-Pose tablets).

You pop the tablet into your mouth, chew for 30 seconds, open your mouth and see your teeth and gums stained red wherever your toothbrushing failed.

Brother—if you see red, you will better do more than stop. What you may think is last night's nightmare is really transparent, multicolored material—called "Wilt-A-Way" refer to as dental plaques.

By selectively staining the bacterial plaques, the tablet shows where your brush is falling. Bacteria thrive within the plaques. And where there's bacteria, dentist bills aren't too far behind.

Soluble sugars from food and drink "feed" and "hardly" eat through dental plaques.

Within seconds, acid forms on the plaque and the tooth gradually dissolves—their enamel softens and then a hole or cavity forms.

Use of the tell-tale dye has also changed many dentists' thinking about dental hygiene. Many now feel brushing after every meal isn't enough. In addition, they urge use of dental floss, a thread-like material.

A few feel the routine should even be prolonged by massaging of the gums with match-like sticks enclosed in a match-like book.

Ailing Cities on Spot

A fresh opportunity is at hand for state, county and local governments to show their staff in competition with a federal authority against whose encroachment they complain.

Special senate and house subcommittees on intergovernmental relations are beginning a long series of field inquiries into basic problems confronting the various levels of government in the nation's major metropolitan areas.

What the subcommittees want to hear is Washington solutions—"grass roots" proposals for improving regional cooperation in solving such problems.

For example, if there is widespread opposition to plans for federal mass transit legislation, the problem will "ask simply."

How do you in your area propose to meet the crushing transportation needs of the present and future? Do you have the legal power and the organizational capacity to deal with these needs?

Authorities and interested parties at the various levels below Washington will be on test. For many of these assertions...

"Leave us alone. Leave these matters to us. We are better able to solve our difficulties than you are."

The answer to that, in the present circumstance, is that their case is unproved.

Many American communities are in deep trouble and show little signs of knowing how to extricate themselves. Slums grow faster than they can stamp them out. Automobile traffic strangles them. Air pollution comes near to smothering them on certain days. Financial burdens weigh them down.

Aut or Nite City, in a new book called "Sick Cities," notes that one town equipped its postmen with gas masks because its air was unfit to breathe. It is a fact of life today, he adds, that every urban American lives to 60 can be a victim of a crime ranging from theft to mayhem.

In less than two decades, says Gordon, nine out of 10 Americans will be living in urban, metropolitan regions. Conditions then may be even more intolerable than they are now, and their communities are now to crack some of their most desperate problems.

Many of the "solutions" thus far tried, like widening streets and highways, only lead to more congestion.

But in many ways—control of sprawl, of road patterns, of pollution, of recreational facilities—effective solutions are clearly barred by antiquated regional and local governing practices.

But one school of thought believes the capacity to clean away the deadwood of decades and grapple imaginatively with the huge dilemmas of city and town and county, the men of congress now plunging into the field, coast to coast, will be only too happy to hear it.

It was something like that on a sporting goods page in one of the new fall catalogues. The catalogues can now obtain a portable record player which works on batteries and can broadcast a hi-fi sound three miles. Records are practically guaranteed to bring game, from rabbits to deer, right up to the nose of the shooter in the woods, which allows hunters to use the device.

That's carrying ingenuity even further than those mosquitoes did.

WASHINGTON Post—Most of the great cities of America are suffering from a chronic metropolitan malady known as hardening of the traffic arteries.

It is generally agreed that unless something is done the nation's urban areas will be reduced to a mass of traffic jams.

It also is generally agreed that the only solution to the problem lies in the improvement of mass transportation.

I am not aware of what measures other cities are taking, but I am pleased to report that the nation's capital is setting an example in this regard.

Freedom a month goes by that some government or private agency doesn't bring out an initiative to improve the traffic situation in the nation's capital.

Copies are sent to congress and the White House, where officials are sure to be asked to "do something about that interesting brush work."

The traffic department changes the direction of one-way streets again, and that takes care of the problem for a while.

The federal pace that has made Washington the most congested city in the development of mass transportation brochures already is producing better results.

For one thing, it provides employment for a large number of people who are waiting for traffic to be improved.

Negro Upgrading Plan Proposed

United Press International
One of the most ambitious programs ever adopted for the upgrading of the Negro race in America has been proposed by the National Urban League.

The proposal, quickly named the "Marshall Plan," would call for a \$10 billion over an estimated 10 billion dollar period.

The project's aim would be to close the gap, except socially, between the Negro and white citizen of the United States.

The Urban League, which conceived the idea and wants to manage it, acknowledges there are many hurdles to surmount before final plans can be announced. That is expected within the next three months.

"We are just putting the meat on the bones now," Herman Sweatt, assistant director of the Urban League in the South, said.

The spokesman said the federal government is exploring "a high level" of the feasibility of the project. Whittney Young, Jr., Urban League executive secretary, was in a day-long conference at the White House yesterday during which the proposed program was discussed.

Young visualizes the program being financed by federal, state and local governments as well as by private foundations.

The plan would finance job training and apprentice courses

for Negroes, scholarships, health programs, business financing, book buying and tutoring.

"The gap between Negro and white, across the board, is a wide widening in terms of such things as education and income," Sweatt said. "If we are going to close that gap, something in addition to equal opportunity has to be added. We must go beyond equality."

The Urban League feels that because of the long lag between the education of large masses of Negro and white children, the finest teachers should now be made available to Negroes.

The Urban League plans to concentrate heavily on the advancement of job opportunities for Negroes and it is here that much of the money would be spent.

A firm, for example, would receive a grant for setting up an apprentice program for Negroes. Teachers would be paid and the salaries of the Negro apprentices might be supplemented while in training.

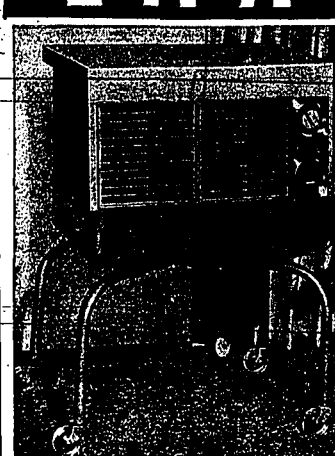

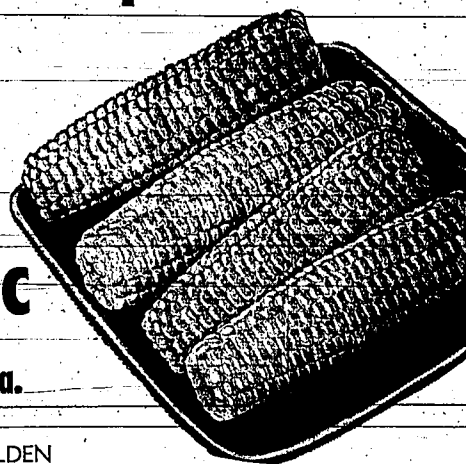

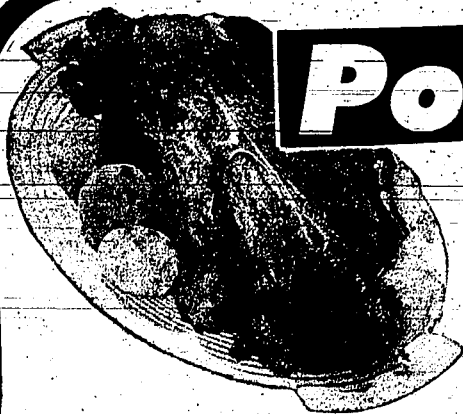

Everybody Gripes About Taxes

NEW YORK, Aug. 8 (AP)—If you see red when you think how much the tax collectors get from your pay, take consolation. Millions of other persons around the world share your feelings.

An Associated Press survey showed that in four of six world centers, families of modest income pay 15 to 20 per cent of their income in taxes.

In the higher pay brackets, the tax percentages range from 45 to 77 per cent.

Any "imaginary" bus driver and a \$100,000-a-year man were selected in each location, each with a wife and two children. Because of the complexity of various tax structures, estimates had to be based on a "number of points."

An average bus driver in New York earns \$2,824, more than double the pay of drivers in other cities.

But he pays \$558 in federal income tax and \$603 in other taxes, totaling 30 per cent of his pay.

The average bus driver in Frankfurt, on an income of \$2,400, hands over 17 per cent—income tax of \$170 and other taxes

The London bus driver has 14 direct taxes amount to \$250 or 13 per cent.

Of \$1,917 in pay, the Tokyo bus driver pays eight per cent in taxes—\$530 for income tax and \$60 for others.

And in Rio de Janeiro, the driver makes \$1,270, but his tax bill is the lowest, of all—six per cent. His income tax is \$10 and other taxes amount to \$170.

The comparison in taxes for

the \$100,000-a-year man moves Rio de Janeiro from the lowest spot to one of the highest. More than 65 per cent of the Rio man's earnings go to the tax collector.

His federal income tax alone comes to 65 per cent. An approximate figure for his other taxes could not be determined.

Deadly Logic Of Gangland Fight Shown

NEW YORK, Aug. 7 (CP)—The deadly logic behind three gangland mysteries was placed together by police Wednesday with the aid of syndicate "squealer" Joseph Valachi.

Before Valachi revealed details of the criminal organization "Cosa Nostra" four things, detectives had tried to pin down the connections between these incidents that rocked the underworld:

The attempted assassination of gambling kingpin Frank Costello, by a gunman who only nicked Costello's scalp as he entered the lobby of his Central park apartment house May 2, 1957.

The barbershop slaying of Albert Anastasia, high executioner of Murder Inc. and another top mob leader, on Oct. 25, 1957.

The disappearance of Anthony (Tony Bender) Strollo last year. Police assumed all along the events were linked in a syndicate struggle for power, but not till the frightened Valachi talked did the pattern fall together.

Now, according to police sources, they not only have the big picture but have their fingers on most members of the cast—at least those who are not dead or missing.

The shootings of Costello and Anastasia, just six months apart, had led to an assessment of police theories: that Costello was marked for death by the syndicate because it was feared he might talk at a time when he was involved in an income tax evasion appeal.

That an underworld newcomer tried to kill "Cicce Frank" to build a reputation . . . that Anastasia was slain in revenge for the Costello attempt . . . that the motive behind was Anastasia's attempt to take over the Cuban gambling empire of his friend Meyer Lansky.

The theories were all off the target, told by Valachi and now backed up by New York detectives, the Costello shooting was personally ordered by Vito Genovese—named by Valachi as the leader of Cosa Nostra—when Costello refused to have Genovese a bigger share of the racket.

Vincent (The Chin) Gigante, Genovese's chauffeur, was picked up as the would-be killer of

roughed up. But Genovese and his group moved first. Enlisting Anastasia's trusted deputy, Carlo Gambino, to switch allegiance and help out, the group employed the Profect and Carlo media of Brooklyn to do away with Anastasia in a mid-Manhattan barber shop. Police said they know the names of the two Carlo mob members who were the trigger men. They said questioning of one suspect, 31-year-old Ralph Marfel, proved fruitless. Marfel has been in prison for assault and robbery. Another man sought

for questioning, Joseph (Joe) Jolly Gioelli, has been missing since August, 1961.

When Genovese went to prison on narcotics charges after his 1959 conviction, the reins of Cosa Nostra were left in the hands of Gambino and Strollo, Genovese, from his cell in the Atlanta prison, gave orders that the syndicate was to stay away from narcotics for the time being but Strollo refused to obey.

Then Strollo disappeared—and for Joseph Valachi, that meant he might be next on Cosa Nostra's "wanted" list. Valachi chose to talk.

Venezuelan Plans Revolution

CARACAS, Venezuela, Aug. 8 (AP)—The final act of communism in Venezuela is and has always been revolution, Gen. Gustavo Machado said. "If the Communist Party of Venezuela (PCV), said in an interview.

Machado said he does not believe in indiscriminate violence, but that the communist guerrilla sabotage (terrorist) activity here serves a purpose in a revolutionary blueprint leading to the overthrow of the present government only for "some sections of the party who are impatient and act on their own."

Despite his public avowals that he is the master-mind of a subversive conspiracy which has claimed hundreds of lives and caused millions of dollars worth of damage, Machado cannot be prosecuted. As a deputy in the parliament, he is cloaked with parliamentary immunity.

Machado speaks of revolution not as just an armed movement to topple a government but in the sense of far-reaching socioeconomic change.

"We want a real revolution which includes elimination of the present system of land ownership and a substantial improvement in the way of life of all Venezuelans," Machado said.

Machado said the communists will attempt to retain their nine congressional seats (including their own) in the December elections, by registering as candidates of "different parties." The communist party has been outlawed for illegal activities since the 1958 elections.

The elections will bring rivers of blood regardless of who wins, Machado said. "If the Central America, in China and government, IDemocratic Action came the right hand of the (party) wins, or the communist revolution here, it will not take it sitting down."

Machado, 65, became a revolutionary in 1919 when he journeyed to Moscow and asked the Bolsheviks for a ship to invade Venezuela.

"They just laughed in my face," he said.

Machado bought a small ranch and with a group of rebels "recaptured" the Dutch island of Curacao and the next day "invaded" Venezuela, then under the dictator Juan Vicente Gomez.

The invasion failed and Machado went into a decade of exile. He studied law at the Sorbonne, then returned to Latin
