Speed Limits Are Changed In Richfield

RICHFIELD, Oct. 9—A change in speed limits on highway 92A through the village limits was made by Richfield village board members at the October meeting held Monday night.

A 30-mile per hour speed limit was set from the west city limits to Fourth street and lowered to 25 miles per hour through the main part of Richfield on highway 92A.

The speed limits had formerly been 35 and 25 miles respectively. The change was arranged by Board Chairman Mont A. Johnson with the state highway board and was approved by the two board members present.

Trustee election was set for Nov. 5 at the Richfield Rex theater. Two trustees will be elected for four-year terms to replace Carl Paulson and Harold Williams, whose terms expire. Both have indicated they do not plan to seek reelection.

Nominations will be filed by petition this year instead of the usual nominating meeting. Petitions are available to candidates at the clerk's office. The clerk also is serving as registrar for those needing to register.

The board appointed Probate Judge Claude Wilson to act as police judge for Richfield during the absence of Judge W. I. Austin on vacation. Twenty-five dollars in fines were remitted by Judge Austin to the village.

Trustee Edward Seibler pointed out that bond and money matters are illegal within the village. Weed burning also was discussed, with Fire Chief Lyle Piper stating that residents should advise him when intending to burn weeds to alert the fire department. No weed burning is being done by the fire department at present.

Need for clearing irrigation ditches this fall was discussed and plans made for the work. Sidewalk repairs and drainage problems of sidewalks are to be corrected, also.

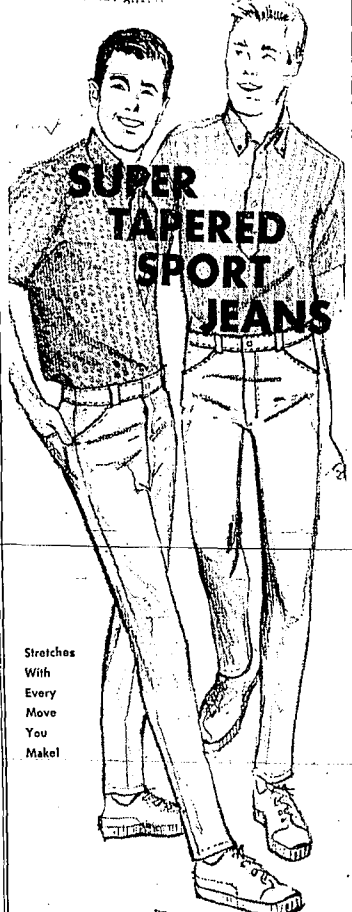

James E. Webb, chief of the national aeronautics and space administration, spoke up after the House appropriations committee voted to slash NASA's budget by \$12 million dollars.

Norwegians Float Down Missouri

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., Oct. 8 (AP) — Ten young Norwegians who are visiting in all from a "kay" as come rafted Tuesday that the Missouri river to the Gulf of Mexico and back.

They are Ron Bracken, a marine biology student at the University of Oregon and Knut Anderson, a commercial pilot in Oslo. They are touring the river in kayes to the Gulf of Mexico.

Malaysian Crisis Is Deadlocked

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia, Oct. 8 (AP) — The Malaysia and Indonesia crisis, with its overtones of threat to the peace of Southeast Asia, is tightly deadlocked. It may last a long time. Malaysian leaders reflect a mood of determination.

Tun Abdul Razak, Malaysia's deputy prime minister and defense minister, sees the crisis lasting until the Indonesians are able to solve some of their internal problems. That could mean a long wait.

"So long as the communists have the influence they have in Indonesia, an understanding is not possible," he said.

Razak conceded this might mean some painful economic effects for this nation, which came into being as Malaysia only three weeks ago. But the effects will be far more serious for Indonesia.

It is clear that the government of Tunku Abdul Rahman, the prime minister, will not budge from the principle and the question of recognition of Malaysia is not a negotiable one.

But the Philippines has broken diplomatic relations. The Philippines has a claim on North Borneo, Indonesia has been exerting too much pressure on Sarawak. Both areas are now part of Malaysia.

The feeling here is that the Philippine government of President Diosdado Macapagal has a tiger by the tail and would like to let go.

One of the principal reasons for becoming involved in the first place, it is said, was an attempt to identify the Philippines with Asia and Filipinos as Asians.

Policeman's Belt Stops Bullet; Saves His Life

SPRINGFIELD, Oct. 8 (AP) — Police man William McCroskey escaped a wound early Wednesday by the thickness of his uniform belt.

The officer, armed with two .38-caliber pistols, was in the back of a patrol car for a check in an alley in the downtown area and asked for identification. One man reached in his pocket, apparently to get his wallet, but instead came out with a pistol.

McCroskey grabbed at the pistol and deflected it just as the man fired. The bullet struck his belt, but he was unharmed except for powder burns and a small metal fragment in his hand.

The policeman then got his own revolver out of its holster and fired at the fleeing man, who disappeared into the night.

Pacific voters rejected a proposed daylight saving time ordinance in a municipal election Tuesday in which four incumbents also were returned to the seven-man city commission. Troy Bank Robbery Case Change Eyed

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 8 (AP) — Forms have been sent to the Idaho bank robbery suspects to sign, authorizing transfer of court proceedings against them to Los Angeles, Ass. U. S. Atty. Tom Sheridan reported.

Record High Budget Eyed Next Year

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9 (AP) — Treasury Secretary Douglas Dillon indicated Tuesday that the administration probably would offer another record high budget next year, but the deficit would show a shrinking trend.

Dillon said "moderate further increase" in the budget was likely in fiscal 1965 because of financial conditions, even "which the government had little control."

He said the rising tide of spending would reflect in part appropriations approved by Congress in prior fiscal years.

The treasury secretary discussed the nation's fiscal outlook in a speech before the annual convention of the American Business Association (ABA).

Dillon said the deficit for the current fiscal year — originally the second highest in peacetime history — is still being whittled down and probably will go below the current \$2 billion dollar estimate. At the beginning of the year, it was 2.7 billion dollars higher.

"That much, at least, should be heartening to anyone — whether or not he agrees with every policy or program recommended by the administration," Dillon said.

The secretary said that, barring an international crisis, next fiscal year's deficit should drop even lower although the house-passed tax cut bill would take a 7 billion dollar bite out of revenue.

He said most of the increases in the budget during the past three years was accounted for by "the sharp stepup in our defense and space needs."

Smylie Set For Journey To Japan

BOISE, Oct. 8 (AP) — Custom made golf balls imprinted with the words "Governor Smylie" and "Idaho" will serve as calling cards for Gov. Robert E. Smylie during his state department tour of Japan.

Smylie will leave for Japan Sunday following the Western Republican conference at Eugene, which begins Friday.

Convention officials reported Tuesday that Smylie will introduce GOP National Chairman William Miller and Gov. Nelson Rockefeller of New York at receptions.

He also has been scheduled to participate in a panel discussion of the "New Frontier at home and abroad."

The governor and Mrs. Smylie will join nine other governors at Seattle for the plane trip to Japan.

The governors will visit a number of other cities and are scheduled to return home Oct. 31.

Former Auditor Talks in Burley

BURLEY, Oct. 8 (AP) — Ruston Swenson, former state auditor, spoke in behalf of "Hire the Physically Handicapped" week at the Monday noon luncheon meeting of the Burley Chamber of Commerce at the National hotel.

Swenson said, "Employed handicapped people are efficient in their work and have less absenteeism from illness and fewer accidents on the job."

Handicapped committees from the national level down to the local level, depend on the leadership of the local businessmen for hiring the handicapped person and taking him off assistance payrolls, he added.

Swenson also stated the program is in its 10th year and that statistics prove that one out of every 10 Americans is handicapped.

U.N. Approves Investigation of Buddhist Crisis

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., Oct. 9 (AP)—The U. N. general assembly agreed Tuesday to the immediate dispatch of a fact-finding mission to South Vietnam to look into alleged ill-treatment of Buddhists. According to Mrs. H. R. business executive and home gourmet, it just isn't true what they say about ducks. "Too much for one and not enough for two." Today's specially bred ducks are so plump one feeds four nicely.

Here is her easy version of the gourmet dish "Duck à l'Orange Moderne." The ducks are quartered and cooked with frozen orange concentrate. By overlapping the quarters in the roasting pan, it is as easy to cook three ducks for twelve people as to roast one whole duck. Serving is easier, too, because the birds come from the oven already carved.

DUCKS à l'ORANGE MODERNE

- (serves 8)
- 1 (6-oz.) container frozen concentrated orange juice, undiluted.
 - 2 (4-lb.) frozen ducklings, cut in quarters.
 - 1 cup brown sugar, firmly packed.
 - 1 cup granulated sugar.
 - 1 teaspoon salt.
 - 1 tablespoon cornstarch.
- Defrost orange juice until it can be removed easily from container. Leave ducklings in refrigerator about 24 hours, then wash the quarters. Arrange duck quarters—skin side up—in shallow roasting pan and bake in 325 degree oven (moderate) for 3 hours or until tender and browned. (If boy parts get crisp and dry, brush them with vegetable oil.)
