That was one conclusion of a special three-man committee named a year ago to review association policy on hydroelectric power licensing. The committee said the idea should be considered only if non-federal entities, which include private power companies, were allowed to build and run power generating plants as part of federal projects. It didn't recommend such action.

Knowland Says Kennedy Ignores Laws

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) Oct. 21.—Sen. William F. Knowland today said that President Kennedy's approval of wheat sales to Russia demonstrates Kennedy's complete lack of executive power and his attempt to violate the constitution and ignore the laws.

The chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee said that the wheat sales are the first step toward a total sale of grain to Russia, which would be a violation of the Foreign Corrupt Practices Act and the Export Administration Act.

Knowland noted that the Joint Committee on Atomic Energy, which is authorized to write an opinion on the financing of wheat sales did not fall under the definition of credit in the law.

The "frontier" approach would have been to ask Congress to revise the law, Knowland said.

Vietnamese Blasted in Delta Battle

SAIGON, South Viet Nam, Oct. 21.—South Vietnamese and U.S. army officers expected trouble when they planned a major attack on a communist guerrilla unit deep in the Mekong delta.

Their fears were well founded. South Vietnamese troops absorbed their worst defeat in nine months. Government casualties were listed at 40 dead and 80 wounded, including 15 American.

The government estimated enemy casualties at 30 dead. No bodies were taken. Only four bodies were found.

The battle, termed by U.S. advisers "the bloodiest since the President John F. Kennedy's forces since a similar defeat Jan. 2, took place in a remote area of rice paddies and palm groves near Loc Ninh, 140 miles southeast of Saigon.

A considerable distance from helicopter bases and out of the range of government aircraft, the sector has long been infiltrated by guerrillas.

Entrenched in fortified positions, Viet Cong heavy machine-guns cut up two waves of South Vietnamese troops carried in by U.S. helicopters.

Another government battalion, brought in on foot failed to dislodge the Viet Cong's well-entrenched and well-equipped battalions. A third helicopter force was halted too.

By Sunday morning, the Viet Cong had pulled back in some places along the many canals in the area.

About 800 Vietnamese troops fought against a Viet Cong force more than 400 to 500 guerrillas, U.S. advisers said.

Four American crewmen were injured when a helicopter was hit by communist fire and flipped over in the mud. Another helicopter lost control and crashed, made a crash landing at an airfield 20 miles away after the American pilot was struck in the back by a communist bullet.

Viet Cong machine gunners also wounded the American crew member of a C-124, and two fighter pilots and damaged several other helicopters.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21 (AP)—If the justice department can spare him as a grand jury witness, Joseph Valachi will go back to Capitol Hill this week.

McClellan said the "sensitive nature" of the case would require Valachi's return appearance.

Kennedy Is Flayed for News Control

SAN BERNARDINO, Calif., Oct. 21 (AP)—Sen. Barry Goldwater, addressing a national newspaper week observance over the week-end, accused the Kennedy administration of endangering the nation's security through what he called "flagrant news management."

The Arizona Republican issued the accusation at a newspaper week meeting.

He specifically attacked the administration's handling of the announcements of "four recent international developments—the rubber test ban treaty, the deal to sell surplus wheat to Russia, the United Nations resolution banning nuclear weapons in outer space, and the Geneva disarmament plan."

Terminating the U.N. resolution, the most flagrant mismanagement of all because it made us close the door to the real military use of space," the potential GOP presidential candidate said.

Goldwater said the American people would have demanded changes in all four of these international developments had they known about them far enough in advance. But he said the announcements came too late for opposition to be mustered.

At a news conference earlier in the day, Goldwater said he has in the past advocated U.S. withdrawal from the United Nations—72 years to say that at best. To him, war is about the U.N. now.

"I've got to have an international debating society," said Goldwater. "Then I believe we could make it the best one possible. I believe members should be required to pay their dues or get out."

NOISE, Oct. 21—The board of managers of the Idaho Chapter of Parents and Teachers Sunday voted to ask the national PTA press to review its policy barring persons in political office from PTA posts. The Idaho chapter refused to follow that policy, rejecting a resolution that would have banned partisan office holders from the board. The state PTA treasurer said she will ask a legal opinion as to whether the organization loses its tax exempt status as a result of the stand. Mrs. George Tothkin, Boise, said she felt the question should be answered by the same body before it takes a vote at the annual convention entering the resolution.

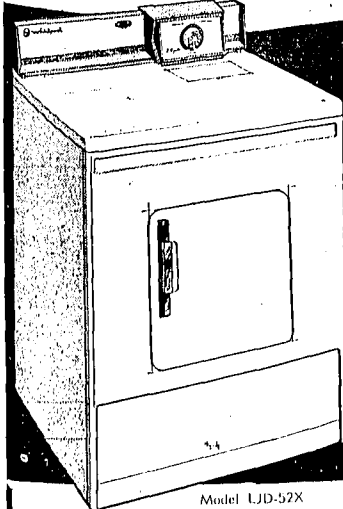

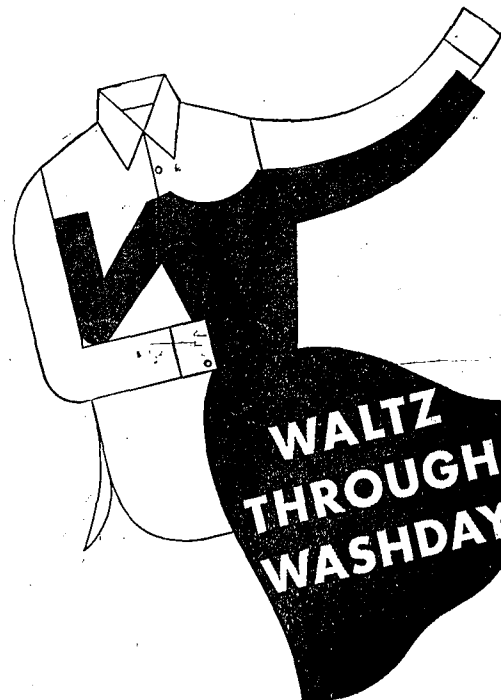

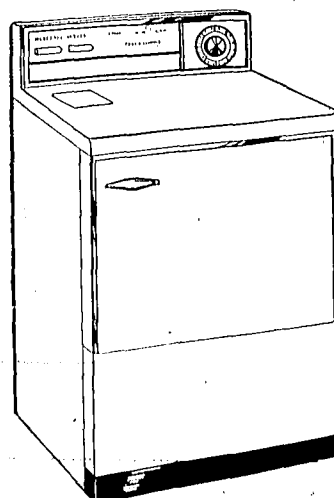

Drought Belt Is Explosive, Hits Economy

CHICAGO, Oct. 21 (AP)—The drought extending from Texas to New York and reaching explosive dryness over the week end, has the effect of the atomic bomb on the economy.

Seattle and other drought-stricken areas have been hit by the loss of crops and property. The drought has also hit the economy of the nation as a whole.

The drought has delayed the seeding of winter wheat in the Great Plains. Livestock producers in many areas have marketed their cattle early because of shortage of feed and water. Milk production in many areas was far below seasonal levels.

Officials in several eastern and midwestern states have ordered the closing of many forests and woodlands. Hunting and fishing have been banned.

Although light rain fell in central sections of the nation over the week-end, weather bureau officials and heavy rains are needed.

A storm off the Atlantic coast became a hurricane Sunday night. The hurricane, named Ginny, was accompanied by winds up to 85 miles per hour. A weather bureau forecaster said the storm, about 90 miles south-southeast of Cape Hatteras, N.C., could bring more wind than rain and thus increase the fire hazard in the parched eastern forests.

On the bright side of the dismal weather picture, the nation's major winter vegetable and citrus growing regions—Florida, California and the lower Rio Grande valley—reported favorable growing conditions. Irrigation from wells provided sufficient moisture for crops in the Rio Grande and Florida.

The arid conditions in southern Maine, New Hampshire and Vermont remained critical. Thousands of acres of forest and fields have burned in upstate New York in the scorching days since Oct. 1 and the weather bureau in Albany reported that the last 21 months, since Jan. 1, 1962, was the driest such period in the records of the bureau.

All Woodlands and fields in New York state were closed to the public. Hunting, fishing and outdoor fires were banned.

The New York health department warned that the widespread smog, especially in the Hudson valley, could cause trouble for persons with respiratory and heart ailments.

Pennsylvania was especially hard hit by the continued parching. The weather bureau said no immediate relief was in sight for the drought-weary state. Fires continued to break out—34 of them Saturday—across the state's timberlands.

More than half of Pennsylvania's 67 counties were declared disaster areas or were applying for disaster area status.

Hunters, farmers and others using the outdoors in Minnesota and Wisconsin were warned not to get any kind of spark.

Agriculture sources in Alabama said the state "was in a critical and a hazardous condition."

In some areas farmers were unable to plow the dry earth.

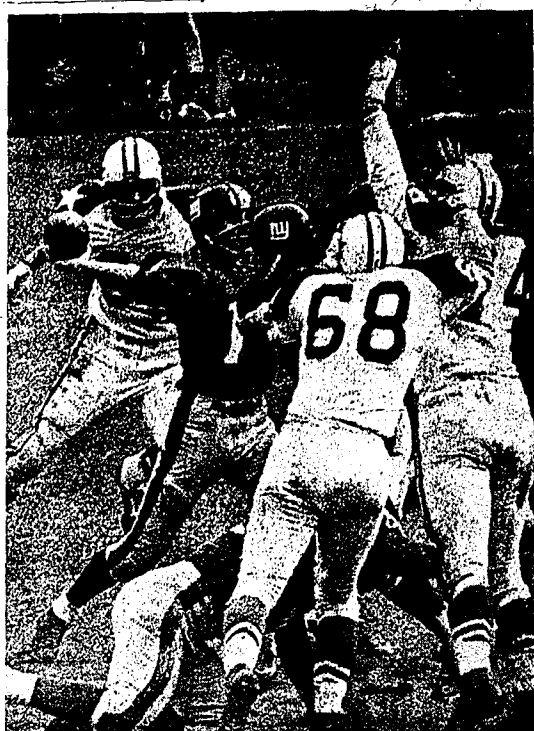
