Smyle Says Fund Slice Not Political

BOISE, Oct. 7 (AP)—Gov. Robert E. Smyle, criticized by two Democratic lawmakers for a cut in state funds for the second half of the year, says he "didn't" believe the fiscal responsibility was a partisan matter.

Sen. Cecil Andrus, D., Clearwater, and Edward V. Williams, D., Rexburg, called for a taxpayer's lawsuit to test the legality of the fund cutback, ordered by the state board of examiners at Smyle's request.

The lawmakers said they believe the action may be in violation of the state constitution, which says if a lawsuit should be filed, the board acted unconstitutionally. It would be the duty of the governor to call a special session of the legislature to provide more money to schools.

"I don't believe extended comment is desirable," said Smyle. "I believe fiscal responsibility was a partisan matter."

Smyle, in asking for the cutback for all general fund operations, said it was a precautionary measure needed because of indications that state tax revenues would fall short of expectations. He said similar cutbacks may be necessary all through the biennium.

Because of the cutback, the board of education has directed the counties to levy additional property taxes so the schools will receive no less money than there had been no cut.

The Associated Taxpayers of Idaho said the counties will levy a total of \$21,000 in additional taxes this year to make up for the cutback.

Andrus and Williams cited an opinion by Boise attorney Joseph N. Legat questioning the constitutionality of the school appropriation law, which gave the board of examiners authority to cut the school appropriation.

Legat, in a letter to Zinner County, executive secretary of the Idaho Education association, said the law contains an unconstitutional delegation of judicial and legislative power to the board of examiners.

He said it also violates a constitutional requirement of unity of title in subject matter, with nothing in the title to indicate that the appropriation of 40 million dollars could be reduced by the examiners.
