

Berber Mutineers Man Cannons and Defy Ben Bella

ALGIERS, Oct. 2 (AP)—Berber mutineers named cannons on Algerian mountain ridges today, vowing to defy President Ahmed Ben Bella even at the cost of civil war.

Ben Bella forces announced plans to arm vigilante committees to fight off necessary loyal army troops. The announcement was made by Hadi Ben Aton, chief organizer of Ben Bella's ruling Front of National Liberation (F.N.L.). "The vigilante committee will safeguard the revolution and fight against counterrevolution," Ben Bella said.

"If necessary they can fight against the Djemah (soldiers)," Ben Bella said. "They will be formed in every town, every village."

Meanwhile, government troops threw a ring of roadblocks around the dissident Kabylie area in an effort to isolate the rebels.

Col. Mohand ou Hadj, military commander of the anti-Berber mutineer force, said he would like to avoid a clash that would not hesitate to fire if fired on.

Some 200 mutineers are believed to be in the area, said a source. Chinese-made cannons up to 75 millimeter caliber and 82 millimeter mortar were sighted. The last of the French settlers faced out from their farms as Ben Bella nationalized their land in an early move toward a hungry peasantry to his defense.

Dodgers Win 5-2 In First Game

NEW YORK, Oct. 2 (AP)—Left-handed Sandy Koufax' record-setting 15 strikeouts and a four-run second inning highlighted by John Roseboro's homer carried the Los Angeles Dodgers over the New York Yankees 5-2 today in the opening game of the 1963 world series. Koufax allowed six hits in beating the favored defending world champions before a packed house of 69,000 at Yankee stadium, while the Dodgers blunted series veteran Whitey Ford's pitching in the early going. Koufax' streakout total was one over the previous series record set by Carl Erskine of the Dodgers against the Yankees, who pitched a no-hitter Oct. 2, 1955. The star southpaw, a 25-year-old pitcher, struck out the regular season's 200th batter, former Yankee three-run homer, former Yankee Bill Skowron in the eighth.

Koufax hit the airlock record by fanning the final batter, pinch hitter Harry Bright.

The Dodgers' win streak for four hits in their big second inning, which was capped by Roseboro's three-run homer. Former Yankee Bill Skowron singled in the first Dodger run, and Steve Karsay hit a double and drove in the first run.

The series continues here Thursday with left-handed Art Lundy on the mound for the Yankees and Johnny Podeski of the Dodgers scheduled to pitch.

Signs Hike

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2 (AP)—President Kennedy signed today, with "great pleasure," a bill granting an average 14.4 per cent pay increase to most of the 2.7 million men and women in the armed forces.

In a cabinet room ceremony, Kennedy used more than a dozen fountain pens to sign the measure, which will cost the government 1.2 billion dollars a year. It is the biggest military pay boost in history.

The bill grants a 14.4 per cent increase to all active-duty personnel in the Army, Navy, Air Force and Marine Corps. It also grants a 14.4 per cent increase to all active-duty personnel in the Coast Guard and the Public Health Service.

Study Is Ordered of Any Discrimination Near Bases

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2 (AP)—The defense department has ordered a study of any discrimination in the armed services for any race, color, religion, sex or national origin.

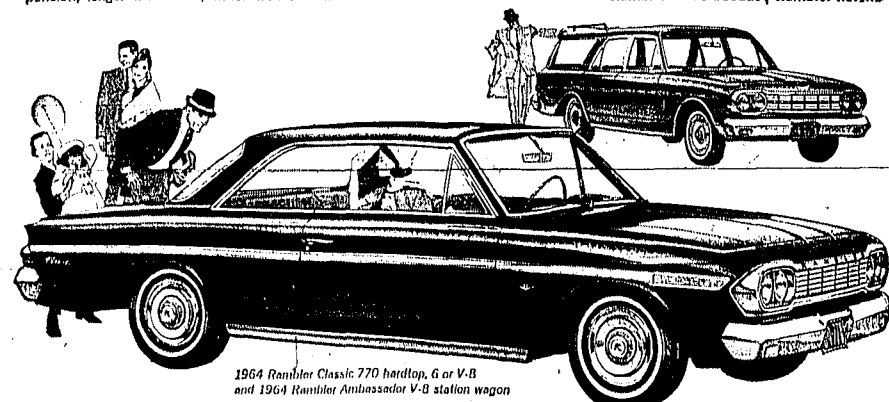

Q. My husband and I are somewhat at odds about investing money and paying off a mortgage. I am in favor of taking \$250 out of the \$10,000 we have put up on our house.

A. I have heard talk that it is possible to cash in series E, U.S. savings bonds after holding them for only eight and a half years and not until maturity in 10 years. This is supposed to be possible because of an increase of interest rate.

If this talk is authentic, when can I cash in E bonds I bought in February, 1956, and July, 1957?

A. Actually you can cash them in right now. Any series E bond can be redeemed any time after two months from the issue date of the bond.

The interest rates and maturities of E bonds have been changed a number of times over the years. E bonds being sold now have maturity periods of seven years and one month; the U.S. treasury is pleased to pay you \$10 for that bond. If you receive it any time in between you will receive less money.

The bonds you hold will reach their first maturity nine years and eight months after their issue date.

If you want to learn what each of those bonds is worth right now, I suggest that you write to Superintendent of Documents, U.S. government printing office, Washington 25, D.C. Enclose 30 cents and ask for a copy of the booklet called "Tables of Redemption Value for United States Savings Bonds, Series A-E."

Because of the change of interest rates and maturities, owners of E bonds need that booklet to figure out what their bonds are worth.

My husband and I are getting on the mortgage considering the fact that interest we pay on the mortgage is deductible for income tax purposes. What do you think about this?

A. To begin with, let's hope that your husband hasn't overlooked the fact that the interest you are getting on the savings account is taxable as "ordinary income" and must be reported each when you file your income tax returns.

So, it's unlikely that the interest that they collect in savings account interest. As a general rule, they would save money by applying some of their savings to reduce their mortgage payments.

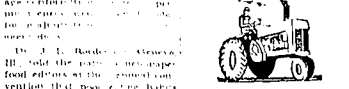

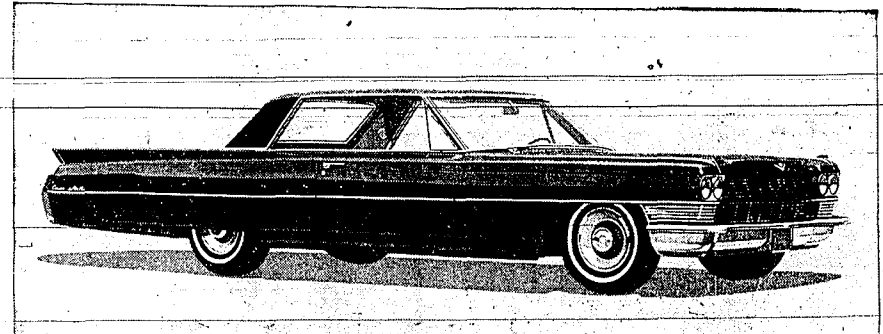

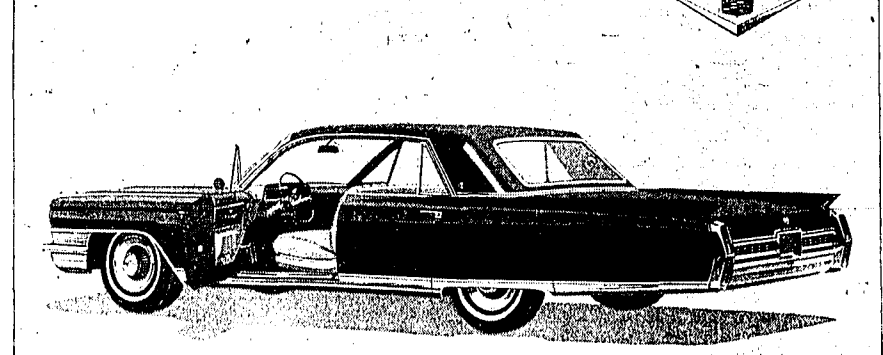

Goldwater Denies That He is Hedging on Conservatism

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2—Sen. Barry Goldwater said today that he has not hedged on conservatism to anger the GOP presidential nominees who have not listened to what he has to say.

Goldwater, Arizona Republican who considered a front runner in a nomination he still insists he has not changed his position on any fundamental issue in recent speeches he has made in all sections of the country.

"I think the people who are saying that I am modifying my conservatism just haven't been listening to what I have been saying," he said.

"I think I think there would be nothing wrong with any man in public life who didn't change his ideas to meet the requirements of the time," he added. "Consistency is not necessarily a virtue. But I haven't changed my stand on any fundamental issue and I don't intend to."

About the only concrete example of a shift in position that Goldwater could think of off-hand was his conversion to support of the Kennedy administration's proposal to clothe the attorney general with authority to file suits to enforce school integration.

"I opposed that in the past but if the attorney general feels that he needs this authority, then I am willing to give it to him, provided that it is restricted to specific cases and is not used as a bludgeon."

But Goldwater said he continues to be opposed to the use of federal forces to enforce desegregation except as the President's authority in this field is outlined

in the constitution.

He said this means that the President can send troops where a governor or state legislature request them, to put down an insurrection or rebellion and to enforce a federal court's edict.

But he said he doesn't agree with the Kennedy administration contention that the federal government has authority to intervene—in the absence of these constitutional provisions—to enforce the general civil rights of any individual.

Goldwater said he wasn't moving toward the center in subscribing generally to remarks made by Gerald E. Stubbins, Princeton, N. J., research executive, and erroneously attributed to the Arizona senator by the Congressional Record.

Goldwater corrected the record Tuesday to show that Stubbins, rather than he, made an Aug. 24 speech in Montclair, N. J. The senator said he had ordered the speech put in the Record but did not know how the mixup occurred.

Probe Into Bus-Train Crash Ends

SALESMAN, Fall, Oct. 2 (AP)—The assembly interim committee on industries safety yesterday completed a two day hearing in the Dept. of Transportation which ended with a report on the Oct. 22 Mexican farm bus crash.

Committee Chairman Edward J. Gaffney, D. San Francisco, told members that safety standards of the bus involved, a converted truck with an aluminum top, are above legal requirements. He added many such buses are one degree less than others used for transporting heavy and cattle. Labor buses are bus ends with a motor. Gaffney said he was not seeking comment on the industry. "I want safety," he said. "I want them to be able to look out and see to the driver like school children can."

Jack Bliss, Salinas, executive vice president of the Grower-shopper association, testified that the growers' farm labor association requires punctual inspections of farm labor buses and has a six-man staff to be sure they are safe.

Arven B. Jacobsen, supervising driver improvement analyst for the state division of motor vehicles, testified that closer visual and aural checks should be made of prospective licensees. Jacobsen said the bus driver involved in last month's crash, Francisco O. Espinoza, 34, failed his first examination for a class B chauffeur's license, but passed it a week later; Espinoza is being held on a manslaughter charge. State Sen. Fred Parr, D., Carmel, who was present at the hearing, said the senate agricultural fact-finding committee may conduct its own investigation of the accident.

Parr said there had been too many of these accidents and steps must be taken to prevent a recurrence.

Rusk to Talk With Russian About Issues

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Oct. 2 (AP)—Secretary of State Dean Rusk talks over possible deals with Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko tonight in the only strictly U. S.-Soviet meeting scheduled in current East-West discussions. The dinner meeting at the headquarters of the Soviet U. N. mission gave Rusk his first opportunity here to raise a host of

Washington-Moscow issues, including the presence of Soviet troops in Cuba. Rusk also was expected to inquire into a variety of possible Soviet-American accords, ranging from trade to space cooperation, and the Soviet position on disarmament and political questions posed in the wake of the limited nuclear test-ban treaty. British Foreign Secretary Lord Avon conducted the West's first deep probe into the second group of questions in a two-hour lunch at Gromyko's quarters Tuesday. British sources said neither side gave any ground, though the atmosphere was cordial and Gromyko seemed to want to continue East-West contacts.

Western sources again cautioned against expecting any hard-and-fast agreements to emerge from present discussions. They said neither side is prepared to move fast, but the continuation of talks is good in itself and may show where the best prospects for agreement lie.

France to Have Bomb By 1966-67

PARIS, Oct. 2 (AP)—The semi-official National Defense Journal said Tuesday that France will have an H-bomb, missiles and atomic submarines by 1966-67. An article said these dates are a year ahead of previous estimates of France's H-bomb ambitions.

The article made these points: 1. By 1964 France will have atom bombs with a punch of 60 kilotons, the equivalent of 60,000 tons of TNT or three times the size of the American bomb used on Hiroshima in 1945.

2. By the end of this year the Mirage IV jet fighter that the French hope will carry the nuclear clear bomb will reach 50 planes and perhaps 60.

3. By 1968-69 France will have a solid fuel-propelled missile similar to the American Minuteman. This missile will have a range of about 1,242 miles.

4. In the same year France will launch the first of a series of nuclear powered subs. Plans call for a sub of 7,000 tons with 16 nuclear armed missiles.

Pigeons Face Death Decree In New York

NEW YORK, Oct. 2 (AP)—A death sentence may be awaiting for the city's estimated five million pigeons. They are believed to carry an often fatal form of meningitis.

The department of health disclosed yesterday it was considering a request to the state legislature for permission to carry out a mass extermination of the birds.

Studies carried out by the health department show that 35 per cent of pigeon droppings found in the city contain the microbe of cryptosporidiosis meningitis.

The microbe in a fungus which is inhaled when the droppings become dust, causing a respiratory infection. "Many thousands of people have become infected," according to the health department.

The department said that pigeons were directly responsible for at least 20 cases of the disease each year. Twenty per cent of these cases died, the department said.

The agency conceded it had not thought of the best way to handle the problem. Permits have been issued to more than 120 building owners and business firms to trap the birds and turn them over to the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

But, the department said, "trapping under these circumstances is obviously not a solution."

In a statement, the department said, "The organism has not been found in the droppings of other birds, nor is it carried by animals which become infected...."

Persecution of Soviet Jews Is Denied by Rabbi

MOSCOW, Oct. 2 (AP)—A Soviet rabbi said Tuesday that American Jews who believe their coreligionists in the Soviet Union are suffering persecution are victims of a delusion.

S. Maryanovskii, rabbi of Tashkent, a city in central Asia, was replying to David Hollander, chairman of the Council of Rabbis in the United States.

Maryanovskii said "with deep bitterness" he had read Hollander's complaints that "Jews in the Soviet Union are subjected to persecution and those who believe in God cannot freely perform their religious rites."

Treaty Shelves Nuclear Projects

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M., Oct. 2 (AP)—Top experts in the nation's nuclear and space programs indicated Tuesday that several U.S. nuclear propulsion projects will be shelved because of the "hot" ban treaty.

Among them are Project Orion and Project Pluto, both of which would contaminate the earth's atmosphere with fissionable material.

The experts are in Albuquerque at a four-day meeting of some 200 government and industry scientists and engineers to discuss the nuclear safety program in space.

F. C. Dillman, staff director of the senate space committee, said Orion, conceived in 1957 by a Los Alamos scientist, Dr. Stanislaw Ulam, had been shelved. The project proposed to lift a payload into space using a series of atomic bomb-like explosions.

Pluto would use a nuclear reactor to propel a missile at supersonic speeds through lower altitudes of the earth's atmosphere. The reactor would gulp air, heat

it to great intensity, then use it to push the rocket.

Another nuclear propulsion program, Project Rover, also a Los Alamos endeavor, was given a new target date by the group.

Dr. P. K. Pittman, director of the atomic energy commission's reactor development division, said Rover, propelled by a nuclear reactor, probably would be in the late 1960's or early 1970's. Before the project was shelved, the reactor would have been the target date was about 1970.
