Chief of 'Grain' To Russians

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10 (AP)—President Kennedy has given the green light for the private sale of millions of bushels of American wheat to the Soviet Union and other communist bloc countries. He made it clear that the grain was for use only in the Soviet Union and Eastern Europe—not in Cuba. His decision, which in so many words he said was just good business for the United States, drew both sparks and cheers. The reaction ranged from Democratic Sen. Strom Thurmond's denunciation that it amounted to "arming our enemy," to Vermont Republican Sen. George Aiken's view that "the deal should prove lucrative for the United States and the people of the purchasing nations."

Other Sales To Russia Are Eyed

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10 (AP)—President Kennedy is willing to sell to Russia such surplus commodities as feed grains, corn, cotton, tobacco and dairy products as well as wheat. Commerce Secretary Luther Hodges announced today.

Hodges told a news conference the sale of the other commodities would depend on whether the Soviet Union requested them and if the same sale conditions set up for the multi-million dollar wheat purchase were met.

The secretary listed cotton, tobacco and feed grains as future sale possibilities to Russia and the European communist bloc. Agriculture Undersecretary Charles S. Murphy noted that such sales would be in the prospect of corn sales. Sen. George D. Aiken, R-Vt., suggested that dairy products might be on the Soviet Union's future shopping list.

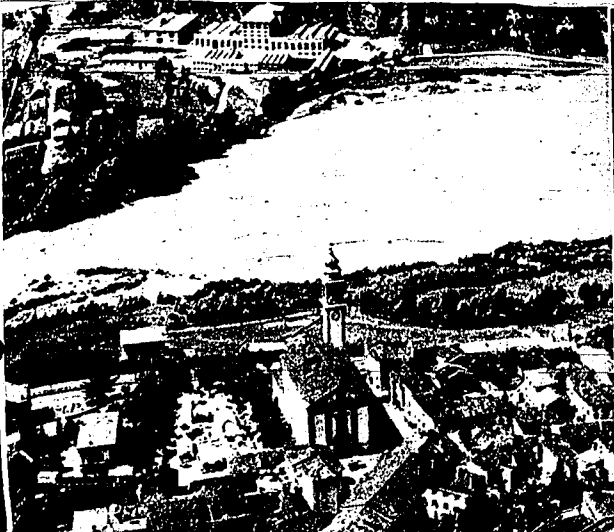

U.S. May Sell Reds Wheat, But They Still Owe Us Money

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10 (AP) — Official figures showed Wednesday that the U. S. government owes Russia over \$15 billion dollars which the Soviets have not agreed to pay up.

The outstanding IOU from Moscow is one of the disputes that has soured U. S.-Soviet trade relations for years.

Trade is a topic expected to figure in talks here Thursday when Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko sees President Kennedy and other high officials.

According to an accounting supplied by state department officials, Russia owes 612 million dollars on World War I debts, 47 million dollars on post-World War II U. S. lend-lease shipments and a large sum—perhaps 800 million dollars—on lend-lease aid provided during World War II.

America sent nearly 11-billion dollars worth of military and civilian lend-lease goods to Russia during the common World War II effort. Afterwards, the U. S. sent some \$200 million in

San Francisco's Cable Cars To Get Well-Deserved Rest

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 10 (AP) — San Francisco's venerable cable car system is going to take a short rest—after 68 years without a vacation.

The system is just plain tired out and in need of rebuilding, said Oral L. Moore, an executive of the city's engineering department. He said the cable cars would be replaced by buses sometime next spring for a period of about 40 days.

"All the present equipment in the Washington-Mason power house was installed prior to 1900 and some, which must be original machinery, as early as 1890," Moore said. "No work other than normal maintenance has been done on it since 1900."

He said the machinery is "subject to failure at any time," and anything less than a major overhaul would be only a stop-gap solution. Moore estimated the cost of rebuilding at \$250,000.

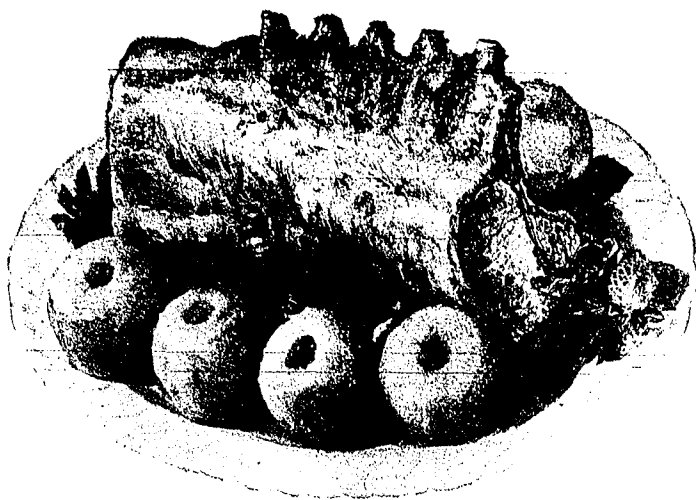
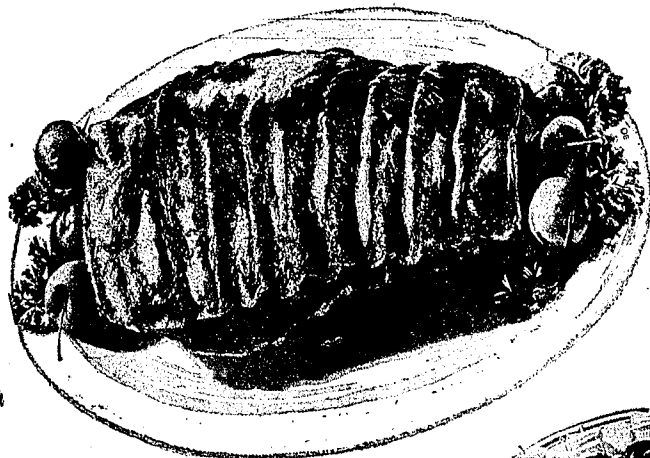

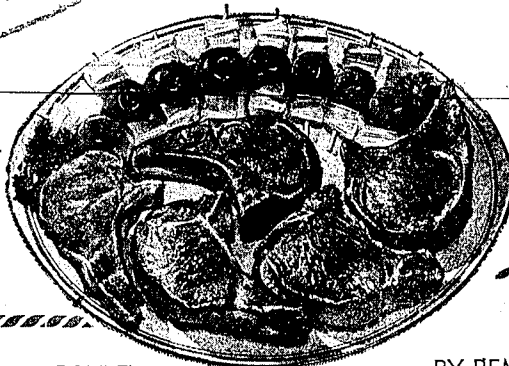

ANN ARBOR, Mich., Oct. 10 (AP)—Three University of Michigan students burned a Buddhist monk in effigy Wednesday in protest against a campus demonstration concerning U.S. military policy in Viet Nam.

Some 200 students had gathered inside the university library to hear two speakers speak at 11 p.m.

Along came three other students carrying a cloth-draped effigy and light. The signs had pictures of Mrs. J. Edgar Hoover, president of South Viet Nam.

"The three, two boys and a girl, carried the dummy into the crowd, then tossed it on a sidewalk. The effigy was soaked with lighter fluid and ignited by the girl."

A note was pinned on the dummy, saying it was a Buddhist monk.

News Around Idaho

LEWISTON, Oct. 10 (AP)—All four members of Idaho's congressional delegation and a senator from neighboring Washington are lined up in favor of an Idaho national park proposal. William P. Johnston, Lewiston, temporary chairman of the New Pacific County National Historical Park association, said he received assurance of support from Sen. Frank Church and Len Jordan and Rep. Compton White and Ralph Harding. All are Democrats except Jordan, a Republican. Johnston said Sen. Henry Jackson, D., Wash., chairman of the senate interior committee, has pledged his support and has promised to try to obtain early committee hearings for the project's authorization. The park would include the rugged Blaine area from the Idaho-Montana border to Lewiston.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10 (AP)—Approval of a \$255,000 loan by the Rural Electrification Administration to Gem State Utilities, Grand View, was reported today by Sen. Frank Church and Rep. Ralph Harding, Idaho Democrats. The loan is for financial construction of 87 miles of new telephone line and expand dial telephone facilities and to construct a new combined commercial and central office in Grand View. The company serves residents of southern Idaho and northern Nevada.

PORT MANTO, Oct. 10 (AP)—Shoshone-Bannock tribal members will vote Oct. 24 on proposed restrictions on hunting by Indians on off-reservation lands. The tribal council proposal would limit Indians to one bull moose or two elk per family, but not more than three big game animals per season off the reservation. By 1970, Indians have unrestricted hunting rights on public domain. The proposal would not affect the game quota on the reservation. If the ordinance is approved, Indians who exceed the limit would lose their off-reservation hunting permits for six months, and for longer periods for further offenses.

COEUR D'ALENE, Oct. 10 (AP)—No objections were raised here Wednesday to a proposed 1.5 million-dollar relocation of a portion of U.S. 95 through Coeur d'Alene. About 60 persons attended a public hearing, a number asking about access to private property along the proposed route. The state highway department says the 44 new shorter route would be safer than the present one, which winds through Coeur d'Alene. The new route would follow U.S. 10 part of the way through the city and would require construction of a new bridge to replace the Blackwell island crossing further upstream.

BOISE, Oct. 10 (AP)—Gov. Robert E. Smylie Tuesday reiterated his opposition to any sale of cabin sites in the Stanley basin, declaring that to sell them could lead to creation of a "rural slum." State Auditor Joe R. Williams has said he favors selling the cabin sites being developed by the state land department on state land along the Salmon river. He said this would put them on the county tax rolls and benefit the county. "I do not believe it is possible to maintain effective sanitary and fire protection standards if the land is sold," said Smylie. "The benefit will be minimal." He said. "Money accruing to the endowment fund from lease would far exceed the interest on the proceeds of a quick sale of the land. Money from the state lands goes to the endowment fund, most of it for the public schools."

BOISE, Oct. 10 (AP)—Idaho collected \$13,021 more in income taxes in September than it did for the same month in year ago but total collections for the year still lag \$235,387 behind 1962. However, an increase in the tax rate voted by the 1963 legislature is expected to boost collections during the next quarter. The measure was effective July 1 but collections will not be reflected on the tax report until next month.

BOISE, Oct. 10 (AP)—Gov. Robert E. Smylie Wednesday announced appointment of Don Watkins, Pocatello, as a research assistant to his personal staff. Smylie said Watkins will serve as a research assistant to the professional ethics advisers. In addition to his research duties will serve as a part-time press secretary. Watkins will continue to reside in Pocatello.

POCATELLO, Oct. 10.—The Pocatello city commission Wednesday certified the results of Tuesday's election, making a 100-vote change in the total of one candidate. Unofficial returns prepared by the city had listed 104 votes in precinct two, ward two, but should have been 64 votes to make the total 338. Hoskins finished 17th in a field of 18 candidates. Incumbent Earl Pond, chairman of the city commissioners, was the leading vote getter with a total of 3,188 votes out of a total of 4,495 votes cast.

CHICAGO, Oct. 10 (AP)—Appointment of three Idaho attorneys as members of committees of the American Bar Association was announced today. Brigadier General B. M. Moxley, Idaho factor of civil defense, was named a member of the committee for legal assistance for servicemen. Justice E. B. Smith of the state supreme court, Boise, was named to the professional ethics committee. Sherman J. Bellwood, Rupert, was reappointed a member of the special committee to cooperate with the American Medical Association.

U. S. Opposes Military Coups In Latin American Countries

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10 (AP)—The United States is strongly opposed to military takeovers in Latin America, says President Kennedy, because they are "self-defeating" and aid the communists.

The chief executive firmly declared yesterday that there had been any change in the U.S. position. "We are opposed to military coups and it is our policy that we have broken off relations with the Dominican Republic and Honduras."

He said the U.S. conference with this country had made its policy "very clear that we are opposed to an interruption of the constitutional system by military coups, not only because we are committed under the Alliance for Progress to democratic government and progress and progress government, but also because, of course, dictatorialism are the seedbeds from which communism ultimately springs up."

Kennedy said he was satisfied that the United States did all it could, short of using force, to try to prevent the military takeovers in the Dominican Republic and Honduras.

He said the United States remained firmly opposed to coups because "They are a self-defeating and defeating for the hemisphere, and we are using our influence and we are using the other countries of the hemisphere are using their influence in those areas where coups have taken place to provide for orderly restoration of constitutional processes."

Senate Democratic Whip Hubert H. Humphrey of Minnesota yesterday proposed a "complete review of arms assistance to Latin America" to be undertaken before the administration's foreign aid authorization bill passes the senate.

"We don't really know what to think," West told UPI.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10 (AP)—The Senate Finance Committee will start public hearings Tuesday on the 11 billion dollar tax bill.

Committee Chairman Harry F. Byrd, D., Va., yesterday declined to permit when the hearings might end. The House approved the bill two weeks ago.

The first all-out will be Treasury Secretary Douglas Dillon. Byrd said the committee would spend a week hearing testimony from Dillon, Budget Director Kenneth C. Bollen, and Secretary Luther H. Hodges and, possibly Walter Heller, chairman of the president's economic advisory commission.

Testimony from non-government officials will not start until Oct. 22. About 115 witnesses have asked to testify. They include spokesmen for major business, labor and farm organizations.

Reason for N. Y. Plane Crash Fixed

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10 (AP)—The Civil Aeronautics Board (CAB) today blamed the 25th death crash of an Eastern Airlines DC7B at New York's Idlewild airport last November on faulty technique by the pilot who ironically was one of aviation's leading air safety crusaders.

Commanding the flight, No. 512 from Charlotte, N. C., to Idlewild, was Capt. Edward J. Bechtold, a 43-year old veteran pilot, who represented the Line Pilots Association (ALPA) in scores of accident investigations and who appeared before congressional committees testifying on various air safety problems.

The CAB's report on the Nov. 30, 1962, accident which 28 of 51 aboard survived, said the probable cause "was the technique employed by the crew during the approach to the runway under fog conditions not adequately reported."

The report did not single out any specific error or individual for the responsibility of inadequate weather reporting, which involved failure to transmit a take off warning to the plane as it approached the airport.

Nor did it offer any explanation of why neither Bechtold's approach control center nor the control tower failed to inform the flight that visibility on the runway it was about to use was virtually zero.

A weather bureau observer on the ground had reported this in them. Bechtold's last weather report showed one mile forward visibility.

The OAB noted that since the accident, the federal aviation agency (FAA) and the U. S. weather bureau have instituted seven reforms in weather observing and reporting—and it indicated, might have prevented the eastern crash.

No CAB "pilot error" verdict was ever written more reluctantly than this one, because Bechtold had worked with the OAB's own bureau of safety on many accidents. The bureau even sent a wreath to his funeral and FAA Administrator Nels E. Follingwider the widow his personal condolences.

Nevertheless, the report said, two cockpit errors were committed that resulted in the crash when Bechtold encountered the unexpected fog and attempted an abortive "go-around."

The OAB said he did not pull the nose up high enough "additional aircraft relations" was the technical phrase used, and he did not use sufficient power to keep airborne.

The report said Bechtold's failure to get the nose higher probably was due to the split-second necessity of changing from visual orientation with the ground to instruments when the thick fog suddenly creased all forward vision.

The lack of sufficient power, the OAB said, may have resulted from a misheard command because of distraction with other duties.

A spokesman for the ALPA, which is expected to take strong exception to the OAB's verdict, said the report was unfair. The pilots' union official said Bechtold's abandoned landing technique was in complete accordance with Eastern's flight manual procedures at the time.

The FAA-weather bureau reforms instituted since the crash include:

Stationing of special observers at runways where visibility-measuring instruments are inoperative; mandatory transmission of vital weather information to flights in terminal areas; installation of fog-measuring devices in control towers as well as on the ground; additional personnel to monitor visibility instruments; and improved communication procedures.

161 Schools Drop Race Barriers

NASHVILLE, Oct. 10 (AP)—At least 61 school districts in southern and border states desegregated their classrooms for the first time this fall, the Southern Education News reported yesterday.

The Southern Education Reporting Service (SERS) monthly publication said that more than one-third of the 1,141 school districts in the region now are desegregated.

The news said only 20 school districts acted under court orders while the other 141 desegregated voluntarily.

The 11 states adding desegregated districts at the beginning of the current school year were: Alabama, 4; Arkansas, 1; Florida, 6; Georgia, 3; Kentucky, 19; Louisiana, 1; North Carolina, 12; South Carolina, 1; Tennessee, 15; Texas, 66; and Virginia, 23.

SERS also said that nine public colleges and five private institutions of higher learning in the region lowered racial barriers this fall.

The public colleges were Florence State (Ala.); Brevard Junior College (Fla.); Valdosta State (Ga.); Columbus College (Ga.); Savannah State (Ga.); Nicholls State (La.); Fayetteville State (N.C.); University of South Carolina; and Henderson County Junior College (Tex.).

The private colleges which desegregated were Harding (Ark.); Jacksonville (Fla.); Memphis State (Tenn.); Martin College (Tenn.); and William Jennings Bryan (Tenn.).

Canadians Gripe About A-Bomb Storage There

OTTAWA, Oct. 10 (AP)—Canada's nuclear debate was stirred again today with the announcement of a joint agreement with the United States to store warheads in Newfoundland.

The warheads are for use by American forces at American bases on Canadian soil after joint U. S.-Canada control.

The first and major agreement between the two countries was signed last August allowing Canada to equip its own forces at home and in Europe with U. S. warheads. First delivery of the equipment is expected this year.

As with the original pact, the new one drew immediate questions on national sovereignty and control of the arms from opposition parties.

It's been there four years ago we were thinking about it. Now I think you can rest assured something like that will come about. Williams lake will not become a private lake within our lifetime."

TANANKEB, Neb.—Oct. 10 (AP) — Once beaten middleweight Jose Torres, consistently faster and sharper with his punches, started his comeback Wednesday night with a 10-round decision over Don Fullmer of West Jordan, Utah.

Jabbing and hooking to the head and body for the first seven rounds, the 27-year-old Torres piled up an early lead and was able to withstand a late rally by Fullmer, 24.

Referee Joey Harrison, the sole official under New Jersey rules, scored it 5-2-1. The Associated Press judged Torres 5-2-1.

The favored Torres, a Puerto Rican now living in New York, had a three pound advantage in weight, 161 to 158. It was his first bout since he was knocked out in five rounds by Florentino Fernandez last May. That was his only defeat.

Huff, New York Must Find Way To Stop Brown

NEW YORK, Oct. 10 (AP) — Violent Sam Huff, middle linebacker of the New York Giants, said in a speech to the club dressing room and talked about Brown. "My wife phoned me in Washington Saturday night and asked me if I'd seen him in the Brown's club house on TV," Sam said. "She seemed a little for me."

There's a sound basis for Mrs. Huff's concern. Her Sam will be one of the chief agents in the Giants' attempt to contain the 220-pound fullback in New York's key National Football league game with the Cleveland Browns Sunday.

The Eastern conference lead will be at stake. The Browns, boiling along unbeaten under new Coach Blanton Collier, currently hold the lead with a 4-0 record. The Giants, defending conference champs, are 3-1 going into their home opener.

The Giants will be healthy for the first time in three weeks with all hands ready to go. Fullback Webster, who has missed the last three games with a back ailment, will start on offense along with Phil King, who injured his left leg last week.

Coach Alie Sherman said he wanted that duo, the Giants' two big backs, in starting roles to give back 35-70 yards a play. He said the team would have 82 tries for 752 yards and nine touchdowns in three games.

Most of the concern, however, is not with Title's protection but with stopping Brown, a five-time league rushing leader who is off to his greatest start. He has gained 654 yards and scored seven touchdowns, both league highs.

"I don't think there's a linebacker in the league who can stop Brown playing him man to man," Huff said. "Don't give me that responsibility."

"You don't play him head to head. There are times when he is not involved. There are plays when I do key on Brown, but if we're in zone defense, my responsibility is the middle."

"If Brown gets outside he's going to hurt you with his speed, but I believe he is more dangerous coming through the line. If you remember 1958 he cut off left tackle and went 65 yards for a touchdown. We're still living with that one."
