

T. F. FAIR SETS RECORD ON OPENING DAY

3 Schools Close In Birmingham; Man Shot in Riot

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Sept. 5 (UPI)—Three Birmingham white schools scheduled to admit Negroes were closed today under the prodding of Gov. George C. Wallace following a midnight riot which claimed one life. The four-member city school board voted unanimously to go along with Wallace but a spokesman said the closings would be only temporary. "If the board has its way and if the situation does not worsen the schools will be open again Monday morning," Board President Robert C. Arthur announced.

Wallace slept late in Montgomery, the state capital 90 miles away, then plunged into a day of strategy talks aimed at keeping his pledge to resist racial integration at every level in Alabama.

The governor, his face drawn and haggard when he finally got to bed last night, was reported considering coming to Birmingham for a closer assessment of the situation and possibly a news conference.

Birmingham police and state troopers surrounded the three schools—one of which registered to Negroes yesterday—this morning and turned away a handful of students who showed up.

It marked the first time that the Wallace pledge sent into effect Tuesday has put in an appearance at the schools. About 100 Negroes were scheduled to attend the city police at each of the schools. Two high schools and Graymont elementary school.

The two-hour riot late last night left 19 persons, including three policemen, injured. About 600 Negroes poured into the streets following the bombing of a bus station. Arthur closed the schools for the second time in two days.

Negro John D. Coley, 20, was killed today in Birmingham. He was shot in the back of the head while he fled the riot. Three other Negroes received gunshot wounds.

Wallace called the violence "hate" and began easily spreading the word with the school officials to close the three schools.

The board has accepted my request and the schools will be closed temporarily," the governor said in a statement.

He said later he had no trouble persuading the board members to close the schools.

North Cities' Race Protest Pit-Ins Held

Wallace, informed of Morse's attack, said back: "That senatorial drip from Oregon... needs his head examined."

Jerome Sets 5-Mill Levy School Vote

JEROME, Sept. 4—Jerome residents are going to the polls today for the third time to vote on a five-mill school levy. Polls are open from 1 to 8 p.m. today at the high school and Appleton school.

A 10-mill levy was defeated by voters in July 2. A two-thirds majority was required and only a simple majority was received. Last month, an election identical to the one being held Thursday was defeated by approximately 100 votes.

This five-mill levy requires only a simple majority of both taxpayers and non-property owners, parents of children under 21 years of age are eligible to vote. The levy will be for one year.

Jerome residents, including students, have campaigned to get out the vote. Thirty carloads of high school students paraded for three hours Saturday.

Dr. Charles Parker heads the citizens group which is endorsing the levy. Only 500 persons voted in the last election and the majority does not express the will of the majority.

He pointed out a deficiency of \$10,000 was created by the state replacement of school funds in 1962 and an equal amount of reduction will be experienced during the next school year.

Archaeologist To Hunt for Moses' Grave

AMMAN, Jordan, Sept. 5 (AP)—Archaeologist Julio Ripamonti said today he plans to spend the rest of his life digging in the wilderness around Jericho with hopes of finding Moses' tomb.

Ripamonti, professor at the Central University of Venezuela in Caracas, recently returned after a 20-day expedition to the ravine at the foot of a hill named Roujoum Makhayyat about 20 miles south of Amman. Ripamonti believes Roujoum Makhayyat, highest hill in the area, could be Mount Prozag from which the Bible says God spoke to Moses the Promised Land. Moses died before reaching the Promised Land and according to the Bible was buried in a valley.

Ripamonti believes Devil's Ravine may be the valley.

Roach Claims BPA Growth Is Power Grab

BOISE, Sept. 5 (AP)—Idaho power Company President T. E. Roach says the decision to extend the Bonneville power marketing plan into southern Idaho was based on the premise that "only Washington knows best."

Roach asserted in a talk before the Boise Bench Lions club Wednesday that the extension, ordered by Interior Secretary Stewart L. Udall, "was motivated by a lust for power and the opportunities for political favoritism to a small number of preferred groups who already are tax avoiders."

"The reasons given for the invasion are pure bunk and are offered in the name of public welfare as interpreted by Udall and the BPA on the premise that only Washington knows best," Roach declared.

He also asserted that BPA sells power below the cost of producing it and said such procedure requires "no brains or skill."

"It's no trick," Roach said, "when you have an unlimited treasury—in other words, the taxpayers—to make up your losses."

"There is nothing about government power that makes it more efficient than investor-owned power. It is simply a device for selling power below cost to 20 per cent of the American people at the expense of the other 80 per cent."

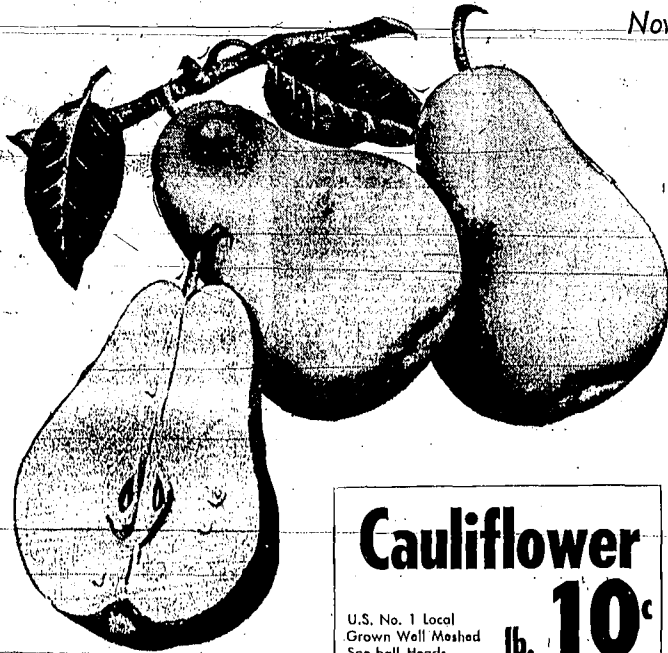

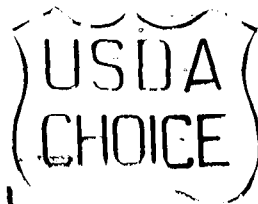

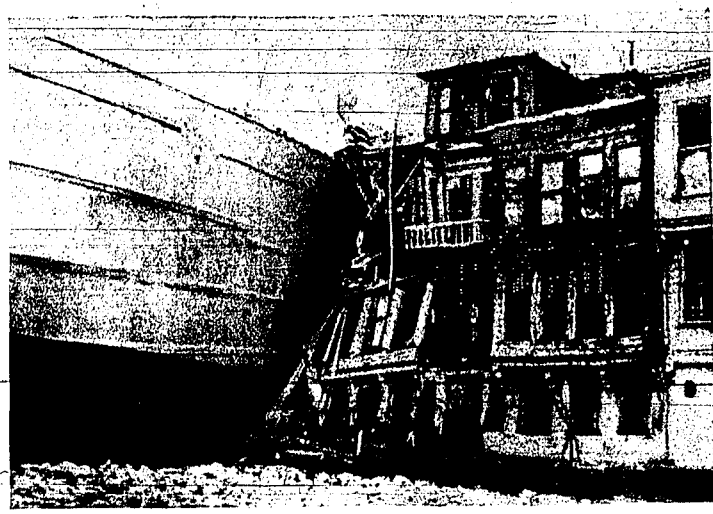

NFO Begins Holding Action To Keep Grains Off Market

CORNING, Ia., Sept. 5—The militant National Farmers organization (NFO), which last summer staged a five-week market rebellion against livestock prices, today began a holding action to keep off the market for grain.
The action was ordered Tuesday by NFO President Oren Lee Staley, who said it was aimed at "cutting off the lifeline" of grain livestock and dairy processors.
Efforts of the new boycott were not expected to be immediately effective.
"The NFO will concentrate first on soybeans and move to other crops as they are ready for harvest."
The plan calls for members of the 18-state farm organization to withhold soybeans, corn and grain sorghum from market until the NFO signs contracts for higher prices with processors.
Along with the withholding action, members were being asked to sign grain sales agreements which would give NFO leaders virtual control of the marketing of soybeans.
The agreements authorize NFO officials to sell members' soybeans "at not less than \$2.75 a bushel," Staley said. That is about 11 cents above the nominal quotation yesterday on the Chicago cash grain market.
"Shut the granary door," Staley said. "If the market wants the grain it can bring the crowd—a fair price to farmers."
Harvesting of soybeans begins next week in some parts of the NFO membership area. Old crop grain already in storage are in-

Training Act Is Okayed By Senators

WASHINGTON, Sept. 5—The Senate has passed a bill under which the federal government for the third year would pick up the whole tab for teaching skills to unemployed workers under the manpower training act.

It's the first piece of legislation suggested by President Kennedy in his civil rights message to be acted on by congress. But it involves jobs, and not strictly racial issues.
The measure was approved by a voice vote Wednesday and sent to the house where a labor subcommittee has completed preliminary work but has not yet reported. Sponsors there said it would be handled in a separate bill, as in the senate, and not tied to the big civil-rights package.

State Land Board Delays Decision On Its Stand Regarding Wilderness

BOISE, Sept. 5—Members of the state land board are expected to decide by Sept. 13 if they will go on record as opposing creation of a Sawtooth wildlife refuge before a feasibility study on national park status for the region is completed.
A resolution opposing the wilderness proposal was presented to the board Wednesday by Land Commissioner O. J. Buxton but action on it was deferred pending further study.
Buxton said the board's statement would be filed as part of the record of a U. S. Forest Service hearing on the proposal held in Boise Wednesday. He said the hearing report would be held open until Sept. 20 to permit written statements.

Gov. Robert E. Smylie said he had no reasons to oppose a national park status for the region, but added that "action on the regulation at this time would be a bit hasty. I think we ought to have more time to study it."
Atty. Gen. Allan G. Shepard also said he believed action should be delayed pending further study.
"I don't know anything about the forest service proposal and would hate to take a stand on it without further study," he said. Democratic members, who are in a majority on the board, expressed support for the national park study but joined Smylie and Shepard in voting for the delay.

HONG KONG, Sept. 5—The Communist China has sent 900,000 students to build defenses to fortify provinces bordering the Soviet Union, the South China Morning Post reported today.
The British-owned, English-language paper quoted a reference from Red China.

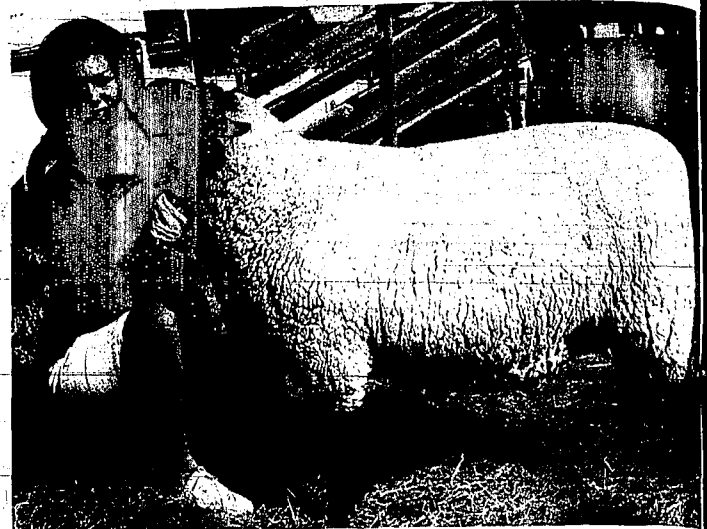

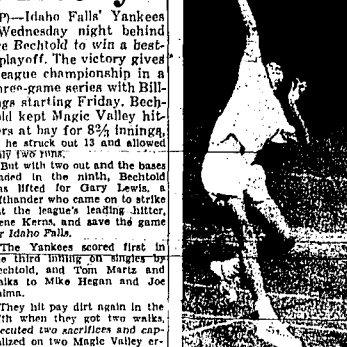
