

NAACP Charges Administration With Sellout

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16 (AP)—A top spokesman for the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People charged the Kennedy administration today with a "sellout" on civil rights. The charge by Charles Mitchell, N. A. A. C. P. Washington representative, came after Rep. Emanuel Celler, D., N. Y., chairman of the house judiciary committee, gave full support to administration efforts to trim the sweeping civil rights bill.

Park Picked As President By Koreans

Chung Hee Park, who seized control of South Korea in a military coup two years ago, has won the presidency through a general election, unofficial returns showed Thursday. Hours before, a spokesman of ex-president Yun Po-sun's Civil Party had virtually conceded victory to the strongman, who resigned his commission to campaign, but remained chief of the ruling junta.

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NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16 — Little victories are better than none, and so it is mildly comforting to realize that the congressmen who have been cut out of the 100 billion dollar bill in new spending projected by the Kennedy administration for fiscal 1964. "It is not what the taxpayer was led to expect by those Republican 'economists' last January," says the House speaker, "but it is what the taxpayer is bound to be further convinced by the Democratic opposition to substantial reduction and by pork-basis projects that he will believe."

The scorecard shows now, the house has cut nearly 3.9 billion from bills for spending during the year that began July 1. Meanwhile, the house approved a 1.5 billion cut in the 14.6 billion requested for 94 independent agencies. If the whole house goes along, that will bring the savings up to 5.4 billion. The bill is bound to be further cuts to foreign aid and other bills.

SENATE MORE GENEROUS—As usual, the senate is proving more liberal than the house. It already has restored more than 800 million of house cuts despite the fact it hasn't yet caught up with the house's pace. Some experts predict the senate will restore more than 1 billion in the year's work is done, which would reduce the savings to five billion. But this isn't necessarily so on this round. Foreign aid is in almost as much trouble as the rest of the bill, and there are those who say the senate will go along with most of the bill the lower chamber cut from the President's 4.3 billion request.

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IN THERE SWINGING—To the economists, it is refreshing to observe how the house continues to cut its meat and eat it, exciting that 15 billion from the independent agencies. The house appropriations committee recommended a 6.1 billion fiscal 1964 budget for the independent agencies and administration (NASA). This is 612 million less than the President and \$250 million less than authorized by the house and senate appropriations committees.

MOON FLIGHTS AND MATING CALLS—For NASA, the House has cut \$1.5 billion from the appropriations subcommittee the cut would delay the manned moon landing by two to three years and, eventually, add three billion to the total cost of the project. The House and Senate appropriations committees obviously were influenced by Kennedy's suggestion that the U.S. and Russia take up the moon together, and feel there should be some sharing of the cost.

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Not Even Close

The word "out" Another record high budget is in the offing for the federal government next year and it will have another built-in deficit. But Treasury Secretary Douglas Dillon says how the deficit next year will show a "shrinking" trend. He blames it all on "financial conditions over which the government has little control." Included in those conditions is the contention greater spending will reflect appropriations approved by congress in prior fiscal years. That's another way of saying the government requires more money for a specific task each succeeding year.

Secretary Dillon also passes along the word that this year's deficit probably will be below the current estimates of 9.2 billion dollars. Taxpayers who recall last year's 8-billion deficit aren't likely to stand up and cheer. However, Secretary Dillon terms the situation "heartening."

Voters may recall some campaign talk back in 1960 about balancing the budget. The first fiscal year under the Kennedy administration it was explained it would be impossible to balance the budget. He carefully pointed out the budget had been set up under the Eisenhower administration and the Kennedy forces had no control over it. Now Secretary Dillon says most of the increases in the budget during the last three years were caused by "the sharp stepup in our defense and space needs."

Already Secretary Dillon is explaining that next year's anticipated deficit (which he says will be somewhat below this year's) is to be blamed on the \$1-billion-dollar decrease in tax revenue because of the tax cut bill. Hasn't someone been explaining rather carefully that the tax cut will be a shot in the arm generally to the economy and will result in greater tax revenue because of the increases in business?

The bewildered taxpayer can be excused if he's getting even more bewildered. Secretary Dillon outlined his ideas of the budget and deficits before the American Bankers association convention in Washington, D. C. Each and every banker in the crowd must have realized what would happen to his bank if he tried to operate it after the example provided by the federal government.

Members of the audience also didn't have to use a battery of adding machines and computers to reach the conclusion the Kennedy administration will increase the federal debt by something like 25 billion dollars in four years. Recalling the 1960 promise of a balanced budget it appears the Kennedy administration won't even come close. In fact, the closest Mr. Kennedy will come to having a balanced budget is that first year in office when he was operating under a budget that was outlined by the Eisenhower administration and ended up with a more 4-billion deficit.

Campaign promises aren't important. Their chief purpose is to get votes. There was no cause for alarm. Just a misunderstanding. That's the official explanation out of Washington about the incident in which a U.S. convoy was blocked out of the narrow route to Berlin for some 48 hours. Russian armor blocked off the highway to the American convoy, touching off a battle two days. The situation was tense, both at the blockade point and in Washington, where diplomats were scurrying hither and yon.

The misunderstanding, it develops, was on the part of low-level Soviet officers, or ones similar to them, could just as easily have been a misunderstanding and upon fire an American troops. It also clears the misunderstanding, occurred rather than the low-level officers; else why did it take two days to correct the situation?

Here in the net of circumstances that could touch off a war, either conventional or nuclear, it could happen at any of the various points where Russian and U.S. troops come into contact. Or it could happen with a U.S. low-level officer at a missile site, or an elaborate step to safeguard against such an error, but have the Russians done anything?

A misunderstanding can be just as deadly as positive planning for warfare.

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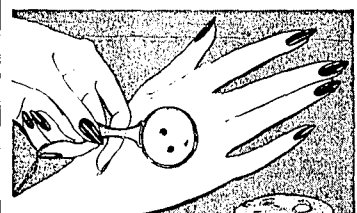

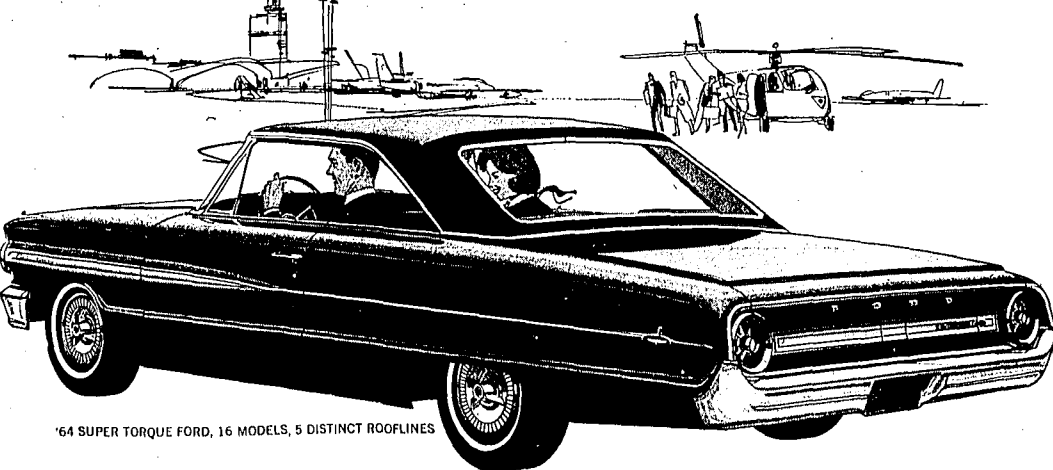

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16 (AP)—Mrs. Ngo Dinh Nhu brought her barnstorming defense of the South Vietnamese government to the capital today. There was no carpet welcome.

Only a handful of reporters and a small delegation from the South Vietnamese embassy were on hand Tuesday night when Mrs. Nhu and her teen-age daughter, 7, stepped from a shuttle flight from Newark, N.J.

Mrs. Nhu, sister-in-law of Vietnamese President Ngo Dinh Diem, has visited several Diem cities in the past 10 days, defending the regime in which her husband is a powerful adviser. She intends to carry her case across the country.

Agents from the airport were absent from the airport were Tran parents, Mr. and Mrs. Tran Ching, Ching, a Buddhist, quit last month to the United States, protesting what he called Diem's anti-Buddhist policies. He has become the Southeast Asian country for political opposition to Diem's regime.

Mrs. Nhu converted to Catholicism upon her marriage. Her husband and brother-in-law are Roman Catholics.

She will be in Washington three days.

Government Security Officer Denies Charges

Oeteka's letter was addressed to John Orinway, chief of the department's personnel operations division, who is reviewing charges which could result in Oeteka's dismissal.

Oeteka was suspended Sept. 23 on charges of conduct "unbecoming to an officer of the department of state."

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More Child Welfare Laws Are Urged

BOISE, Oct. 16 (AP)—Additional child welfare laws and appropriate funds for support of such programs have been urged by the Idaho conference of Social Workers.

The conference ended its annual meeting here Thursday with the election of John Harris, chief of the state division of child welfare, as president for the coming year.

Other officers elected were: Rex T. Smith, chief of public health, as department of public health president; Gretchen L. Johnson, treasurer; and A. Brannan, as secretary.

Members of the board of directors were: Jesse Beran, Twin Falls; Sam Day, Lewiston; and R. E. Kall, Boise.

The conference commended the 1957 legislature for enacting the most of the recommendations of the state's child welfare commission, but urged that action was also taken on several others.

The conference went on recommending an evaluation of the present tax structure, the state's present resolution, the state's present tax structure, and the state's present resolution.

The delegates expressed their belief that under the present tax structure the legislature is unable to provide sufficient funds for child welfare services.

Other resolutions, the conference gave its support to efforts to amend the public health department to implement programs for child welfare and recommended support for the implementation of the youth rehabilitation program carried out under the direction of the state health department.

The delegates also agreed to the function of the new children's legislation and make recommendations for improvement of the laws if necessary.

Demos View Vote Change For Parley

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16 (AP)—The Democratic National convention, which like "Topsy" just grew, may be trimmed to a more manageable size next year. And its collective voice may have less Southern drawl and Western twang.

The decisions will be made when the Democratic National committee meets in November or early December to allocate the votes for the 1964 convention at Atlantic City.

A subcommittee headed by Jacob Arvey, Chicago, the national committeeman from Illinois, has been studying the allocation of votes since last May.

No proposals have been announced, but sources close to the national committee say these could be among them when the committee meets:

A return to the bonus system. It could reward with larger representation those states, mostly east of the Mississippi — which voted for President Kennedy in 1960.

No bonuses, but a reduction in voting power of those states which lost representation in congress because of population shifts in 1950 and 1960 but, in effect, never lost any of their convention votes.

A combination of the two that would allocate votes on an up-to-date population basis plus bonus votes for multiples of Democratic votes in 1960, regardless of whether Kennedy carried the state.

Also expected to come up is a hardy quindrental — the number of persons at a Democratic convention.

Republicans limit their state delegations to one man-state vote basis. But Democrats over the years have split things up into half votes. That way more delegates get to go to the convention, a form of reward for party faithful.

But if also can be confusing. In 1960 there were 3,942 delegates authorized to cast 1,021 votes at the Los Angeles convention. And that didn't include more than 1,400 persons present as alternates.

To the politician, however, the number of delegates isn't nearly as important as the number of votes allotted each state.

Some critics felt the 1960 convention was weighted in favor of the East — but not all — Southern and far Western states.

Drought, Woodland Fires Plague Many Parts of Nation

CHICAGO, Oct. 15.—Drought and woodland fires continued to plague many parts of the nation today.

Drought conditions in some areas in the eastern half of the nation appeared near the critical stage. Hundreds of fires burned in the tinder-dry forest lands in the Northeast and Midwest sections.

Summer's lush green pasture lands in much of the Western rangelands and in other areas were dry and brittle. Hay shortages were reported. There was a heavy decline in feed for livestock. Milk production sagged. Marketing of cattle was higher than normal for the season.

Water levels on most of the Great Lakes and many major

river and streams were below seasonal levels. Water shortages developed in some communities and restrictions were ordered.

No accurate estimate of the damage the drought and fires have already caused in the past several weeks was available. But the Wabash Valley association in Indiana said that drought damage in southern Indiana and southeastern Illinois alone may total between 25 million dollars and 50 million dollars.

There appeared no immediate general break in the long dry spell across much of the eastern half of the country. Record high temperatures have been set in scores of cities in the first half of October, with readings in the 80s and upper

90s.

However, some heavy thunderstorms erupted in the Central plains and Mississippi valley. Thunderstorms accompanied by lightning struck West Central Kansas with the first rain of consequence since Sept. 2. A four-hour storm dumped 2.55 inches of rain on Hutchinson.

In the Southeast, 1.02 inches were recorded during a six-hour period in Miami, Fla. Thunder showers also fell on many other parts of Florida.

Hundreds of fires have burned thousands of acres of forestland in more than a dozen states. New York state's vast and valuable forestlands appeared threatened, but fires also spread across other areas in the Northeast including Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, Vermont and New Hampshire.

Flames also whipped through wooded areas in West Virginia,

New Bridey Murphy Book Eyed

PUEBLO, Colo., Oct. 15.—While in deep hypnosis, Mrs. Remember Bridey Murphy said that she had lived three lives in the past. Although she thought just as soon whether this particular Bridey Murphy ever lived outside the dreams of a Colorado housewife, under hypnosis is a matter for considerable argument.

Mrs. Bernstein, Pueblo business student of parapsychology and author, insists she did. He said Bridey will be reborn again next year—in print.

Bernstein, who wrote "The Search for Bridey Murphy" nine years ago, said his new book will prove that Bridey was not a hypnotist with a supply of ideas for his content that is a man's consciousness survives death.

Bernstein's long preoccupation with Bridey began in 1952 when a friend, Mrs. Hugh B. Tighe, agreed at a party to let him hypnotize her. Bernstein had been experimenting with hypnosis for 10 years before that.

He began describing in detail episodes in the life of Bridey Kathleen Murphy, including that she was born in Cork in 1893 and died in Belfast in 1902, as well as hypnosis sessions with her. As she lay in a state of deep hypnosis, Mrs. Tighe's speech and mannerisms were those of an Irish girl of little education in the 1890s.

Bernstein wrote his book on the basis of this and later sessions with Mrs. Tighe, who appeared in the book as "Bridey Simmons." The book was published in 30 countries with 200,000 hard-cover copies and 750,000 paperback copies. It was made into a movie.

Mrs. Tighe, who lives now in Denver suburb with her husband and three daughters, made it clear she thought just as soon she said she had lived three lives in the past.

NEW YORK, Oct. 16 (AP)—Supreme Court Justice Irving Saypol has let it be known he doesn't favor the fancy hats of attorney Paul Erd, fighting a constitutional challenge for refusing to take the stand in determining if the alleged witness was coerced to give a statement of perjury.

"You humiliated me as a lady and as an attorney," complained Mrs. Erd.

"Don't become personal and offensive," the judge replied.

Treasurers Distribute School Funds

BOISE, Oct. 16 (AP)—County treasurers began distributing \$4,472,997 to the state's 100 school districts today under the foundation program for education and transportation for the 1963-64 school year.

Announcement of the distribution, second for the year, was made Tuesday by D. F. Engelking, state superintendent of public instruction.

Washington county, which received 77 per cent of its total allocation for the year in the July distribution, was not included in Tuesday's fund transfer. All other counties have received only 50 1/2 per cent of their total allocations.

Tuesday's distribution represents a reduction of 1 1/2 per cent from the 49 million dollar allocation due from the 40 million dollars "appropriated" for the schools for the two-year period which began July 1.

The cut was ordered by the board of examiners when it appeared likely revenue for the current biennium would be short of the 101 1/2 million dollars appropriated from the general fund by the 1963 legislature.

The reduction was ordered for the first quarter of the biennium which ends Dec. 31.

"The school fund appropriation bill calls for additional distributions of \$4,897,000 on Dec. 31 and 22 million dollars next March 31. A transfer of \$7,334,562 was made last July 15.

Districts receiving more than \$100,000 in the Tuesday distribution were: Ada, \$442,670; Blain, \$462,946; Bingham, \$294,820; Bonneville, \$392,670; Canyon, \$470,183; Cassia, \$131,931; Elmore, \$101,825; Jefferson, \$141,903; Kootenai, \$168,666; Latah, \$140,489; Madison, \$121,814; Minidoka, \$144,813; Nez Perce, \$120,145; Payette, \$111,854; and Twin Falls, \$284,050.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16 (AP)—Konrad Adenauer stepped from office Tuesday after 14 unprecedented years as the first chief of the West German republic in this capital which he left with Adenauer's prestige in Washington so clearly as if he had never been there was a strange mixture of the official sentiment is all of feelings about him, which could be summed up in an over-simplification: He was greatly unappreciated, but was not popularly respected, but was not popularly respected, but was not popularly respected.

The words are warm and affectionate. Those who like them are generally no so. But some never interested in the "Old One."

Through the administration of President Dwight D. Eisenhower, the Bonn-Washington relationship was extremely close, built of Adenauer's character, integrity, largely on the warm personal and strong will could have led a friendship between Adenauer and completely defeated and destroyed the Bonn Washington relationship. Only a man clean shaven Brumack. And Eisenhower was said he was "one of the greatest statesmen of our times."

Secretary of State John Foster moralized nation back into the family of free peoples.

When Dulles died, relations began to slip. The allying continued at a stepped-up pace after the inauguration of President Kennedy in 1961.

For seven years—the peak of the Washington diplomatic scene—commented: "He is one of the few who deserve a statue in their honor."

Everything was cordial while Dulles ruled. The harmony between the two men was almost unappreciated Dulles, a man always cautious in choosing his advisers, once called the chancellor "one of the truly great men of our time."

Other contemporaries seconded Churchill's praise of the German leader, the most astute politician since Brumack. And Eisenhower said he was "one of the greatest statesmen of our times."

More time must elapse to get the necessary perspective to tell what went wrong after 1961. Adenauer, it is safe to say, did not trust the young men on the "new frontier." Because of this lack of trust, he developed a strange uneasiness which interrupted his desire to be reassured that the new administration did not plan to sell Germany down the river.

This was done again and again by Kennedy, orally and in many personal messages. Each reassurance seemed to work for some time. But then "Der Alte" (The Old One) would find some new cause for concern and new assurance would be required.

The result was an increasing feeling of frustration in Washington. Kennedy himself used superlatives in lauding the chancellor—he called him on his arrival in Germany last June "a great European statesman, an architect of unity, a champion of the liberty who already lives in the history he helped to make."

But less friendly words were used privately in the administration offices.

"It is time for them to grow up, to behave like equal partners who don't require to be reassured every fortnight that we love them dearly," one critic said.

Adenauer was sometimes described as a suspicious and jealous man. Those characteristics annoy Americans, especially if, as Washington firmly believes, there is no ground for suspicion or jealousy.

There were at least three events in recent years that caused officials to wonder about the chancellor.

to bring about reconciliation between the two ancient enemies. There were strong voices of appointment to be heard. Adenauer, these critics said, let himself be trapped by an error when he fell for the "new frontier" of the Kennedy administration. He had no clear idea of how he did not understand the American mind. Despite these irrevocable mistakes, Adenauer's political leadership in Europe's political history is not to be forgotten.

But if Erhard represents a change and a new era in the history of the Federal Republic, it is not to be forgotten.

The administration's approach does not agree with Adenauer's view of the world. Erhard is a real political leader, the thinking here. Erhard does not need any more experience.

Perhaps he has grown up and learned to have more respect for the chancellor's efforts.

Champ Gains Fame by Hands, Feet

NEW YORK, Oct. 16 (AP)—Willie Pep, a defiantly dapper dancer whose flying hands and feet earned him the world featherweight title and the nickname "The Flying Saucer," is the latest addition to boxing's hall of fame. "He is nice news," said Pep, who finished his selection. "I was surprised that I got it now."

Now a sales representative for a radio company in Brockton, Mass., Pep said "I miss boxing very much. It was an exciting life and it gave you a chance to meet a lot of very nice people."

Light-footed Willie, now 41, was one of the fastest, most clever boxers in modern history. His footwork often left opponents facing nothing but the crowd while Willie grinned triumphantly behind them.

In 1924 with a 15-round decision over "Chinky" Wrentham in New York, he was in military service for two years and retained the crown until the first of his classic fights with Sandy Saddler.

The inky Saddler won the first one in a fourth-round knockout in 1928, but Willie regained the title in 1949 with a decision over Saddler. Sandy won the next two on knockouts in 1950 and 1951.

Pep turned pro in 1946 and piled up the amazing record of 83 victories in a row before losing to Sumner Angert in a ten-round fight. He then won 72 of his next 73 bouts, married only by a draw.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 16 (AP)—California quarterback Craig Morton led his team in the Big Six total offense and passing statistics with the 205 yards he gained through the air last Saturday.

Ace Halfback Notes "Bad Deal" At Being Ousted

NORMAN, Okla., Oct. 16 (AP)—Ace halfback Joe Don Looney said Tuesday that "I got a bad deal" when he was ousted from the University of Oklahoma football team.

Head coach Bud Wilkinson said "my biggest regret is that I allowed him (Looney) to come back to the team this year."

Wilkinson announced Monday that Looney, on the basis of a vote by members of the team, was being dismissed for "disciplinary reasons."

Wilkinson broke his silence Tuesday on reasons for dismissing Looney and told Associated Press sports writer Norman Rowland:

"Team morale had just ceased to exist. It would have just been to look like a joke. We protected this guy for more than a year and we can't continue to protect one guy at the expense of 53 others."

Looney's father, Don Looney, Midland, Tex., also told the Associated Press that he had heard conflicting versions on how the dismissal of his son was handled.

The elder Looney, a former football ace, said Wilkinson told him by telephone the dismissal resulted after a vote by seniors on the team. But he said his son told him Wilkinson had called a meeting of the team, announced that Looney was being removed and "anybody who didn't like it could leave, too."

Young Looney intends to complete this term at Oklahoma and return to Texas Christian university, Fort Worth, one of three schools he attended before coming to Oklahoma.

"I'll go back to the (Texas) later and try to get a job," he told sports writer John Crowley of the Daily Op-Ed. "I'll be glad to go back to school."

"I still seem like a bad dream to me," Looney said. "I hardly know where to turn next. If we had won last week's Texas game with me having a good day, everything would have been okay."

Looney went only four yards in six carries during the game which Oklahoma lost 27-7 in the Cotton Bowl at Dallas.

Wilkinson said the dismissal was "no bolt out of the blue" but resulted from a chain of events.

"We had been living with this problem for more than a year and finally could take it no more," the 47-year-old coach said. He said the end came Monday morning when a delegation of team leaders came to his office.

"They told me they thought the presence of Looney on the team was hurting the team," Wilkinson said.

The coach said he talked with Looney before afternoon practice and told him the decision and when Looney asked if there was anything he could do, "I told him he should talk with

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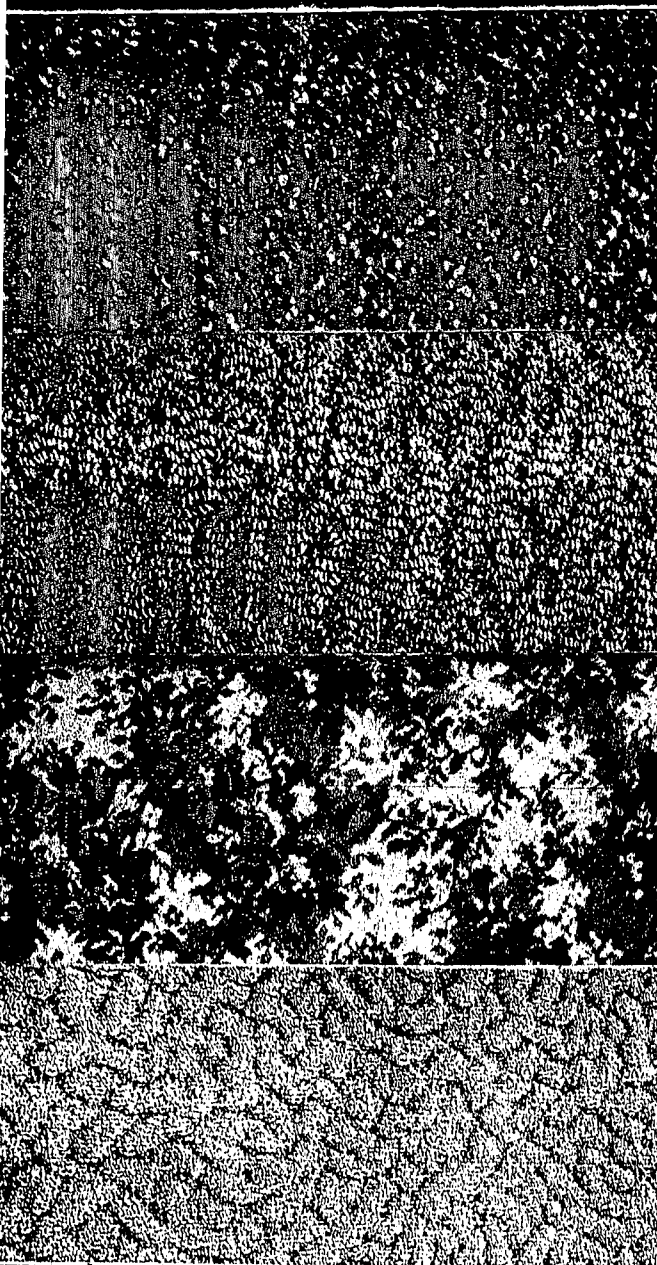
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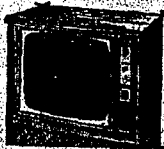
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Atlanta Is Facing New Negro Plan

 Atlanta faces a new "all the way" integration campaign that may provide some valuable pointers on just how well organized the racial movement has become. This is the first time Negroes have attempted to put their organizations together to do on a regional basis what the Aug. 29 march on Washington accomplished at a national level.

Atlanta is a southern city that has reached what might be termed a mid-point integration. Schools, parks, some theaters, transportation, some hotels and motels and a large number of restaurants have been desegregated.

There are, however, pockets of strong resistance, primarily in public accommodations and housing areas. These will be under attack in the new program, and there will be education drives to get more Negroes into better jobs and more Negroes to the election polls.

Major integration campaigns today rarely are triggered until many of the participants are trained and tested. So-called "non-violent workshops" provide instruction. Young students who may be in street crowds are told how to react in the presence of television cameras and what to say to treatment.

Recently, when two Negro girls attending West End high in Birmingham were showered with

stones from a smashed car window, a policeman found them perfectly willing to talk. Their families urged them to speak up. They were silenced by a 16-year-old Negro boy, who had learned the discipline of the movement.

Now the Negro movement is attempting to add organization and unity to the discipline and enthusiasm.

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High Court's Years Under Warren Cut Swath Through American Life

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16 (NPA)—The supreme court's ten years under Chief Justice Earl Warren have cut a huge swath through American life, raising some of the most important questions of personal liberty, individual rights, religious practice that still divide millions to bitter anger.

Children sitting beside Negro children in hundreds of schools, voters in long lines in Old South, urban and suburban areas casting their full weight for the first time in voting and prayer in public schools, all these changes register the every-day impact of what the Warren decade has done to the relations between men and their government.

In these years, congress and the presidency combined have not come closer to matching the social and political change in this country.

The school segregation cases, prayer and Bible reading decisions, the Tennessee legislative apportionment matter, the maker rulings on state court procedures rank as the most closely spaced landmarks in the high court's history.

Unusually, the court has brought down upon its collective head some of the most lavish and most furious criticism ever aimed at this always contentious tribunal.

The waves break most sharply against the figure of the chief

justice himself, "Impetuous Earl Warren" is the derogatory toll from billboards flung by the far right-wing John Birch society. Segregationists are the phrase Warren Court is a term of derision.

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Immunization Against Flu Is Advised

BOISE, Oct. 16 (AP)—Annual immunization against influenza was advised today by the Idaho state health department for persons most susceptible to the disease.
