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Kennedy Is Considering Trip in West

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20 (AP) — President Kennedy is considering a trip into the West that would give him a chance to look over the area, preserve natural resources, natural wonders and wilderness areas—and to get some political exposure in advance of the 1964 campaign.

Under present planning, he would venture into Arizona, the home of Sen. Barry Goldwater, regarded as the top contender for the 1964 Republican presidential nomination.

Nothing has been settled, but the talk has reached the point that the White House is reported to have asked the interior department several weeks ago to outline a possible journey. And some advance work on a trip may be undertaken shortly.

The trip may be undertaken in October and might take Kennedy by plane, train and auto from the Grand Coulee dam in the Northwest to Glen Canyon dam in Arizona. Ceremonies are on tap at each place in October.

Kennedy recently canceled an engagement to appear Oct. 7 in Atlanta at the dedication of the 7th anniversary of Georgia Tech.

The White House gave a rather vague explanation that Kennedy might be busy elsewhere at that time.

The trip, one administration official said, would be "oriented primarily to conservation."

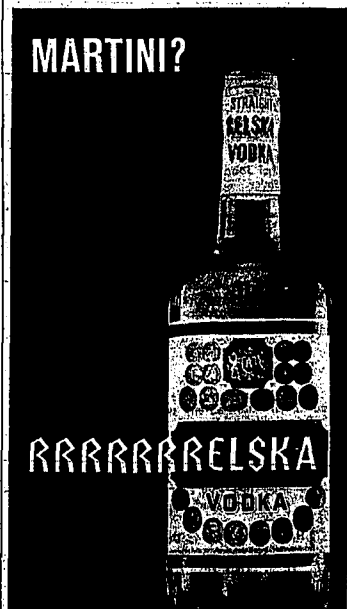
Food for Americans

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Lane Cops Title With Late Rally Over Armstead

SAGINAW, Mich., Aug. 20 (AP)—Late-rallying Kenny Lane, fighting out of a baffling southpaw style, pounded out a unanimous 15-round decision over Paul Armstead Monday night and claimed the Michigan version of the world lightweight championship. Lane, the No. 2 ranked contender by the World-Boxing-association, opened cuts along both of Armstead's eyes in the 10th round and nipped up points in the final five rounds to win the decision.

Lane's victory somewhat cleared up the muddled world lightweight situation. The southpaw from Muskegon, Mich., long shunned in his bid for a title match, now has backing for a fight with Carlos Ortiz, recognized as champion everywhere but in Michigan.

Lane, 21½, landed his most damaging blow in the 12th round, with a wild left to Armstead's ear. The left drove Armstead in to his own corner.

Armstead, 135, weathered the storm.

It was the closest either fighter came to scoring a knockdown in the slow-moving bout.

Referee Lou-Julio awarded Lane the fight 10-143 on Michigan 10-141, must-it system. Judge Don Dilly scored it 147-141 in favor of Lane and Judge Roy Tuhau had Lane ahead 146-138. The Associated Press scored it 145-145 in Lane's favor.

Armstead, ranked first by the WBA behind Ortiz, started fast with an attack consisting mostly of right crosses to Lane's head. Lane was content to counter punch during the early rounds and Armstead opened a slight cut over his right eye in the sixth round.

Lane weathered Armstead's best round, the ninth, and opened his attack in the 10th with a left to the stomach and right jabs to start the blood flowing from Armstead's eyes.

In the 11th, Lane built up his margin with a solid right jab and in the 12th he banged Armstead with a hard left to the jaw moments before his wild left drove the loser back.

A crowd of about 5,500 watched the fight at the Veterans Memorial Stadium. The fighters divided 50 per cent of the receipts.

If the bout with Ortiz goes through, it will be Lane's third world title. He is champion of the United States, and the world title was reinstated only Sunday.

Ortiz and Lane each has won one of their meetings.

Lane had won previous lightweight championship fights and Armstead won a decision over Brown in 1936.

The victory was the 88th for Lane against 12 losses and two draws. Armstead, winner of 50 previous fights, suffered his 11th loss in 51 fights.

A record Buffalo crowd of 23,524 saw the game.

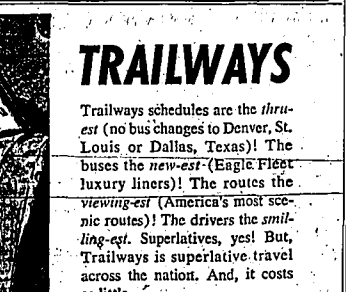

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Jury Fails to Reach Decision On Libel Case After Six Hours

ATLANTA, Aug. 20 (AP)—A federal court jury failed to reach a verdict after nearly six hours of deliberations Monday night in the trial of Wally Butts—10 million dollar libel suit against publishers of the Saturday Evening Post. Shortly before 10 p.m., the clerk of the U.S. district court announced to attorneys and spectators "this court is in recess until 9 a.m. tomorrow." The 12 male jurors at that time will resume consideration of the case against Curtis Publishing company, which grew out of an article last March 23 which charged that Butts passed on secret information on the Georgia football team to Alabama Coach Paul (Bear) Bryant in advance of their game.

Butts, former coach and athletic director at the University of Georgia, remained at the counsel table in the courtroom for most of the six hours.

His wife and three daughters who sat on the front row of the spectator section during the 11 days of the trial, rested at a nearby hotel for some hours after the case went to the jury at 2:40 p.m. EST. Two of the daughters returned to the courtroom Monday night and were with Butts when the announcement of the recess was made.

As the hours grew on before the announcement, Butts sat impassively at the table with his hands clasped most of the time. From time to time, he chatted with persons who came over to the table.

The jurors went to a downtown hotel where a section of the top floor had been blocked off for their occupancy Monday night. Two deputy marshals sat in the corridors outside of the 12 single rooms reserved for the jury.

In charging the jury earlier, Judge Lewis R. Morgan said that truth is the complete defense to any action for libel.

Morgan's charge to the jurors on the 11th day of the case required only 35 minutes.

"Your authority is not to be exercised arbitrarily," he told the jurors.

Morgan said the burden was on the publishing company through a preponderance of evidence to prove that Butts passed on to Coach Paul (Bear) Bryant of Alabama advance information on Georgia plays before the two teams met last September. Alabama won 35-0, and Butts at that time was athletic director at Georgia.

The judge emphasized that any libel committed against Coach Bryant, if there were libel, is not an issue in this case.

"If you find that Butts did give information to Bryant which could have affected the outcome of the game or the football game, you will find for the defendant company."

On the other hand, Morgan said that if the jurors decide that the magazine failed to prove the truth of its story, it would be the duty of the jury to rule in favor of Butts and fix the amount of damages he should receive.

He said that a person with a bad reputation would not be entitled to the same damages as one with an excellent reputation even if the libel were proved.

He also told the jurors they should give no consideration to references during the 11-day trial to investigations made by Atlanta's general of Georgia and Alabama.

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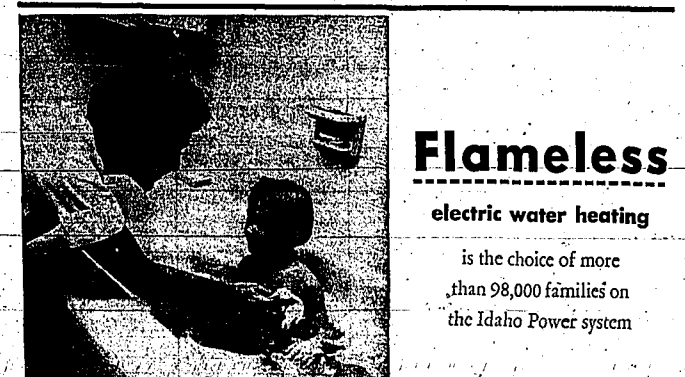
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
